The Minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

A Petition of Gurdon S. Manwaring—one of Andrew R. Miller—of Andrew Smyth—of John Vial—of John Marschalk—of William Harriman—and of Ebenezer Cole for the appointment of Weighmaster—were read and laid on the Table.

A Petition of Ann Smith for extension of time for payment of a balance due from her on an Assessment upon Lot No. 24 in Roosevelt Street was [115] read and referred to the Finance Committee.

A Memorial was received from Julia M. Lawrence, Widow of the late Captain James Lawrence of the United States' Navy who fell in the engagement between the United States' Ship Chesapeake with the British Ship Shannon, stating that on the 14<sup>th</sup> of September 1813 the Common Council after sundry recitals resolved that in testimony of their high sense of acts of devotion to our country and of the regard in which they held the memory of the deceased that the sum of One thousand dollars be granted to each of the children of the said Captain James Lawrence, to be placed in the hands of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and the Interest thereon to be added yearly to the principal and to be paid to the daughter when she arrives at the age of Eighteen years and to the Son at the age of Twenty one years, and in case of the death of either the portion of the deceased to go to the Survivor: that the Infant son has since died—leaving his Sister Mary N. Lawrence surviving—and praying the Common Council to carry said Resolution into effect—which having been read was referred to the Finance Committee.

A Petition of John Varick to be appointed Deputy Clerk [116] of Grand and Gouverneur Street Markets: one of John Miller for Stall No. 5 Spring Street Market: of John Crawbuck and Hassel Wheeler for stalls in the Market erecting in Grand St. and of James Puddy for Butcher's License and Stall in the Fly Market—were read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition of the Captains of the Second District of the City Watch, complaining of the insufficiency of the present caps of the Watchmen—was read and referred to the Watch Committee.

A Petition of sundry Inhabitants of the 8<sup>th</sup> Ward, complaining that the water of the Well at the corner of Spring and Varick Streets was very bad, and praying a new one may be sunk, and a Petition for a Well in Spring Street at the corner of Wooster Street—were read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Ward and Street Commissioner.

A further petition of Cornelius Harsin, to be reimbursed for expences of a wharf erected by him and to release the same to the Corporation, accompanied with a Statement of said expen- [117] diture, was read and referred to the Committee on Wharves.

A Petition from sundry Inhabitants that Beaver Street between William and Broad Streets may be raised and repaved, was read and referred to the Street Committee and Street Commissioner.

A Petition of Gilbert Davis, of Joseph Green, of James Rogers and of Luke Gillen, praying remission of penalties said to be incurred by selling liquor without license, were read and referred to the Attorney to report the facts.

A Remonstrance from sundry owners of Ferry Boats employed between the City and Staten Island against granting to Aaron Ogden the exclusive right of the Wharf at Whitehall Slip for his Steam Boat was read and referred to the Ferry Committee.

A Petition that a Building in Water Street near Pike Street which projects into the Street and is also from its decayed State dangerous to passengers may be removed, was read and referred to the Counsel and Street Commissioner to report.

A Petition of William Freeman for appointment as [118] Measurer of Grain was read and referred to the Committee on Applications.

A Confidential Communication from Jonas Humbert Jr. on the subject of oil was referred to the Lamp Committee.

A Similar Communication from the same person on the subject of Flour used by the Bakers in this City was read and referred to the

Committee on the subject of the Inspection of Loaf Bread—Viz. Committee on Laws.

A Petition that Leonard Street between Orange and Elm Streets may be regulated and paved—was read and referred to the Committee on Streets.

A Petition that Avenue D. may be opened and regulated from North Street to the Market place was referred to the Road Committee.

A Petition of William Mooney for permission to transfer the Lease of lots held by him under the Corporation to the Mutual Insurance Company was read and laid for consideration until a Report from the Finance Committee on the [119] subject which was to be presented this evening was read.

A Petition in behalf of the Corporations of Hudson and Athens for the use of the Mud Machine was read and referred to the Committee of Wharves—with authority to grant the prayer of the petition.

A Communication from Alfred S. Pell on the subject of numbering Hackney Carriages and other regulations respecting them was read and referred to Mr. Allen Ald. Mesier Mr. Akerly.

A Petition of the Medical Society of the County of New York for the use of a Room in which to hold their meetings was read and referred to the Committee on Public Offices with authority to grant the prayer of the Petition.

A Petition of Peter S. Webb for remission of fine for selling bread under weight, the same having been baked by contract of a certain weight and to be sold out of the City, was read and leave given to Petitioner to withdraw his petition.

[120] Petitions, of J. Scoles for privilege to construct a vault in Hester Street, and of James B. Murray for a Vault in Warren Street were granted on the usual terms under direction of the Street Commissioner

A Petition from sundry Inhabitants that the Line of the Fence of the Park in Hudson Street may be set back so as to range with the line of said Street was read and referred to the Committee on Public Lands and Places.

A Petition of John Brinckley for permission to assign to the Washington Insurance Company the Lease of No. 118 Chrystie Street was read and referred to the Comptroller and Counsel to grant the prayer of the petition, upon the Rent due on said Lease being paid & discharged.

The following persons were appointed Firemen, the Chief Engineer certifying the Vacancies, Viz.

[122] The Street Commissioner presented an Assessment for paving Ludlow Street from Delancey to Rivington Street—which was confirmed and Morris De Camp appointed Collector thereof.

He also presented the following Ordinances—which were passed: Viz—for repaving Spring Street from Wooster to Thompson Street and for repaving Jacob Street from Frankfort to Ferry Street, and Jacob C. Mott, Abraham Baudouine and John Brower were appointed Assessors: for regulating and paving Franklin Square, and Roger

Strong, Abraham Bloodgood and Jacob C. Mott were appointed Assessors; and for building a Common Sewer in Canal Street from the Westerly side of the Bulkhead in Washington Street to Collect Street, and Peter Hawes, Roger Strong and John Targee were appointed Assessors therein.

He also presented a Return of Delinquents on Assessments for paving Broadway—whereupon a Warrant was directed to issue to the Collector for collecting the same.

The Counsel presented a Release of Quit rent to Garrit Storm and Susan his wife, Juliana M. [123] Gouverneur, Adelaide Gouverneur, and Isaac H. Gouverneur, heirs of Isaac Gouverneur deceased, Richard J. Tucker, Thomas Irvin and John Reade on a lot in the First Ward granted 15<sup>th</sup> February 1769 to Nicholas Gouverneur, the Commutation for the same having been paid by Garrit Storm—whereupon—the Release was directed to be duly executed.

The Counsel presented draughts of the following deeds, which were directed to be duly executed:

“For lots Nos. 22 and 14 of the Collect lots to Thomas Egerton

For lot No. 191 of the Collect lots to Edmund Kirby

For lot No. 154 of the Collect lots to James Vincent—And for a triangular lot of ground in Chamber Street to Elbert Anderson which have been prepared in pursuance of instructions from the Comptroller.

Also a lease of a narrow slip of ground bordering on Roosevelt Street to Charles M<sup>c</sup>Carty—which has been prepared in pursuance of an order of the Board. This lease is for eight years and nine months from the first of August last with a covenant for a renewal

Also a covenant with Peter M. Allison for building [124] a pier at the foot of Oliver Street—which has been prepared in pursuance of instructions from the Assistant Street Commissioner.”

He also, agreeably to the Report of the Finance Committee, Comptroller and Counsel, to whom had been referred the report of the Comptroller, Street Commissioner and Counsel on the subject of the pier at the foot of Courtlandt Street, presented the Counterpart of *the counterpart* of an agreement with John Mullanphy and the Comptroller respecting the north side of the pier on the South side of Courtlandt Street—which agreement was directed to be duly executed. The Report of the Street Commissioner, Comptroller and Counsel was as follows:

“That all the interest of Jacob Wilkins in this pier was mortgaged

by him to the Eagle Fire Company, which mortgage has been foreclosed and the property purchased in at a sale under a decree of the Court of Chancery by a Mr. Mullanphy, who is now of course entitled to all the interest which Jacob Wilkins had in the premises at the time he executed the Mortgage.

[125] Mr. Mullanphy now offers the premises to the Corporation upon the same terms which they hold them from the Executors of the will of Jacob Wilkins, excepting that he requires a relinquishment of all right to call upon him for any portion of the rent in arrears. The undersigned are of opinion that it would be for the interest of the Corporation to accept of his proposition, excepting so far as relates to the relinquishment of rent, and that a sum equal to the proportion now due from him for rent should be paid to him, as a relinquishment of the right to demand rent from the owner of a part of the premises might operate as a relinquishment of the whole rent in arrear."

On which report that of the Finance Committee, Comptroller and Counsel was as follows:

"That they have had the same under consideration and agree with them in their report. They recommend that the same be adopted and that the Counsel be instructed to prepare a lease accordingly, the rent to commence on the 1<sup>st</sup> of August 1817, the time at which the property was sold by order of the Chancellor."

[126] He also presented the draught of a Contract for making a sewer in Canal Street—which was referred to the Canal Committee.

The Street Committee, on the petition that Water Street at Corlaer's Hook may be paved, reported: "That the Carriage Way from Clinton Street to near Corlaer's Street is paved agreeably to the directions of the Board: that the owners of the property have been directed by the Street Commissioner to lay the sidewalks. A number have complied and the whole will be done in due time. That part of the street lying between Pike and Rutgers Slip they would recommend to be regulated, the Curb stone laid and the side walk to be gravelled, and that the Street Commissioner prepare an ordinance to that effect."

The same Committee, on the petition for paving Water Street from



Pike to Rutger Street reported in favor of the petitioners—both which reports were approved.

[127] The same Committee, on the petition for regulating Roosevelt Street so as to carry the water on the surface, presented a report which was read and laid for consideration.

A Resolution was presented referring to the Street Committee to consider the propriety of regulating the Sewer in Roosevelt Street on the same plan with that in Ferry Street, and was agreed to.

The same Committee, on the petition to widen Market Street, presented a report which was referred back to the same Committee.

The Alms' House Committee presented the following report—which was ordered to be filed:

“That the humane views of the Corporation in relation to the insane have been carried into effect. Apartments have been fitted up in the North wing of the Alms' House at Bellevue and the male maniacs have been removed from the Penitentiary to these apartments under the care of a person taken on trial as a keeper. There are now 14 persons in his charge, and as there are accommodations for thirty, provided they are not raving mad, it is the intention of the Committee to remove some of the crazy paupers at the Lunatic Asylum to these [128] new apartments as soon as the Keeper shall become somewhat accustomed to the management of such persons. The Committee have also directed some better arrangements for the female maniacs requiring particular attention.

“In visiting the Alms' house Establishment the Committee have been very much pleased with the order, neatness and regularity displayed in the management of this Institution and take this opportunity of expressing their satisfaction with the Commissioners and all the officers of the house. They find upon examination that on the 1<sup>st</sup> September instant there were in the different buildings 1565 persons:

Of these there were about 70 sick in the Hospitals and 40 in the different wards not requiring to be removed to the hospitals." which was ordered to be filed.

[129] The Committee of Wharves, Piers and Slips, on the petition of Deborah Post, reported: "That the prayer of the petitioner ought to be granted—that is to have a Water grant for a lot situated at Corlaer's Hook between Abraham Legget and Cornelius Ray and to extend from Water Street to the permanent line of South Street."

[130] The Market Committee, on the subject of Forestallers occupying the Market, reported:

"That in the discharge of their duty they find great difficulty in preventing occasions of the law for regulating the Public Markets. The small meats brought to the lower Fly Market are, with very few exceptions, first brought by the persons offering them for sale in and about this City: or the creatures are sent them by some person residing a few miles in the country, with whom an arrangement is made for that purpose, to sell on commission or as pretended agents for the owner—to the great detriment of our own Butchers who are restricted to a particular stand, while these people enjoy all the privilege and advantages of the Market intended for the man who brings the produce of his own farm for sale. The same system in effect is practised by the sellers of poultry, eggs and vegetables. The Lower Market, together with the ground appropriated for the Country people, is daily occupied by persons under the denomination of agents—and it is not



uncommon for men bringing articles of produce from the country to distribute them among several of these agents, [131] thereby occupying three or four stands at one and the same time contrary to the true spirit and intent of the law. "The Committee take it for granted that the object in preventing our own butchers from occupying stands in the lower market was that by appropriating a convenient place for the sale of country produce the farmer might be encouraged to bring to the City the small meats and other articles produced on his own farm: but by the system now pursued this object is completely defeated, as it is a rare thing to see a farmer in the market with meats &c. of his own raising, almost every article being sold on commission or by the pretended agents of the farmer. The truth is, in the opinion of the Committee, that nearly, if not all, these agents are Butchers or Hucksters in disguise, who under cover of their agency have an opportunity of evading the law forestalling and other improper acts. The Committee cannot perceive the propriety of permitting the market thus to be occupied to the exclusion of our own citizens who are regular bred butchers and at the same time subjects of taxation, high rents and other inconveniences incident to a residence in this City, while the persons alluded to, who are principally residents of Long Island, perform no duty and pay [132] no taxes in this County. The Committee are of opinion that the evils complained of will in some measure be remedied by doubling the fees on all meat offered for sale in and about the lower market, except that sold by the person who raised the creatures on his own farm—and by compelling those denominated agents to pay a certain price for their stand toward defraying the expence of the public markets. The following Resolutions are therefore offered:

"Resolved that the fees for selling meats in and about the lower Fly Market, except that sold by country people being the produce of their own farms, be raised to double the amount fixed by the law to regulate the public Markets.

"Resolved—that the Market Committee be authorised, at their discretion, to grant permits to all persons selling fruits, vegetables, poultry, eggs or butter in or near said Market, and to fix such fees, rates or sums of money to be paid for such permits as they may deem just and reasonable—provided, however, that it shall not be necessary for country people, resorting to said market to sell their own provisions to have or pay for such permits."

whereupon—the resolutions therein proposed [133] were agreed to, and the Counsel directed to report an Ordinance agreeably thereto.

The Finance Committee, on the application of William Mooney, reported:

“That Mr. William Mooney, who holds Two lots of ground in Chatham Street under lease from the Corporation, for the purpose of improving that part of said lots fronting on Chamber Street, and to pay the arrears of rent due on the same has made an arrangement with the Mutual Insurance Company for the loan of a sum of money, and therefore requests permission from the Board to assign his leases to said Company as security for the sum to be loaned. The Committee consider the request of Mr. Mooney reasonable; and as the permission to assign will not lessen the security of the Corporation, they respectfully recommend the following resolution:

“Resolved that William Mooney be permitted to assign to the Mutual Insurance Company of the City of New York the leases held by him for Two lots of ground in Chatham Street belonging to the Corporation—provided he pay to the Comptroller all the money which shall be due or owing on said lots for rent or otherwise.

“Resolved—that the Counsel of the Board be instructed [134] to discontinue the suit pending with Mr. Mooney, on his paying the costs accruing thereon.”

whereupon the resolutions proposed were agreed to.

The Finance Committee, on the communication of J. Waterman, reported: “That the lot alluded to is situated at the corner of Water and Roosevelt Streets and is charged with the sum of 515 dollars and 68 cents. The lease held by Mr. Waterman contains the usual conditions and includes all taxes and Assessments to be imposed during the term for which it was given. The Committee however subscribe by no means to the justice of these conditions, particularly when applied to the present case, inasmuch as the improvement is only applicable to the Lessee during the term of his lease and after that reverts to the owner of the fee. It appears as a matter of equity, therefore, that the Lessee ought to pay only so much of the Assessment as his Leasehold is benefitted by the improvement, and that the remainder, if any, ought to be [135] paid by the Lessor. Adopting this

as a principle, the Committee have calculated the ratio benefit to be derived by Mr. Waterman at 245 dollars 55 cents, leaving the amount to be paid by the Corporation at 270 dollars and 13 cents and they offer the following Resolution accordingly:

“Resolved that the Collector of Assessment for opening Roosevelt Street be instructed to receive from Jedediah Waterman 245 dollars and 55 cents, in lieu of the whole amount imposed on the lot held by him under lease from the Corporation situated at the corner of Water & Roosevelt Streets.

“For the purpose of establishing a general principle in relation to Assessments on property held under lease from the Corporation for opening and enlarging streets or public places, the Committee beg leave to propose the following Resolution for the consideration of the Board:

“Resolved that the Counsel of the Board be instructed to request the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, who are, or who may be hereafter appointed by the Supreme Court for the purpose of opening, extending or enlarging any street or public place in this City, to assess on the Lessee or lessees of property belonging to the Corporation only so much of the cost of such improve[me]nt as he or [136] they shall, in their opinion be benefitted thereby, in proportion to the extent of his term, and the remainder, if any, on the Corporation.”

The Special Committee on the subject of regulating Greenwich Village presented a Report which was read and the consideration thereof postponed: 50 copies were directed to be printed for the use of the members.

Mr. Allen presented a Communication containing Resolutions for the regulating of the Weighmasters—which was read and laid for consideration. One of said Resolutions recommending the increase of the number of Weighmasters to 23 was considered and agreed to and upon motion afterwards extended to 24. The Board then proceeded to appoint an additional number of Weighmasters—when the following were appointed:

An Invitation from the Columbian Society to attend the celebration of the victories of Champlain and Plattsburg on Friday next at Washington Hall was presented and accepted.

"Resolved that it be referred to a Committee to consider the expediency of prohibiting the Manhattan Company from digging up and leaving the Streets of this City unpaved in such manner as to be dangerous to passengers, and also to consider of the propriety of taking measures to obtain compensation for injury done by the said Company to the pavements in this City."

A Petition of William Harriman for continuance of appointment of Weighmaster, and one of Joseph G. Sidney to be appointed to paste up notices of the Corporation in the Streets—were read and referred to the Committee on Applications.

A Petition for a Well and Pump near Vestry and Hudson Streets—and one for a Well in Washington [142] Street near Hubert Street—were read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Ward and Street Commissioner to report Ordinances therefor.

A Petition of P. Schermerhorn and others, owners of Water lots between Fulton Street and the Pier on West side of Peck Slip—praying that the pier, agreeably to the general plan of South Street, may be run out—was read and referred to the Committee on Wharves, Piers & Slips.

A Petition from sundry Inhabitants in Roosevelt Street, praying that the Assessments for opening said Street may be immediately collected, was read & referred to the Finance Committee.

A Petition of Henry Hutchins that Collister Street may be regulated—was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A Petition of John Van Sice, praying that the time for paying of Assessment on Lot No. 44 in Roosevelt Street laid for improving said Street may be extended three months—was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

[143] A Petition from owners of lots in Roosevelt Street and Streets adjacent, recommending the adoption of the plan proposed for regulating said Street by conveying the water under the side walks—was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A Petition of Ebenezer Storer keeper of the Tontine Coffee house



was received, stating that he has received a note from the Attorney of the Corporation informing him that he has incurred a penalty by not having up a sign as a Retailer of Spirituous Liquors: that since the Establishment of said house no other sign has been exhibited than the Keeper's name; but if the Board consider it necessary he will comply with the Ordinance; and praying a remission of the fine. As the report of the Commissioners in that case cannot be confirmed before the October term of the Supreme Court, when it will be too late to regulate those streets this season, the Counsel respectfully recommends that an order be passed to suspend that improvement till the first of May, as by so doing the owners of property in that neighbourhood will be relieved from paying the sums which will otherwise be awarded the Lessees for their damage. The Counsel also recommends the adoption of a similar Resolution with

respect to Harman, Grand, Oliver and Dover Streets, and for these purposes he respectfully recommends the adoption of the following Resolution: Viz

The Ferry Committee, on the petition of Aaron Ogden and the Remonstrances against the same, presented a Report, the consideration whereof was postponed and the same referred back to said Committee.

The same Committee, on the communication from the Counsel respecting granting permission to D. D. Tompkins and N. Brown to extend the size of the Ferry House which they have had permission to erect, presented a Report, the consideration of which was postponed.

The Police Committee, to whom was referred the petition of Resolvert Stephens, reported: "That [152] they have enquired into the matters set forth in said petition and find that Mr. Stephens has been for some years past usefully employed as Assistant Clerk in said office: that his punctuality and correct conduct have heretofore been approved by this Corporation and in two instances rewarded by an increase of Salary which is now eight hundred dollars per annum:

"That your Committee are well satisfied that Mr. Stephens still continues faithfully, and with ability to discharge his official duties, notwithstanding his time (by the gradual increase of the business of that department) is now almost constantly employed in the public service: And your Committee are of opinion that a small increase might with great propriety be made to the Salary of Mr. Stephens. Coles failed in business, and Mr Davis, to secure himself, took the remaining stock in trade off his hands, and put a young man in the place who proceeded on to selling and retailing liquors, as was usual, without any license having been taken out for the present year. Mr. Davis is about discontinuing business at that place, or has already done so." Respectfully submitted.

"The complaint against Mr. Rogers is for selling liquors at Manhattan Island without license. The circumstances attending the case of Mr. Rogers being somewhat special, are as follow:

Last year he and one parsons were in partnership and did business together under the firm of Rogers and parsons at the above mentioned place. Altho' Rogers was the principal man of the firm, the License, as has been frequently the case, was taken out in the name of parsons the other partner. Before the license had expired in the course of the last year they dissolved partnership. Rogers bought out Parsons, paid him for his half of the expence of the licenses, and was to have the benefit of the same, and continued the business in his own name. Parsons moved to another part of the City and opened a grocery Store at New Slip in company with one Jennings. In May last Parsons finding out that he could not procure license to retail liquor without producing and surrendering up the license he held for the last year, called upon Mr. Rogers and requested the loan of the old license until the next day, when he would return it. Rogers, without knowing that it would prevent him from renewing the same, let him have it. [170] Parsons proceeded with it to the Mayor's Office, got his license, gave up the old one to be cancelled and left Rogers in the lurch, who

afterwards applied for a license and was refused on account of not having the former license to be given up."

The Minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

His Honor the Mayor presented the Calender of persons confined in the Bridewell reported by the Keeper with the following observations thereon:

“It is satisfactory to remark that tho’ there are many criminals there are not more than a comparison with other places of equal population would give as reason to expect: and it is still more satisfactory to observe that there are but [186] few instances of crimes of a high nature and very few that mark a union of cruelty or violence and depravity. This observation is warranted not only by the present calender but by a consideration of the cases which were disposed of by the last Court of Sessions, at which there were thirty seven prisoners convicted and sentenced, most of them for inferior crimes.

It is also worthy of remark that a very great proportion of the petty offences which were brought before the Sessions were found to have originated in, or were connected with dram shops and little groceries. A great majority of the assaults and batteries were committed by persons who were heated by liquor drunk in these nurseries of vice—And in cases of petty thefts, in very many instances it was found that the thieves made these places their resort.

This view of the operation of our criminal code encourages us to hope that it may be as effectual for the prevention of crimes as the laws of other countries which are of a more sanguinary nature—tho’ the crowded state of our prisons, the consequent necessity [187] for frequent pardons and want of means to employ convicts are very unfavorable to the contemplated operation of our system.”

A Communication of Jacob Acker Inspector of Firewood for Eleventh Inspection District, stating that he has constructed an Instrument by which a Load of Firewood may be measured with great accuracy and dispatch, and requesting the same may be examined by a Committee—was read and referred to the Committee on Arts and Sciences.

A Recommendation in favor of William Herriman to be appointed a City Weigher; of John Drevvelin to be appointed an Inspector of firewood; and a petition of Abraham Cole for appointment of Measurer of grain were severally read and referred to the Committee on Applications.

A petition of George Ireland, requesting that a part of a Brick Cistern may be extended [189] about three feet in the street at a building he is erecting corner of William and Frankfort Streets, accompanied by a Communication of the Street Commissioner stating that he had examined the premises and recommended granting the prayer of the petition—were severally read, and the petition granted on the usual terms and under direction of the Street Commissioner.

A Petition from Sundry Inhabitants, that the Sidewalks of Water Street as far as to the East of Clinton Street and that the sidewalks on the North side of Cherry Street may be paved were read, also a remonstrance from a number of Inhabitants against laying the Sidewalks in Cherry Street East of Rutger Street—were severally read and referred to the Street Committee.

A Petition of Charles Lee, stating that he had two wooden houses within the Fire limits, that he was desirous of pulling one down and removing the other upon the foundation of the one removed, and pray-

ing permission therefor—was read and leave was given to the petitioner to withdraw his petition.

[190] A petition of Anthony Ferris for permission to sell fruit in Catharine Market: of Bridget Lyon to be permitted to continue to sell small wares at the head of the Lower Fly Market: of Abraham Pierre for permission to sell smoked beef in Fly Market: of Martin Hills and George *Evens* [Ewen] for Stall No 28 Fly Market—were severally read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition from the Inhabitants and Owners of lots in Franklin Street, praying that the Sidewalks of said Street between Elm Street and Broadway may be paved, was referred to the Street Committee.

The Street Commissioner presented the following Ordinances. which were passed: Viz. for a Well and pump in the 2<sup>d</sup> Avenue between North and First Streets, and for regulating Canal Street from the Bulkhead at Washington Street to the Easterly side of Collect Street, and Abraham Bloodgood, John Targee and Jacob C. Mott were appointed Assessors in the first and Peter Hawes, John Targee and Roger Strong in the last.

He also presented Returns of Delinquents on the Assessments for opening Fourth Street and for paving Franklin Street, and Warrants were ordered to issue to the Collectors for collecting the same.

The Counsel presented a Lease to Aaron Ogden for a Birth for a Steam Boat on the West side of Whitehall Slip which was directed to be duly executed.

for their maintenance during their confinement. In the subsequent revision of the Laws this Ordinance was not renewed, and of course expired under the act of limitation of Corporation Laws. Your Committee can now find no existing law by which this practice is continued unless it is drawn from the late resolution of the Board which delegates no authority for Commitment but merely provides for their maintenance during confinement. Your Committee has no doubt but that the resolution referred to was predicated on the supposition that a power of commitment existed under some other law and that it was not the intention of the Board to create that power by the Resolution. In reference to the Law of the State passed in 1817 concerning the imprisonment of Apprentices and servants who refuse to serve their masters, your Committee can find nothing in relation to the subject, it relating to servants made free after 28 years of age and not slaves, so that the practice which [195] has grown out of the ordinance of 1812 has since its expiration continued without authority in so shameful and oppressive a degree that it has become common to receive the already miserable slave in our Bridewell without a commitment or complaint but merely the assertion of oppressive tyranny or the wanton desire of hardened cruelty. The mere will of a petty despot not only established a crime, but was the fiat of punishment. It is not the province of your Committee to express an opinion respecting the right by which one fellow creature holds in bondage the liberty of another, enslaving the mind as well as body. Your Committee are not called upon to defend or condemn the strange anomaly between that natural and indefeasible charter of man expressed in our Declaration of Independence and the fact of the existence of slavery under a constitution solemnly erected on this basis—But your Committee cannot abstain from expressing their abhorrence of a practice which consigns a fellow creature to the punishment of a malefactor for no other crime than the misfortune of being a Slave. The prisons of this commonwealth were erected for the punishment and prevention of crimes affecting the whole. Private [196] grievances are, in almost every instance redressed by private actions, and your Committee can see no good reason for adding to the catalogue of evils attending the unfriended slave the infamous punishment of a common felon for a private offence, at times so trivial that it is only conceived from the circumstance of his being a slave.

Your Committee cannot perceive that any injury can arise to masters by prohibiting their commitment to the public prison; at least the inconvenience cannot equal the injustice of a criminal punishment

without trial and the inconvenience of crowding the prison already too much inhabited by felons. In all cases the power of the master over the slave is sufficiently ample to enable him to confine him for domestic offences in his own house, and this in the opinion of your Committee will answer every end, and is scope enough for domestic tyranny to exercise under the sanction of law. Your Committee therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolution.

“Resolved that the Keeper of the Bridewell be instructed not to receive in his [197] custody any person without a regular commitment according to Law for some public Crime expressed in the Warrant of Commitment, and that henceforth the practice of receiving slaves for safe keeping be abolished—That if any slave or slaves be in custody for safe keeping without a commitment from some magistrate duly authorised, notice shall be given to the owner or owners of such slave or slaves to receive him, her or them in their custody in three days thereafter, or that he, she or they will be discharged, and at the expiration of such time, in case of non compliance on the part of the owner or owners, said keeper is hereby commanded to discharge such slave or slaves.”

The Surrender was prepared by the late Counsel of the Board and has been duly executed and acknowledged by Mr. Striker and his wife, who represents that in the year eighteen hundred and fourteen the Corporation agreed to accept the surrender and release him from the payment of the rents in arrear. The Counsel has not been able to find in the Minutes the Order of the Board upon the subject, tho' he has no doubt that such an order was made. Mr. Striker declines paying the rents which have accrued since the order was made. The counsel now submits the Deed for the purpose of ascertaining whether it is the pleasure of the Board that it shall be accepted and Mr. Striker released from the payment of all the rents in arrear."

The Committee on Laws and Counsel, agreeably to the orders of the Board at the last meeting, reported [204] a Law to amend a Law to regulate Carts and Cartmen in the City of New York—which was read by paragraphs and passed.

The following Resolution was presented & agreed to:

"Whereas the Supreme Court did at the last term confirm the Report of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment appointed for opening and improving Anthony Street between Collect and Orange Streets—And by a Law passed at the last Session of the Legislature this Common Council is empowered to suspend the opening and improving any street for such time as they shall think proper, not

exceeding 15 months after the confirmation of the Report of the Commissioners &c. Wherefore

“Resolved that the opening of Anthony Street between Collect and Orange Streets be suspended until the 1<sup>st</sup> day of May next, at which time the buildings and incumbrances shall be removed and the Collection of the Assessment commence.”

Mr. Allen presented the following resolution:

“Resolved that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be authorized to invest the a- [205] mount granted by the Corporation to the children of the late Captain James Lawrence in such securities, bearing an interest, as in their opinion shall be most advisable: provided, however, that said investment shall not impair the claim of the surviving child, at the time of her arrival at the age of eighteen years, to the whole amount of money appropriated, including the interest, in conformity to the true tenor and spirit of the resolutions on that subject passed September 1813.” which was agreed to.

Mr. Allen presented also the following resolutions:

“Resolved that it be referred to the Street Committee and Street Commissioner to enquire whether it is expedient to repave the Bowery and regulate the sidewalks of the same from its intersection with Chatham Square to Broome Street, and also to regulate and pave the remainder extending from Broome Street aforesaid to Art Street, and if in their opinion it shall be deemed necessary and expedient, that they be instructed to report an Ordinance accordingly, to take effect as early in the spring of 1819 as may be.

“Resolved that the said Committee be instructed to take into consideration also whether [206] it is proper, under all the circumstances, that a part of the expence of paving said Street, should be paid by the Corporation and that they report their opinion to the Board accordingly.” which were agreed to.

