PREPARING OUR UNIVERSITIES FOR THE FUTURE

Created in 2002, the Alliance Program is a unique academic joint venture between four leading universities that share a common vision of their evolving role in a world of interdependence and complexity. The program expands the scope of experiences and opportunities to students and professors, and through innovative collaboration and dialogue in the areas of education and research, it allows for the development of policy-relevant scholarship and dialogue within and beyond the academic community.

Every year, more than 130 students and 40 professors benefit from the Alliance, and 40 conferences are organized in Paris and New York on the pressing issues of our time. The Alliance Program is now endowed at Columbia University for what is, in Columbia history, the first joint endowment with international partners.

In a word, the Alliance Program is a model of academic partnership between four higher education leaders that together represent tomorrow's global university: "Un des nec plus ultra des réseaux internationaux des grandes écoles s'appelle Alliance" (*Le Monde de l'Education*, October 2005).
