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Introduction

The 1960 Census Tract Summary File was created by merging the Census Bureau's 1960 3- and 8-block matrix tally tapes. The original 3-block file contains tract tallies derived from 100-percent questionnaire items. The 8-block tape contains tract data based on sample questionnaire items. Table I on the following page indicates the sampling fraction for each of the 63 tables contained in the data record². Note that some tables are repeated on both a complete-count and sample basis. Totals for these "duplicate" tallies will not necessarily agree.

Census Bureau source documents describing the original 3-and 8-block tapes may be obtained for the cost of reproduction by writing to the Central Users' Service, Bureau of the Census, Washington D.C. 20538. Refer to 1950 Decennial Operations Division Technical Memoranda 20B (3-Block Matrix) and 29T (8-Block Matrix).

B. Conventions for Data Records

Block (Physical Record) Size

Block-size for this summary file follows 1970 census summary tape conventions and has been fixed for the entire file at one block-size which is an even multiple of 120 characters. No data item is ever split across a 120-character sub-block or a physical record although the practice of splitting tables across these units often occurs.

The block-size for the 1960 tract file is 1,800 characters.

Logical Record Size

A logical record consists of the geographic identification and all data fields for one summary matrix comprising a single geographic area.

The logical record size for this file is 10,800 characters or 6 physical records. Each logical record consists of 207 characters of geographic identification and padding followed by 1,177 nine-character fields containing population and housing summary data and padding.

Total File Size

Approximately 23,000 logical records for the United States.

Sequence of Files

Knowledge of the pattern of data organization, often referred to as the "sort sequence", is necessary to locate and perhaps further aggregate census data on the summary tapes. The file described in this document consists of records for 1960 census tracts. The file is in sort (ascending sequence) by tract (prefix, basic, and suffix) within county within state. Records for "split tracts" (i.e., tracts that have been divided into two or more portions because they cross corporate or other boundaries) occur together in the file within their respective counties. A diagram illustrating this sequence is shown on the following page.

Conventions for Fields

--Geographic Identification

The geographic codes which identify a logical record are contained in the first 207 characters of the first block of the logical record. (Field sizes for these codes are variable.) This identification is not repeated in subsequent blocks of the record.

The designation "padding" has been applied broadly and refers both to characters that are unused or which contain information that is not relevant at the census tract level of summarization.

Geographic fields so identified may be blank, contain zeros, or numeric or alphanumeric representations. In all instances these fields may be ignored.

--Data Fields

Data fields contain integers only and are a uniform size of 9 characters each. Padding conventions for data fields are as described above.

Suppression Rules

--Complete Count Data (Tables 1 - 16):

1. If total population is less than 5; tables 1, 8, and 11 through 16 will be suppressed and contain zeros.
2. If total housing units is less than 5; tables 2 through 7 will be suppressed and contain zeros.
3. If total housing units is 5 or more but
 - a) if total owner-occupied units reporting value is less than 5; then table 7 will be suppressed and contain zeros.
 - b) if total renter-occupied units reporting rent is less than 5; table 10 will be suppressed and contain zeros.

--Sample Data (Tables 17 - 63):

If Nonwhite (Spanish Surname/Puerto Rican) population is less than 400; then sample detail for these universes will not be shown and all pertinent fields in tables 17 through 63 will be filled with zeros. No other suppression rules apply to sample tables 17 through 63.

C. Label Conventions

Header and trailer labels on DUALabs' 1960 Census Tract Summary Tape copies are standard OS labels.

Labels are classified into two required types: "volume" labels, where "Volume" coincides with a physical tape reel, and "File" labels, where "File" has the normal meaning of a collection of related data records, more than or less than one reel.

A label is always an 80-character physical record.

In the conventions for the 1960 tapes, labels are restricted to the following:

1. One Volume Header (VOL1) at the beginning of each physical tape reel.
2. Two File Headers (F0H1,2) at the beginning of each file and at the beginning of each tape reel (following the Volume Header) within file.
3. One Volume Trailer (EOV1) if end of tape does not coincide with end of file.
4. Two File Trailers (EOF1,2) at end of file. If end of tape and end of file coincide, use only File Trailers.

The rules for tape mark are:

1. One tape mark separates labels and data, occurring after all labels which precede data, and before all labels which follow data.
2. Two tape marks appear at the end of tape after EOV or EOF records.
3. If a file ends within a volume and another file is written on that volume, then one tape mark both precedes and follows the end of file labels; the next file headers appear and are separated from their data by a tape mark.

Label Content

As noted, the labels on DUALabs' tape copies are standard IBM OS labels. The File Identifier (Data Set Name) which appears beginning in character 5 of the First File Header Label is as follows:

1. State-separate and -merged compressed copies:
DSN = STA~~A~~1960■, where AA=1960 State code.
C
2. State-separate and -merged straight copies:
DSN = STAAX5CS, where AA=1960 State code.