A Resolution extending the time for the New York and Brooklyn Steam Boat Company to place on the Ferry a Team Boat, was presented and being read was referred to the Ferry Committee.

Alderman Underhill presented a Resolution which was agreed to in the words following:

“Resolved that the Comptroller of this Board be requested to call upon the Clerk of the Corporation of Trinity Church for a Grant by said Church of ground between Washington and Greenwich streets for a Market place.”

The Minutes of last Meeting were read & approved.

A Petition of William Pasman for a Stall in Spring Street Market

and a petition of Mary Jones for a Huckster's Stand in one of the Markets—were read and referred to the Market Committee.

A petition of Ebenezer Allen, stating that a prosecution had been commenced against him for encumbering the Street with an Anchor [209] which Anchor was not the property of petitioner, and praying said Suit may be discontinued—was read and leave given petitioner to withdraw his petition.

A Petition of Caleb Sutton for appointment of Measurer of Grain was read and granted and petitioner accordingly appointed.

A petition of David Dunham, in behalf of himself and others interested in the Ferry at the foot of Delancey Street, praying permission to erect at the gateway of the bridge two small lodges or one story buildings to accommodate the Ferry Master and persons waiting for a passage, was read and referred to the Ferry Committee, with authority to grant the prayer of the petition.

A petition of Sundry Pawnbrokers, stating infractions of the law respecting pawnbrokers according to their construction of the law—was read and referred to the Committee on Laws.

A Request from the Commissioners of Estimate & Assessment for opening Varick Street, to be furnished with a profile of the intended regulation of said street [210] from the North side of Vandam Street to the centre of Hamersly Street was read and ordered that the Street Commissioner furnish the profile requested.

A further petition of Joseph Tremain for appointment of Weighmaster, was read and laid on the Table.

A petition of a number of persons licensed as Dirt Cartmen, praying an alteration in the late Law amending the Law respecting Cartmen so as to authorize them to cart stones used in building, was read and referred to the Committee on Laws.

A Petition of Sundry Inhabitants that Beach Street may be paved and the side-walks laid was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A Petition of Andrew Allen for remission of fine incurred by encumbering the street with Firewood was read and the fine remitted on payment of Cost.

A petition of Eliza Norman, William Norman [211] and Eveline Norman, Infants, by Eliphalet Wheeler their guardian, was presented, stating that they are heirs of John Norman deceased, that there has been awarded by the Commissioners of Estimate on opening Fourth Street to said petitioners and to John Norman their brother and Ann Dally, Wife of Abraham Dally sister of petitioners, the sum of Seven

thousand five hundred dollars, and praying that the portion of said Sum belonging to petitioners may be deposited with the Clerk of the Supreme Court, in order that petitioners may apply to said Court in the ensuing October term for a disposition of the same agreeably to law. A similar petition from Abraham Dally and Ann his Wife, by Eliphalet Wheeler Guardian of said Ann Dally his wife, formerly Ann Norman, and one of the heirs of said John Norman, stating the interest of said Ann to one fifth of said award of Commissioners and praying the same may be paid into the Supreme Court—were read and referred to the Finance Committee and Counsel with authority to comply with the requests of said petitioners.

The Comptroller, reported respecting a Deed from Trinity Church for ground for a Market in [212] Christopher Street as follows: "That, agreeably to a Resolution passed at the last meeting, he called on the Clerk of the Corporation of Trinity Church and obtained the draft of a deed of cession for a piece of ground on the Southerly side of Christopher Street between Greenwich and Washington Streets for a Market. A Blank is left in this Deed, to be filled with the breadth of a passage way which is to be left open for public accommodation on the Southerly side of the Market house. As the vegetable Market place, together with the building, will occupy 30 feet, there will remain 20 feet of the ground ceded for a Street. It is respectfully recommended that the blank should be filled accordingly, and that the Counsel of the Board should prepare a Counterpart and have the regular conveyances executed and exchanged."

He also presented a Return of Delinquents on an Assessment for widening Spring Street—whereupon a Warrant was ordered to issue to the Collector for collecting the same.

He also presented an Assessment for a Well and Pump in Vandam Street and for one in Mott Street near Chatham Street. which was confirmed and Morris [214] D. Camp appointed Collector in the former and Noah Jarvis in the latter.

The City Inspector presented Ordinances for correction of Sundry nuisances—which were passed

The Counsel presented Two Deeds to Elbert Anderson, one for a Triangular piece of ground fronting Chamber Street and the other for a Lot of ground fronting on the same Street—which were directed to be duly executed.

The Special Committee, to whom was referred the remonstrance of a number of persons, owners of landed Estates lying in the Village of Greenwich, made a report on the 7<sup>th</sup> of September which was laid, and now being called up and read was as follows:

“The regulation of this Village from [215] its vicinity to the City is a subject of great public importance, as it soon will become united to and make a component part of the thickly populated part of the City. It is also a subject of much individual interest to the proprietors on whom the burden of the regulation falls. Your Committee have therefore given this subject their particular consideration: they have personally inspected and viewed the ground, they have examined the Maps and models, they have heard the gentlemen remonstrating, their Surveyor and their Counsel, and if the plan which your Committee herein recommend should hereafter be found not to have been



the best possible one which might have been adopted, your Committee will only have to regret the want of experience and information on a subject of this nature which may have led them to a wrong conclusion.

“ The part of the Village of Greenwich which is the subject of the regulation lies principally between Herring Street (which may be termed the natural ridge or backbone of this part of the village) and the high ground at and near Broadway. The Water east of Herring Street naturally descends in a direction from the Hudson, forms the Streams called the Minetta, flows parallel [216] with the river, then circuitously, discharging themselves into the Hudson. The ground covered by the Minetta Streams, as well as considerable lands adjacent, lies too low to be improved for agricultural purposes, much less for the purpose of building on, to constitute the part of a populous City. A considerable part of the land, however affected by the regulation, lies sufficiently high for all the purposes of building, but requires to be raised to give its water the necessary descent, whether it is discharged over the surface of the Streets or thro’ Sewers: but as Sewers require less descent to carry off water than the surface of streets, it results that the farther the Sewer is extended into this Village the less filling in will be required—and on this subject (the extension of the Sewer) has arisen the difference of opinion existing between the major part of the proprietors and the Street Commissioner in relation to the plan remonstrated against. This plan raised Asylum Street and made the water west of that Street flow directly into the Hudson and extended the Sewer to Carmine Street, making the Sewer about Two thousand six [217] hundred and eighty feet. As the water by this plan has to be carried over Streets to the Mouth of the Sewer at Carmine Street, it results that the ground has to be very considerably raised in many places to give the Streets the necessary descent. The raising of the ground, and the plan itself of the Street Commissioners, is, in the opinion of your Committee, the best plan which could have been projected to render the Surface of this village suitable to build on, yet it is to be regretted that the low value of property in the village and i[t]s total present unproductiveness should have made many of the proprietors unwilling that a plan should be adopted which would carry with it so extensive and permanent advantages, tho’ it must be admitted that these advantages would have been purchased at very considerable expence but by no means at so great an expence as has been frequently stated in formal memorials and petitions where correctness of information is certainly expected from

gentlemen possessing character and reputation in the community. That the Board may form an opinion of the real expence of raising the surface of this land your Committee state:

“That from most of the Streets west of Asylum Street which were regulated the last season, there [218] was a large quantity of Surplus earth taken away and which might have been used to fill in the lots and regulate the Streets of this village at an expence of from 4 to 8 cents per load.

“The plan herein after mentioned will produce more surplus ground than the present plan, and your Committee are confident in the opinion that the removal and filling-in will be done at an expence of at least from 6 to  $12\frac{1}{2}$  cents per load: and your Committee further confidently state that from 10 to  $12\frac{1}{2}$  cents per load are the highest prices which have been given this season for earth within threefourths of a mile of this situation.

“Your Committee nevertheless recommend a partial alteration of the present plan. In doing so they have been influenced by a desire to meet the views and opinions of the proprietors who have remonstrated, and to lessen the expence of filling in as much as is consistent with the proper raising and regulating the low lands and carrying off the water of this village—and your Committee think that even the proposed plan should not be carried into execution until a large majority of the proprietors wish the village regulated. By this delay the property will become more valuable and the proprietors consequently better enabled to pay the necessary Assessments.

“The plan, or alteration of the present plan, which your Committee recommend, is that the Sewer, to discharge the water from this Village, be laid thro’ Clarkson, Carmine Street and the Sixth Avenue to about where Factory Street intersects the said Avenue, making the surface of the Sixth Avenue at this point about Thirteen feet above high water mark. This alteration will extend the Sewer from Carmine Street Eight hundred and forty feet, and will make the whole length of the Sewer Three thousand seven hundred feet, and will allow a descent on the bottom of the Sewer of about  $2\frac{3}{4}$  of an inch for every hundred feet.

“By this regulation the present surface of the ground at the intersection of the Sixth Avenue, Christopher Street and Greenwich Lane will be about a proper height; the Sixth Avenue will have an ascent of  $7\frac{1}{2}$  inches on one hundred feet from the Sewer to Seventeenth Street, where the present surface is of a suitable height, between which and Twenty second Street the ground is so situated as to allow the water

to [220] be conveyed directly to the North River, with some deep digging between the Eighth Avenue and the River; but the Surplus earth will be required between the Sixth Avenue and Broadway or to fill in along the river, when the wharfing out to the Channel is undertaken. According to this plan all the Streets below Seventeenth Street will at the Sixth Avenue be depressed, which will increase the ascent to Broad way to about Ten inches on one hundred feet. The line will then rise at Ten inches on the hundred feet from the Sixth Avenue for four hundred feet, and then descend in a regular line to the North river.

“To prevent the lake or pond mentioned in the remonstrance, your Committee find that it was proposed to form a temporary drain to convey the Manetta Water to the intended Sewer, and which will be indispensable until the whole of the regulation is completed as far north as Twenty first street. A permanent culvert may therefore (if then thought proper) be constructed to receive the water of the East branch of the Manetta, which will tend to reduce the quantity [221] of filling in at that point, which will be a saving for the present: but your Committee are of opinion that the best plan will be to convey the water in a direct line from Broad Way to the Sixth Avenue.

“Your Committee have also paid particular attention to the manner in which Asylum Street has been regulated, with a view to reduce the height if practicable; but on examining the different elevations they do not find that it can be now done to advantage, for if the water is carried to Greenwich Lane and from thence to the Sewer the descent will not exceed Fourteen inches on the hundred feet and varies to seven and an half in proportion to the distance the different Streets are from the Sixth Avenue. Taking into view the situation of the property to the Southward and Eastward, the water of which now goes into the River, they are of opinion it would be unadvisable to reduce the present height of Asylum Street and thereby discharge considerable water, now falling to the Southward and West of it into the Sewer.

“By this plan the highest point on Greenwich Lane will be between Hammond and Bank Streets, where it will be about Six feet [222] above the present surface, which will allow a descent of  $7\frac{1}{2}$  inches on One hundred feet from this point to the Sewer, and the same to Thirteenth Street—The length of the Sewer being determined and also the height of Sixth Avenue, Asylum, Seventeenth Street and Broadway, of course all the intervening Streets must be made to conform.

“Your Committee therefore recommend that the Street Commis-

sioner be directed to make an exact plan and model in conformity to this report, that the proprietors may know the heights and levels agreed upon by the Corporation."

whereupon Mr. Allen presented the following resolution, which was agreed to:

"Resolved that the general plan of the report of the Committee on the subject of regulating the Village of Greenwich be adopted, and that the Street Commissioner prepare a model conformable thereto.

[223] The Finance Committee, to whom was referred a Resolution on the subject of treating with Silvanus Miller for a gore of land adjoining his property near Roosevelt Street, reported: "That said gore is 14 feet front on Water Street and 161 feet deep, extending to a point on Front Street, and was assessed by the Commissioners for widening said Street at 2556 dollars and 3 cents. The Committee are informed that according with a mutual understanding on the subject Mr. Miller was to possess the gore alluded to on his paying the amount which it would be assessed by the Commissioners: and from the following extract of a report made the 3<sup>d</sup> day of February 1818 and adopted by the Board, it will appear that an arrangement of the kind alluded to was actually agreed upon by Mr. Miller and a Committee of this Board:

"And that it (Roosevelt Street) be straightened from Water to "Front Street, as shewn on the plan "which will tend to lessen the "expençe, as Silvanus Miller, who owns the property on the Westerly "side is willing to take the triangular piece of ground that will then "be left between his property and the proposed line of the Street at "a fair valuation."

[224] The Committee have but one opinion on this subject, which is that Mr. Miller ought immediately to comply with the agreement thus entered into, and to effect this object they propose the following Resolution:

"Resolved that the Comptroller be instructed to call upon Silvanus Miller Esqr. requesting that he will pay the amount assessed on a certain gore of land adjoining his property near Roosevelt Street and receive a Quit claim from the Corporation for the same.

"The Committee beg leave farther to state that the Commissioners

have also assessed on the ground under water in front of the property of Mr. Miller 600 dollars and 47 cents, and on that in front of the property of John Agnew 455 dollars and 39 cents to be paid by the Corporation; neither Miller or Agnew having obtained a grant for said ground. The Committee are not aware that any reason can be assigned why the Corporation should pay the Assessments on this property, particularly as a part of it is now occupied and built on by the owners of the land in front and as grants from the Corporation may be obtained by these gentlemen at any time on the [225] usual terms. They therefore recommend on this subject the passage of the following resolutions:

“Resolved that the Comptroller request Silvanus Miller and John Agnew to pay the amount assessed on the ground under water in front of their property near Roosevelt Street for widening said Street, and that they be farther requested to take out their Water grants for said property forthwith.

“Resolved that the Comptroller report to the Board the results on the foregoing resolutions, in order that further steps, if necessary, may be taken by the Corporation in the premises.”

[226] The Finance Committee, to whom was referred the application of the City Dispensary for payment of the Donation to the Vaccine Department, reported:

“That the donation alluded to was granted on certain conditions to be performed by the Trustees of the Institution, as will appear from the annexed extract from the report of the Committee on that subject.

“The Committee therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

“Resolved that the Clerk furnish the Trustees of the City Dispensary with a copy of the report on the subject of vaccination adopted

by this Board on the 16<sup>th</sup> of March 1818, with a request that the provisions therein contained may be complied with on their part."

[227] The Chairman of the Special Committee, to whom was referred a report and certain Resolutions on the subject of Weighmasters, presented a Report, which, not being signed by a Majority of the Committee, was considered irregular. Mr. Allen then proposed the following Resolutions and rates for weighing, which having been read and considered were agreed to: Viz.

"Resolved that the number of Weighmasters appointed by the Common Council shall not exceed Twenty five.

"Resolved that a suitable person, being one of the Weighmasters, shall be appointed by this Board a Weighmaster general for the City and County of New York: That it shall be the duty of the Weighmaster general to provide and keep an office in a central part of the City, and attend said office daily at the usual hours of business to receive applications for weighing, direct the Weighmasters to the performance of their duty, and apportion the business among them in rotation, agreeably to a regular list of their names to be furnished by the Clerk of the Common Council for that purpose, in the first instance, and afterwards as they shall make their returns to the office. He shall copy the returns of the several [228] Weighmasters in a Book to be provided for the purpose, to which all persons interested may have free access at all reasonable times; which returns, when so copied, shall be carefully examined by the Weigher who has performed the service and signed by him. In the event of any of the Said Weighmasters refusing or neglecting to perform their duty or being guilty of any mal practice in office or other improper conduct, he shall report the facts and circumstances of the case to the Common Council, to the end that such delinquent may be removed from office. He shall, at the expence of the owner thereof, cause all scales and weights used by the said Weighmasters to be carefully adjusted on or before the first day of \_\_\_\_\_ in each year, and oftener if necessary. He shall report in writing to the City Inspector once in every three months the total amount of receipts by the several Weighmasters. In case of sickness or inability to perform his said duties, he shall



appoint one of the Weighmasters to act in his stead, who shall be entitled to the fees of said Office during such attendance. He shall be entitled to receive for his said [229] services and for defraying the expence of Office rent and other incidental charges Five per cent on the whole amount of receipts by the Several Weighmasters, to be paid him on making their returns to the office.

"Resolved that each Weighmaster shall, at his own expence, keep one good and sufficient scales and weights, and shall weigh no article unless the application for that purpose has been first made to the Office and instructions received from the Weighmaster general accordingly. They shall make regular and true returns of their bills to the Office, in order to their being recorded, and the fees of the Weighmaster general promptly paid. They shall be entitled to demand and receive the following fees, the one half to be paid by the buyer and the other half by the Seller; but the employer shall be liable for the payment thereof in the first instance: that is to say

“Resolved that the Counsel of the Board be instructed to draft an Ordinance in conformity with the principles of the foregoing Resolutions, combining all that part of the present law necessary and consistent and introducing a clause repealing the remainder.”

The Committee of Applications, on the petition of Abraham Cole for appointment of Measurer of Grain, reported in his favor and he was accordingly appointed to that office.

[232] The Street Committee, on the petition for paving part of Franklin Street, Reported:

“That they have had the subject under consideration and are of opinion that the prayer of the petitioners ought to be granted; therefore offer the following Resolution:

“Resolved that the Sidewalks in Franklin Street from Elm Street to Broadway be regulated and paved and that the Street [Commissioner] prepare an Ordinance for the same.”

The same Committee, on the petition for paving Charlton Street reported the following Resolution:

“That the prayer of the petitioners ought to be granted and that the Street Commissioner prepare an Ordinance for the same.” which was agreed to.

The same Committee, on the petition for widening Market Street, reported:

“That in the opinion of the Committee the prayer of the petition ought to be granted.

“It is proposed by the petitioners that said [233] Street be widened Ten feet on each side making it Sixty feet, instead of forty its former width. It appears that Colonel Rutgers and others, the owners of the



principal property in that street, have sold a number of lots and leased others upon which substantial fireproof buildings have been erected, and that in conveying the said property ten feet in front have been thrown out into the Street, and they are willing in widening the said Market Street to convey to the Corporation the Ten feet in front of all their lots as well as those which have been leased or sold. But it farther appears that certain articles of agreement between Henry Rutgers, Anna Banker and others, binding each other to throw out Ten feet in front of their lots on both sides of Market Street for the purpose of widening the same, and never after to claim the same. A Map comporting with this agreement has been filed in the Street Commissioner's Office, and the agreement itself has been "Recorded in the Office of Register in and for the City and County of New York in Lib: No. 107 of Conveyances &c. of page 301; on the Eighth day of August 1814"—but this Instrument is not satisfactory, inasmuch as the title to the ground thrown out and to be thrown out is not vested in the Corporation. Your Committee, however, un- [234] derstand that Colonel Rutgers Anna Banker and others of that family are willing to make a satisfactory conveyance of the Ten feet in front of all their lots fronting on Market Street. The Committee therefore recommend the adoption of the following Resolutions:

"Resolved that the Counsel to the Board take the necessary steps to vest in the Corporation the Ten feet in front of all lots on Market Street which Colonel Henry Rutgers and others may be willing to cede for the purpose of widening said Street.

"Resolved that when the aforesaid cession shall be made satisfactory to the Counsel, he be and is hereby directed to take the necessary steps by an application to the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment to widen Market Street to Sixty feet by taking Ten feet in front of the several lots on each side and to extend the widening of said Street from Cherry Street to Harman Street."

ing in Canal Street, which was referred to the Committee on the Fire Department to report.

Mr. Allen presented the following: which was agreed to:

"Resolved that the Street Commissioner be authorized to contract for the unfinished part of the Basin at the foot of Spring Street: provided such contract shall be made at a price not exceeding the rate per foot to be paid for that part of said Basin already completed; and provided farther that the Corporation shall not be bound to pay the amount of such contract before the month of June ensuing."

He also presented the following—which was agreed to:

"Resolved that it be referred to the Police Committee to take into consideration the propriety of continuing the several Constables & Marshalls [236] assigned to attend the Police Office the extra allowance of pay for services rendered by direction of the Special Justices, agreeably to a Report of a Committee adopted by the Common Council the 3<sup>d</sup> day of February 1812: and that said Committee report to the Board as early as may be."

Alderman Munson presented the following—which was agreed to:

"Resolved that the Commissioners of Estimate for the Market place between Crane Wharf and Fulton Street be and are hereby ordered and directed to make a just and equitable estimate of the value of the benefit and advantage to the respective Owners, Lessees, parties and persons respectively entitled unto or interested in the lands, tenements, hereditaments and premises which the said Commissioners may deem to be benefitted by and in consequence of erecting upon the said premises a public Market; in pursuance of an Act of the Legislature of the State of New York passed March 14. 1817, authorizing the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York to take possession of certain lands."

For repaving Water Street from Wall Street to the Fly Mar-ket: for repaving Front Street from Coffee house Slip to near Fly Market; and for repaving Pine Street from Pearl Street to the East

River—which were confirmed and Morris De Camp appointed Collector in each.

He also presented an Assessment for a Well and Pump in Spring Street near Wooster Street, and an Assessment for regulating Wooster Street from Spring Street to Amity Lane, which were confirmed and Noah Jarvis appointed Collector in each.

He also presented a Communication on the subject of Lime Houses, recommending their being permitted to be continued until the 1<sup>st</sup> of December in each year—which was read and referred to the Committee on Laws.

The Counsel, on the subject of the cession of ground by Henry Rutgers and others for widening Market Street, reported:

“That Colonel Henry Rutgers and others have released to the Corporation all their interest [247] in the property bordering on Market Street between Cherry and Division Streets which is required for the purpose of widening Market Street in pursuance of an Order of the Board. “The Counsel also informs the Board that Colonel Rutgers and others about four years since entered into covenants to appropriate so much of their property as might be necessary to widen certain Streets to Sixty feet, in pursuance of a plan filed in the Register’s Office, and that he understands they are willing to make a cession accordingly to the Corporation.

“As the widening of these Streets would greatly advance the value of property fronting upon them and would also contribute much to the beauty and health of that part of the City, the Counsel respectfully recommends that he be authorized to inform Colonel Rutgers and the other parties to that Instrument that the Corporation are willing to accept a cession of the same.”

Morrell, being the Widow and heirs at law of Andrew Morrell deceased, for a Lot of ground in Rose Street, which had been by him examined and deemed satisfactory—whereupon Resolved that the same be accepted and recorded.

He also, agreeably to order, presented an Ordinance entitled “A Law to regulate Weighmasters” which was read by paragraphs, amended and passed—and it was Resolved that the operation of the



Said Law be postponed until the First day of November next. The Board then proceeded to elect by ballot a person to fill the office of Weighmaster general, when John G. Betts was chosen to fill said Office.

The Street Committee, on the petition for paving Beach Street, reported in favor thereof and presented the following Resolution:

"Resolved that Beach Street from Greenwich Street to Washington Street be paved and the Side walks completed and that the Street Commissioner report an Ordinance for the same." which was approved.

[249] The Road Committee, to whom was referred the petition for opening Avenue "D" reported:

"That they have taken the subject into consideration and are of opinion the prayer of the petitioners ought to be granted. Mr. Eckford and others having bought property that is bounded on said Avenue, and for which they can have no benefit in consequence of not being able to get to it, and as there are plenty of materials handy to be had, they recommend the following:

"Resolved that the Counsel of this Board be, and he is hereby directed to take the necessary steps to have Avenue "D" opened to the Market place, with all convenient speed."

[260] The Ferry Committee, to whom was referred the subject of a Resolution respecting the New York and Brooklyn Steam Ferry Boat Company, reported:

"That the Common Council, by a Resolution passed the 22<sup>d</sup> day of December 1817 did consent that the New York and Brooklyn Steam Ferry Boat Company might substitute a Team Boat in lieu of the Second Steam Boat mentioned in the lease of the Fulton Street Ferry, provided such Team Boat should be in operation by the 1<sup>st</sup> day of June then next—And that the Common Council did likewise consent to unite with the said Company in an application to the Legislature to increase the rate of ferriage in such Team Boat equal to the Steam Boat: that such application was accordingly made at the last Session, but owing to some cause unknown to your Committee it was denied, and as that fact was not ascertained until near the close of the Session, it was impossible then for the Company to complete the Boat by the time limited in the said Resolution. And your Committee further report that the time for placing a Second Steam Boat upon the said ferry does [261] not expire until the 1<sup>st</sup> day of May next: And as in their opinion the public will sustain no inconvenience by the substitution of a Team Boat they accordingly recommend that the Company be allowed a further time sufficient to build a Team Boat and put her in operation: And for this purpose they recommend the following Resolutions:

"Resolved that the time limited by a Resolution of this Board passed the 22<sup>d</sup> of December last for the New York and Brooklyn Steam Ferry Boat Company to build and complete a Team Boat in lieu of the Second Boat mentioned in the Lease of Messrs. Fulton and Cutting, be and is hereby extended to the 1<sup>st</sup> day of April next. Provided, however, that such Team Boat shall not be less than Seventy feet in length on Deck, nor less than Forty two feet in breadth on deck including the Platform.

Resolved, that in case the said Company shall not be able to procure an Act of the Legislature to enable them to charge the same rates

of Ferriage in such Team Boat as is now allowed for the Steam Boat, or from any other cause shall be disposed to place another Steamboat upon the Ferry, conformably with the provisions of the Said Lease, they shall be at liberty to do so, and to [262] discontinue the further use of such Team-boat. Provided always that a Team Boat be put on the Ferry by the 1<sup>st</sup> of April next or a Steam Boat by the 1<sup>st</sup> of May next.

"Resolved that the Counsel of this Board be authorized and requested to endorse these Resolutions upon the before-mentioned Lease."

"That they have had an interview with Mr. Miller on the above mentioned subjects and have received from him the following propositions: On the subject of the Water grant, he proposes to take it out immediately and pay the Assessment imposed for opening Roosevelt Street, provided he shall be exempt from the usual Quit rent until South Street is made and completed in front of said grant:—And on the subject of the gore of land alluded to he offers to take said gore at the amount assessed on it by the Commissioners for opening Roosevelt Street, and give his Bond for the same payable with interest from the First day of May ensuing.

"The Committee are of opinion that the proposition of Mr. Miller in relation to the Water grant is reasonable, inasmuch as the situation of the water in front of his lot, owing to the obstruction occasioned by the Floating Engine is such as totally to exclude him from the use of said water and [268] has hitherto prevented his deriving any interest or emolument whatever from the same, and therefore ought to be acceded to on the part of the Board. But the Committee cannot agree to that part of Mr. Miller's proposition respecting the gore of land, in which he proposes paying interest from the 1<sup>st</sup> day of May next, as the Corporation would be a loser by the operation to the amount of the interest on the purchase money from the day on which they were bound to pay and actually did pay the persons damaged by opening Roosevelt Street to the said first day of May, a term of Eight months; especially as it was distinctly understood by a Committee of this Board, together with the Counsel, that Mr. Miller had agreed to take said gore at a fair valuation, and the Commissioners, uninfluenced and under the obligations of their oaths, have declared the said gore

of land to be worth the money at which it stands assessed to the Corporation.

"The Committee therefore propose the following Resolutions for the consideration of the Board:

"Resolved that the Counsel be instructed to prepare a grant to Silvanus Miller and [269] Margaret Miller, for the use of said Margaret the Wife of Silvanus Miller for the ground under water alluded to in the foregoing Report: said grant to contain the usual covenants, except that no quit rent shall be required to be paid by the grantee until South Street in front of said grant be made and completed, after which period the rents, as now established, to be annually paid—Provided, however that previous to executing said grant the Assessment for opening Roosevelt Street, together with the interest which may be due thereon, shall be fully paid and satisfied by the grantee.

"Resolved that the Counsel be instructed to prepare a quit-claim to Silvanus Miller for a certain gore or piece of land adjoining his property near Roosevelt Street, provided said Miller shall execute to this Corporation a Bond for the sum of Two thousand five hundred and fifty six dollars and three cents payable with interest from the 16<sup>th</sup> day of September 1818 and that the said quit claim remain on escrow until the amount of such bond, together with the interest be paid and discharged."

A Petition of William McCartee for permission to use a Drain under the Street from the Centre of the Block in White Street between Church & Chapel [276] Streets in order to carry off the Ley &c. from his Manufactory, was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A Memorial was received from Rodman Bowne, Lessee of Catharine Slip Ferry, stating that some further accommodations on the Brooklyn Side are necessary for the Ferry, and requesting the consideration of the same to be referred to a Committee—also stating that he had been in the practice of charging 4 cents for each passenger in his Team Boat across the Ferry, which he presumed was agreeable to the Common Council; that, understanding the power of regulating the rates of ferriage is given by the Charter to the Corporation, he respectfully solicited that an ordinance might be passed authorising the rate of ferriage for each passenger to be increased to 4 cents. Whereupon the same was referred to the Ferry Committee and the Committee on Laws.

A Petition that Fourth Street may be regulated from the Bowery to the Sixth Avenue was read and referred to the Street Committee.

[277] A Petition from sundry owners of Houses and lots fronting on Collect Street in the Sixth Ward, complaining of the mode in which said Street has been paved, and praying the same may be altered and the pavement be made similar to the late pavement in Chapel Street, was read and referred to the Street Committee and Street Commissioner.

A Petition that additional Lamps may be placed in Leonard Street between Broadway & Orange Street, was read and referred to the Lamp Committee.

A Remonstrance from a number of Inhabitants residing in Mulberry Street against one Benjamin French taking daily a large quantity of water from Pump No. 45 in said street to the injury of the Neighbourhood, was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Sixth Ward.

A Petition was received from Nathan Jackson, stating that he had been prosecuted under the Pawnbrokers' Law as a dealer in Second-hand Articles and a judgment recovered against him; that the facts

of the case were that he had purchased at auction some second-hand chairs and Maps; that not wishing to retain for his own use the whole [278] of them he had sent a part of them again to auction where some of them were sold. Under these circumstances he prayed relief of the Board. Whereupon the Same was referred to the Committee on Police.

A Memorial was received from Benjamin Dearborn, requesting the Common Council to appoint a Committee to investigate the properties and the advantages of the Proportional Balance invented by him over the present mode of weighing by means of Scales and weights Whereupon the same was referred to the Committee on Arts and Sciences.

Mott were appointed Assessors; and for a Well and Pump in Duane Street between Broadway and Elm Street *Street* and Abraham Baudouine, John Brower and Jacob C. Mott were appointed Assessors.

He also Reported that the Road thro' the Ninth Avenue from Greenwich Lane to 28<sup>th</sup> Street and along 28<sup>th</sup> Street from the Ninth Avenue to the Hudson River had been completed much to his satisfaction and that he had accepted the Road. He also stated that the Proprietors on the Tenth Avenue between 28<sup>th</sup> Street and the Bloomingdale Road were desirous the same should be made and he recommended it to the attention of the Board—Whereupon the same was referred to the Road Committee.

