

Hadrian's Villa

Columbia Summer Program in Italy: Archaeological Fieldwork



Activities

Students participate in trips to Rome and nearby areas to help situate Hadrian's Villa within the broader context of the residential culture of Roman emperors, and to appreciate its impact on Renaissance architecture.

Housing

Students live in a hotel near the excavation site. Meals are provided during the week.

Academic Program

Columbia University offers a four-week summer program that provides undergraduate and graduate students with the unique opportunity to excavate and learn together at Hadrian's Villa, a UNESCO World Heritage site near Rome and the most important Roman villa. It synthesizes Roman, Greek, and Egyptian architectural and artistic traditions and has attracted scholarly attention for centuries.

Students enroll in the following course:

***Hadrian's Villa: The Archaeology of an Imperial Court.* 6 points.**

Coursework includes daily excavations, workshops, seminars and on site presentations. Central to the course is the combination of fieldwork with the formulation of new historical questions and scholarly approaches. The project is intended both to promote familiarity with advanced archaeological techniques and to suggest avenues about how to employ technical knowledge to think critically about the importance of Hadrian's Villa in the ancient world.

The project is part of Columbia's Advanced Program of Ancient History and Art (APAHA), a program created under the joint aegis of Columbia's Italian Academy for Advanced Studies in America and H2CU, the Honors Center of Italian Universities of the Sapienza University in Rome.