Note that all state-merged versions retain each State's data as a separate file.

Unlabeled Tape Copies

Unlabeled copies simply contain data followed by a tape mark. In the case of State-merged files, where each State's data constitutes a separate file and there is more than one file on a reel, a tape mark separates each State's data.

D. Character Set

The character set is restricted to those characters which are generally accepted and which are represented by a unique code in any particular coded decimal language. Analysis of the IBM binary coded decimal tape code recognized by 9 computer manufacturers on approximately 15 different computer types reveals a consensus on the 10 decimal digits, the 26 alphabetic symbols, 6 special characters, and the blank or space. Also, each of these systems recognizes the tape mark.

The character conversion chart on the following page contains the 43 character graphics and their coded representation in BCD and EBCDIC. The 6-bit character code is shown in octal representation; the 8-bit character code is shown in hexadecimal.

The six special characters which may be used in data intended for interchange are indicated below. They also appear on the character conversion chart shown on the next page.

- 1/ This is a 6-bit code known as binary coded decimal, used originally in earlier model IBM computers and peripheral devices.
 - 2/ This is an 8-bit code, known as extended binary coded decimal interchange code, which originated with IBM Systems 360.
 - 3/ In the octal representation of each 6-bit code, the three high order bits are represented in the most significant digit of the octal code, and the three low order bits are represented in the least significant digit of the octal code. The range of each octal digit is 0-7.
 - 4/ In the hexadecimal representation of the 8-bit code, the four most significant bits are represented in the most significant position of the hexadecimal code, and the four least significant bits are represented in the least significant position of the hexadecimal code. The value range of each hexadecimal character is 0-15 where the values 10, 11 - - - 15 are defined by the letters A, B - - - F, respectively.
 - 5/ Octal 20 for blank, in BCD, appears only on tape. Internally this code is 00 and the difference between the internal and external representations is handled automatically by the hardware. Where BCD is generated internally in the UNIVAC 1107 or 1108, and written to tape without the hardware translation, the octal 20 must be created in core.

II. Description of File Contents--1960 Census Tract Summary Tape

A. Explanation of Tabulation Description

Tabulation Description Elements (Applies to subject tabulations only, not geographic codes.)

The data fields in each record are organized into tables in the documentation, which are described in terms of their major components or elements. The first element consists of DUALabs' Data Descriptor Numbers for use with DUALabs' 70-Series Programs. These are 6-digit numbers consisting of a table number (first three digits) and a line number within a table (last three digits). (Geographic codes also have 6-digit Data Descriptors, which always begin with a "G".)

The second element is the tabulation title which is a description of each tabulation on the tape. The order of presentation of items on the tape is not reflected in the title.

The third element is the total number of data items or fields in the table.

The fourth element is the universe being tabulated; e.g., persons, persons 14 years and over, vacant housing units.

The fifth element constitutes the variables or stratifiers by which the universe is classified; e.g., age, sex, plumbing facilities. The name of each stratifier is preceded by the word "By" and followed in parentheses by the number of categories of the particular stratifier.

Below the stratifier names are listed the stratifier categories (sixth element) used to classify the universe in the particular tabulation.

Note the use of the colon following some of the stratifier categories. This indicates that there is no actual item of data on the tape for that category as such. Looking back at the example, the first item or number on the tape for tabulation 21 is for Total Males Now Married, the second item for Total Males Widowed. Following five items of Marital Status for Males, the sixth item is Total Females Now Married, the 11th item Negro Males Now Married, and so on.

Position Identification

At the top of each page describing the data within this file is a unit identifier. It is used to pinpoint the physical location on the tape file of the first data field described upon that page. The elements describing the position are BLOCK (a physical division of the record or tape) and CHARACTER within block.

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1960 Censuses of Population and Housing Census Tract Summary Tape

1. Intervals in value tables 001000 and 013000 should be changed so that the tenth and units digits of all dollar figures are zero and so that there are gaps of \$100 between class intervals. According to the Census Bureau, the gaps are retained for several reasons, the most important of which is that any amount smaller than \$100 has no significance in an estimate of value and gives a spurious impression of greater accuracy than exists. Past experience with schedules on which value of property was written in indicated that respondents were in integral multiples of \$100 in all but a slight percentage of cases. Class intervals were thus provided on the 1960 questionnaires with \$100 gaps between class intervals.
2. Contract rent table 065000 was tabulated for rented-occupied units only. The universe for this table should be changed accordingly.
3. The following changes should be noted concerning table 068000, Urban-Rural Location and Tenure:
 - a) The universe includes vacant seasonal and migratory units and should be changed to read Count of Occupied and Vacant Housing Units.
 - b) Rural detail has been tabulated in places of less than 50,000 population only.