He also recommended that directions be given to take up and remove the paving Stones from the lots lately sold at the Albany Basin and that an Engine House should be erected on the Lot reserved at

that place for the purpose: Whereupon it was Resolved that he direct the removal of the paving Stones [280] agreeably to his recommendation and farther that the subject of the Engine house be referred to the Committee on the Fire Department.

The Counsel presented the Draught of a Petition to the Supreme Court for appointing Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment for opening part of Avenue "D" and the Clerk was directed to affix the Common Seal to the same. He was also directed in the recess of the Board to affix the Common Seal to a Petition for appointing Commissioners &c. for widening Market Street.

He also presented a Deed to William H. Ireland for Lots Nos. 11 & 12 of the lots at New Albany Basin purchased by him at the late Sales of that property, which was directed to be duly executed.

The Committee of Repairs would embrace this opportunity of stating to the Board that the duties of the Superintendent have become more arduous and extensive than formerly in consequence of many branches of business coming immediately under his direction. The economy introduced into this Department by the purchase of sundry articles wanted for public purposes and the work being done at the yard, together with the increasing demands necessarily made on the time and attention of the Superintendent, united with the fidelity and industry of this public officer, are considerations which have induced the Committee [285] to recommend to the Board the adoption of the following Resolution:

The Special Committee, to whom were referred the Remonstrance of Bailey and Russell and sundry others and also of several of the Weighmasters against the provision of the late Law regulating Weighmasters, reported: "That after the mature consideration that your Committee have given the subject referred to them they cannot for a moment hesitate to recommend to the Common Council that the Subscribers to the Remonstrance referred to your Committee have liberty to withdraw the same. Your Committee would observe that the Law to regulate the Weighmasters of this City was recommended to the Common Council as a remedy for the many evils existing in that Department. [286] They could then have but a theoretical knowledge of the result of its operation in practice; but from cases analogous they believed that the full execution of the law would satisfy every reasonable expectation they had formed. It was stated to be an experiment which your Committee thought was well worth the trial. If the experiment failed an alteration or a repeal could be speedily made and but trifling inconvenience ensue to the public. From further reflection your Committee are still more sanguine that the said law will have a very beneficial tendency, and that none of the evils represented in the said remonstrance as likely to result therefrom will arise from its complete operation. The following Resolutions are respectfully submitted: "

The first Resolution proposed was as follows:

"Resolved that the Subscribers to a *Resigned* [Remonstrance] by Bailey and Russell and others against the Law to regulate Weighmasters have leave to withdraw the same."

The question being taken thereon, and a Division having been called, it was carried in the affirmative.

“For a law to reduce the fees of the Coroner on persons dying in the Alms’ house, Penitentiary and Bridewell to the same as he receives at the State Prison.” Which Resolution was agreed to.

Mr. Akerly also presented a Resolution referring to the same Committee to enquire into the propriety [290] of extending the Fire Limits—which was agreed to.

Alderman Taylor presented a Resolution directing the Side Walks in Hammond Street to be gravelled from Washington Street to Asylum Street and that the Street Commissioner prepare an Ordinance therefor—which was agreed to.

Mr. Akerly presented a Resolution directing the Street Commissioner to enquire into the propriety of paving the Side walks from Water Street to Gouverneur Street—which was agreed to.

A Resolution was presented, referring it to the Committee on Wharves, Piers and Slips to consider and report on the expediency of continuing West Street from Charlton Street to the North side of the Pier at the foot of Spring Street—which was agreed to.

Mr. Stevens presented a Resolution referring to the Committee on Finance to enquire into the State of the Funds and general concerns of the Society of the Sailor’s Snug Harbour and to report to the Board—which Resolution was agreed to.

The Minutes of last Meeting were read and approved.

The Mayor presented the Calendar of the prisoners confined in the Bridewell or City Prison which was directed to be filed. He also made the following observations respecting the same:

"It appears that there were at the period of that return Fifty seven persons in confinement, of whom 34 were convicts. Of these 8 are sentenced by the several Sessions and 26 by the Police Magistrates as Vagrants or disorderly persons. Four of the remain- [294] ing persons are indicted and are waiting their trials, and there remain only 19 who are detained to answer for crimes. Of these 19 one is committed for counterfeiting, two for grand Larceny, four for petit larceny and twelve for assault and battery.

"This view of the State of the City Prison is certainly gratifying inasmuch as it must evidence the remark that the crimes are comparatively few and so very few of any magnitude.

"The Mayor since his last report has paid his accustomed visits to the Bridewell and is happy to observe that it is kept with a cleanliness and order that do very great credit to the Keeper."

A Petition of sundry Inhabitants of the Ninth Ward, praying that the Inhabitants of said Ward may be exempted from the payment of the Tax laid upon Dogs, was read and referred to the Police Committee.

An account of Sundry Peace Officers for services in attending to enforce the Dog Law, having been ordered upon that duty by his Honor the [295] Mayor, was read and referred to the Police Committee.

A Petition that Lamps may be erected on the First Avenue as far as Eighth Street was read and referred to the Lamp Committee.



A Petition of Lawrence Martin for Stall No. 47 in Catharine Market at present held by Thomas Place who is willing to relinquish the same, and a petition from Peter P. Roome for Stall No. 7 in Spring Street Market were read and referred to the Market Committee.

of the Assessments for the Third Avenue might be delayed, Reported: "That the Assessment amounts to 749 dollars and has been due since the 4<sup>th</sup> day of December 1814 and that there are arrears of taxes due on the said ground, including the present year, [302] of about 1000 dollars: that the lands alluded to have been advertised according to law for the payment of said Assessment and Arrears of taxes and are to be sold on the 3<sup>d</sup> day of November instant, unless the claim of the Corporation shall be previously satisfied.

"The Committee are of opinion that a final settlement of the several claims to these lands is a very desirable event, and that such event would be materially retarded, if not totally defeated, at least for some time to come, by a sale of them agreeably to the advertisement alluded to. They therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

"Resolved that the people of Haerlem be allowed an extension of time for the payment of the Assessment for opening the Third Avenue and the Arrears of Taxes on their Common lands to the 1<sup>st</sup> day of October 1819; and that the Street Commissioner and Collector of Arrears of Taxes be instructed not to sell the said lands until the further order of the Board. Provided, however, that the said Assessment, with the taxes now due, together with the interest and other expences, continue a lien on said lands.

[303] "The Committee beg leave further to state that the difficulties which appear to exist among the Inhabitants of Haerlem on the subject of the lands alluded to have led them to believe that the question of title can in no other way be so equitably and firmly settled as by an Act of the Legislature authorizing an umpire between the parties concerned; and they therefore propose the following Resolution:

"Resolved that the Committee on Applications to the Legislature be authorized to consult the subscribers to the annexed petition on the propriety of petitioning the Legislature to vest the fee of the Common Lands of Haerlem in the Corporation of this City under such restrictions as shall comport with the rights of individuals as well as the interest of the public."

The Committee on Public Offices, on the complaint of James Davidson against John Marschalk a City Weigher, reported: "That by the annexed Bill of Mr. Marschalk it appears that he did present a bill for fees not allowed by [323] law; and this circumstance unexplained or unaccounted for in any case should in the opinion of your Committee be considered good ground for the removal of any officer under the Board. But in the present case Mr. Marschalk acted under the new law, and it appears by the Tariff therein established that Moss (the article weighed) is twice enumerated, and at different prices, one price for loose Moss and another for Moss in Bales.



"The error made by the Weigher was in charging for Moss in Bales the price allowed for loose Moss. It appears this was the first instance of this Weighmaster's weighing Moss under the new Tariff, and he alleges that he had not then discovered that the same article was twice enumerated in the law, but that after making out his Bill and discovering this fact he did not collect the amount of fees as charged in his bill.

"Under these circumstances your Committee have considered that this Weighmaster has cleared himself from the imputation of receiving or designedly charging illegal fees."

A Memorial of Sundry Inhabitants of the Eighth Ward, complaining that there was no place assigned in said Ward where public sales at auction might be held, which was an inconvenience to the Inhabitants and praying that the corner of Spring and Greenwich Streets near the Spring Street Market may be assigned for such purpose was read and referred to the Committee on Laws.

A petition of Henry Gahn was received—stating that Ursula Matuet Jouette, a French Lady formerly of the Island of St. Domingo, died intestate in New York on the 9<sup>th</sup> of August 1807: that the City Treasurer administered upon her Estate and returned for the Corporation the sum of \$287.98 cents which remained in his hands after the payment of her debts: that one half of this amount was in the year 1815 paid over by order of the Corporation to Mr. La Forgeue of this City as Attorney for the Widow Magnan [363] one of the children of the deceased Mrs. Jouettee: that by the documents accompanying the petition authenticated by the American Consul at Paris (Isaac Cox Barnet Esqr.) it appears said Mrs. Jouette had only one other child Louis Matthias Jouette who, together with Monsieur Manni the present husband of Mrs. Magnan, has executed a power of Attorney to petitioner to demand and receive all the property of said Intestate Mrs. Jouette and praying that the said sum remaining in the Treasurer's hands may be paid over to him. The Minutes of last meeting were read & approved.

His Honor the Mayor stated that he had been requested by George Caines Esqr. to represent to the Board that he was desirous of receiving the countenance of the Board on the subject of lighting the City with Gas Light, wishing a Committee to be appointed to whom he might communicate his ideas on the subject—Whereupon the same was referred to the Committee on Arts & Sciences.

[375] His Honor the Mayor reported the Calender of persons confined in the City Prison which had been furnished to him by the Keeper and stated that it did not require any particular observations from him: he would merely observe that it was creditable to the Morals of the Community as the offences mentioned in the Calender were all of minor degree.

Whereupon the same was directed to be filed.

A petition of John Jacob Astor and Stephen Ludlum, stating that a sale was made at Auction of Fourteen Lots of ground on Norfolk Street assessed for Taxes as the property of Dr. Nicholas Romaine; that at the time of Sale Seven were the property of J. J. Astor and Seven of William Cutting; and requesting Two Separate Certificates to be given to J. J. Astor for 7 Lots and one to S. Ludlum for 7 Lots who was the purchaser of the said Seven Lots belonging to

William Cutting—Whereupon the same was referred to the Comptroller & Street Commissioner.

A petition of Henry Ward stating that he had been assessed for personal Tax in the First Ward & had paid the same; that he has also been Assessed in the Second Ward, and praying relief therefrom—was re- [376] ferred to the Comptroller to report.

A Petition of John Harriot for Stall No. 55 Fly Market—of James Weeden for Stall No. 55 or 57 same market: of Maria Manolt for continuance to her of Stall No. 57 owned by her husband now absent from the City on business, and of Samuel Weeks praying that Stall No. 55 Fly Market owned by his son who has left the City may be continued to him for One year—whereupon the same were referred to the Market Committee.

A petition of John Jacob Astor was received—stating that he had been assessed on Thirty one Lots of ground in the 7<sup>th</sup> ward lying on the West Side of Montgomery Street and running from Division to Lombardy Street and without examining into his Title has paid the Taxes thereon from 1812 to 1817—that he has recently discovered that but Thirteen of said Lots belong to him and praying to be refunded the money erroneously paid with interest thereon—whereupon the same was referred to the Finance Committee.

A petition from Edward and W<sup>m</sup> M. Hitchcock [377] Contractors for the Streets was received Stating that Some complaints have been made to the Attorney respecting the cleaning of the Streets which were, on receiving notice of them, immediately attended to; that, as the system on which they acted was a new one and considered in some measure as an experiment, some few omissions were to be expected: they therefore hoped the Common Council would remit the penalties should any have occurred—which was referred to the Committee on Streets.

A Communication was received from Dr. Stephen Brown and Dr. John J. Howe House Physician and Surgeon to the Bellevue Establishment stating the number of patients which they had to attend at that Establishment amounting in all to 261 persons, representing the various and laborious duties which they had to perform and requesting an increase of their Salary. Whereupon it was referred to the Alms' house Committee with a request that they would call upon Drs. Akerly and Drake the visiting Surgeon and Physician for information on the subject of said petition.

[381] The Counsel [presented] the Draught of a Lease of a Lot of ground in Grand Street near the Ferry to William Vail, which was directed to be duly executed.

He also presented the Counterpart of the grant from the Corporation of Trinity Church for a Strip of ground adjoining the Market at Greenwich, which was directed to be duly executed.

The Street Commissioner presented a Communication Stating that by the gale of wind on the night of the 5<sup>th</sup> instant near 600 feet of the Bulkhead at the Battery had been washed away and that the remaining part was so much decayed that probably the next Storm would entirely demolish it, and he recommended that measures Should be immediately taken to secure the same from farther injury. Whereupon it was referred to the following Committee to take such measures as they may deem necessary to secure the Battery from farther injury and to report at the next meeting the probable expence of the same—Viz. Aldermen Mesier Thorp Mr. Stevens Ald. Morss Ald. Taylor.

[382] The Street Commissioner presented Assessments for a Well and Pump in Willet Street and for one in Duane Street near Elm Street: also an Assessment for regulating Laurens Street from Spring Street to Amity Lane—which were confirmed and Noah Jarvis appointed Collector in each.

He also presented a Return of Delinquents on the following Assessments and Warrants were directed to issue to N. Jarvis the Collector to collect the same.

Viz. For a Well & Pump in Columbia Street

For regulating Bleeker Street

The Comptroller, on the petition of Henry Gahn, reported:

“ It appears from an examination of the Books and Minutes of the Corporation that a balance remained with the Treasurer in the year 1808 of \$287.98. On the 30<sup>th</sup> May 1808 a Warrant passed in favor of John La Forge [383] attorney of Ursule Eugenia Jouette, the Widow of Pierre Michael Magnan, heiress of one half of the Estate of the late Ursule Francaise Maillet, widow of Pierre Helaire Jouette, for \$146.24.

“ The 20<sup>th</sup> February 1815 a petition of Louis Matthias de Jouette by Stephen L. Falott his Attorney praying for a Moiety of the Estate of his Mother Ursula Mahiel de Jouette, who died Intestate in 1807, was referred to the Counsel and Chamberlain.

“ On the 19<sup>th</sup> June following the Counsel and Chamberlain reported

that they are satisfied that the facts set forth in the petition are true and recommend that the prayer of the petitioner be granted, and a Warrant directed to issue for the amount \$143.99 to be paid to the petitioner upon his executing Bonds of Indemnity to the Corporation as usual on the payment of distributive shares of Intestate Estates." This Report was approved and a Warrant ordered to issue. July 31. 1815 a Warrant passed in favor of L. de Jouette for \$143.98 which appears to have been delivered to J. Zuntz.

"The above Statement of facts the Comptroller has taken the liberty of presenting to the Board, as the public Administrator with whom he was associated in the reference of Mr. Gahn's petition was in office subsequently to the transactions before mentioned.

[384] As the amount belonging to the Estate of Mrs. Jouette appears to have been regularly disposed of to the legal heirs and as the Two trunks of papers or any other effects alluded to in the petition are not in possession of any Officer of the Corporation nor is it known where they are no further order Seems necessary on the Subject."

"That agreeably to a Resolution of this Board the Committee have had a meeting with Cornelius Ray, Robert Lenox, William Bayard and Preserved Fish Esqrs. a Committee appointed by the Chamber of Commerce to confer with the Committee from this Board and, after hearing the objections made by the Committee on behalf of the merchants, and having also investigated the subject with all the care and importance which its importance required, offer for the consideration of the Board the following Resolutions:

"Resolved that the Ordinance passed October 12<sup>th</sup> 1818 entitled an Ordinance to regulate Weigh- [385] masters be repealed from and after the 15<sup>th</sup> instant.

"Resolved that the number of Weighmasters in this City shall not exceed Twenty five and that no new appointment to that office shall be made until the number be reduced by resignation or otherwise to Fifteen."

The same having been read Alderman Taylor moved that the consideration thereof be postponed.

The question being taken thereon and a Division being called—the Members voted as follows:

Affirmative. Mr. Recorder Ald. Underhill Morss Taylor Thorp Messrs. Westervelt Parker Akerly Board. 9.

Negative. Ald. Mesier King Van Amringe Buckmaster Munson Messrs. Bolton Stevens Kip Allen 9.

The Board being equally divided his Honor the Mayor gave his vote in the Negative—So the motion was lost. The question was then taken on agreeing [386] to the First Resolution proposed in the report and a Division having been called the Members voted as on the former question. The Board being equally divided his Honor the Mayor gave his Vote in the Affirmative, so the Resolution was carried in the Affirmative.

The question was then taken on the Second Resolution and agreed to. Alderman Taylor gave notice that he would at the next meeting move for a reconsideration of the vote given. A motion was then made that the Committee on Weighmasters be directed to report at the next meeting a Tariff of Fees and Charges. It was moved that the consideration of that motion be postponed, which was carried in the Affirmative.

The Committee on Assessments to whom were referred the petitions of Thomas C. Doremus and James La Tourette, reported:

“That they have Satisfactorily ascertained the matters Stated in the Said petitions respectively to be true and that the petitioner Doremus is not worth more than Two thousand Five hundred Dollars and that the other petitioner is *is* not worth to exceed Three thousand Dollars and that they have each been taxed the Sum of [387] Eighty Six dollars: That with respect to the former he was misled by having been assessed in the Third Ward the preceding year and now in the Second: and that the latter is a young man just established in business and was never before Assessed, and that neither of them was Seen by the Assessors or had any information in regard to the Tax until they were called on for payment.

“Your Committee are aware of the danger of interfering generally to give relief from Taxes regularly assessed but when cases of extreme hardship like the present occur where the Taxes imposed exceed all reasonable bounds and where a Satisfactory excuse is offered for not applying to the Assessors to get it rectified they consider the Common Council called upon by imperious duty to give relief, otherwise

embarrassments and even ruin might be the consequence to many. The duties of the Assessors are doubtless very arduous but it is to be regretted that *that* from the difficulties they meet with in ascertaining the amount of Individuals' personal property they are Sometimes induced to make an Estimate without any data and without seeing the party or giving him any intimation respecting it. Such, your Committee are well assured, was the case in both of these instances. Your Committee are therefore [388] of opinion that these cases ought to be considered as exceptions to the general rule and that the petitioners are justly entitled to relief, and to that end they offer the following Resolution:

"Resolved that the Collector of Taxes of the Second Ward be authorised to receive from Thomas C. Doremus the Sum of Ten Dollars and Seventy five cents and from James La Tourette the Sum of Twelve Dollars & Ninety cents in full of their respective personal Tax for the present year."

The Committee on Assessments, to whom was referred the Remonstrance of the Trustees of the Baptist and Methodist Churches, reported:

"That they have had the Subject under consideration, examined the Assessment complained of and have been attended by the Assessors who made it and heard their explanations in relation thereto—from all which it appears that the Said Churches respectively are owners in [389] fee of certain pieces of vacant ground in the vicinity of a Well and Pump lately placed in Second Avenue expressly appropriated as a burial ground, which have been assessed equal with other grounds in the neighbourhood for the expence of the said well and pump. The Assessors being under an impression that the grounds belonging to the Methodist Church might hereafter be improved by having a Church placed upon it, and that those belonging to the Baptist Church might be sold as building lots, and particularly the front part where no dead were yet interred, and anticipating those results conceived it their duty to assess those grounds in the same manner as if they had belonged to individuals.

"The act under which this Assessment was made directs that "the expence shall be estimated and assessed among all the owners or oc-

cupants of the houses and lots of ground intended to be benefitted thereby' from which it is evident that the assessors are bound to anticipate the erection of houses on vacant lots, when they can reasonably do so, and to assess them in the same manner as if the houses were already erected, but when a piece of ground is exclusively used as a Cemetery it is difficult to perceive how it can be benefitted by having a Well and pump near it.

[390] "The Legislature have exempted Churches and burial grounds from the payment of Taxes and the Supreme Court have strongly intimated that such property ought not to bear an equal proportion to that of individuals for the expence of improving and widening Streets. With what propriety then ought they to be assessed an equal ratio with private property for the expence of making Wells & pumps?

"With respect to Churches, in the opinion of your Committee it may not be improper to assess them a small proportion inasmuch as a Well and Pump in their vicinity may add to their safety in case of fire and afford facilities in cleansing them, but burial grounds as such cannot be benefitted and therefore in no case ought to bear any part of the expence. And as these cases frequently occur it is important that some general rule should be adopted by the Common Council to regulate such Assessments in future, and with a view to accomplish that object and relieve the petitioners your Committee offer the following Resolutions:

"Resolved that in future no grounds occupied exclusively as a Cemetery in this City shall be assessed for the expence of making any Well [391] or pump and that grounds occupied by any Church or place of Divine Worship shall only be liable to be assessed therefor in a ratio not exceeding one fourth as much as other property.

"Resolved that the Assessment for a Well and Pump in Second Avenue between First and North Streets be referred back to the Assessors for correction and revision and that the Clerk furnish them with a copy of the preceding Resolution."

The Committee on Arts and Sciences, on the proposition of Monsieur Monneron, reported:

"The petition of Mr. Monneron referred to the Committee of Arts



and Sciences has been under consideration. It proposes to erect upon the City Hall a Sun Dial and within the same a Clock with Two faces, one of which is to designate the true time and the other the mean time. The true time is that marked by the Sun's arrival at the meridian of any place, and Mr. Monneron proposes that one face of the clock should point this out [392] and announce it daily by the firing of a pistol to be discharged by the sun's rays concentrated by a lens. The other face will shew the mean or Clock time and thus point out the difference. The advantages held out by Mr. Manneron do not appear of sufficient magnitude to warrant the expence, wherefore your Committee cannot recommend the adoption of the plan and accordingly offer for the adoption of the Board the following Resolution:

"Resolved that it is inexpedient to adopt the plan and proposal of Mr. Monneron."

The Same Committee, on the memorial of Jacob Acker, reported:

"That Mr. Acker has presented to the examination of the Committee a graduated Instrument or Scale by which a Load of Fire Wood may be measured with great exactness & dispatch: and your Committee are of the opinion that said Instrument will be of great service in the [393] hands of the Inspectors of Firewood in ascertaining the Solid contents of a load of wood, whereby equal justice will be dispensed to the buyer and Seller. The solid contents of a Cart load of wood as determined by law should be 37 ft. 10 inches &  $\frac{8}{12}$ —but in some of the wood brought to Market it is so short that the buyer may lose from 4 to 10 Solid feet in a Load. This is to be remedied by the Inspectors, but for want of a Scale already calculated this is not done. The Instrument offered by Mr. Acker will meet the case and the Committee recommend that the Same be adopted and the Inspectors of Firewood be directed to furnish themselves with such a scale. Mr. Acker does not ask for any compensation, but the Committee in consideration of his attention and skill in calculating the graduation of this scale recommend that he be complimented with Twenty dollars—Your Committee therefore recommend the following Resolutions:

"Resolved that the Superintendant of Repairs, under the direction of Mr. Acker, make a neat and complete Instrument and scale for



the measurement of Fire Wood and that the Same be deposited in the office of the City Inspector as a Standard.

"Resolved that when so completed it shall be called Acker's Scale for the Measurement of Fire- [394] Wood and that the City Inspector be directed to inform the several Inspectors of Fire Wood that they must furnish themselves with an Instrument according to the Standard Model and that they must measure Fire Wood by the scale thereon.

"Resolved that a Warrant pass for 20 dollars in favor of Jacob Acker for his ingenuity and Skill in calculating the Scale for the aforesaid Instrument."

them and consider the [396] proposal a wild project and at any rate if practicable at this time inexpedient. Therefore

petitions from R. Murden, David Banks & Benjamin G. Jansen for appointment of printer to the Corporation were presented & read

A petition of Henry Wright for appointment of Measurer of grain was read and the prayer thereof granted and petitioner appointed a Measurer of grain.

[401] A Petition of Elihu H. De Camp was received stating that having been appointed a Weighmaster by the Board but not finding so much employment as he expected he would be desirous of receiving an Appointment as Guager and would resign the appointment of Weighmaster. Whereupon his resignation as Weighmaster was accepted and he was appointed to the office of City Guager.

A petition of Hassel Wheeler for Stall No. 35 Fly Market was read & referred to the Market Committee.

A petition of Thomas Ludlow and Gulian Ludlow stating that the Commissioners of Estimate for extending the Sixth Avenue from Greenwich Lane to Carmine Street intend presenting their report to the Supreme Court in January term: that there is a large quantity of earth on said Avenue which will be surplus and required to be removed, and praying that that part which runs thro' their ground instead of taking the said surplus at a price to be determined by the Commissioners they may be permitted to remove the same after the Assessment is confirmed—Whereupon the same being read was referred to the Road Committee.

[402] A petition of Benjamin Hills praying payment on his Contract for filling in Basin between Fulton and Dey Streets—was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

A petition of John Hanning, Lessee of the School Room over the

Watch house in Spring Street, praying the same may be rented to him for the ensuing year, was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

A Petition of Samuel Leggett praying that the opening of Dover Street may be commenced as soon as public convenience will permit—was read and referred to the Counsel.

A Remonstrance of Bunnell Brown & others against exempting the Trustees of the Baptist Church and Methodist Church from the Assessment for the Well and Pump in the Second Avenue was read.

The Street Commissioner laid before the Board a corrected Assessment from the Assessors to whom the Assessment had been referred back for the Well & Pump in the 2<sup>d</sup> Avenue—which Assessment with the Remonstrance were referred [403]. to the Committee on Assessments.

A Memorial subscribed by a considerable number of the Merchants of the City was presented stating that they understood that the late Law respecting Weighmasters was at the last meeting of the Board repealed, and that they were informed that a proposition was about to be made for its re-enactment, which they remonstrated against and hoped it would not be revived—which memorial was read and laid on the Table until the motion for the reconsideration of the vote at the last meeting should be made.

A Communication of very considerable length from Garritt Gilbert, Registrar of Deeds in the City and County of New York, on the subject of his office was received, stating a variety of gross inaccuracies in the keeping of the Records highly prejudicial to their character for accuracy. He also stated that the rooms assigned for the keeping of the Records was, from the increase of the Books, not sufficiently large to accommodate them. Whereupon the same was referred to the Committee formerly appointed on the subject of forming a general Index of the Records of the City and County—Viz. Alderman King.

A Letter was received from Thomas Walton, one of the Captains of the City Watch resigning on account of his state of health his appointment as Captain of the First District and tendering to the Common Council his [407] thanks for the favor conferred on him by the appointment. Whereupon it was resolved that his resignation be accepted.

The Board then proceeded to elect a person to fill the vacancy, when Henry Leake was appointed Captain and Abraham Blauvelt was appointed Assistant in the place of Henry Leake appointed Captain.

The Finance Committee, on the petition of John Jacob Astor, Reported:

“That with a view to grant relief to the petitioner, provided it could be done consistent with their duty to the public, and believing the case of Mr. Astor to be novel and unprecedented, they have given the subject due consideration and in hopes of finding some provision by which the property might be made liable for the Taxes thus paid they have examined the several statutes of the state but have found no clause that will apply to this particular case. The only clause which appears to have any bearing on the subject is the 10<sup>th</sup> section of the act for the assessment and collection of Taxes which authorises persons in possession of Real Estate, the taxes of which [408] ought to be paid by any other person, to pay the same and to recover from those who ought to have paid and creates a lien on the property for the amount, but as the lots alluded to were vacant and not in the actual possession of Mr. Astor it is a question in the minds of the Committee whether he has any claim whatever by which he can recover. The Corporation agreeably to statute have a Lien on real Estate until the tax is paid—the taxes being paid their lien ceases and cannot be renewed by a refunding of the money: it follows therefore



that relief cannot be granted Mr. Astor without a total loss to the Corporation, which in the opinion of the Committee ought not to be expected on his part or authorized as a precedent on theirs, inasmuch as he had it within his power to correct the error of the Assessors either by examining the Books previous to their being returned to the Supervisors or on the demand for the Collector of the Tax—and although it may appear hard for him to pay the taxes on the property of others, it would be [409] equally hard on the Corporation to refund him a sum which by his act they are prevented from collecting where it ought to be sought for. The Committee therefore propose the following Resolution:

“Resolved—that it is inexpedient to grant the prayer of the petition of John Jacob Astor hereunto annexed.”

[410] The Special Committee, to whom was referred the Communication of the Street Commissioner on the subject of the injury done to the Battery by the last storm, presented a report which was read and the further consideration postponed and it was made the order of the day at the next meeting on Monday: The Committee were requested to report as to the Title of the Corporation to the ground under water which will be required for the proposed extension and whether a re-cession of that part of the Battery now held by the United States can be obtained.

Alderman Taylor, agreeably to the notice given at the last meeting that he would move to reconsider the vote given on the repeal of the Law respecting Weighmasters, now made a motion to that effect. The

question being taken on the reconsideration and a Division having been called it passed in the negative as follows:—

A Letter was received from his Excellency Daniel D. Tompkins stating that he understands the Corporation have it in contemplation to extend the Battery from Castle Clinton to the West Pier or Pier No. 1: that he begged leave thus early to state that if such improvement was made he was ready to relinquish his interest in [418] the Lease on the West side of the pier without any deduction of the rent reserved by the Corporation therefor, in the hope however that the present Boat House might be permitted to remain which would be ornamented at his own expence. Whereupon the subject was referred to the Battery Committee.

A Memorial was presented from the Mechanics Bank in the City of New York stating that they have become owners of certain lots or parcels of ground on which there is an annual Quit rent payable to the Corporation and praying they may be permitted to commute for the same by advancing such sum of money as shall be deemed just and reasonable. Whereupon the same was referred to the Finance Committee.

A memorial was presented from Brigadier General H. G. Stevens in behalf of the first Brigade of State Artillery stating that they consider the Militia law passed at the Last Session of the Legislature as extremely injurious to their Corps: that [419] they propose presenting a memorial to the Legislature on the subject, which they presented with the petition and they requested the sanction of the Common Council to said Memorial to the Legislature—Whereupon the same was referred to the Committee on Applications to the Legislature.

A memorial from sundry Inhabitants was received, praying that in opening the Street from Beekman Street to Water Street the north-

easterly line thereof may be straight from the corner of Beekman and Pearl to Water Street so as to take part of the premises of Walter Bowne fronting on Pearl Street. order, Four Engines in ordinary, Four Hook & Ladder Trucks one Hose Waggon, Nine thousand and fifty four feet of good Hose, Fifteen hundred and fifty six feet ordinary, Eleven hundred and fifty five feet ditto bad, making in the whole, including three hundred and fifty five feet of spare hose, Twelve thousand one hundred and twenty feet Also Four hundred and nine Fire Buckets in good order, seventy two ditto broken in the whole Four hundred and eighty one: also Sixteen Ladders, Twenty Hooks, one machine for throwing down chimnies and one Copper Pump. The total number of men belonging to the Fire Department [422] when the companies are full, including the Engineers and Fire Wardens, is Twelve hundred and eighty three. By direction of the Board there has this year been built one Engine for Company No. 24 and Two others are now building, one for No. 12 and one other in lieu of the Floating Engine. He also reports that the present situation of Engine House No. 27 is such as renders it very difficult to remove the machine therefrom."

