DESCRIPTION

Part I.

A collection of about 250 catalogued items consisting of correspondence with various Governors of the State of New Jersey during the years 1908-1936. Governors represented in the collection are: Woodrow Wilson, John Franklin Fort, and Morgan F. Larson. The subject of the correspondence is extremely varied and is typical of the material crossing the desk of the average Governor. Typical items are: a letter from a local W.C.T.U. chapter complaining about conditions at a local militia camp; a diplomat outraged at the treatment afforded a countryman at a local amusement park; a memorial erected to a Mexican Aviator killed in the state; official transmittal of the Supreme Court decision in the Delaware River Basin Case involving New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania; campaign contributions; and intra-party correspondence during the Wilson Gubernatorial administration.

Part II.

A collection of three scrapbooks consisting of correspondence from contributors to the Wilson Campaign chest, arranged by state and town of the correspondents. The collection offers insight into the grass roots appeal that Woodrow Wilson had for the poor and lower middle class American of the early twentieth century.