"That Mr. Hanning rented the said school Room from the Corporation for One year from the 1<sup>st</sup> of May last at 85 dollars, and that it appears from the signatures to a recommendation attached to his petition the said school has been conducted in a manner satisfactory to the neighbourhood and is a regular and respectable establishment. The Committee believing the present rent to be equitable and that there cannot be a better disposition of the property, recommend that the prayer of the petition be granted.

The Committee beg leave to include in this report an application made to them in behalf of Dr. Frederick Fowler for the School Room over the Engine Houses lately erected in Rose Street from the present time to the 1<sup>st</sup> of May next

"From the representations made to the Committee they are led to believe the character and acquirements of the applicant amply fit him for the performance of the duties of a [427] Teacher, and as the place is at present unoccupied they presume no objection can arise to granting his request. The Committee are informed, however, that by a

standing Resolution of the Board no property of the Corporation can be sold or leased except by public auction: they therefore recommend that so much of said Resolution as relates to the cases embraced in this report be rescinded and that the Board adopt the following Resolutions:

“Resolved—that the Resolution forbidding the sale or lease of Corporation property except by public sale be suspended so far as it relates to leasing the school Room in Spring Street from the 1<sup>st</sup> of May 1819 to the 1<sup>st</sup> of May 1820. and also so far as it relates to leasing the School room in Rose Street from the present time to 1<sup>st</sup> May 1819

“Resolved—that a Lease for the School Room in Spring Street be granted to John Hanning in extension of his present lease to the 1<sup>st</sup> day of May 1820, at the same rent and subject to the same covenants he now is under.

“Resolved that a Lease be granted to Dr. Frederick Fowler for the School Room in Rose Street from the present time to the 1<sup>st</sup> day of May 1819 at a rent of Fifty Dollars for the [428] whole term.”

The Finance Committee reported:

“That the Block of ground between Dey and Fulton Streets at the North River is now in a situation to be sold, and as an early sale of said property will prove advantageous to the purchasers by permitting them to prepare for improving said ground at the opening of the ensuing Spring and will place some cash in the Treasury in return for the large sums expended for the purchase and filling of said Block which will be particularly grateful to the Finance Committee, they recommend the following Resolution:

“Resolved—that the Finance Committee and Comptroller be authorized to sell at public auction, on such terms as in their opinion will be most to the interest of the Corporation the Block of ground, except Two lots, bounded by Dey, Fulton, Washington and West Streets, as laid down on the Map [429] of said property herewith presented.

“The Committee beg leave farther to represent that the Corporation owns a small Lot and Tenement No. 265 William Street the Lease of which will expire on the first day of May next and as the place

is considerably out of repair and will be subject to an annual expence unless sold or leased for a term of years, the Committee propose the following Resolution:

The Road Committee reported:

"That they have settled the accounts with the Overseer of Roads for the present year and are pleased to say that the present plan of making the Street Commissioner the Overseer is much better [430] than that formerly pursued. Your Committee herewith submit the expence of the Four last years. In 1815 & '16 the amount of monies paid for keeping the old Roads in repair was \$7073.05. In the above Two years the Ninth Ward was divided into Two Districts and an Overseer to each. In 1817 & '18 the Street Commissioner was made the Overseer and the expences \$3752.26 so that a saving is made of about One hundred per cent. Very few complaints have been made of the Roads—not as many as when the Two Overseers had charge of them."

The Report of the Special Committee on the Battery, which had been made the order of the day, was called up and read as follows:

"The Special Committee to whom was referred the Communication of the Street Commissioner on the subject of the injury done to the Battery by the late gale, beg leave in part to report: That they have viewed the [431] Battery and find the injury and destruction so great as to require a Barrier of some kind, to support the ground already made, from one extremity of the Battery to the other.

"They consider it advisable to construct this Barrier of Stone. A Bulkhead sunk in the usual manner would be less expensive than the

Stone Work contemplated, but when your Committee considered its perishable nature, particularly that part of it which is under water, and the desired permanency of the contemplated improvement and also its interest and consequence to the Inhabitants of your City they unanimously agreed to recommend the use of the most lasting materials.

"After your Committee had agreed in the above opinion they caused a Survey and Map to be made, not only of the Battery but of the water fronting the same from the pier at the extremity of South Street to the southern extremity of Washington Street, which accompanies this Report for the information of the Board.

"The next important question which presented itself to the consideration of your Committee was where they should recommend the placing or erecting of this Barrier.

[432] "The great expence of this improvement will consist in the erection of this Barrier. Your Committee think that it should therefore be carried out to such distance as considerably to increase the extent and add even to the advantages and beauty of this justly celebrated public promenade.

"By the map the Board will perceive that the Water fronting the Battery is generally shoal, even much more so than has usually been supposed, and that the Battery may without any injury to the Harbour be extended on an average of an hundred and twenty five feet. The average depth of water at this distance being not more at high water than Twelve feet. The distance on this line from the south line of the water conveyed to the United States to the pier at the extremity of South Street is Ten hundred and seventy feet and the distance between the United States North Line and Washington Street is Two hundred and twenty five feet. On this line forming a slight curve from the bridge of Castle Clinton until it approaches the South angle of the Battery, where the line becomes more circular and strikes the pier in [433] a direction with the East side of South Street, your Committee recommend the commencement of the improvement by throwing in stones until a ridge is formed up to low-water mark. The average height of this Ridge will be but eight feet and the expence of forming it will not exceed in the opinion of your Committee Seventeen thousand Dollars.

"Your Committee feel confident that the United States will unite and make their part of the ridge and other improvements which are necessary for the preservation of their property. Your Committee propose with the approbation of the Board to communicate with the proper Department of the General Government on the subject.

"Your Committee have had under consideration several plans for the improvement above low-water mark. One plan proposes a Wall with a face of hewen stone on an inclined plane of about Forty five degrees. Another proposes that the Wall be made of the same materials but with a perpendicular face: The Third that there should be no Wall, but the formation of a shore similar to nature with beach gravel filling up the interstices of the stones. Your Committee forbear at present expressing any opinion on these different plans; they [434] have not had sufficient time to make up an opinion as to this part of the subject.

"The best estimate which your Committee can make as to the expence of the whole of this improvement, including the filling in, is that it will not exceed an hundred and fifteen thousand dollars. They consider that it will be proper to apply to the Legislature for a law to tax this amount for this specific purpose in addition to the necessary amount required for the current expences of the City.

"Your Committee have directed a partial filling up with stone to prevent the farther destruction of the land already made. This expence will not exceed Twelve or Fifteen hundred dollars. Your Committee conclude their report by offering the following Resolution:

"Resolved that the Street Commissioner, "after the first of March next," under the direction of this Committee, enter into Contracts for the delivery of the requisite quantity of stone to construct the Ridge mentioned in this Report and delineated on the accompanying Map."

[436] appropriation should be assessed upon property contiguous and immediately benefitted by the appropriation. Whereupon the same was referred to the following Committee: Mr. Recorder Ald. Buckmaster Van Amringe Messrs. Kip Westervelt Akerly Allen

Mr. Allen presented the following Resolution.

“Resolved that application be made to the Legislature for a Law authorising the Corporation to ra[i]se by assessment the sum of

Dollars for the purpose of repairing and enlarging the Battery and that the said sum be assessed by Commissioners appointed by the Corporation on the real estate in this City in proportion to the benefit and advantages to be derived by such estate from said improvement.”

which being read was referred to the Committee on applications to the Legislature.

[437] The Counsel presented the following:

“The Counsel herewith respectfully submits to the Board for execution a Deed from the Corporation to Elbert Anderson for a Lot of ground fronting on Chamber Street, which has been drawn in pursuance of an order of the Board and instructions from the Comptroller. Also a Lease to Elbert Anderson and Theodorus Bailey for so much of Two Lots of ground as remained after extending Chamber Street, which has been drawn in pursuance of the award of the Arbitrator chosen by them and the Corporation.”

“The Special Committee on applications to the Legislature beg leave to report in part that they have had the several subjects referred to them under consideration and have concluded to recommend to the Board that they petition the Legislature for Laws to the following effect:

[438] 1. For authority to raise a revenue, to be applied to the support of foreign poor, by levying a tax on all descriptions of pleasure Carriages kept in this City—said Tax not to exceed in amount the rates fixed by the late law of the United States on that subject.

2. For authority to raise a revenue for the like purpose by laying and collecting a duty not to exceed per cent on the amount



of all goods, Wares and Merchandise sold by public auction in any of the streets or public places in this City, goods sold by distress and under execution excepted.

3. For authority to regulate and license all persons following the business of a Stock, Exchange or Money Broker and the Keepers of officers for the sale of Lottery Tickets in whole or in part, in this City, and to fix the amount per annum to be paid for such licence, provided the same shall not exceed                      Dollars.

4. For authority to appoint a Special Collector in this City to collect the tax imposed on the people called Quakers in lieu of Militia duty—and that the time for collecting the [439] same be extended to that allowed the several Collectors of Taxes for making their returns, and that the Collector be directed to pay the amount thus received to the Chamberlain of this City for the use of the poor thereof.

5. That the Fees of the Coroner for this City, for his view of every Body and taking and returning each inquest, be reduced from Ten to Five Dollars.

6. For an alteration in the Lamp and Watch District, as follows: Beginning at the North River, at a place called Decklyne's Ferry, a little to the Northward of the State Prison and running thence easterly in front of the new Bank houses to the road called Sandy hill road, and thro' the said road to the Northward of Potters' field and the house of William Neilson to Broadway, thro Broadway to Thirteenth Street and through Thirteenth Street to the East River, including the lots on both sides of the line thus designated.

"The Committee beg leave to close their report by offering the following Resolution:

"Resolved that the Counsel be instructed to prepare petitions together with Draughts of Laws on the foregoing subjects, except the first & last [440] Articles and that he lay the same before this Board preparatory to their being sent to the Legislature for their concurrence."

The Minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

A Petition of George Leviniss for Stall No. 22 Fly Market was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Letter from the Police Magistrates was received stating that at the request of some members of the Board they presented a statement on the subject of their compensation by which it would appear [2] that from the decrease of the business in the Police Office the salary at present allowed by the Corporation was not a sufficient compensation for the services of the Magistrates—which being read was referred to the Finance Committee.

A Petition of Daniel Codwise in behalf of James Codwise was presented stating that James Codwise now is and for Eighteen year past has been a Resident Burgher in the Island of St. Croix; that in August last he came to this City with his family for his health only and rented a house for a temporary accommodation; that he has since returned to his stated residence at St. Croix; that a few days before his r[de]parture he was called upon by the Collector of the Eighth Ward for Twenty one dollars fifty cents assessed on him for personal Tax; that not supposing himself subject to such Assessment he respectfully applied to the Board for relief—which being read was referred to the Committee on Assessments.

A Petition of Isaac Adriance to be permitted to take about 20 loads of sand from 125<sup>th</sup> Street to be replaced with coarse gravel was

read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the 9<sup>th</sup> ward [3] with authority to grant the prayer of petitioners.

A petition of Charles McCarty was received stating that he is Lessee from the Corporation of a Lot at the corner of Cherry and Roosevelt Streets: that he has been Assessed \$140 for paving and regulating the side walks: that on a former assessment upon said property the Corporation directed only a part of the assessment to be levied from him: he therefore requested the same rule might be applied in relation to the present assessment. Whereupon the same was referred to the Committee on Assessments.

A Petition from Noah Brown and others—owners of property in the vicinity of North Street, praying that on the opening of North Street it may be filled in and regulated as far South easterly as Lewis Street on Manhattan Island—was read and referred to the Street Committee.

The Committee of Charity, on the application of the Society for the promotion of Industry praying for aid from the Corporation, reported:

“That in discharging the duties imposed upon them by this reference they have visited the Rooms occupied by the Society as a House of Industry, have conversed with some of the Managers of the Institution and the people employed therein, and with other persons of respectability not connected with the Institution, and in short have sought information from every source where they thought it could be obtained; the result of all which has been a full conviction in your Committee that the Society for the promotion of Industry is an Institution highly beneficial to the community and worthy of public [8] patronage. Your Committee are aware that the rapid increase of public charities among us within a few years past is considered by many competent judges (and probably not without good reason) as a principal cause of the great increase of pauperism in our City. It does not appear to your Committee, however, that this Institution has the least tendency to lead to such a result; on the contrary is well calculated to, and really does correct this public evil and promotes habits of order and industry in exact proportion to the efficient means placed in their hands to act upon.

“In prosecuting their enquiries your Committee have satisfactorily ascertained that this Institution has already kept from the Alms House a number of persons who even at this early part of the winter would, without the aid afforded by the Society for the promotion of Industry, have become a public charge, and it is with peculiar pleasure they have learned that in many other instances persons who have heretofore applied to this Institution for work under the most pressing distress

and friendless have, by the disinterested aid and indefatigable zeal of the Managers, been provided with comfortable situations in respectable private families where their uniform good conduct and correct deportment have justified the expectations of the Guardians of this Institution.

“Your Committee have also ascertained that at the present moment the applicants for Work to the Society for the promotion of Industry are far more than they can (without pecuniary assistance) find employment for and that the number is daily increasing—and the Managers are under the painful necessity of refusing work to those who, there is too much reason to believe, after having sought in vain for employment throughout the City and being now unable to procure it from this last resort either apply to the Alms’ house or become public beggars, or perhaps take to some other pursuit of a more corrupting & disgraceful tendency.

“From what your Committee have seen and ascertained in relation to the subject before them they do not hesitate to say that they believe the aid afforded by this Board to the Society for the promotion of Industry is, by the judicious management of that Institution, so much saved to the City in the prevention of pauperism, and they are of opinion that the prayer of the Memorialists ought to be granted. They beg leave to recommend the following Resolution:

“Resolved that the sum of Five hundred [10] Dollars be given by this Board to the Society for the promotion of Industry in this City for conducting the business of that Institution to be paid out of the first monies in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated.”

"That the Fire Engine Establishment now exclusively supported by the Corporation is very expensive to the City and that if we add to this a part of the expence of the City Watch and of lighting the City we shall find that the sums paid by the Corporation, which add to the security against fire and which are properly chargeable to this head, have become an enormous expence to the Community. It is therefore an object worthy the serious attention of the Board whether these expences can be met without recourse to the [12] continued increase of direct taxes.

"There is no doubt in the minds of your Committee that the privilege of insuring against fire, if granted to the Corporation, might be made to produce an income sufficient to meet all the future expences of the Fire Establishment. Your Committee think the Citizens would prefer effecting their Insurance in that establishment in which they were all interested and which would give the greatest security. If any money was made from the Citizens by Insurance with the Corporation it would be made for the Community at large. It would be to the Citizens at large a game in which if their property was destroyed they would win by recovering their insurance; if they paid their premiums without there being a loss the same would enure to their own advantage. The property of the Corporation would afford a security exceeding quadruple that of any office in the City which of course would be an additional inducement for a preference. And though the advantages above referred to would be derived by the Corporation from such a privilege yet your Committee would prefer to leave the business of Insurance to the Companies already

chartered or which may be hereafter chartered for this purpose, provided the [13] Legislature would pass a Law taxing these Companies such percentage of their profits as would produce to the Corporation the annual sum of Ten thousand dollars to be applied toward supporting the Fire Engine Establishment.

"This sum would bear about the proportion to the whole expence of the Fire Establishment that the property insured by these Companies bears to the whole exposed property in the City. Your Committee think that such a tax or rather Assessment on the property of these Companies is no more than reasonable and it will appear the more obviously so when we reflect that in many of the European Cities the Fire Insurance Companies bear all the expences of extinguishing fires.

"Your Committee therefore recommend to endeavour, in the first place, to get this proportion of the expences of the Fire Establishment assessed on the Fire Insurance Companies in the City; and as the consent of these Companies to the enactment of such a Law might contribute to the facility of its passage it is recommended that a Committee of this Board communicate with the Companies with a view to learn if they will add their concurrence to the passage of such a law.

Your Committee therefore recommend the [14] following Resolution.

"Resolved that the Committee on Insurance be directed to correspond with the different Fire Insurance Companies on the subject matter contained in the above report and report the same to the Board."

which was approved, the Resolution agreed to and the subject referred to the same Committee.

The Finance Committee, to whom was referred the Memorial of the President and Directors of the Mechanics' Bank, reported:

"That by a Law of the Corporation all quit rents for grants issued prior to the year 1804, or the money for which such rents shall be commuted, and all rents arising from such *from such* of the said grants as shall not be commuted, are especially vested in the Commissioners

of the Sinking Fund for the reduction of the City Debt. The grants alluded to by the petitioners, however, are subsequent to that period and therefore cannot be [15] commuted for but by a special order of the Board.

"The Committee are of opinion that as the Corporation are indebted to the petitioners in several sums bearing an interest of Six per cent the operation of a Commutation of the aforesaid rents will simply be to lessen the amount of debt without any change of Income on the part of the Treasury. For instance—suppose the average amount of rent to be 360 Dollars: then the amount of principal, say 100 dollars for every Six, will be Six thousand dollars, and the Corporation will pay 360 dollars less per year to the Bank and receive that amount less on account of quit rent. With this brief view of the subject the Committee offer the following Resolution:

"Resolved that the Comptroller, under the direction of the Finance Committee, be authorised to commute with the President and Directors of the Mechanics' Bank for the quit rents reserved on land belonging to them, as more particularly described in their petition to this Board and that such commutation can be made on the usual terms."

The lands described in said petition were: viz

I. [16] A grant made to Swartwout of land now in the First Ward of this City subject to a quit rent forever of \$41. Dollars 25 cents per year.

II. A grant to Lindsay of land adjoining the above subject to a rent forever of 41 dollars and 62 cents.

III. A grant to John R. Murray for land now in the Fifth Ward, on which there is reserved a quit rent from the 1<sup>st</sup> day of May 1810 to 1<sup>st</sup> of May 1824 of 82 dollars 81 cents, from 1<sup>st</sup> of May 1824 forever of 115 dollars 62 cents.

IV. A grant to John R. Murray for land in the Fifth Ward, on which there is a quit rent from 1<sup>st</sup> May 1815 to 1<sup>st</sup> May 1821 of 75 dollars 81 cents and from 1<sup>st</sup> May 1821 to 1<sup>st</sup> May 1828, 84 dollars 27 cents, & from 1<sup>st</sup> May 1828 forever of 134 dollars 82 cents

The said sums to be paid yearly.

Whereupon the foregoing Report of the Finance Committee on said petition was approved and the Resolution agreed to.



[17] The Special Committee on Applications to the Legislature reported that in addition to the subjects already reported on they would recommend certain others to the consideration of the Board in order that laws may be applied for accordingly.

The first Article proposed was as follows:

I. For authority to raise by Assessment on the real and personal estate in this City the sum of \$                      Dollars to be specially applied to defraying the expence of enlarging and repairing the Battery, and that said sum shall be apportioned by the Supervisors of the County for the time being among the several Wards of this City, as it respects the real property therein, according to the ratio of benefit and advantage to be derived from said improvement.

It was moved that the consideration thereof be postponed. The question being taken thereon and a Division called it passed in the negative as follows:

Negative. Ald<sup>n</sup> Mesier King Van Amringe Underhill Morss, Taylor Messrs Bolton Stevens Kip Anthony 10.

Affirmative. Mr. Recorder Ald<sup>n</sup> McQueen Buckmaster Munson Messrs Westervelt Parker Akerly Board Allen 9

Mr. Allen then presented a Resolution to be inserted [18] after the Word "City" and to strike out the rest. It was moved that the farther consideration of this article be postponed—which was agreed to.

The Second article was then read as follows:

II. For authority to enter on all property which shall have been or may be sold for arrears of Taxes or assessments, the term for which the same was sold having expired, and to hold the same and the rents, issues and profits thereof, until claimed by the rightful owner, who, before he shall be entitled to take possession, shall account to the Corporation for all improvements, taxes, assessments or other expences which may be justly due thereon—provided however that nothing herein contained shall prevent the full operation of the Statutes of limitation as in other cases."

On the question of agreeing to the same it was carried in the affirmative and it was referred to the Counsel to prepare a Memorial to the Legislature and a Bill corresponding therewith.

It was then moved that the consideration of the 3<sup>d</sup> article be postponed, which was agreed to.

The Special Committee on Applications to the Legislature, to whom was referred the petition of Brigadier General Stevens in behalf of



the [19] Officers of the First Brigade of New York State Artillery, Reported:

"That they have examined the Memorial to the Legislature, together with the amendatory act alluded to by the petitioners, and from the views of the subject taken by the Committee the amendments required are such as in their opinion are both reasonable and necessary.

"The principal object of the Memorialists appears to be that the fines incurred by the Members of the Brigade, instead of being paid into the Treasury of this State as provided by the late act to organize the Militia, may be paid to the president of the Brigade Court Martial to be applied toward defraying the contingent expence of the Corps: and, when it is considered that the Members of this Corps are at unusual expence for equipments and sacrifice a good portion of their time in training for instruction in Military Tactics, it appears hard to your Committee that they should be deprived of the sums thus collected from their own members, toward meeting the ordinary disbursements of the Brigade.

"The Committee are well aware that great caution ought to be observed by the Board in affixing their sanction to Applications (other than their own) to the State or General Governments: [20] the present case, however, appears to the Committee to be so intimately connected with the peace and security of the Citizens of New York that it forms an exception to many others which might be cited. The handsome and martial appearance of this Corps, together with their alacrity in attending the parades on all days of public rejoicing are of minor importance when compared with their utility in cases of riot or insurrection at the State Prison or Penitentiary or as a force which may be relied on in any sudden emergency. It must be within the recollection of the members of this Board that cases have occurred when the Magistracy of the City were unable by their own authority to keep the peace, and when, had it not been for the timely aid of this Corps, the consequences might have been very serious and alarming to the Citizens.

"With these impressions on the minds of the Committee they recommend that the Board adopt the following Resolution, and that the Clerk of the Common Council be instructed to endorse it on the memorial of the First Brigade of New York State Artillery to the Legislature and certify the same as is usual:

"Resolved that the Common Council concur [21] in the foregoing

Memorial and respectfully recommend it to the consideration of the Honorable the Legislature."

The Counsel presented the following:

"The Counsel herewith submits the opinion of John Wells Esqr. as to the liability of the Corporation to pay the amount awarded by the Jury to the respective owners of the premises lying between Roosevelt Street and James' Slip, which were required by the Corporation for the purpose of forming a public Slip. As the Counsel has repeatedly had the honor of expressing his opinion to the members of the Board he deems it unnecessary at this time for him to enter into a particular detail of the reasons upon which his opinion is predicated. He therefore will simply remark that he concurs with Mr. Wells in his opinion."

The opinion of Mr. Wells was as follows:

"I have examined the transcript of [22] the proceedings relative to a public Slip between Roosevelt Street and New Slip. These proceedings are in their nature adverse to the proprietors of the lots proposed to be taken and the Corporation are not only actors in the first instance, but they necessarily continue so throughout. In the case of Streets it is different, for there the Corporation merely originate the measure and are functus officio as soon as Commissioners are appointed. I do not think, therefore, that the decision of the Supreme Court in regard to Hudson Street would at all govern the case under consideration. Nor does it follow from the opinion of the Court in Stafford against the Corporation of Albany that the Corporation had no control over the proceedings after they were once begun. They merely determined that the Mayor's Court acting as Commissioners had no power over the finding of the Jury but not that the Corporation could not have dispensed with that finding. I am therefore of opinion that inasmuch as the property in question was to be applied to the use of the Corporation, and as they alone are to pay for it, they have that interest in the proceeding directed by the Statute that gives to them a control over it until others have acquired rights under it,

which they cannot do [23] before the Assessment has been made by the Jury, and that until then the Corporation have a right to discontinue it. In this case the Nol: pros: was entered in due season and was an effectual discontinuance. The subsequent proceedings were of course wholly irregular and void and cannot be obligatory on the Corporation."

Alderman Van Amringe then moved that the Report of the Committee on Laws, presented on 14<sup>th</sup> December, be now considered. The question being taken thereon it was agreed to. The Report being read was in the words following:

"The Law Committee, to whom was referred the Report of the Counsel relative to the decision of the Supreme Court in an application to them by the Board for a Mandamus to compel the Mayor's Court to enter judgment upon a Nolle prosequi filed in behalf of the Board in a proceeding then pending before the Mayor's Court to appropriate the Waters between the foot of Roosevelt Street and James' Slip in the East River to public purposes—Viz. "That it "was unnecessary to interfere by Mandamus, because if the Corporation had a right to discontinue they have done it most effectually, "and if an action is commenced to recover the damages awarded the "matter [24] may be taken advantage of by pleading it in the suit." Report: That if your Committee were governed in the decision of this case by the Statute alone they could not doubt but that the Corporation would be concluded by the judgment of the Mayor's Court, because they believe that the proceedings in question are of record and that an action of debt would lie on the judgment in which case the Record could not be traversed. But in the case of *Stafford vs. the City of Albany* (a case very similar to the present), as well as in the case under consideration, the Supreme Court decided that the proceedings of the Mayor's Court in these cases are not of record and that the action must be *assumpsit*. The only question, therefore, for the consideration of the Committee is "Had the Corporation a right to discontinue?" If the proceeding was an adverse proceeding in a Court of Law as such there could be no doubt of our right to discontinue. But it is not. It is a proceeding before the Court as Commissioners. It is not at all a judicial proceeding. The Mayor's Court can do nothing but affirm or disaffirm the assessment. In the case of *Stafford vs. the City of Albany* the Supreme Court decided that the Mayor's Court acted as Commissioners and [25] the Supreme Court have decided that when Commissioners have been appointed

the Corporation cannot discontinue their proceedings. In the case under consideration the Commissioners were appointed because the precept had not only issued but the Jury were actually empannelled before the Corporation applied for a discontinuance. The Supreme Court in their late decision on the application for a Mandamus certainly doubted whether the Board had a right to discontinue. They say "If the Corporation had a right to discontinue &c." leaving the question as to the right in doubt undecided. The question immediately under consideration is without precedent: of course the opinion of your Committee is wholly formed on their construction of the Statute and the case of Stafford vs. the City of Albany, which may possibly be not the opinion of the Supreme Court in the event of suits being commenced against the Board. But your Committee at least consider the question very doubtful and if persisted in will certainly involve the Board in long and expensive Law Suits which will probably cost the Board one fourth of the whole sum awarded the proprietors. The Board has passed an order to take part of these Waters for public use, in [26] which they cannot proceed until the present question is disposed of, so that their plan for improvement if not frustrated will be delayed in all probability four or five years. If the estimate of the Jury for the property was exorbitant: if it exceeded the value of the property as much as the probable expence of defending the suits, it would be reasonable for the Corporation to permit suits to be commenced and try the question. But your Committee believe the estimates to be moderate and to which the Board may accede without injury to their property. Your Committee were informed that the Bonds of the Corporation would be taken by the proprietors for a number of years for the sums awarded them, to ascertain which your Committee addressed a note to Mr. David Stebbins (a copy of which is annexed) and received an answer stating that the Bonds of the Corporation will be received at Six per cent interest payable half-yearly, as follows: For the amounts awarded Minturn & Champlin and Robert Hunter the Bonds may be extended to five or seven years as suits the Corporation and for the remaining sums awarded the proprietors at five years. For further particulars your Committee beg leave to refer the Board to the [27] Letter of Mr. Stebbins and to offer the following Resolution:

"Resolved—that the Board agrees to the several estimates made by the Jury in the proceeding had before the Mayor's Court to appropriate the waters between the foot of Roosevelt Street and James' Slip on the East River to public purposes and that the Counsel be in-

structed to take the necessary measures to carry the same into effect, "provided that the proposition of Mr. David Stebbins to take the bonds of the Corporation as specified in his letter be complied with by him." Mr. Allen then moved to strike out from the resolution all the words after the word Resolved in order to introduce a Resolution which he read in the words following:

"—— that the Corporation will take the Bulkhead and piers between Roosevelt Street and James' Slip and appropriate them to public uses as a Slip or Basin and will give bonds for the amount payable at the periods proposed by one of the proprietors with interest at six per cent per annum, provided the owners of said property will deduct from the assessment and valuation of the Jury per cent, and not otherwise."

The question being taken and a Division called [28] it passed in the Negative as follows:

Negative. Mr. Recorder Ald<sup>n</sup> Mesier King Van Amringe Underhill McQueen Taylor Munson Messrs. Bolton Stevens Kip Anthony Parker Akerly. 14.

Affirmative. Ald<sup>n</sup> Morss Buckmaster Messrs. Westervelt Board Allen. 5.

The question was then taken on agreeing to the Resolution proposed by the Committee with a proviso proposed by Alderman Van Amringe that the proposition of Mr. David Stebbins to take the Bond of the Corporation as specified in his letter be complied with by him. A Division having been called the question was carried in the Affirmative 13 to 6 the members who on the last vote voted in the negative now voting in the Affirmative excepting Mr. Stevens who voted in the negative. Alder- [29] man Buckmaster gave notice that he would move for a reconsideration of the question at the next meeting of the Board.

Mr. Stevens presented the following—which was agreed to

"Resolved that the Committee on the Fire Department be instructed to enquire and report as to the expediency of passing an Ordinance licensing Bell ringers and prohibiting all persons under certain penalties from ringing the Bell of any Church in this City."

His Honor the Mayor stated that he had a confidential communication to make to the Board—whereupon the Lobby was cleared and

[35] Whereupon it was directed that said Report be filed and that 50 copies be printed for the use of the Members of the Board.

A petition of Garrit H. Van Wagenan & Robert Carnley was presented stating that on or about the 14<sup>th</sup> of December 1807 a grant was made to G. H. Van Wagenen of a water lot along the permanent line of East Street on the East River: that part of the said lot, by agreement with Robert Carnley, belongs to him; and praying that upon the surrender of the grant by said Garritt H. Van Wagenen and on payment of all rents due separate grants may be issued to them for their separate proportions—Whereupon the same was referred to the Counsel, Street Commissioner and Comptroller.

A Memorial was presented from F. C. Augustus Uz, stating that complete success had attended the experiment of his compound Lever when applied to a portable Fire Engine and requesting the countenance of the Corporation to his said improvement—which being read was referred to the Committee on Arts and Sciences.

A Memorial was received from Thomas Mussy [36] stating that he had invented a Machine named a "Rut Level" to be employed in repairing Avenues, roads & turnpikes, which he offered on certain conditions to the Corporation. Whereupon the same was referred to the Road Committee.

An Application by Martin S. Wilkins Esqr. in behalf of the freeholders of the town of Harlaem, stating that they have applied to the Legislature for a Law to appoint Trustees in whom the Title to their Common Lands may be vested, and that it has become necessary for

them to have a Copy of the confirmation of the Act passed in 1772 authorising Commissioners to settle the line between their Common Lands and the Common Lands of the City of New York and of the award of the Commissioners appointed under the act of 1772, and praying to be furnished with the same, was read and ordered that the Comptroller, at the expence of the Applicant, furnish copies of the said Documents.

A petition of John G. Betts, late Weighmaster General, stating that on his appointment to the office of Weighmaster General he had, for the proper discharge of the duties of said station, hired an Office and incurred other expences which, as the Law is now [37] repealed, have become useless, and praying remuneration therefor—which was read and referred to the Finance Committee with authority to make such compensation as they judge proper.

A Petition of James Casey, praying remission of fine under the Pawnbroker's Licence, was read and referred to the Police Committee.

A petition of John Smith, Inspector of Firewood of the 9<sup>th</sup> District, praying to be appointed to inspect Fire Wood stored in the yards in his District, was read and referred to the Alderman & Assistant of the 3<sup>d</sup> Ward with authority to grant the prayer of the petitioner.

A Petition that Varick Street between Vandam & Carmine Streets may be regulated was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A petition of Duncan Douglass was received, stating that he had been called upon by the Collector for an arrear of Tax amounting to 10 dollars forty cents, due for the tax of 1817; that his Wife paid to the Collector of said Ward eight dollars of said Tax, and praying that on payment of \$2.40 cents [38] he may be discharged therefrom—was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

A Petition of Isaac Rhoads Jr. for Stall No. 1 in Grand Street Market at Corlaer's Hook—was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition of Michael Nangle to be relieved from a fine under the State Law regulating Hawkers and Pedlars—was read and laid on the Table.

A Memorial from sundry Hatters and Dyers remonstrating against the law entitled "a law respecting the public pumps and to prevent the drying of Cloth in the Street" passed the 4<sup>th</sup> September 1818 and praying the repeal of the last Section of said law, was read and referred to the Committee on Streets.

The Street Commissioner presented a Communication, stating that on the late revision of the Laws it had been omitted to re-enact the Law "to regulate the casting of Water into the Streets," and as the said law had been found beneficial he recommended its re-enactment. Whereupon it was referred to the Committee on Laws, who immediately reported a Resolution recommending the reenactment of said Law. Whereupon it was Resolved that the law entitled "A Law to regulate the casting of Water into the Streets by certain persons therein named" passed 24<sup>th</sup> Feby. 1817 be and the same is hereby re-enacted.

The Comptroller presented a Communication stating certain property of the Corporation which it would be advisable to dispose of on lease—which was referred to the Finance Committee.

A Petition of sundry Boatmen employed in bringing Fire Wood to the City, praying that John Young be appointed Wood Inspector in [45] place of James Hunt, was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Third Ward.

The City Inspector presented the following:

"The City Inspector respectfully reports to the Board a statement of the deaths in the City and County of New York for the year 1818 amounting to Three thousand two hundred and sixty five being an increase of seven hundred and thirty eight above that of the preceding year.

"In consequence of the excessive heats that prevailed during the summer months of the past year a greater number of deaths took place during those months than was usual in former years. This circumstance combined with the increase of our population, (to which may be added the constant influx of emigrants many of whom are of the poorer class and unaccustomed to our climate) may account for the number of children that died of distempers peculiar to our summer months in an atmosphere unusually rarefied.

"The Returns of deaths received from Baltimore and Philadelphia, however, sufficiently prove that the climate of New York is as salubrious as that of her Sister Cities: to exemplify which we need only observe that in the year 1817 the deaths in Baltimore [46] (with a population perhaps thirty thousand) amounted to Thirteen hundred and twenty, whilst in our City, containing a population at least four times greater, we had not more than twice that number.

"The fortunate exemption of our City from the pestilential visitation of the Yellow Fever is justly a subject of general gratulation and solemn thankfulness, and it is to be hoped that the same vigilance that, under providence, has guarded us from its scourge, will be the means of shielding our City from its future visitations."

"Resolved that the Counsel be instructed to prepare a law, to be sent to the Legislature for their concurrence, authorising the Corporation to raise by tax on the real and personal estate in this City and County the sum of Two hundred and fifty thousand dollars to be applied to defraying [52] the current expences of the ensuing year, and that he designate in said Law the Lamp and Watch District as follows: Beginning at the North river at a place called Decklyn's Ferry, at a little to the northward of the State Prison, and running thence easterly in front of the new Bank houses to the road called Sandyhill Road, and thro' the said Road to the Northward of Potters' field and the house of William Nielson to Broadway, thro' Broadway to 13<sup>th</sup> Street, and thro' 13<sup>th</sup> Street to the East river, including the lots on both sides of the line thus designated.

"That the action brought by Mr. Graham was a qui tam action in the name of the Informer, one half the penalty by the statute belonging to the Informer: that the common informer has of course a right to discontinue proceedings commenced in his own name which Mr. Graham did by order of his client on receipt of Ten Dollars. But by compromising in this it is not in the power of the common informer to deprive others of the right of suing for the penalty. If this should be allowed [54] there would be very little reason in inflicting penalties of this nature as nothing would be easier for a person subject to the penalty than to find a friendly informer in every case. In the opinion of your Committee the Attorney has a just cause of action against the petitioner and beg leave to offer the following Resolution:

"Resolved that John Fitzgerald have leave to withdraw his petition and that the Attorney prosecute the suit against him."

[55] The Committee on the subject of applying to the Legislature for a Law to authorise the Corporation to insure against losses by fire presented a Report which was read and on motion the consideration was postponed and 50 copies ordered to be printed for the use of the members.

A Resolution was presented directing the Clerk of the Common Council to give notice by advertisement in the Public Papers of the intention of the Corporation to apply to the Legislature for the above mentioned law, upon which the question being taken it passed in the negative.

The Committee on Arts & Sciences, to whom was referred the Resolution to enquire if any deficiency exists on the part of the person employed to regulate the public Clocks, Reported as follows:

"Mr. John Berger has been the regulator of the public Clocks about Two years, and altho' complaints have been made of their irregularity yet upon an interview and explanation with Mr. Berger there appears to be no cause of complaint against him, since the stopping and irregularity of the Clocks has arisen from causes beyond his control.

The Street Committee, to whom was referred on the 16<sup>th</sup> of November last the petition of Thomas L. Ogden and others praying the regulation of the Side Walks in Nassau Street &c. Reported:

"That they have examined the subject and agree in opinion with the petitioners that the Street would be much improved by the proposed alteration Yet the Committee are informed, and which information they believe correct, that the walk on the East side of the Street is more than double the width of that on the West side of said Street; that the Consistory of the Reformed Dutch Church are the owners of the surplus ground on the east side in fee; that in the year 1795 the Church at their own expence removed the fence to the present line with the consent & approbation of the Corporation, for the accommodation of the citizens and particularly their own congregation, with an express stipulation and consent of the Board that they might build vaults under the walks which [66] has accordingly been done; that the entrances to the said Vaults are within one foot of the present line of the fence within the Church yard, and by removing the fence to the proposed line the whole vaults and the entrances to the same would be in the public Street, or by equalising the walks on both sides the vaults would be under the cartway of the said Street.

"The Committee are therefore of opinion that a consent of the Board to the proposed alteration would be inconsistent with the former agreement made with the Consistory of the Church and offer the following Resolution:—

"Resolved that it would be inexpedient for the Corporation to consent to the proposed improvement in removing the fence of the Middle Dutch Church or equalising the Walks in Nassau Street between Cedar and Liberty Streets for reasons above stated, unless the petitioners should first obtain the consent of the Consistory of the Reformed Dutch Church."

The same Committee on the remonstrance of certain owners in Pearl Street against being Assessed for the repaving of that Street between Cross and Elm Streets, reported:—

“That in the year 1811 Pearl Street was directed to be broken up, raised and repaved in order to gain as much elevation as possible for Collect and Canal Streets. The proprietors on Pearl Street thought it unjust that they should pay all the expence of such regulating & paving [68] inasmuch as the pavement was perfect and putting them to the very great expence of repaving their Side walks, altering Stoops, Cellar-doors &c. Whereupon the Corporation did agree to relieve them from the one half of the expence of the Carriage way. Your petitioners resting under the assurance that their Street was not to be again taken up for a similar purpose made no further objections. They are now about to be assessed for the like purpose against which their petition is presented: and your Committee are of opinion that your petitioners ought to be exempted from paying any part of the expence for paving the Carriage Way, and therefore offer the following Resolution:

“Resolved that the owners & occupants of houses and lots in Pearl Street between Cross Street and Elm Street be exempted from the payment of any part of the expence for repaving said Street other than their proportion of the intersection of Pearl and Collect Streets.”

"Resolved that the Comptroller, under the direction of the Finance Committee, be authorised to sell at public auction in addition to the lots already directed, the lot No. 15 fronting on Fulton Street, part of the Block belonging to the Corporation between Washington, Dey, West and Fulton Streets at the North River."

The Finance Committee, to whom was referred a communication from the Comptroller on the subject of certain portions of public property which may be disposed of the present year, reported the following resolutions:

"Resolved that the Comptroller be authorised to sell at public auction for a term of [71] years of below the following property belonging to the Corporation:

1. The Hay Scales at Gouverneur's Slip for Three years.
2. The Hay Scales at Duane Slip for Three years.
3. A House and Lot No. 265 William St. for Seven years.

4. The School room over the Engine house in Rose Street for Three years.

5. A House and Lot corner of Beach and Chapel Streets for Seven years.

6. Nine cellars under Centre Market for Two years—with the condition that they are at no time to be occupied by a family or fire kept in them.

7. A House and  $1\frac{3}{4}$  Acres of land on Long Island near Hellgate Ferry for Three Years.

8. The Ferry at Horn's Hook for Three years. The Leases on the whole to commence on the first day of May next.

"Resolved that the Comptroller be authorised to lease to the Fulton Steam Boat Company, for a term of Three years from the first day of April next, at an annual rent of Eight hundred Dollars, the Wharf at Beekman Slip now in their possession—conditioned that they shall not occupy [72] any part of said Wharf with Firewood except the Blocks, and not more of them than Ten feet in width measuring from the most easterly side of said Wharf.

"Resolved that the Comptroller give notice in the several papers employed by the Corporation that proposals will be received on or before the first day of March next for renting for one year from the 1<sup>st</sup> day of May 1819 the public Docks and Slips.

"Your Committee beg leave farther to report that the piece of ground alluded to by the Comptroller as lying on the South side of Pearl Street in the Sixth Ward is now vacant & unoccupied in consequence of a claim set up by Mr. George Janeway averring that the line between his property and that of the Corporation is incorrectly run. For the purpose of settling this matter amicably, if possible, the following Resolution is proposed:

"Resolved that the Street Commissioner and Counsel of the Board be and they are hereby authorised to ascertain and settle in an amicable manner the bounds between the land belonging to the Corporation and George Janeway in the 6<sup>th</sup> Ward, and in the event of their inability to effect a settlement with Mr. Janeway as aforesaid [73] that they report to this Board accordingly.

The Comptroller, to whom was referred the petition of Henry Ward, presented a Report which was referred to the Finance Committee.

The Report of the Committee of Laws, to whom was referred the Communication of the Attorney that the Police Magistrates claimed the right to appoint an Attorney to prosecute on breach of recognizances on Tavern Licences, and which Report was presented at the last meeting and the final question postponed, was now called up: and the opinion of the Counsel and the said Report having been read were in the words following:

"Opinion of the Counsel."

Chairman of Law Committee.

Sir.

In compliance with the request [74] of the Law Committee I have examined the law relative to the power of the Common Council to take orders relative to prosecutions for breaches of recognizances entered into by persons licensed to retail spiritous liquors.

"By the 244<sup>th</sup> Section of the Act to reduce several laws relating particularly to the City of New York into one act, it is provided "that such recognizances instead of being entered and acknowledged "to and in the name of the people of the State of New York shall "be given to and taken in the name of the Mayor &c.—and that the Common Council shall take such order relative to prosecutions for breaches of such recognizances and shall also from time to time make such ordinances to regulate Taverns in the said City as they may deem suitable and necessary to preserve the good order and welfare of the same. As the power of directing prosecutions is here given in express terms to the Common Council, it becomes necessary to ascertain whether they have ever been divested of it. The only act which affords any ground for such a pretension is the Act granting additional powers to the Special Justices, passed April 16. 1816. by which it is provided that such recognizance shall not be estreated or delivered [75] to the Common Council but that the Special Justices shall cause such recognizances to be sued in any proper Court and the monies recovered thereon shall be deposited in the City Treasury and form a part of the fund for the support of the poor.

"As there are no words in this Act divesting the Common Council of the right of directing prosecutions, I presume it will not be



contended but that they possess this power concurrently with the Special Justices and that they are bound to put them in suit when ordered by the Common Council.

The point in question I understand to be whether the Common Council or the Special Justices possess the power of designating the Attorney; or in other words whether the Justices have the power of appointing an Attorney to commence suits in the name of the Corporation, not only without their consent but in defiance of their authority.

"An objection fatal to this pretension presents itself at the very threshold of this enquiry. According to the established rules of law a Corporation cannot appear but by Attorney and they cannot appoint an Attorney otherwise than under their Corporate Seal. Now, as I presume the Special Justice will not contend that they possess the power of compelling the Corporation to affix their seal to a Warrant of [76] Attorney, they must fail in this pretension from the absolute impossibility of carrying it into effect.

"By the Act concerning Counsellors &c. it is provided that every person of full age and sound memory, other than defendants in cases when Corporal punishments may be inflicted, may appear by Attorney in every action in plea by and against him in any Court in this State.

"If the right of a Corporation to appear by attorney required the sanction of a Statute the Courts of Justice would undoubtedly put such an equitable construction upon this as would extend the benefit of it to them: and, as it is presumed that the Corporation of this City are not within the exceptions of the act, they might with all due deference to the authority of the Special Justices insist upon availing themselves of its provisions.

"But it may be contended that, altho' the Corporation cannot appear otherwise than by Attorney and the right of so appearing is sanctioned by Statute, yet that it does not follow that they must appoint him.

"An Attorney is a person appointed by another to do any thing in his stead, and to contend that he may be appointed by any other person is to contend for what is a solecism in terms.

[77] "It will be contended by the Special Justices, and it is upon this and this alone that their pretension rests. that they are required by the act to cause all such recognizances as are forfeited to be sued in some proper Court, and that as they possess the power of causing them to be prosecuted in the name of the Corporation they by necessary implication possess the power of doing all such acts as may be



necessary to enable them to carry this power into effect. The question then presents itself whether it is necessary that they should appoint the Attorney in order to enable them to sue, and whether it is not possible that an Attorney appointed by the Corporation can conduct a suit by the direction of the Special Justices. If this is possible in the nature of things then the ground upon which they predicate their claim fails to support them. And as the Corporation have appointed an Attorney and have declared it to be his duty among other things "to commence all actions upon the laws of this State in cases when the penalty is given to the Corporation" there is not a shadow of ground to support this pretext upon the plea of necessity.

"Prior to the Act of April 1816 the Corporation possessed exclusively the power of taking all orders relative to prosecutions for breaches of such recognizances, and it was required of them that they should take all such orders relative to the premises as they should deem suitable and necessary to preserve the good order and welfare of the City.

"By the Act of April 1816 it is also made the duty of the Special Justices "to cause such recognizances to be sued." By putting a reasonable construction upon this Act (and indeed the only reasonable one which it admits of) it must mean that they possess this power concurrently with the Corporation, and as it is made the duty of the Corporation to take all orders &c. as before mentioned the Legislature presumed that they would not disregard the injunctions of the Act but would among other things appoint an Attorney, as this is an indispensable order in relation to prosecutions; and when they authorised the Police Justices to cause recognizances to be put in suit, they presumed that the Corporation would do their duty by appointing an Attorney for that purpose.

"This construction is not only reasonable but is in accordance with the established rules for construing Statutes: for by preserving the power of the Corporation unimpaired the penalties will be more generally enacted than they would be if the power of enforcing them was exclusively [79] confined to the Special Justices, and the intention of the Legislature in passing this law undoubtedly was to subject the retailers of Spirituous Liquors to a more vigilant inspection and rigid observation of the laws and not to divest the Corporation of any of the coercive powers for this purpose. By this construction the last Act does not infringe upon the first, and altho' subsequent acts repeal preceding ones so far as they are irreconcilable, yet if the last admits of a reasonable construction by which the provisions of the first can

be preserved inviolate that construction is to be given to it. By this construction also the vested rights of the Corporation to regulate these prosecutions remain inviolate and statutes in derogation of private rights are even to be construed strictly.

“On the other hand the construction contended for by the Special Justices is unreasonable in every point of view, for they are contending for a power which they cannot enforce, inasmuch as they cannot affix their Corporate Seal to a Warrant of Attorney and the Corporation can also at any time release the action: the costs of proceeding, in the event of failure would be thrown upon the Corporation and they therefore ought to have the power of selecting an Attorney in whose [80] vigilance and legal discretion they have confidence, and the Corporation are alone interested in the monies which may be recovered.

“On the other hand no imaginable reason can be given why the Legislature should deprive the Corporation of the power of appointing their own Attorney to conduct their own suits—a privilege which is denied to none but fools & lunatics.

“If it is necessary to recur to authority in order to put this matter beyond question I would refer to the practice under the laws of the United States.

“By one of these laws it is enacted that the Collector shall take bonds on the exportation of merchandise and ‘shall put the same in suit.’ By another act it is provided that when any bond for the payment of duties shall not be satisfied on the day it may become due ‘then the Collector shall forthwith and without delay cause a prosecution to be commenced for the recovery of the money due thereon ‘by action in suit at law in the proper Court having cognizance ‘thereof.’ These words or equally as strong and in the last case are nearly the same with those relied upon by the Police Justices—And yet the Collectors have ever been required to deliver these bonds to the United States Attorney to be sued. [81] Here then we have a practical construction of similar Statutes adopted in every district in the United States and which is in accordance with what I contend for in the case in question.

“If the construction which I put upon the Act is correct, the next question which presents itself is what remedy is to be resorted to in order to prevent the commencement of suits in the name of the Corporation without their authority. This would be an offence which would subject the Attorney to the severe animadversion of the Court and would also subject all parties concerned in it to an indictment

for misdemeanour. The Court would also order the proceedings to be discontinued and would compel the Attorney to pay all the Costs."

"Report of the Law Committee."

"The Law Committee, to which was referred the representation of the Attorney 'that the Police Magistrates claimed the right of appointing an Attorney to sue out forfeited recognizances for Tavern 'Licences'—having taken the opinion of the Counsel on the same, in which they concur, beg leave to refer the Board to that opinion annexed. In addition to the [82] reasons given by the Counsel, the very great impropriety of permitting an irresponsible person to this Board to officiate for them is apparent. If an Attorney not authorised by the Board has a right to commence an action without their order he has an undoubted right to discontinue it without permission. H[e] may compound with the offender and compromise the rights of the Board without the possibility of detection, thereby rendering the penal laws of the Community a private emolument and a source of public immorality. The penalties of the Corporation and of the State in which we are concerned so far from exciting apprehension in offenders, are a subject of complaint from the virtuous and of derision from the vicious on account of the ease of avoiding the consequences. Security against vice depends more upon the certainty than the magnitude of penalties, and it may be asked what security have the Board that the punishment will certainly visit the Offender when the Attorney conducting the suit is not under the control of the Board.

"Your Committee have no apprehension that any of these consequences would ensue in [83] the course of Mr. Graham's practice, but once established as a precedent and you have no guarantee for the observance of good faith. The Board does not allow to its officers the power of dispensing charity. It is not for them to consider of hardships and difficulties in enforcing the law but the single question are they liable to the law. To bestow charity and relieve from penalties is reserved exclusively in the Board, and altho' under the arrangement of the Police Office the trust might not be abused as much as by an officer of the Board, yet in the one case our redress is remote and uncertain and in the other immediate and positive. Your Committee beg leave to offer the following Resolution:—

"Resolved that no suit shall hereafter be commenced in the name of this Board except by an Attorney duly authorised by the Board and

that if any suits shall be commenced by any person not so authorised the Counsel be, and he is hereby instructed to apply to the Court in which such suits shall be pending to dismiss the same—and to make him or them pay the costs.

“The Committee farther report that five or six suits have been commenced by Mr. Graham under the direction of the Police Magistrates and [84] have made considerable progress toward judgment. As the Police Magistrates proceeded in the business under an impression that the Statute gave them the power and not from any disrespect to the Board and as it will be a saving of time and expence to permit Mr. Graham to conduct these suits to judgment, your Committee beg leave to offer the following Resolution:

“Resolved that the Counsel of the Board be, and he is hereby directed to associate himself with J. L. Graham Esqr. to superintend and direct as Counsel the suits now pending in the name of this Board, brought by the said J. L. Graham Esqr. on forfeited recognizances of Tavern Keepers.

“Your Committee, while on this subject, beg leave to remark that in consequence of the penalty in the recognizance being One hundred and twenty five dollars suits must be brought in the higher Court of Record which not only delays the immediate punishment of the Offenders & affords time to make interest to have the same remitted, but in case of failure incurs a heavy expence to the Board. If the penalty should be reduced to one hundred dollars [85] suits might be brought in the Marine Court in which case the punishment would be so prompt that your Committee believe it would be attended with happy consequences in deterring offences. They therefore beg leave to offer the following Resolution:

“Resolved that the Counsel prepare a Memorial and the draft of a law for an application to the Legislature so as to amend the act entitled ‘An Act to lay a duty on Strong liquors and for regulating Inns & Taverns’ as that the amount of the penalty in recognizances entered into by persons selling by retail any strong or spirituous liquors be reduced to One hundred Dollars.”

The question having been taken on the report and resolutions, the report was approved and the Resolutions agreed to.

The Committee to whom was referred the expediency of taking a suitable portion of ground at the East River near Corlaer’s Hook for

a public Walk or Promenade and a suitable portion of ground at the North River near Fort Gansevoort for the like purpose and also of enlarging and [86] repairing the Battery in an ornamental & durable manner, Reported:

"That they have considered the subject with all the deliberation and care that its importance demanded. On the one hand they were sensible that the measure, if gone into upon the extensive scale proposed by the Resolution, must add greatly to the public debt of the City and finally require a considerable augmentation in the annual Tax. On the other hand the Committee could not but see that the plan submitted to them embraced great public improvements which if once lost might not be retrieved: improvements which will contribute alike to the recreation, pleasure and health of our citizens and are essentially connected with the future splendour of our growing Metropolis.

"Before, however, your Committee give an opinion whether the objections arising from the increase of the City debt and the consequent augmentation of the annual tax outweigh the advantages which will flow from the contemplated improvements they beg leave to present a general view of the subject, with some facts which in their opinion are material to be brought under consideration to enable the Board to arrive at [87] a just conclusion.

"The only public Walks South of the great Military Parade ground are the Battery, the Park in front and the ground in the rear of the City Hall and St. John's Square opposite St. John's Church near Hudson Street. This last Walk belongs to Trinity Church and therefore is not strictly a public Walk, tho' it is not probable it will ever be applied to other purposes. The distance from the South line of the Grand Military Parade ground and the Western point of the Battery is about 3 miles. The distance from Fort Gansevoort to the same point is a little less than Two miles and an half. The distance from Corlaer's Hook to the Battery is about two miles and from Corlaer's. Hook to Fort Gansevoort about two miles and an half. The distance of St. John's Square to the Western point of the Battery is rather short of one mile and a quarter, and from the Park in the rear of the City Hall to the same point about three quarters of a mile. A Line drawn from the East to the North River one mile from the Battery passes through the Hospital yard. The population south of the Hospital Yard somewhat exceeds Forty Thousand.

"That part of our City which lies south [88] of the Grand Square or Parade ground contains probably from 2700 to 2750 acres,

and when it shall be compactly built upon will have a population rather exceeding 250,000 souls.

“For the purpose of ascertaining at what era a condensed population will extend to the Grand Square or Parade Ground, or in other words will amount to 250,000 the Committee have thought it proper to judge of the future by the past. This rule appeared the more likely to lead to a correct anticipation because our City, our State and our Country are in the vigor of youth. Its stride to manhood surpasses the most sanguine calculations. Every thing before us shews that we are to be one of the greatest of nations. Our wealth and resources keep pace with our increasing population; and the enterprize, the intellect and character of the American people are a guarantee that their national and public improvements will correspond in magnificence with the greatness & power of the Republic.

“To return to the question—when will our City contain 250,000 souls? Soon after the War of the Revolution our numbers were about 23,000. The census of 1790, the first which was taken under the General Government, gives 33,000.

[89] The Census of 1800 gives 60,000 and that taken in 1810 gives upwards of 96,000. Our population may be now calculated to increase 40,000 every Ten years, and that increase will augment with our augmented numbers. At present there are at least 125,000 and in 1820 there will be 135,000 Inhabitants. In 1830 there ought to be nearly 180,000; and the Committee think themselves justified in concluding that if the Almighty shall continue his favors to our City and to our nation the City of New York will in 26 years from this time contain 250,000 souls.

“In a free government, as ours is, its population constitutes its wealth as it does its strength. Hence in 1785 and 1786 the population of the City paid only an Annual Tax of \$25,000. In 1792 and 1793 the taxes rose to \$40,000 per year. In 1799 and 1800 it considerably exceeded \$100,000. In 1807 it amounted to \$129,000. In the year 1813, the first year of our late war with Great Britain, it exceeded \$174,000. In 1817 it amounted, including the State Tax, to \$374,311  $7\frac{1}{100}$  and in the last year 1818, owing to the reduction of the State Tax to One instead of Two mills per dollar, the Tax upon this City was reduced to \$340,994  $8\frac{1}{100}$ .

“Before your Committee close their statement [90] of facts upon which alone can be founded the calculations which must determine whether the City of New York is able to meet the expenditure called



for by the proposed improvements the Committee beg leave farther to state that by the report of the Special Committee appointed specially with reference to the Battery an expence on that object alone must be incurred little short of \$120,000. By the report of the Street Commissioner to your Committee about \$100,000 will be necessary to secure the ground at Corlaer's Hook so as to give to the Inhabitants forever a Walk looking up and down the East River. The land at Fort Gansevoort will not cost much, the title being chiefly in the Corporation. The right of the Corporation is proposed to be reserved. Your Committee estimate that the cost of enlarging the Battery and securing it permanently, of taking all the land required to be taken at Corlaer's Hook and of reserving and taking land at Fort Gansevoort, so as to give a Walk there of about 1200 feet, will altogether amount to \$250,000.

"Your Committee farther state that the City Debt amounts to nearly \$1000,000 which if the whole debt bore an interest of Seven per cent [91] would give an interest account against the City of \$70,000 per annum.

"The Revenue of the City in 1808 was \$57,830. In 1817 it was increased to \$72,814  $\frac{6}{100}$ . During the year 1818 it amounted to \$91,262  $\frac{29}{100}$ . The Revenue will probably continue to increase with the increase of the City. About the year 1823 it will be considerably greater than it now is, as many leases which are now at a low rent will then end and thenceforward produce a much higher income.

"Before the Committee conclude the detail which they have given, they beg leave to observe that most of the preceding estimates and calculations are not made with strict and accurate precision, nor so meant to be understood; but are intended to be sufficiently correct to enable the Board to act wisely upon the matter now under consideration.

"A general view of the subject is now before the Board. By the details that have been given every member is able to count the cost and say whether it can be paid. Some of your Committee have thought the expence too vast to be encountered. Others have thought that the property contiguous to these great Walks should be made to bear the whole expence. Others have [92] thought it should be a common expence borne by the Common funds of the City—And an opinion has been expressed that the expence should be met partly by the general fund and partly by a local Assessment upon the contiguous property. All however have agreed in this—that public



Walks contribute to the pleasure and health of the people and are an Ornament to a City. They agree too, that the points of land proposed to be taken are the most eligible of all others. Those points are at opposite and convenient distances from each other. The located spots will give great and useful public walks to our citizens when New York shall hold a rank among the first Cities of the world. The Battery may justly be considered one of the most elegant Walks that any City can boast of. It is the pride as it is the ornament of New York. Corlaer's Hook, tho' not equal to the Battery, falls little short of it either in the extent or beauty of its prospects. The site proposed to be taken above Fort Gansevoort will afford a considerable view of the North River and open to the eye of the Citizen an entire view of the Narrows. These three public Walks, the Battery, the Walk at Corlaer's Hook and that [93] upon the Hudson place New York beyond a rival in the splendour of her promenades.

"Already does our population class our City with the second rate cities of Europe. The revenue we carry into the National Purse, our Commerce and the tonnage of our ships place us among the first. The Committee believe the City to be able to carry into effect the proposed improvements and to meet the necessary expence—And they believe the Citizens will cheerfully unite their efforts, provided a due regard is shown to the general interests of the whole City.

"Under these impressions Your Committee respectfully recommend the following Resolutions:

"I. That the Board reserve all the land under water west of 10<sup>th</sup> Avenue from 14<sup>th</sup> to 19<sup>th</sup> Streets making a front of about 1200 feet for public purposes.

"II. That the Counsel be directed to take the necessary legal steps to vest in the Corporation the land and the land under water at Corlaer's Hook lying South of Grand Street and east of Corlaer's Street to the permanent lines for the like purpose.

"III. That application be made to the [94] Legislature to obtain a grant of their title to the lands of the Battery and the lands adjoining the same under water to an extent not exceeding 400 feet for the like purpose.

"IV. That application be made to the Legislature to raise the sum of \$250,000 for the purpose of forthwith enlarging and completing the Battery agreeably to the plan adopted by the Board, and also for paying for the land and land under water to be taken at Corlaer's Hook to be hereafter improved as the Corporation shall direct—and

that the said sum be raised by Assessments upon the real and personal property in this City as follows:

\$62,500 in 1819

62,500 in 1820

62,500 in 1821

62,500 in 1822

“V. That application be made to the Legislature to authorise the Corporation to borrow not exceeding the sum of Two hundred thousand dollars for the purpose of making the aforesaid public improvements and that the said annual sums of Sixty two thousand five hundred dollars be pledged to redeem [95] the same.”

The question being taken thereon and a Division called it past in the Negative all the members present voting in the Negative excepting Messrs. Board & Schieffelin who voted in Affirmative.

The question was then taken on agreeing to the Second Resolution & a division having been called it was carried in the affirmative as follows:

A Petition of John Simonson for a Stall in Spring Street Market;  
A Complaint against Bridget Lyons for exhibiting goods for sale on  
the Side Walks opposite No. 156 in Front Street; A petition of  
Andrew Hutton and Jacob Flager for permission to exchange Stalls,  
and a petition from John A. Martin for Stall No. 1 in Corlaer's Hook  
Market were severally [102] read and referred to the Market Com-  
mittee.

A Letter was received from Silvanus Miller Esqr. stating that at  
the request of Mrs. Sarah Beekman and Mrs. Ann Payne he repre-  
sented that for the improving and opening of Roosevelt Street from  
Cherry Street eastward ground was taken belonging to their Ward  
Miss Sarah B. Payne a Minor and an award therefor amounting to  
\$9,255: that owing to the minority of the said Sarah B. Payne the  
said sum cannot now be paid over to the guardians: they therefore  
propose to the Corporation to make out a Certificate of the amount  
aforesaid to draw legal interest until the said infant shall arrive at the  
age of 21 years and then to be paid to the said infant or her guardians,  
the Certificate to remain in the possession of the Comptroller or other  
person appointed by the Corporation who shall be instructed to give  
a satisfactory explanation in writing of such trust to said guardians:  
that this arrangement will preclude the necessity of applying to the  
Supreme Court in relation to this claim and thereby avoid unnecessary  
delay and the loss of interest with costs. Whereupon the same was  
referred to the Finance Committee.

[103] His Honor the Mayor presented the Return of persons con-  
fined in the Bridewell as made by the Keeper. He merely observed  
that of those reported as confined there were but nine who were

charged with offences, the residue being vagrants or persons in confinement on sentence—A state of the prison highly honorable to the order and morality of the City. He also observed that in his visits to the Bridwell he had been perfectly satisfied with the cleanliness and order observed in the prison, in which in his opinion no prison he had ever visited excelled. The Return was ordered to be filed.

The presentment of the Grand Jury of the 15<sup>th</sup> instant, in which they presented the present regulations of the Stands of the Hackney Carriages and of the conduct of the Drivers as a Nuisance, was read and referred to Alderman King Messrs. Allen Parker

A petition of Le Grand Jarvis to be appointed a City Surveyor was read and referred to the Street Commissioner.

[104] A Complaint from the Inhabitants of the Eighth Ward of the situation of the pumps in that Ward was read and referred to the Superintendant of Repairs with directions to attend immediately to redressing the evils complained of.

A Memorial was received from a Committee from the Governors of the New York Hospital stating that on the 1<sup>st</sup> instant there was due to the Hospital from the Corporation the sum of \$11,880  $\frac{14}{100}$  for the care of lunatics sent to that Institution from the Alms House and requesting the same might be liquidated. Whereupon the same was referred to the Finance Committee.

A petition was received from John Young stating that a complaint had been lodged with the Attorney against a lad named John Stump for firing a pistol in a yard in the City: that the boy was a foreigner unacquainted with the laws and was living with him on trial; and praying that the proceedings against him may be dismissed. Whereupon it was resolved that the petitioner have leave to withdraw his petition.

A Memorial was received from John Jacob Astor [105] and others, requesting the Corporation to sanction and further the views of the petitioners in an application to the Legislature for the appointment of Commissioners invested with powers to adjust the level of those streets, Avenues &c. in this City which have not yet been regulated and to make such models or plans as may enable the proprietors of real estate in this City to know how the present surface of their ground is situated with regard to the permanent regulations which are to be made. The same being read a motion was made to refer the same to a Committee. The question being taken thereon it passed in the Negative. Alderman King then moved a Resolution that it was inexpedient to comply with the request of the petitioners—which was agreed to. It was then Resolved that the subject matter of the proposed Memorial



to the Legislature be referred to the Committee on Applications to the Legislature to propose such measures thereon as they should judge expedient.

A Memorial was received from sundry Owners of lots in Frankfort Street, stating that they understood a petition was to be presented to the Board for opening Frankfort Street from Chatham Street to William Street, against which measure they begged [106] leave to enter their remonstrance. Whereupon the said Memorial was directed to be laid on the table until the coming in of said petition.

A Memorial was received from Sundry owners of lots in the vicinity of Washington Market stating that by the filling up of the Basin they experience a great want of accommodation for vessels at that place and praying that an extensive pier may be run out at the end of Vesey Street which if turned a few feet to the South from the West end of the Pier would make a safe and convenient place for vessels. Whereupon the same was referred to the Committee on Wharves, Piers & Slips.

A petition of Peter M. Allison, praying payment of the balance of Contract due to him for erecting the pier at the foot of Oliver Street, was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

A petition of Henry Rutgers, William B. Crosby, Anna Bancker and John Withington in behalf of the Baptist Church was received stating that in the year 1813 the Heirs of Hendrick Rutgers adopted a plan for widening Henry and Bancker Streets eight feet on each side [107] which improvement extends between Montgomery and Catharine Streets, a Map of which is on file in the Register's Office: that it is now in the power of the Corporation to make a great saving to the Inhabitants when those improvements are made by now reserving for public use eight feet of the ground in Fayette Street about to be improved on each side of Henry Street and on the North side of Bancker Street, and praying that measures may be taken accordingly. Whereupon the same was referred to the Street Committee.

A petition of Dunbar Sloan was received stating that from unforeseen events he had been reduced from respectable circumstances to indigence and had been compelled to take shelter from absolute want in the Alms' house: that for Two years past he has been employed as a Teacher and praying to be allowed some compensation therefor to be enabled to procure for himself some decent cloathing and to make his declining years somewhat comfortable. Whereupon the same was referred to the Alms' House Committee.

A Petition of Hermanus A. Veeder for Appointment of Inspector



of Firewood in the Yards was referred [108] to the Committee on Applications.

A Petition of John Weeden and Samuel Hutching, Street Inspectors, praying for reasons stated in their Memorial an increase of their salary, was read and referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

A farther petition of Robert Latimer praying remission of a fine for not having Rates in his Hackney Carriage alledging that the same occurred from the malice toward him of his Driver whom he had just discharged, was read and referred to the Attorney with authority, on the facts appearing as stated in the petition to remit the fine on payment of costs.

A petition from sundry Lessees of lots in Harman Street, praying the Corporation will defer the opening of said Street for One year from the 1<sup>st</sup> of May next was read and referred to the Committee on Streets.

A proposition from Charles G. Foster on the subject of lighting a portion of the City with Gas Light was read and referred to the Committee on Arts & Sciences.

The Battery Committee, on the petition of D. D. Tompkins & others, reported:—

“That your Committee cannot learn from any Document on file the circumstances under which the old Boat-house in question was built—but are inclined to think from what they learn from some of the said proprietors of papers and others that it was originally erected at the joint expence of those who have heretofore occupied it. Also your Committee understood, and believe such was the understanding of the Board at the time the Report on William Van Beuren’s petition was adopted, that the consent then given to erect a new Boat House was on condition that the Old one should be prostrated and that the

new one should be a complete substitute as to all persons interested in the Old House. Your Committee beg leave farther to observe that as the area or surface of Water under the new building is more spacious than that under the old, and as all parties—towit Revenue Officers, Health Officers and Printers were comfortably accommodated with room for their respective boats, they can see no reason why the same accommodation should not [114] be afforded under the new building, provided the parties as heretofore would only come to an understanding with each other. Your Committee therefore think it inexpedient to grant the request for the continuance of said Old Boat House and recommend the following Resolutions:—

“Resolved that the Old Boat House be removed on or before the day of April next, and that the Street Commissioner attend to the removal of the same.

“Resolved that those interested in the Materials be permitted to take and carry away the same.”

The Street Committee, on the petition of sundry dyers and hatters, presented a Report which was read and laid for consideration, and it was resolved that the Attorney be directed not to commence any suits on the law until [115] the further order of the Board.

A Resolution was presented proposing an Amendment to the law respecting the Sale of Crabs prohibiting their being sold in the Streets between the 1<sup>st</sup> of December and the 25<sup>th</sup> March—which was referred to the Market Committee.

The Report of the Committee on the subject of an Application to the Legislature to authorise the Corporation to insure against losses by fire was called up. On motion to consider the same it was agreed to. The same being read was in the words following:—

“That they have communicated their proposition to the different Fire Insurance Companies on the subject of uniting with the Corporation in an Application to the Legislature to levy a tax of Ten thousand Dollars on the different Offices and have received for answer that it is not expedient to accede to the same.

They therefore farther report

“That by referring to the accounts of the Comptroller for the

last six years it appears that in the Fire Department the sum of \$73,903.45 has been expended, making an annual average expenditure of \$12,951.77: That in the Watch [116] Department, during the same period, the sum of \$302,687.53 has been expended, making an annual average expenditure of \$50,447.92—and That in the Lamp Department the sum of \$20,316.60 has been expended the last year—forming together the annual sum of \$83,716.29: That these Three Departments are intimately connected with each other, for if the City is well watched and lighted, beside giving security to the persons and property of our fellow citizens, many of those calamities will be avoided which proceed from incendiaries as well as the carelessness of many by arresting the flames before they have acquired a considerable ascendancy.

“In a review of the present system it appears to be wholly conducted on erroneous principles. The Corporation by a tax on their fellow citizens furnish nearly the whole of the apparatus for extinguishing of fires. Another class voluntarily give their personal services by which a number are called upon more frequently to discharge the duties of Jurors, and the emoluments arising from Insurance are put into the pockets of those who hold stock in the different companies now incorporated.

[117] “The growing importance of our City and the immense sum with which its Inhabitants are taxed to defray the ordinary expences force upon your Committee the necessity of providing the ways and means to relieve their constituents from a portion of these burthens, and on a full consideration of the whole subject they deem an Application to the Legislature to authorise this Corporation to open an Insurance Company to ensure real and personal estate in the City and County of New York as affording the means of accomplishing in part this purpose.

“By a reference to the Books of the Assessors it appears that the real estate may be estimated at \$59,827,285, and the personal estate at \$20,426,806, from which it may be estimated that the property properly the subject of Insurance may amount to the sum of \$40,000,000, the average rate of Insurance on which, estimated at  $\frac{1}{2}$  per cent, would produce the sum of \$200,000, in which the office opened by the Corporation would come in for a full proportion of the public patronage in competition with the present Insurance Companies.

“There are strong considerations to induce your Committee to believe that a preference would [118] be given to insurance in the office the Corporation should establish. 1<sup>st</sup> as the faith of the whole

City and County would be pledged for a re-imbursement in case of loss or damage by fire—: 2<sup>dly</sup> Every insurer would to the amount of his premium beside obtaining security by that very act diminish his taxes: 3<sup>dly</sup> Greater vigilance to prevent fires would be called into operation not only against the fire-brand of the incendiary but as to the innumerable acts of negligence now furnishing so copious a source of these calamities.

“To these views of your Committee they believe not a solid objection can be urged, and if those that may be urged be carefully examined they may be traced, they apprehend, to motives of personal interest.

“They therefore confidently recommend the following Resolution:

“Resolved that the application for permission to open such an Insurance Company shall be made under the direction of this Corporation and that the Counsel be directed to draw a Bill to be forwarded with their application comprising this object.”

A petition of John Van Sicklen on the subject of a Kitchen said to be against the Fire Law was read and referred to the Committee on the Fire Department.

A petition of John Randel Jr. praying for reasons stated in his Memorial that time may be given him until the 1<sup>st</sup> of December next [126] for completion of Maps of Manhattan Island to be made by

him and by his Contract to be delivered on the 1<sup>st</sup> of May next, was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

A petition was also received from J. Randel Jr. praying for payment of Nine Maps in part of the above Contract, which was also referred to the same Committee.

A petition of sundry persons praying the repeal of the Law regulating the Sale of Crabs was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A memorial of the Female Assistance Society praying some pecuniary aid was read and referred to the Committee of Charity.

A Memorial from sundry owners and residents in Harman Street, praying the Corporation will delay the opening of said Street for one year, was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A Memorial from certain Owners of land lying within the parcel of land included within the Tract denominated on the Map of the Commissioners for laying out Streets and Roads as the Military Square, that the Corporation would either determine to take and pay for the same or abandon the same to the proprietors, was presented and read. "That in the opinion of your Committee the subject is one of great importance and requires that immediate and decisive measures should be taken to counteract the effects which may be produced on the minds of the Legislature by the Memorial alluded to. The evils which would grow out of a measure that shall take [134] from the Corporation the power of completing the plans for the permanent regulation of the Streets and Avenues on which so much time and money have been already expended and which are in some instances carried into effect, are incalculable—for it is not only the loss of the money already expended which is to be feared, but the theoretic notions of the new Commissioners may probably clash with the experience and practical knowledge of those who have made the subject a study of many years, and all that has been done must be demolished to meet their views—by which not only an expence that cannot easily be estimated would be incurred but confusion and disorder be the consequence.

"The Committee are unable to conceive the motives which have induced the application alluded to, and were it not for the known intelligence and respectability of the gentlemen concerned they should be ready to attribute them to something more than public good or general utility—for is it to be credited that with a knowledge of the large sums expended by the Corporation in obtaining [135] the elevations of the several monuments which designate the courses of the Avenues and streets and in making a map on which such elevations are to be

marked, and that two Surveyors are now actively employed in taking profiles of the Streets as far up as 25<sup>th</sup> Street from which is to be prepared a Model (also in progress) shewing distinctly the elevations and depressions of all the Streets and Avenues in that part of the City, that these gentlemen can with proper views attempt to impress the Legislature with a belief that nothing has been effected in relation to this important object?

"The Committee are constrained to enter their united protest against the measure applied for by the Memorialists, and therefore recommend that a respectful remonstrance be presented to the Legislature, on behalf of the Corporation, pointing out the evils that will result to the Community should the plans already in operation be destroyed—and they present the following Resolution accordingly

"Resolved that the Counsel of the Board, in conjunction with the Street Commissioner, be instructed to prepare a remonstrance to the Legislature against the Memorial and petition of [136] John Jacob Astor and others praying that Commissioners be appointed to regulate and adjust the levels of the Streets and Avenues not already regulated, and that they report such remonstrance to the Board for their sanction at their next meeting."

Titus, stating that a complaint had been made against them for having a pile of boards in Water Street between Pike & Market Streets: that said [149] boards were piled under the direction of Mr. Weeden one of the Street Inspectors—and praying relief, was read and referred to the attorney with authority to remit.

A petition of Francis Wunnenburg for an appointment to some office and of John Price to be appointed Keeper of Potters' field were read and referred to the Committee on Applications.

An application was received from Gouverneur Kemble in behalf of the West Point Foundry Association, offering to supply to the Corporation Cast Iron Railing to be placed around the Park & Battery—and referred to the Committee on Repairs.

A petition of James Lowerre to rent the Slip or Basin on the West side of the City at the foot of Canal Street offering therefor the sum of \$500 per annum for 8 or 10 years or \$400 per annum for the same until the same is devoted by the Corporation to public use, was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

A petition from L. & Joseph Webb was received, [150] stating that under the expectation that the permanent Sewer would be carried through Hamersley Street where the Drain now is they had taken out their Water grant at the foot of Clarkson Street and made ground at the expence of \$13000 for the purposes of a Ship yard. They therefore pray that the permanent sewer may not be carried thro' Clarkson Street but may be carried thro' Hamersley Street. Whereupon the same was referred to the Committee on Greenwich Village.

A petition from sundry Owners of lots in Harman Street praying that the improvement of opening said street may be carried into effect after the 1<sup>st</sup> of May next, was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A petition from Nathaniel & Harvey Weed and Benjamin Bailey, praying that Greenwich Street in front of Albany Basin and that Cedar

Street be regulated agreeably to the survey made prior to the sale of the property at that place, was read & laid on the Table.

[154] The Street Commissioner presented a communication recommending permission to be given to erect Lime houses in all streets of 50 feet wide and upwards from this time and to be a general privilege from and after the 1<sup>st</sup> of March provided the Buildings are actually progressing. Whereupon the same was referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the 3<sup>d</sup> Ward with authority to grant permission to erect Lime-houses within that Ward.

He also presented the following Ordinances, which were passed, and John Targee, Abraham Bloodgood and Jacob C. Mott were appointed assessors in each. Viz. for regulating and paying Albany



Street from Greenwich Street to the Bulkhead; Cedar Street from Greenwich Street to the Bulkhead; Washington Street from Cedar Street to Carlisle Street, and Greenwich Street from Albany Street to Cedar Street.

He also presented an Ordinance for a Well and Pump in Spring Street near the junction of Orange & Spring Streets—which was passed and Jacob C. Mott, Abraham Bau- [155] douine and John Brower were appointed assessors.

The Counsel submitted for execution the following Deeds for lots of land upon the Block near Washington Market—which were directed to be duly executed: Viz.

A Deed to Leonard Kip & Henry E. Ingraham for Lots Nos. 1 & 2.

A Deed to William H. and Joseph Ireland for Lot No. 6.

A Deed to Joseph Newton for Lot No. 16.

He also presented a Communication, stating that the Report of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment on Harman, Grand & Carmine Streets and on Avenue 'D' have been confirmed by the Supreme Court and he recommended that Collectors be appointed to collect the assessments in such of the cases as it is intended shall be carried into effect on the 1<sup>st</sup> of May—Which Report was ordered to be filed. It was afterwards ordered that the subject of Harman, Grand and Carmine Streets be referred to the Street Committee and that of Avenue 'D' to the Road Committee.

[156] He also presented the draught of a Memorial and Remonstrance to the Legislature upon the subject of regulating Streets which he had prepared in conjunction with the Street Commissioner agreeably to the order of the Board—which was directed to be referred to the Committee on Applications to the Legislature to insert in said Memorial the further steps which the Common Council had taken in relation to the regulation of the Streets and Roads by causing a model in wood to be constructed giving the heights, levels and courses of the Streets as contemplated to be improved. The same Committee were authorized to cause the said Memorial to be authenticated during the recess of the Board and to be transmitted to the Legislature.

The Committee on Public Lands & Places and the Committee on Applications to the Legislature, to whom jointly were referred the First Resolution of the Report of the last mentioned Committee made on the 28<sup>th</sup> of December last and the amendment proposed thereto by Mr. Parker and also the Memorial of the Owners and Representatives

of owners of Lands lying in the Military [157] Square complaining of the neglect of the Corporation in not complying with the views of the Legislature and praying them to purchase the same or, if more desirable, to concur in an Application to the Legislature for permission to abandon the same, Report

“That their attention has been frequently engaged in examining the subjects referred to them and that they find both highly deserving nay requiring the immediate attention of the Corporation. The injury done to the Battery by the storm in December last has been so extensive and has so effectually ruined the whole front line as to render the erection of an entire new Bulkhead indispensable; and as enlarging the area of the Battery at the same time will contribute essentially not only to the improvement of the City but promote the convenience and comfort of the citizens to a degree infinitely beyond the expence, your Committee cannot but approve of the Report and plan in relation to this subject presented by the Battery Committee and adopted by the Board.

“With respect to the Military Square your Committee, notwithstanding they acknowledge the justness of the claim of the Memorialists and feel in a measure the hardships represented, still [158] they think the propriety of the views of the Corporation in not having relieved them before are animadverted on with rather too much asperity. The necessity of extinguishing as soon as possible the rights of individuals in the places and squares laid down by the Commissioners appointed by the Act of 1807 has more or less occupied the attention of the Corporation since the filing on record their Map, and though no particular scheme of finance to effect the object has been proposed still great solicitude to relieve the Memorialists and those similarly situated has always been expressed by every member of the Board.

Had the funds of the Corporation been adequate no complaint would have been heard and the powers contained in said Act would have been executed within the period contemplated perhaps by the Legislature. But now, however, your Committee think this subject ought to be attended to, and as the claims for relief by the proprietors of the Military Square are so just and so earnestly made they would suggest the policy of an immediate endeavour to satisfy them.

Notwithstanding a considerable reduction [159] has been authorized by the Legislature of this parade still your Committee are persuaded a further curtailment may be made without prejudicing in the least the convenience of this spot for military exercise. The Square

contains at present about 89 Acres and if reduced on the plan proposed by one of the subjoined Resolutions to somewhat about 57 acres, it will yet answer every purpose contemplated by the Commissioners: and as the amount required to make the purchase will thereby be brought more within the reach of the ability of the Corporation, your Committee beg leave to recommend the measure.

“The sum to effect these important objects must necessarily be very considerable as *as* our taxes are perhaps already sufficiently burthensome, your Committee have concluded it would be more advisable to raise gradually a fund for this purpose by a small additional Tax on real & personal property for a few years than to excite discontent by a levy of heavy contributions at any one time, and therefore humbly submit the following Resolutions:

I. Resolved that Application be made to the Legislature for power to lay a Tax of one third of a Mill on a Dollar on the real [160] and personal property in this City annually until the proceeds thereof shall amount to a sum adequate to pay for repairing and improving the Battery and also to purchase the Military Square.

“II. Resolved that a similar application be made for power to reduce at the discretion of the Corporation the Military Square by selling off a range of lots on each side not to exceed 200 feet deep.

“III. Resolved that a similar application be made, in case any part of the Military Square cannot be obtained by purchase, that then on Application to the Supreme Court they shall be authorized to appoint Commissioners to fix the value of the part which cannot be purchased and that so much of the law as relates to assessing the amount of monies expended by the Corporation on account of the purchase of said Square on the property benefitted thereby may be suspended.”

to the Committee from whom the Report had been received. After some discussion Mr. Schieffelin withdrew his amendment. Mr. Recorder then proposed as an Amendment that after the words 'Military Square' should be added 'and also for taking and reserving 'under the authority of this Board a proper site at Corlaer's Hook on 'the East River and another proper site at or near Fort [164] Gansevoort on the North River for public Walks.'

The Minutes of last Meeting were read & approved.

His Honor the Mayor informed the Board that he had received a polite communication from Stevens the Intendant of the City of Charleston South Carolina accompanied by two copies of the Laws & Ordinances of the City of Charleston in elegant bindings—Whereupon the following Resolution [181] was presented by Mr. Stevens and agreed to:

“Resolved that his Honor the Mayor be requested, in behalf of this Common Council, to have bound and transmitted, to the Intendant and City Council of Charleston Two Copies of the Ordinances of this Board and to assure the City Council of Charleston that this Common Council have received with great pleasure this mark of their attention and that it will ever give this Board sincere pleasure to reciprocate with them acts of individual kindness and unite in measures interesting to the welfare of their respective Cities.”

The Mayor also laid before the Board the following presentment of the Grand Jury, which was directed to be filed and entered on the Minutes

The Grand Jury for the body of the City and County of New York, being about to close their labors, feel it a duty incumbent on them to manifest their approbation of the course of conduct which has been pursued by the Chief Magistrate of this City in restricting as far as practicable the granting of licences to retail spirituous liquors to that description of persons whose principal business is that of selling drams.

[182] “Upon a careful review of the cases which have come under our cognizance during the present term of the Court, we find that a great majority have arisen either in Dram Shops or from causes intit-

mately connected with them, and from a comparative statement of the difference between the business which has come before us at the present Sessions with that which has been acted upon at former periods when serving as Grand Jurors, it is evident to us that crimes have lessened. The information we have derived from the Police Magistrates that their business has decreased nearly one half is matter of congratulation to all good Citizens. This may be owing to a combination of causes. The vigilance of our Police almost insures certain detection of crime. The prompt and due administration of justice, by which offenders are brought to speedy and condign punishment and the certainty of that punishment being inflicted without favor or prejudice claim to be the prominent causes why crimes have decreased. The introduction of Sunday Schools throughout the various parts of our [183] City has had a very salutary effect upon the minds and morals of the poorer classes of society, and it may fairly be inferred that the suppression of Five hundred Dram Shops in one year is another cause to which the reduction of crime may be attributed and that it requires still further and greater exertions, not only on the part of the Chief Magistrate but of all good Citizens to lend him their aid in limiting and suppressing their number. We therefore find it our duty to declare on oath that we consider them public Nuisances and pledge ourselves as Citizens to use our influence and exertions in support of any suitable plan or system that shall have for its object their further reduction."

Whereupon the same was directed to be filed and entered on the Minutes.

[184] A petition was received from George Robertson, stating that he is owner of a Lot of ground situated on the West side of East Bank Street in the village of Greenwich: that the same has been taken for 13<sup>th</sup> Street: that he has received no compensation therefor, and praying relief from the Board. Whereupon the same was referred to the Street Committee.

A petition from sundry Inhabitants of the 1<sup>st</sup> Ward remonstrating against the charge of 20 cents per day on all River Sloops and Market

Boats which shall be laid up during the winter Season in any of the public Docks or Slips particularly as it relates to the public Slip or Basin generally called Lent's Basin—which having been read was referred to the Finance Committee.

A petition of Helen Taylor, the Widow of Taylor a fireman who lost his life at a fire, and to whom an annuity was allowed by the Common Council, praying Two years advance of the said pension, was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

[185] A petition of Joseph Sanford, praying relief from a fine imposed on him for sifting lime in the Street—was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Sixth Ward and the Attorney.

A petition from Sundry Owners & Inhabitants of Beekman Street praying that in the proposed improvement of said Street a line may be struck on the Northeast side of said Street from Abraham Hallett's house to the Southwest side of Ann Byvannick's property on South Street and to run a line parallel thereto from Pearl Street to the East River.

A remonstrance against the above proposed improvement being made was presented from a considerable number of owners and Inhabitants in Beekman Street, and the petition and Remonstrance were referred to the Committee on Streets and the Alderman and Assistant of the ward.

A petition of John Taylor for remission of fine incurred by leaving his grate in the Street uncovered was read and leave given to petitioner to withdraw his petition.

[186] A petition of John Norman for Stall No. 39 Fly Market, one from Henry Lyons for Stall No. 41 Washington Market, one from Benjamin Davis and Solomon Dean for permission to exchange Stalls No. 10 Washington Market and No. 43 Catharine Market with each other, and one from Amos Wood for a Stall in Grand Street Market at Corlaer's Hook were severally read and referred to the Market Committee.

A petition of Henry W. George for appointment as Keeper of Potters' field was read & referred to the Committee on Applications.

A petition of Holly Waterbury praying for the appointment of Superintendant or Keeper of the Mud Machine now vacant by the death of Mr. Porsiana, was read & referred to the Committee on Wharves.

A petition from William Hunter, William Vail and Thomas Morrell, lessees of Grand Street Ferry, praying to be permitted to transfer



the lease of said ferry to David Dunham, was referred to the Finance Committee.

[187] A petition of John Armstrong for appointment of Weigher of Hay, stating that he had rented the house now occupied by Stephen Huestis to which is attached a pair of Hay Scales, and a remonstrance from Stephen Huestis against granting the same, were read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the 9<sup>th</sup> Ward to report a statement of facts.

A Communication was received from N. & H. Weed, stating that they were purchasers of a lot of ground at the Albany Basin at the late Corporation Sales: that the note given by them for the 3<sup>d</sup> payment fell due on the 11<sup>th</sup> instant and they called upon the Treasurer to pay the same but the note could not be found; that they are ready to pay the same and therefore do not expect to pay interest on the note. Whereupon the same was referred to the Finance Committee to report.

A Remonstrance from sundry owners of ground in the Military Square stating objections to the Resolution of the Common Council lately passed for taking the same was read and laid for consideration.

[188] A petition for a Well and Pump corner of Broome and Essex Streets was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Ward and Street Commissioner to report an Ordinance therefor.

A petition of T. Seely praying further time for complying with an Ordinance in relation to a privy was read and referred to the City Inspector with authority to grant the prayer of petitioner.

A petition from sundry Inhabitants praying that Lispenard Street may be opened to Broadway was read and referred to the Street Committee.

The Street Commissioner presented an Ordinance for regulating and paving Dey Street from the Easterly side of Greenwich Street to the Westerly side of West Street and also so much of Greenwich Street as may be necessary to make it conform to the regulation of Dey Street—also an Ordinance for regulating and paving Washington Street between Dey and Fulton Streets—which [189] were passed and Jacob C. Mott, Abraham Baudouine and John Brower were appointed Assessors in each.

The Chief Engineer presented a Communication stating that in different parts of the City Hydrants have been erected by individuals at their own expence, and as they are sometimes out of repair he recommended that they be repaired at the public expence: which was read and referred to the Committee on the Fire Department.



The Counsel presented for execution a Lease of Two Lots of ground at Yorkton on Long Island to Thomas Morrell drawn in pursuance of an order of the Board—which was directed to be duly executed.

The Counsel also, agreeably to the orders of the Board, presented a Memorial to the Legislature and a Bill corresponding therewith, which Bill was entitled 'An Act to provide for the expence of extending the Battery and purchasing the parade in the City of New York'—which having been considered, amended and the [190] blanks therein filled, was agreed to and directed to be duly authenticated by the Signature of the Mayor and the Seal of the Corporation and transmitted to the Legislature now in Session at Albany.

[192] The City Inspector presented a Communication on the subject of Acker's Scale for the measurement of Firewood—which was directed to be referred to the Committee on Arts and Sciences.

The following persons were appointed Firemen, the Chief Engineer certifying the vacancies:

The Finance Committee on the application of James Lowerre, reported

“That in consequence of the quantity of earth deposited in said Slip by the wash of the Drain through Canal Street it is rendered entirely useless for the accommodation of vessels, and since the construction of the Basin at the foot of Spring Street every purpose of accommodation is answered. The Committee are of opinion, therefore, that the said Slip may be rented [193] for the purposes contemplated by Mr. Lowerre without any detriment to the public or loss of revenue on the part of the Contractors for the public docks and Slips; but, as it will eventually be necessary to fill in this Basin, the Committee have thought it advisable to reserve to the Corporation the right of placing a Bulkhead at their discretion in the opening of said Slip for the purpose of preventing the earth from escaping to the Channel of the River, by which so much will be gained in the filling of said Basin and at the same time the shoaling of the water in the Channel be prevented. They therefore recommend the following Resolution:

“Resolved that the Comptroller be instructed to rent to James Lowerre for Two years from the first day of May next, and until the Corporation shall require the use thereof at the annual rent of 500 dollars, the Slip or Basin at the foot of Canal Street, reserving to the

Corporation the right, at their discretion, of placing a Bulkhead in the opening of said Slip not to exceed Two feet above low water mark, and also reserving as aforesaid the use of the outer part of the [194] Wharf around the whole extent of said Slip or Basin: And that in renting the public docks & Slips the said Slip or basin, except so much of the outer part thereof reserved by the Corporation, be excluded Provided the said James Lowerre shall, on or before the 18<sup>th</sup> instant, accede to the terms hereby offered."

The same Committee, on the petition of John Randel Jr. Reported :

"That they have examined the parts of the Map alluded to in the papers referred to them, and in the opinion of your Committee the work thus far completed reflects much credit on Mr. Randel as an artist and correct delineator and deserves the commendation of the Board. The Committee have also read the Contract entered into by Mr. Randel, stipulating that the monies to be paid by the Corporation [195] shall be advanced from time to time as the work is completed and delivered in whole or in part. The amount applied for, therefore, was due on the delivery of the 9 sheets to the Street Commissioner, and the Committee will recommend a Warrant accordingly.

"The Committee beg leave to state farther that they have had a conference with Mr. Randel on the subject of an extension of time and other matters connected with the due execution of the contemplated Map. The Sheets finished and deposited in the Street Commissioner's Office are made from actual surveys taken in the field by Mr. Randel, and the fences designating the bounds of real estate are laid down by measuring from each bend or angle to a transit line run in its vicinity for that purpose.

By this method of measuring the division line of each man's property will be correctly designated as in actual possession, when by the ordinary mode with chain & Compass the lines will vary in proportion to the distance and variation of the needle owing to the attractive quality of the substances contained in the Rocks & other bodies within its range. [196] The additional labor bestowed by Mr. Randel on the work already completed & delivered he considers as gratuitous on his part, intending it as a specimen of correct delineation,

his contract only binding him to complete the work in the usual manner, and he therefore intends, unless a small compensation is allowed him, to complete the remaining sheets from Surveys in his possession made with a chain and Compass, except that part which falls in the avenues which he considers himself bound to delineate correctly.

"Your Committee are fully aware of the necessity which exists, under present circumstances, to use every economy in the expenditure of the public money; but as this is a work of considerable magnitude and importance, one which is to become a public record for posterity and which will not only be an ornamental document but of great public utility in correctly designating the present face of the country and the exact bounds & landmarks of public & private property, they cannot help expressing their hope that the [197] Board will not, after appropriating so large a sum to this object, refuse the additional amount required to make the Map a finished and complete production.

"The length of the Boundary fences, including public roads which it will be proper to transit, is computed at 155 miles, which, at 5 dollars per mile, will amount to 775 dollars, the sum for which Mr. Randel is willing to run the lines as above stated and which the Committee conceive to be a moderate compensation for the labor he will have to bestow on the subject.

"The Committee beg leave to state further that should the Board agree to authorise Mr. Randel to proceed with the Maps on the plan suggested it will be necessary to grant him an extension of time to the 1<sup>st</sup> of May 1820. In the meantime he will proceed with the work as expeditiously as possible and deliver the sheets, as they are finished, to the Street Commissioner. That the Board may have the matters contained in the foregoing Report fairly before them, the Committee offer the following Resolutions:

"Resolved that the Comptroller be [198] instructed to report a Warrant in favor of John Randel Jr. for 300 dollars, being in part for Mapping &c. as per his Contract dated February 1818.

"Resolved that John Randel Jr. be allowed 5 dollars, in addition to his present contract, for each mile of fence designating the boundary of real estate and for each mile of public road, which he shall lay down by measuring from every bend or angle in the same to a transit line run in its vicinity for that purpose—provided that the whole amount to be paid for the above services shall not exceed the sum of 775 dollars.

"Resolved that the time allowed Mr. Randel by his Contract for completing certain Maps of Manhattan Island be extended to the 1<sup>st</sup>

day of May 1820—provided that on or before the 1<sup>st</sup> day of June next he commence his operations at the line designated on the Commissioner's Map extending along North Street and Greenwich Lane.

"Resolved that the Counsel be instructed to prepare an additional Con- [199] tract with Mr. Randel embracing the provisions contained in the 2<sup>d</sup> and 3<sup>d</sup> Resolutions herewith presented."

A motion was made to postpone the [202] consideration which was agreed to—but was afterwards reconsidered and thereupon the report of the Committee, the Letter of Colonel Rutgers and the Resolution were referred to the Street Committee with a request to report at the next meeting of the Board.

The same Committee, on the petition of Edward & William Hitchcock Contractors of Street Manure for remission of certain fines, presented a report, which was read and laid for consideration.

Alderman Taylor moved that the report of the Committee on the petition of certain Hatters and Dyers be called up. The question being taken thereon it passed in the Negative. It was afterwards moved that the Board reconsider the vote—which was agreed to. It was then moved that the said report be now considered. The question being taken thereon it was carried in the Affirmative. The report was then read and was in the words following:



"They have examined and find [203] that section prevents them from throwing any filthy or discoloured water into any one of the Streets in the City within 200 feet of any one of the Public Pumps and on the side of the Street on which said Pump is situated shall forfeit and pay for every such offence the sum of Twenty five dollars. They farther state that they have taken the subject under consideration and are of opinion that a repeal of that section would be beneficial to that class of our citizens. They therefore offer the following Resolution:

"Resolved that the last section of a law passed September 14<sup>th</sup> 1818 respecting the public pumps and to prevent the drying of cloth in the streets be and is hereby repealed."

His Honor the Mayor stated that having received information that Major General Jackson would arrive in this City on Saturday and as he understood it was the wish of the Common Council to render to him certain marks of distinction on his visit to this place, he had on the advice of some of the members called this Special Meeting to take said subject into consideration.

[208] Whereupon the Recorder presented certain Resolutions which after some discussion were agreed to in the words following:—

"Whereas the Common Council of the City of New York entertain a deep and grateful sense of the public services of Major General Andrew Jackson, as a testimony of which and wishing to transmit to posterity the respect they bear for his military achievements the splendour of which have been surpassed only by the great and lasting benefits they have secured to the United States:

Therefore the Common Council, acting in behalf of the Citizens of New York, do Resolve:

"Firstly—That the freedom of the City in a gold box with a suitable inscription be presented to Major General Andrew Jackson at a Common Council to be specially convened for that purpose, and that an appropriate address be made to him by his Honor the Mayor in behalf of the Corporation

"Secondly That he be respectfully requested to permit a full length portrait [209] painting of him to be taken under the direction of the Corporation to be placed in the Gallery of Paintings in the City Hall.

"Thirdly—That Mr. Recorder, Alderman Munson, Mr. Stevens, Mr. Allen and Mr. Bolton be a Committee to wait upon General Jackson upon his Arrival in this City and communicate to him in behalf of the Corporation the high satisfaction it will afford them to receive him in their Council Chamber and the manner in which they are desirous of giving a public demonstration of the very distinguished interest they take in his character and his fame.

"Resolved that the Committee appointed to receive General Jackson in behalf of this Board be instructed to offer to him and his Suite a conveyance up the Hudson River to Westpoint and back to this City in a Steam Boat under the direction of the Corporation.

"Resolved that the Committee invite General Jackson and suite to be with the Corporation on Monday, when his Honor the Mayor presents the Standard to the Governor's Guard.

"Resolved that the said Committee be directed to carry into effect the preceding Resolutions.

[210] His Honor the Mayor was requested to procure the Gold Box mentioned in the Resolution and the following were appointed the Committee to carry the other Resolutions into effect—viz—Mr. Recorder Alderman Munson Messrs. Stevens Allen Bolton

On motion of Alderman Mesier it was resolved that the words 'and Battery' in the Memorial agreed at the last meeting to be presented to the Legislature be stricken therefrom, and the Memorial so amended was directed to be transmitted to the Legislature forthwith.

The Minutes of last meeting were read & approved

Mr. Recorder, from the Committee of Arrangements, reported that agreeably to the directions of the Common Council, they had waited upon Major General Jackson and had presented to him the Resolutions passed at the last meeting of the Board, that they had received a reply from General Jackson, which [212] he read to the Board and which was as follows:

R. Riker Esqr.

Chairman of the Committee

Sir:

“The Resolutions of the Common Council of the City of New York with which you have this day presented me have been read with that satisfaction which the generosity and hospitality of your honorable body is calculated to inspire.

“It affords me singular gratification to be enabled to comply with the several requests contained in your Communication, and I accept with pleasure your polite invitation to witness the ceremony of presenting the Standard to the Governor’s Guard.

“Having but a few days to remain in this section of Country I am compelled to deny myself the pleasure I had anticipated in visiting West Point and therefore decline the acceptance of the transportation which has been so liberally offered for my conveyance to that place.

“For the honor conferred on me [213] by your distinguished body

permit me to present through you to the Common Council of the City of New York the assurance of my high respect and gratitude."

Whereupon it was Ordered that the same be entered on the Minutes at length and filed.

It was also resolved that the Board will assemble tomorrow at One o'clock in the Sessions Room for the purpose of conferring upon Major General Andrew Jackson the freedom of the City agreeably to the Resolutions of the Common Council.

Mr. Allen, from the Committee of Finance, on the representation of Messrs. Weed informed verbally that the Notes alluded to in Messrs. Weed's Communication at the last meeting of the Board had been found and were paid.

[214] A petition of Abraham Sears for appointment as Measurer of Grain was read and referred to the Committee on Applications.

A petition of Peter Kennison was received stating that he is Lessee of Lot No. 153 Chatham Street: that a part of said lot is taken for opening Harman Street: that the Commissioners of Estimate in assessing the loss sustained by the improvement deducted therefrom the value of the buildings thereon: that unless he is permitted to remove the same they will be of no value to him and praying to be permitted to remove the Buildings to another lot, was read & referred to the Street Committee.

A petition of Magdalena Russell, praying on account of her indigent circumstances that she may be exempted from paying an Assessment laid on No. 56 James Street for repairing the Drain in said Street was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

[215] The Alderman and Assistant of the Ninth Ward, on the petition of John Armstrong and Remonstrance of Stephen Huestis, Reported:

"That said Huestis is now a Weigher of Hay and lately performed the duties at the Scales now occupied by said Armstrong, who is desirous of receiving the appointment of Weigher. Huestis is building a Scale, and the one he left is in the occupation of said Armstrong. If he does not receive the appointment the building will be entirely useless and as it is the wish of a considerable number of the Inhabitants of Harlaem that the appointment should be granted your Com-

mittee recommend that John Armstrong receive the appointment of Public Weigher of Hay and offer the following Resolution:

“Resolved that John Armstrong be appointed Weigher of Hay.”

Which was approved and he was appointed a Weigher of Hay.

The Finance Committee, on the petition of Robert H. Bowne, presented the following Report which was approved & the Resolutions adopted [216] That in pursuance of the instructions given them they have attempted to treat with said Bowne and accordingly addressed him by note, offering to report in favor of a Settlement of his quit rent upon the same principle and terms complied with by Dr. Samuel L. Mitchill and John Agnew in a similar case, at the same time enclosing a statement shewing the amount paid by those gentlemen and also what amount was due the Corporation from said Bowne. In answer your Committee have received a note from Mr. Bowne denying that the case of Mitchill and Agnews was similar to that of his, and averring that had a grant been given for the property at the period when the occupation of the water took place, the rent would not have been half the price now asked, and in conclusion offering to pay 500 dollars instead of 1071 dollars the sum demanded by the Committee or to refer the subject to the decision of referees.

“Your Committee are opposed to the reference of a subject which appears to them so plain, particularly as they [217] have evinced no disposition to take advantage of circumstances or to require of Mr. Bowne any thing but what they believe to be perfectly reasonable and just; and they therefore adopted as a basis for the settlement of the quit rent due the Corporation the terms complied with by Messrs. Mitchill and Agnew: and although Mr. Bowne has denied the similarity of the cases they are unable to conceive how cases more similar could be selected, for the property is adjacent to each other, there being but one lot, that of Sylvanus Miller, and the Street between the property of Mitchill and Agnew and Robert H. Bowne.

“Mitchill and Agnew, by permission of the Corporation, built in the year 1804 a Dock in front of their property and enjoyed all the emoluments of a grant by the use of the water. Samuel Franklin, by permission of the Corporation, built in the year 1803 a dock in front of his property and enjoyed the same privilege. Mitchill and Agnew paid the amount of quit rent due from the time of building their Dock up to the 1<sup>st</sup> of May 1818 at the rate of one dollar per foot with interest, and the same [218] terms are offered to Robert

H. Bowne by your Committee. The only difference in the cases is that Samuel Franklin built his Dock one year previous to Mitchill and Agnew and that it lies a few hundred feet farther east, and, as the Committee believe, has been much more productive to the owners, in some measure owing to their having the use of part of the water crossing the foot of Roosevelt Street in addition to that in front of their property. Neither do the Committee agree with Mr. Bowne that the quit rent would have been 50 per cent less had a grant been given at the period of the building of the dock, as from the books in the office of the Comptroller it appears that a grant was given George Codwise in July 1803 for property between Burling & Beekman Slips, for which he pays rising one dollar & 20 cents per foot, and in 1804 Thomas Bulkley and David Lydig obtained grants for their property extending up as high as Dover Street and about 65½ feet on South Street, for which they pay 70 dollars per annum, more than One dollar per foot.

[219] These are the latest grants in that section of the City, except those taken out during the last year, and were no doubt the data on which Mitchell & Agnew's rent was founded, and in the opinion of your Committee ought not to be departed from in a settlement with Mr. Bowne. They therefore propose the following Resolution:

"Resolved that the Comptroller be authorised to settle with Robert H. Bowne for the arrears of quit rent due the Corporation on his property at the foot of Roosevelt Street on the same principle and terms as those complied with by Dr. Mitchell and John Agnew."

Alderman King then presented the following:

The question being taken thereon and the [220] Ayes and Nays having been called by Alderman Buckmaster, it passed in the Negative, all the members present voting in the negative excepting Alderman King and Mr. Anthony who voted in the Affirmative.

The same Committee, on the petition of Messrs. Hunter, Vail and Morrill on the subject of Grand Street Ferry, presented a Report which was laid for consideration.



The same Committee, on the petition of Helen Taylor, Reported :

" That in 1813 the report of a Committee was adopted recommending a yearly donation to Helen Taylor in consequence of the death of her husband while assisting in extinguishing the fire on some of the buildings of this City: That the said Helen was presented with a donation of 60 dollars in addition to the yearly allowance and has ever since received the said allowance in advance, the total amount of which (it being 6 years since the Report was adopted) is 420 dollars. The Committee have no wish to call in question the pro- [221] priety of the measures of their predecessors, but as the allowance was only to continue during the pleasure of the Corporation and one of the principal reasons urged in favor of the aforesaid yearly donation is removed by the arrival of the children of the said Helen to an Age which fits them for earning their own sustenance, the Committee are of opinion that the yearly allowance to the said Helen ought to be discontinued: They nevertheless are disposed under the circumstances of the case to recommend a compliance with the wishes of Mrs. Taylor to be put in possession of the sum of 120 dollars for the purposes stated in her petition, but that henceforth her claim to the yearly allowance of 60 dollars ought to cease. They therefore recommend the following Resolutions:

" Resolved that the Comptroller be instructed to report a warrant in favor of Helen Taylor for One hundred and twenty dollars.

" Resolved that the yearly donation of Sixty dollars to Helen Taylor heretofore allowed by the Corporation be and the same is hereby discontinued."

The Board assembled in the Sessions' Court Room, agreeably to the Resolution of yesterday. The reading of the Minutes of last meeting was dispensed with.

Upon motion, the Resolution of the Board agreed to at the Special Meeting on the 19<sup>th</sup> inst. & the reply of General Jackson thereto, which was reported on the 22<sup>d</sup>, were severally read.

[228] Mr. Stevens, from the Committee of Arrangements, informed the Common Council that they had waited upon General Jackson and accompanied him to the Hall and that he was now in waiting in the Common Council Chamber.

The Committee were then requested to wait upon the General, inform him that the Common Council were assembled prepared to receive him and introduce him to the Board.

The Committee accordingly retired and in a few minutes General Jackson entered. Upon his entrance the Common Council rose to receive him. After being seated a few moments two of the Committee led him to the centre of the space occupied by the Common Council and presented him to the Mayor, upon which his Honor the Mayor addressed him as follows:

'Address of the Mayor.'

Major General Jackson.

"No task could be more gratifying to me than that which I am now to perform. [229] I am to congratulate you, in behalf of the Common Council and of our fellow Citizens, on your arrival among us.

"We are happy to avail ourselves of the first opportunity of testi-

lying by every mark of respect the feelings your high military services have inspired.

"While the whole country was agitated by the threatened invasion of a powerful foe, we could not but learn with anxiety that he had directed a large armament to a point where it was known he could only be met by an inferior force, chiefly composed of our undisciplined and inexperienced countrymen. We knew that Britain, at the end of a contest which had convulsed Europe for Twenty years, had destined her veteran and victorious troops to make war upon us: but the sons of our soil, animated by your spirit and conducted by your wisdom, drove the invaders from our shores and achieved a victory, which, while it raised the character of our country to an elevation that attracted the admiration of the rest of the world, left to every American a debt of gratitude to you, and to our brave brethren who fought with you, which can never [230] be cancelled.

"With these sentiments allow me to present to you this certificate of your being admitted a freeman of this City, and to thank you for your compliance with the Resolution of the Common Council requesting your portrait.

"Permit me also to assure you that we shall feel great pride in being able to claim you as our fellow citizen, and in placing the portrait of one who has deserved so well of his country in our Gallery occupied by the resemblances of many who have similar, tho' no one superior, claims to our grateful acknowledgment."

To which General Jackson made the following reply:

Sir

The distinguished honor which the Common Council of the City of New York has conferred by my admission as a freeman of their City is to me a source of the highest gratification and will ever be recollected with feelings of the warmest sensibility. To be associated with those who have been [231] distinguished for their patriotism and zealous attachment to the republican principles of our government is the most exalted station of an American citizen. The approbation you have been pleased to express of my humble efforts in the field command my greatest acknowledgments. For those sentiments am I indebted to the bravery of the troops I had the honor to command.

"What I have done was for my country. Had I erred in the discharge of my official duty, that error would have originated in the warmth of my devotion to her interest and a misapplication of the means best calculated to promote her happiness and prosperity: but to find that my conduct has been sanctioned by my government and

## Roll of Freeman's Oath

Taken and subscribed by Major General Andrew Jackson on the Twenty third day of February One thousand eight hundred and nineteen before the Honorable Cadwallader D. Colden Mayor of the City of New York and the Common Council of the same -

I Andrew Jackson do swear - That I as a freeman of the City of New York, will maintain the lawful franchises and customs thereof: That I will keep the said City from harm as much as in me lieth, and that I will in all things do my duty as a good and faithful freeman of the said City ought to do. -

This remarkable document, previously unpublished, was discovered by the editor among the loose papers in the custody of the city clerk. The common council saw fit to honor General Jackson for his military achievements with the freedom of the City. After the Freeman's Oath had been administered by Mayor Colden, the General appended his signature to this document and it was placed on file (see vol. X, pp. 263-5). approved by my fellow citizens is a source of happiness unequalled in the occurrences of my life, for the proudest honor which can grace the soldier and the richest reward which he can receive for the fatigues, perils & privations of his profession is the approbation of a grateful country."

The general was then handed by two of the Committee and seated on the right of the Mayor. His Honor then administered to him the Oath [232] of a Freeman as prescribed by Law and delivered to him the Certificate of his being a freeman. His Honor the Mayor then arose and announced General Jackson to have been admitted a freeman of the City of New York agreeably to the Charter and Laws of the same.

The General was then introduced by the Committee of Arrangements to the several members of the Common Council, after which he retired accompanied by the Committee of Arrangements.

The Comptroller also Reported:

“That agreeably to the 4<sup>th</sup> Section of “an Act to amend an Act entitled ‘an act relative to the Court of probates, the Office of Surrogate and the granting of administrations’” passed April 11, 1815 the

public Administrator 'shall once in every year, at such time as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty may appoint for that purpose, exhibit to them in Common Council convened a statement of his receipts and expenditures by virtue of such administrations respectively &c."

"Agreeably to the Act, the Common Council are to appoint the time when the [241] public Administrator is to exhibit a statement of his receipts and expenditures. J. Nitchie was appointed on the 22<sup>d</sup> May 1815 to this office and gave a Bond with surety in the penal sum of \$10,000. conditioned for the faithful performance of the duties of his Office agreeably to an order of the Board passed May 22<sup>d</sup> 1815.

"J. Hammond was appointed in his place June 10. 1816, but it does not appear that he has given a Bond according to the 1<sup>st</sup> Section of the Act aforesaid. In June and July 1818 Mr. Nitchie paid into the Treasury the sum of \$1287.39. There has been no payment made by Mr. Hammond since his appointment nor have any accounts been exhibited by either gentleman.

Which were directed to be duly executed.

The Special Committee, to whom was referred the petition of the makers & venders of Weights, Beams and Measures complaining of the conduct of Oliver Vanderbilt, Sealer of Weights and Measures for the County, presented a Report, which was read. A Memorial from Oliver Vanderbilt in justification of his conduct was also presented and read. The Report of the Committee was as follows:

"That they have carefully examined the subject of complaint which admits of four separate and specific charges against the Sealer—Viz.—

"1. [245] For over charging

"2<sup>d</sup> For refusing to seal

"3<sup>d</sup> For sending for Weights and Measures and taking them to his own house contrary to law.

"4. For taking small sums of money in lieu of the penalty.

"On the First charge the Committee are unable to judge correctly, as the present law allows the Sealer a reasonable compensation for his services for adjusting over the specific rates for sealing.

"On the Second Charge (for refusing to seal) it has been proved to the Committee under oath.

"On the Third charge it appears to have been the practice of the Sealer to send for the Weights and measures before he had examined them and thereby in many cases run the Citizens to an unnecessary and useless expence.

"The Fourth Charge, for compounding for small sums of money has been not only fully proved by a number of respectable witnesses but also admitted by the Sealer.

"The Committee are therefore of opinion that Oliver Vanderbilt has exercised the duties [246] of his Office in a vexatious and improper manner, and beg leave to offer the following Resolutions:—

"Resolved that Oliver Vanderbilt be, and he is hereby removed from the office of County Sealer."

"Resolved that it shall not be lawful for the Sealer of Weights and Measures appointed by this Board to vend any weights or measures in this City during the time he shall hold the office of Sealer nor be concerned directly or indirectly in vending those articles.

"Resolved that it shall be the duty of the Sealer to inspect and examine the Weights, Beams and Measures in use once in every year at the stores or residence of the owners and for such examination he shall be entitled to ask and receive for every fifty six twenty eight or fourteen pound weight two cents, and for every weight of a smaller denomination than fourteen pounds One cent; for every liquid measure One cent; for every dry measure two cents, for every scale, beam or balance three cents and for every yard measure three cents—provided [247] the same shall be found correct, and all such as shall be found not conformable to the Standard shall be sent to the Store of the said Sealer at the expence of the owner in three days after being so notified in writing by the Sealer under the penalty of 20 dollars, and for which he shall be allowed the sum prescribed by the present Law with a reasonable compensation for such alterations as he may make—provided always the additional compensation shall not exceed more than the price of sealing, or unless a special Contract shall be made by the parties agreeing to such further charges for extra services.

"Resolved that it may be lawful for the Sealer to examine the Weights, Beams and measures used in this City, as much oftener in



the year as he may think proper, but without a charge for the same if correct except once in every year.

"Resolved that the Ordinance in relation to Weights and measures be so altered and amended that the same may be conformable to the above resolutions, and that the Counsel be instructed to report an ordinance accordingly at the next meeting of the Board."

The question being taken on each Resolution separately they were severally carried in the Affirmative.

It was then resolved that the Committee on Applications be instructed to report at the next meeting of the Board on the subject of appointing a person to fill the Office of Sealer of Weights and Measures for the City.

The Finance Committee, to whom had been referred a Communication from the Police Magistrates, presented a Report, which having been amended was as follows:

"They have good reason to believe from the information furnished by the Police Magistrates that their fee emoluments are materially reduced, owing [249] in part to much of their former business being directed to other channels, and breaches of the peace, together with other crimes diminishing to a degree before unknown.

"Your Committee consider the police of this great and populous City as a very important feature in its government and the duties required of its Magistrates are arduous and demand their unremitting and persevering exertions. It is a matter of public notoriety that for some time past crimes have decreased in this City, and your Committee have no hesitation in saying that, in their opinion, this state of things is in a great measure brought about by the prompt and energetic manner in which the business of the Police is executed in conjunction with the measures adopted by the Chief Magistrate of this City, and that this faithful administration of duty necessarily diminishes the amount of income to the Justices.

"The present Salary of the Police Justices is 750 dollars per annum, and your Committee have deemed it their duty to recommend an



addition of 250 dollars to each of them and offer the following resolution [250] accordingly:

“Resolved that the Salary of the Police Justices be increased to One thousand dollars per annum, to commence on the 26<sup>th</sup> day of February last.”

The question being taken on agreeing to the Report and Resolutions of the Committee, the same was carried in the Affirmative.

The Committee on Applications to the Legislature, to whom was referred the Resolution requesting them to enquire and report whether any and what amendments are necessary to the Law relative to the recovery of debts to the value of Fifty dollars and under, reported:

“That they have had the subject under consideration and are of opinion that the present organization of the Assistant Justices’ Courts in this City are productive of numerous abuses, and that in some cases, suits are permitted without [251] reasonable cause, litigation encouraged and justice imperfectly administered. The Committee have not sought for a particular detail of facts on this subject, but are persuaded from the opinion of those they have consulted, together with their own observation, that the present system is injurious to the property, morals and convenience of our Citizens and requires a radical change. The Committee believe that the evils complained of are in a great measure produced by the circumstance of the Justices depending on the costs of suit for their emolument instead of a regular & stated Salary, and there being more Courts than are necessary for the due administration of justice and less business than will afford a competency to the judges, a rivalry is created for sinister purposes destructive to an independent and impartial discharge of duty. The Committee therefore recommend the following outlines of a law, to be presented to the Legislature for their concurrence, which in their opinion will at least remove some of the most prominent objections to the present system

“That the Nine lower wards be divided into Four Judicial Districts, in each [252] of which a Court shall be held for the trial of causes to the amount of 50 dollars and under.

“That the First, Second and Third Wards shall compose the First district: That the Fourth and Sixth Wards shall compose the Second district: That the Fifth and Eighth Wards shall compose the Third

district; and That the Seventh and Tenth Wards shall compose the Fourth district.

"That there be Four persons appointed and commissioned by the Council of Appointment to hold such Courts and that one of such persons be from time to time assigned to each respective Court by the Common Council.

"That the Justices respectively, instead of receiving fees of Office to their own use, shall be compensated by a yearly salary to be paid out of the City Treasury, and that the fees allowed by law shall be granted to the Corporation and received according to their direction.

"That the Common Council shall appoint a suitable person as Clerk to each [253] of the said Courts, who shall give such sureties as may be required for the faithful performance of his trust, and shall collect and receive all costs of suit and make monthly returns of the same to the Comptroller verified on oath before the Mayor and pay the amount thereof to the Chamberlain of this City; and that each of said Clerks shall receive a salary to be regulated by the Common Council.

"That the salary to be allowed the Justices shall include the expence for stationary, fuel &c. but not of Office hire, which shall be located and provided at the expence of the Corporation.

"That the Ninth Ward shall remain, with respect to the Assistant Justices of that Ward, the same that it now is.

"Resolved that the Counsel be instructed to prepare the draught of a Memorial & Bill conformable to the foregoing sketch & report the same at the next meeting of the Board."

for the purpose of leasing the public Slips, which was lost. Mr. Kip presented the following Resolution:

"Resolved that the Comptroller advertise for Contracts for the Slips and Wharves for one year with a stipulation on the part of the Corporation that, unless the Contractors are put in possession of the Basin at the foot of Roosevelt Street by the first day of August next, a reasonable allowance shall be deducted from the Contract."

The Resolution being divided, the question was taken on the first part & agreed to.

The question being taken on the latter part, it was also carried in the affirmative.

The Report of the Finance Committee on the petition of Messrs. Hunter, Vail and Morrel, for permission to assign the lease of Grand

Street Ferry, which was presented on the 22<sup>d</sup> of February last and laid for consideration, was now called up and being read was as [270] follows:

"The petitioners hold a lease of said Ferry for 21 years from the 1<sup>st</sup> day of May 1814, and David Dunham and Associates hold a lease for the ferry at the foot of Delancey Street to Williamsburg for 21 years from the first day of May 1813. The object in establishing the ferry at the foot of Grand Street was communicated to the Board at the time by the Committee on that subject, who not only examined the claims set up by the parties but also the utility of said establishment in a public point of view and a decided preference was given to that from the foot of Grand Street. The Committee are of opinion that the present population of that part of the City is not sufficient to support the two ferries in competition with each other and as they are informed and believe that the transfer is to be made on such terms as will bind Mr. Dunham to continue the present establishment at both ferries, whereby the people most interested will receive all the accommodation required and no injury can be sus- [271] tained by the Corporation or the public. The Committee cannot perceive any objection to granting the prayer of the petition and therefore recommend the following Resolution:

"Resolved that W. Hunter, W. Vail and T. Morrill be permitted to make a transfer of their lease for the Ferry from Grand Street to Morrill's point to David Dunham.

The Street Committee, on the subject of improving Harman Street, reported:

"That they have communicated with Colonel Rutgers and those of the family who are owners of lots on said Street on the subject referred, that they all agree to the propositions made by Colonel Rutgers except the Executors to the estate of Mrs. McRea who state that they are so circumstanced that they cannot enter into any arrangement whatever. The proposition of Colonel Rutgers is that he will assume the assessment of all the lots on the North side of Harman Street which have not more than [272] 15 years unexpired, the lessees to agree to pay the interest on their respective assessments in addition to

their present rents provided the improvement go into effect immediately after the 1<sup>st</sup> of May next.

"The Committee have given to the propositions a deliberate consideration and are of opinion that it would be partial & unjust to agree to the same, inasmuch as the assurances said to be given in the report on which the improvement was predicated was general as it related to all the lessees without any limitation, and your Committee can see no good reason why the lessees not included in Colonel Rutgers' proposition should not have the same relief as those thereby provided for. They do therefore recommend the adoption of the two first Resolutions heretofore reported by them which are as follows:

"Resolved that the widening and improving of Harman Street be delayed for the term of 15 months from and after the confirmation of the Report of the Commissioners—provided the owners in fee of the lots held by lessees shall not have assumed the pay- [273] ment of the Assessments on said lots on or before the first day of April next.

"Resolved that if the said owners in fee shall assume the payment of said Assessment on or before the 1<sup>st</sup> day of April next then the widening and improving of Harman Street shall go into effect immediately after the first day of May next."

"Resolved that if Colonel Rutgers and all others of his family who are lessors of grounds assessed for widening Harman Street, as set forth in the Report of the Committee on that subject, shall refuse or neglect to enter into a written engagement to comply with the [274] same by the 15<sup>th</sup> day of March instant then this Board will adopt every legal measure by application to the Legislature or otherwise to prevent the same from going into effect until such engagement shall be fulfilled on the part of the proprietors."

The question being taken on agreeing to the same, it was carried in the Affirmative.

The Committee on Arts and Sciences, to whom was referred the Communication of the City Inspector on the subject of Fire Wood, presented a Report. The Communication of the City Inspector was as follows:

The City Inspector respectfully states to the Board that the graduated scale for measuring Fire wood, styled 'Ackers Scale' has been deposited in his office.

"That the Inspectors of Firewood have generally examined the Scale and are preparing others upon its plan for the use intended by the Board

"It has been remarked that the rungs of the Cartmen's Carts in which the Firewood is carried are too short and that [275] still an uncertainty will prevail by the rounding of the Wood above the rungs, which might be obviated by directing the lengthening of the rungs to six feet, and thus, the Fire wood being piled flat at the top, the Scale may be more effectually applied with the approbation of both buyer and Seller."

The Report of the Committee was as follows:

The Committee of Arts and Sciences, to whom the foregoing Communication of the City Inspector was referred, have had the same under consideration and are of opinion that the rungs of carts for carting Fire wood may be lengthened with advantage to the Community. Five feet six inches above the floor of the Cart will be sufficient to pile the shortest cordwood under the chains of the Cart and leave the top flat and easily measured by Acker's Scale. They therefore recommend the following Resolution:

"Resolved that the 'Law to regulate the Sale of Fire Wood' be so amended that all lengths of Fire Wood not less than 2 feet 9 inches be considered as Merchantable wood and be [276] allowed to be sold by measure as such, and, in order that the Inspectors may be enabled to make a Cartman's load of firewood contain 37 feet 10 inches &  $\frac{8}{12}$  and be piled between the rungs without being rounded, that the law be altered in this respect also, and that all cartmen riding fire wood be required to mark the rungs of their carts made to rise 5 feet 6 inches above the floor thereof, and that no Inspector of Firewood shall allow any load to be rounded off but piled square between the rungs

and that each load, when inspected and measured by Acker's Scale shall contain in solid contents 37 feet 10 inches and  $\frac{8}{12}$ ."

He also, agreeably to order, presented the draught of a memorial to the Legislature and a Bill corresponding therewith entitled "an Act to amend an act to reduce several laws relating particularly to the City of New York into one Act so far as it relates to Assistant Justices." which was read by paragraphs, amended and agreed to, and the same was directed to be duly authenticated and transmitted to the Legislature.

On motion of Alderman Munson—Resolved that a Watchman be

stationed at or near the foot of Grand Street and that the Watch Committee give the necessary directions for that purpose.

The Comptroller presented the proposals he had received for leasing the Docks & Slips the ensuing year. Whereupon the Gallery was cleared &

The Doors closed.

[279] The several proposals offered were opened and read, when it appeared that Herman Ruggles had offered the sum of \$42,500. which was the highest sum offered. It was Resolved that his offer be accepted and that the public Docks & Slips be leased to the said Herman Ruggles for one year from the 1<sup>st</sup> of May next, he giving good and sufficient security, to be approved by the Finance Committee for the payment of the said sum of \$42,500 in quarterly payments & performing the Covenants of the said Lease. The Clerk was directed to inform Mr. Ruggles that it was expected his Surety would be given and the Contract completed on or before Monday next the 15<sup>th</sup> instant.

The Minutes of last meeting were read & approved.

A petition [was read] from Joseph Constant for permission to construct Four Vaults in front of his Lots in White Street near Broadway—which was granted on the usual terms under direction of the Street Commissioner.

A petition from sundry Inhabitants, stating [283] that the Well and pump at the intersection of Division and Ludlow Streets was dry, and praying the same may be deepened, was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Ward and Street Commissioner.

A Remonstrance from sundry Inhabitants against the opening and extending of Lisenard Street to Broadway was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A petition of David Dunham was received, stating that he is the sole proprietor of the Williamsburg Ferry; that he is also proprietor of the Grand Street Ferry; that he has become possessed of them at great sacrifices and greatly with a view to the public benefit as the former proprietors of Grand Street Ferry found it impossible for the two ferries to exist together. He therefore prayed to be permitted to make use of the landing at York-town for his Boat now plying between Delancey Slip and Williamsburgh and that he be released from the terms of the Lease of the said Ferry and that the two ferries be for the present consolidated and requests a lease agreeably to such arrangements. Whereupon [284] the same was referred to the Ferry Committee.

A Letter was received from John Nitchie Esqr. exhibiting, in conformity with the Resolution of February last, a statement of his account as former public Administrator. A similar letter was received from Judah Hammond Esqr. the present public Administrator, with the Statement required of the estates of Intestates which had come to his hands. Whereupon the same were referred to the Finance Committee.

A petition from the Governors of the New York Hospital was received, stating that tho' the principal of the Arrears of their demand against the Corporation up to the 31<sup>st</sup> December last was paid, yet a sum amounting to \$1171.2 was due to them for interest which they requested might be paid to them. Whereupon the same was referred to the Finance Committee.

A petition of Oliver A. A Recommendation from a number of Citizens in behalf of the appointment of Abel W. Hardenbrook as a Sealer of Weights & Measures. A petition of William S. Clark for some appointment under the Board with a recommendation in his favor from his Excellency D. D. Tompkins: A petition of Samuel Littlefield for appointment of Measurer of Grain: A petition of Abraham M. Valentine for appointment

of Inspector of Lumber—were severally read and referred to the Committee on Applications.

A petition of David D. Deming, praying [286] on account of his indigent circumstances to be relieved from a personal Tax laid on him, was read and referred to the Committee on Assessments.

A petition from a number of the Inhabitants of this City to the Legislature, remonstrating against the repeal of the Act to protect the fishing in Hudson River and to prevent obstructions in the Navigation thereof passed 11<sup>th</sup> April 1815, was presented with a request that the Common Council would give their sanction to said petition; whereupon the same was referred to the Committee on Applications to the Legislature.

A petition from Alexander Black, stating that he had made great improvements in Lamps by means of heating the Oil used in them and by which means Summer strained oil is of equal use with winter oil, and requesting the patronage of the Common Council, was read and referred to the Lamp Committee.

[287] A complaint of sundry Inhabitants of Kings' County against the Inspectors of Manure, alleging that insufficient loads were inspected and passed by them, was read and referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

Mott, Abraham Baudouine and John Brower were appointed Assessors in the former and John Targee, Abraham Bloodgood and Jacob C. Mott in the latter.

The Alderman and Assistant of the 6<sup>th</sup> Ward and Street Commissioner, on the petition of Joseph Constant, Reported:

The Street Committee and Alderman and Assistant of the Second Ward, on the petition and remonstrance on subject of opening Beekman Street, Reported:

"That they have considered the [291] subject of opening this Street on the old plan and on the proposed plan. The adopted plan of improvement makes the Street so crooked as renders it impossible to see the river from the upper part of Beekman Street, and from the jogs in it it will be particularly unpleasant to the eye as you ascend this Street from the water. On the whole your Committee are of opinion that the old plan should be relinquished and the plan petitioned for adopted which plan commences at Abraham S. Hallett's house in Beekman Street and runs until it strikes the Southwest corner of Mrs. Byvank's Water Grant in South Street.

"The opening of the Street on this plan will cost the Corporation about Nine thousand dollars more than the opening of the Street on the old plan, and the expence to the neighbourhood will be also considerably greater. The Committee think that a permanent improvement to the City should not be adopted on a wrong plan from the consideration of such an expence to the Corporation. It will be necessary for the Corporation on the adoption of this plan also to take two additional lots for to bring their market and [292] ground up to the proposed line of this Street, and though this will also increase in another way the expence to the Corporation yet they will obtain additional ground for their market which in opinion of your Committee is required. Your Committee offer the following Resolution:

"Resolved that the Counsel of the Board prepare a law and memorial to the Legislature, requesting that the Commissioners who have been appointed by the Supreme Court for the opening of Beekman Street be directed to open the Street and assess the property on the plan proposed in the above report—and that the Commissioners for taking the ground for a site for the new market also take out, in

The Doors were closed.

A Letter was received from Herman Ruggles stating that the friends upon whom he had relied to become his Sureties in the Contract for the public docks & Slips refused to join with him in a Bond alleging that his offer had been too high and that therefore he was obliged to abandon the Contract. The Minutes of last Meeting were read & approved

A Letter was received from Robert R. Whereupon the same was referred to the Counsel to take the necessary steps [302] to defend said Suit.

great and the field of Assessment for the benefit is so limited that there will be a balance of loss and damage above any benefit to be derived from the improvement. which being read was referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Fourth Ward to report.

A petition of Abraham Bell for remission of fine for not placing a Curb or box over the opening of his grate in the Street, he having been uninformed of the law relative thereto, was read and referred to the Alderman & Assistant of the Eighth Ward to report.

A similar petition from John Taylor was read and referred to the Police Committee.

A petition of Hugh Walker for remission of fine incurred, as is represented, by his not having his Scales & Weights sealed by the City Sealer, was read and referred to the Attorney to report.

A petition of James Thompson for permission to construct a vault opposite No. 21 in Wall Street was granted under direction of the Street Commissioner

[304] A petition of Samuel E. Benson and of Robert Murden for the Appointment of Deputy Street Inspector and of J. and D. B. Van Doren for appointment of Guager were severally read & referred to the Committee of Applications.

A petition of Thomas Wymbs in behalf of a number of the Inhabitants on the South side of Harman Street, stating that they understand it is in contemplation to widen Harman Street by taking down the houses on the South side, and praying that the same may be delayed at least for one year: A petition from Robert Mc'Dermut and others praying that the contemplated improvement of widening Harman Street may be carried into execution forthwith; and a petition from a Committee of the Inhabitants of Harman Street who consider themselves aggrieved by the Assessment for opening said Street, praying the Common Council will in pursuance of their Resolution of the 8<sup>th</sup> instant take measures for vacating the order for opening said Street—were severally read and laid for consideration.

[305] A petition of Robert Sickles for appointment of Deputy Keeper to the Penitentiary was read and referred to the Alms' house Committee.

A petition of William Hendrick, stating that he has invented an improvement in the boxes and handles or brakes of pumps which he terms 'the united forcing and lifting pump' by which means great power is acquired and much larger quantities of water can be raised than by the ordinary pumps and offering the same to the use of the Corporation, was read and referred to the Committee on Arts and

Sciences with authority to use if required one of the public pumps to make the experiment.

The Counsel presented a Lease to Jacob Warner for Lot No. 265 William Street—which was directed to be duly executed

The Counsel, agreeably to the Resolution of the Board at the last meeting, reported a Memorial to the Legislature on the subject of Tavern Licences and the draught of a Bill to be enacted into a Law entitled 'An Act concerning the retailing of Spirituous Liquors in the City of New York' which Bill having been read was in the words following:

'An Act concerning the retailing of Spirituous liquors in the City of New York.'

(1.) Be it enacted by the people of the State of New York represented in Senate [309] and Assembly—That it shall not be lawful for any person residing in the City of New York, nor for any two or more persons residing in the said City and being partners in business or inhabiting or using the same house, shop, tenement, garden or place of business to keep a Tavern or carry on the business or calling of a Tavern Keeper and at the same time to be a retailer of strong or spirituous liquors in the said City under Five gallons to be drank or used out of the house, shop, tenement, garden or place where the same is sold or kept for sale.

(2.) And be it farther enacted—That if any person residing in the City of New York, or any two or more persons residing in the said City and being partners in business or inhabiting or using the same house, shop, garden, tenement or place of business, shall first obtain a licence or permission to keep a Tavern in the said City or to follow

the business of a Tavern-keeper, he, she or they shall thereby be disqualified and disenabled during the continuance of said licence or permission [310] to obtain a licence or permission from the Commissioners of the Excise or any other person or persons, body politic or corporate, to retail strong or spirituous liquors under Five gallons to be used or drunk out of his, her or their house, shop, garden or place of business, in case any such person or persons shall first obtain a licence commonly called the excise or any licence or permission to retail strong or spirituous liquors under Five gallons, to be drunk out of his, her or their house, shop, garden or place of business, he she or they shall thereby be disqualified and disenabled during the continuance of such licence or permission to keep a Tavern in the said City or to follow the business of a Tavern Keeper.

(3.) And be it farther enacted—That if any person or persons as aforesaid shall obtain a licence to keep a Tavern in the said City or to follow the business of a Tavern-keeper therein, no other person or persons being at the time or thereafter and during the continuance of said licence become a partner in business with him, [311] her or them or becoming an Inhabitant of or using the same house, shop, tenement, garden or place of business, shall be entitled to and obtain a licence commonly called the excise or a licence or permission to retail strong or spirituous liquors under Five gallons, to be drunk or used out of his, her or their house, shop, garden or place of business—and if any person shall obtain the said last mentioned licence or permission, no other person or persons being at the time or thereafter and during the continuance of such licence become a partner in business with him her or them or becoming an inhabitant of and using the same house, shop, tenement, garden or place of business shall be entitled to obtain a licence or permission to keep a Tavern or to follow the business of a Tavern-keeper.

(4.) And be it farther enacted—That if any single person or two or more persons as aforesaid shall obtain or have at the same time the two licences hereby intended to be prohibited, both of them shall be void and the person or persons so obtaining and having them shall be subject [312] to all the pains, penalties and forfeitures to which he, she or they would become liable by means of his business & transactions as tho' the same was done or transacted without any licence for that purpose.

(5.) And be it farther enacted—That no such licence shall be granted in the said City to retail strong or spirituous liquors for the



purpose of keeping an Inn or Tavern unless such person or persons so applying shall first obtain a Certificate from and signed by the Assessors of the Ward in which such applicant resides certifying that such person or persons are of good moral character and that in their opinion it is proper and necessary that such licence should be granted.

(6.) And be it farther enacted—That the person who now is or hereafter may be appointed Commissioner of Excise in the City of New York shall, before he proceed to execute the duties of his Office, take and subscribe the following oath before the Mayor or Recorder of the said City—To wit.

I Commissioner of Excise do solemnly swear that I will [313] in all things while acting as Commissioner of Excise do my duty according to the best of my judgment without fear, favor or partiality according to law.'

Which Oath shall be filed in the Office of the Clerk of the said City.

(7.) And be it farther enacted—That this act shall not take effect till the first day of August next in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and nineteen.

(8.) And be it farther enacted that at any time hereafter it shall be lawful to grant a Licence for the purpose of keeping an Inn or Tavern and also at the same time to retail strong or spirituous liquors to any person or persons who shall have licences for both those purposes in the said City on or before the first day of August next any thing herein contained to the contrary in any wise notwithstanding:

After some debate thereon Alderman King moved that the said Bill be referred back to the Counsel with directions to report a [314] Bill in conformity with and agreeably to the Resolution of the Board of the last meeting. Debates being had thereon and the question having been taken on the said motion it passed in the negative. The ayes & nays having been required by Alderman King were as follows:

[319] To the Honorable the Corporation of the City & County of New York.

The undersigned, a Committee appointed by the Trustees of the New York City Dispensary to enquire into the state of the Vaccine Department of this Institution and to communicate the same to the Mayor, Aldermen and Common Council beg leave respectfully to report.

That agreeably to the provisions made by your Honorable Body for the diffusion of the benefits of Vaccination among the poor of this City and its vicinity the Physicians of the Dispensary during the past year have vaccinated Eight hundred and forty two persons. Of this number Five hundred & thirty have been vaccinated at the Institution and Three hundred & twelve at their respective places of abode.

The annexed Documents prepared by the physicians contain the details upon this subject.

The undersigned Committee by direction of the Trustees also respectfully solicit from your Honorable Body the continu- [320] ance of the pecuniary remuneration hitherto granted to the attending Physi-

cians of this Institution in order the better to enable the Trustees to extend more widely among the poor the invaluable blessings of Vaccination and thereby to secure the Community from the ravages of a loathsome & mortal disease

"That the annexed complaint was made to him by Mr. Oliver Vanderbilt late City Sealer against the said Hugh Walker—Viz

On the 22<sup>d</sup> of February 1819 I examined Mr. Hugh Walker's Weights the corner of Perry & Washington Streets and found them as follows:

2 7 Light

11 Small weights Light

3 Beams 1 not sealed

13 Liquid Measures 8 not sealed

Three Witnesses to prove the above to be correct

Mr. Walker having been sworn stated in answer to the above mentioned complaint that it is true he had in his possession when the City Sealer called at his grocery Store 5 Fifty sixes and that as he was informed & believes one of them was too heavy & four were too light, but it is true he states that said Weights never have been used in buying or selling any Article since they have been in his possession: that he has done business in a small line and has had no occasion to use large Weights: that the Beam complained of as not having been sealed had never been used by him: that the nine small Weights complained of he farther stated under oath he purchased of Mr Vanderbilt [333] about nine months ago: that they are all Iron Weights and have undergone no alteration since he bought them: that when he purchased them they were all sealed and stamped by Mr. Vanderbilt on the surface of the lead in the hole in the bottom of each weight, which stamp is still plain to be seen: that the small liquid measures stated to have been not sealed have been very seldom used and some of them not at all: that they are the same as when purchased and as he believes all correct. He believes that Mr. Vanderbilt would not have complained of him had he known that the large Weights, which are the principal cause of complaint had never been used by him: that he was not at home when Mr. Vanderbilt called at his Store and therefore could not have made to him the

necessary explanations: that his Weights have since been left with the Assistant State Sealer to be adjusted and sealed.

A Mr. Miller, a respectable neighbour of Mr. Walker corroborated his statement.

According to the above statement the principal cause of complaint appears to be answered and leaves uncontradicted the use [334] only of the smaller articles without having them sealed.

The Finance Committee, on the Report of the Vaccine Department of the City Dispensary; Reported:

"That they have examined the Documents referred to them by which it appears that 842 persons have been vaccinated by the Institution during the last year, 530 of which were vaccinated at the Establishment and 312 at their houses. The view given of the subject in the Report alluded to is perfectly plain & satisfactory to your Committee and the aid granted by the Board to this Department of the Institution is, in their opinion, well bestowed and has tended to extend more widely the superior benefits of Vaccination to the offspring of the poor of our City. The Committee therefore recommend the passage of the following Resolutions:

[335] "Resolved that the Comptroller report a Warrant for 300 Dollars in favor of the Treasurer of the New York Dispensary, being the Balance due that Institution on an appropriation by the Corporation of 600 dollars to the Vaccine Department for the year ending the 16<sup>th</sup> day of March instant.

"Resolved that the Report of the Vaccine Department to this Board be filed in the Office of the Clerk of the Common Council.

[336] The Finance Committee, on the petition of a Committee of the Fulton Steam Boat Company, reported:

"That they have had a conference with the Committee of said Company at which they attempted to shew that the rent required of them was more than that received by the proprietors of the pier on the East side of Beekman Slip similarly situated, and instead of 800 Dollars per annum required of them by the Corporation they offered 600 as the highest rent they were willing to give.

The time of your Committee has not permitted them to make the necessary enquiry so as to ascertain the amount received by proprietors of Wharves affording the same accommodation as the one alluded to, but from the best calculations they are enabled to make, taking the Wharfage allowed by law as a criterion and granting that at least two vessels may be accommodated at the same time, they are led to believe said pier would bring an annual income of 1000 dollars at least; and when it is recollected that no longer than the last year [337] the Corporation expended in rebuilding this wharf between 3 & 4 thousand dollars the Committee cannot think the rent required unreasonable or much too high altho' objected to by the Agents of the Company. Your Committee admit however that the establishment of these Boats is a public convenience and that the occupancy of the Wharf by other vessels might be attended with some inconvenience to the proprietors of the Ferry to Brooklyn, and therefore feel disposed to recommend the acceptance of a rent that must be deemed moderate in every point of view, and they propose the following Resolution accordingly:

"Resolved that in consideration of the public utility of the Boats established by the Fulton Steam-boat Company the Comptroller be authorised to rent them the pier at Beekman Slip for three years from the expiration of their present term at the annual rent of 700 Dollars."

The Committee are satisfied therefore that the Covenant compelling the proprietors to keep the piers and Bulkhead in repair ought not to be insisted on by the Board and they accordingly recommend the passage of the Resolution referred to them in the following words:

Your Committee therefore recommend that a Lease be granted to the petitioner for the Ferry between this City and Weehawk for the term of Fifteen years from the 1<sup>st</sup> of April next, the first five years at a nominal rent, the next five years at the rate of Fifty Dollars per annum and for the residue of the Term One hundred dollars per annum—that the Lessee shall provide some suitable landing place on the New York side at his own expence with liberty to change such landing place from time to time as he may deem it expedient and that no other ferry be granted during the said term within the distance of a quarter of a mile on each side of the former landing place at Weehawk

The Street Committee and the Alderman & Assistant of the Second Ward, to whom were referred the petitions on subject of opening [344] Beekman Street, together with the Resolution on the subject, Reported:

"That they have again given this improvement & the documents in relation to it their attentive consideration. The importance of the improvement and the interest which it has excited are admitted and known to the Board. The Committee are unanimous in opinion that the straight line will make the best & most ornamental improvement, tho' the expences incident to this mode of improvement have to some extent divided the Committee, as well as the neighbourhood, in opinion as to the expediency of carrying it into effect. To enable the Board to judge of the wishes of the neighbourhood who have petitioned and



expressed their opinions to the Committee we have taken the amount of their respective assessments and we find that the petitioners for the straight line improvement pay \$24000, toward opening the Street. The petitioners for the old or crooked line improvement pay \$18,534. It must also be observed that the Assessments on the property of the petitioners in favor of the [345] new line, if the new line were adopted, would be much increased and far exceed the Assessment on the property of the petitioners for the old line. The reason of this is obvious. The petitioners in favor of the Old Line, or some of them, are assessed for fronts, whereas if the new line were adopted the Assessment for fronts would fall on the petitioners for the new improvement which would tend to increase the Assessment of the one set of petitioners while it diminished that of the other.

But your Committee are inclined to think that not much consideration should be given to the wishes of the individuals on either petition whose property will become Fronts by the adoption of either of their respective plans.

Your Committee consider that the property in Beekman Street and the Cross Streets above Pearl Street is differently situated the owners of which may be said to be less interested than those above referred to, the Committee find that the amount of Assessments in those Streets for the straight line improvement to be \$13,262. and for the crooked line improvement to be but \$3871.

[346] In relation to the increased expence to the Corporation for the one third of the Buildings, the Board are referred to the former Report.

The small quantity of ground which will be left between the Market and this Street your Committee think is required for public purposes, but if in the opinion of the Board it is not required this does not appear to be a good reason that the Board should adopt a bad improvement to meet their own particular views when the neighbourhood have to pay more than nine tenths of the expence of the improvement.

In relation to the line proposed by the Resolution referred to this Committee we are of opinion that it does not present advantages sufficient nor does it remedy the evil sufficiently to make it advisable to adopt it.

It appears to your Committee that a great majority of the people in Beekman Street and the Cross Streets above Pearl would prefer **that this improvement should be dropped to carrying it into effect on the Crooked lines.** To the owners of property [347] below Pearl Street it is not of so much consequence on which plan the Street is



opened excepting where their property becomes fronts on the respective plans.

"Your Committee have only farther to observe that after this re-examination of the subject they adhere to the opinion expressed in their former Report and it is for the Board to determine. The Committee, to bring the subject properly before the Board, offer the following Resolution:

The Street Commissioner presented an Ordinance for a Well and Pump in Suffolk Street between Grand and Broome Streets, which was passed, and John Targee, Abraham Bloodgood and Jacob C. Mott were appointed Assessors.

[360] He also presented an Assessment for making a Turnpike Road on the Eighth Avenue from Greenwich Lane to the Bloomingdale Road, and also one for making a Road on the Ninth Avenue from Greenwich Lane to 28<sup>th</sup> Street—which were confirmed & Noah Jarvis appointed Collector in each.

He also presented a Return of Delinquents in the following Assessments—Viz:

For regulating Mercer Street from Bleecker to Amity Street:

For regulating Green Street from Houston to Bleecker Street:

For regulating and paving Crosby Street from Hester to Broome Street.

Whereupon Warrants were ordered to issue to Noah Jarvis Collector for collecting the same.

The quantity of Manure given for a Load having been, for some years, regularly the same, tho' less than the quantity allowed by law, your Committee do not, therefore, think that the petitioners have been defrauded as stated in their petition.

[365] In relation however to the conduct of the Inspectors your Committee offer the following Resolution:

Resolved that the Inspectors of Manure have grossly neglected their duty in not giving the measure directed by the Corporation Ordinance and in not requiring the Boxes of the Carts to conform to the Law, and that the City Inspector furnish them copies of this Report and Resolution."

"That the petitioners hold the Lease of Four Lots fronting on Tryon Row as stated in their petition, that the lease of three of said lots expires on the 1<sup>st</sup> day of May 1830 and may be renewed at an appraised rent, but that the lease of one of the lots forming the corner of Augustus Street and Tryon Row expires on the 1<sup>st</sup> day of May 1826 and contains no provision for renewal, which is the principal obstacle to the improvement [366] contemplated by the petitioners. The Committee are decidedly of opinion that it is inexpedient to sell the Lots alluded to, but that the object of the petitioners may be effected by improving the property to advantage they propose the following Resolution:

Resolved that the Comptroller be authorized to grant a new Lease to Peter and George Lorillard for the Lot No. 29 at the corner of Augustus Street and Tryon Row for a term of years to expire on the 1<sup>st</sup> day of May 1830 and at a rent One hundred and fifty dollars per annum and that said Lease be subject to renewal on the usual conditions—Provided that the present Lease for said Lot be cancelled and the said Lorillards concur in the proposition herein contained on or before the fifteenth instant."

"That altho' in the subdivision of said Lots the proprietors propose reserving to the Corporation the amount of rent originally stipulated still in the opinion of your Committee the plan presents difficulties not easily obviated. The Deeds of conveyance to the purchasers designate the boundaries and dimensions of each lot agreeably to a Map made of the property at the time of sale and the claim of the Corporation must rest and be made on the identical Lot designated by the Deed, but according to the arrangement of the petitioners both the dimensions & boundaries of the Lots are altered—Lots K—L—M—instead of containing 26 feet front and rear and made to contain but 23 feet—L therefore contains a part of K, M a part of L and so on: besides, some, if not all of the Lots referred to have been sold by the original purchasers and the property vested in others who are now the petitioners for a subdivision which certainly does not lessen the difficulties anticipated by the Committee. On the [368] whole the Committee are of opinion that it is inexpedient to grant the prayer of the petitioners and the only alternative they feel it their duty to offer is the privilege of commuting for the rent reserved to the Corporation and they propose the following Resolution accordingly:

"That the petitioners have it in contemplation to circulate a subscription among the neighbours residing near the Bowling Green for the annual payment of a sum as may by them be agreed on for the purpose of defraying the expence of improving and ornamenting the Bowling Green by planting Trees, Shrubby &c. and keeping the same in order, on condition that the Corporation in consideration thereof will permit the said Subscribers to occupy the Bowling Green as a place of recreation for their families. Now your Committee perceive no objection to granting the request of said petitioners, especially as the public will notwithstanding enjoy every advantage they do at present and [370] will moreover be gratified by seeing the Bowling Green in a highly cultivated state. They therefore beg leave to submit the following Resolution:

Resolved that the neighbours residing near the Bowling Green who may enter into an agreement to raise money by annual contribution for the purpose of improving by planting Trees and Shrubby in the Bowling Green shall be permitted to occupy the same as a place of recreation for themselves and families."

It was then moved that it be referred to the Committee on public Lands and Places to make such ornamental improvements at the Bowling [371] Green as they shall consider proper and expedient. The question being taken thereon it was carried in the Affirmative.

A Resolution was presented directing Washington Street to be regulated from Canal Street to Spring Street, which was referred to the Street Committee with authority to report an Ordinance therefor.

Alderman Mesier presented the following:

Resolved that a Committee be appointed with full powers to remove all obstructions, and especially fish poles, from all the waters

within the jurisdiction of this City and that this Board will indemnify them in whatever they shall do under this Resolution and for all costs and expences they may incur in the premises, and that the Committee endeavor to discover the names of those who offend against the statute of the State in this subject and report them to the Attorney of the Corporation who is hereby instructed to prosecute for the penalties."

A motion was made to postpone the consideration thereof until the 2<sup>d</sup> Monday in May next. The question being taken thereon it was [372] carried in the Affirmative. The Ayes & Nays being called by Alderman Mesier were as follow:

A petition that Walker Street be paved between Broadway and Elm Street was read and referred to the Street Committee who immediately reported an Ordinance therefor, which was passed and John Targee, Abraham Bloodgood and Jacob C. Mott were appointed Assessors.

A petition that Second Street may be opened [376] from the Bowery to Avenue 'C.' was presented and referred to the Street Committee.

A petition from sundry owners and lessees in Grand Street remonstrating against the contemplated improvement of widening said Street between Broadway and the Bowery was read and leave given to petitioners to withdraw their petition.

An Invitation from the Trustees of the African Free School to the Members of the Common Council to attend on the 13<sup>th</sup> instant the annual examination of the Scholars of that Institution was presented and accepted.

A petition of the Society of United Christian Friends for permission to extend the vaults of their Burying ground corner of Duane and Augustus Streets a few feet under the Street was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A petition that Beach Street may be regulated and paved from Varick to Chapel Street was read and referred to the Street Committee.

[377] An Application from John Ireland to be permitted to construct a Vault in front of No. 124 Duane Street was granted on the usual terms under direction of the Street Commissioner.

Mr. Stevens stated that a petition for regulating Front Street from Peck Slip to Crane Wharf had been given but was at the pres-



ent moment mislaid—He therefore moved that the subject be referred to the Street Committee with power to present an Ordinance if in their opinion expedient—which was agreed to.

A petition was then read from Peter Schermerhorn Esqr. remonstrating against regulating said Street between Peck and Fulton Slips until the opening of Beekman Street &c. shall render it necessary, which was referred to the same Committee.

A petition of Jackson & Baggot praying further remuneration than that allowed by the Commissioners of Estimate for damages incurred in widening Grand Street was read and leave given to petitioners to withdraw their petition.

A petition was received from John Fink, stating [378] that the Corporation had at his solicitation granted to his Son John L. Fink Stall No. 1 Washington Market: that said John L. Fink is unadvisedly endeavouring to dispose of said Stall: that the sole dependance of said John L. Fink for support is on petitioner and praying that said Stall may be given to petitioner to enable him the better to provide for his said son—Which being read was referred to the Market Committee.

The Street Commissioner presented an Ordinance for regulating Washington Street from Canal to Spring Street which was passed and Peter Hawes, John Targee and Roger Strong were appointed Assessors.

He also presented a Return of Delinquents on Assessments for paving Vestry Street and for paving side walks in Franklin Street—whereupon warrants were ordered to issue to Noah Jarvis Collector to collect the same.

He also, agreeably to order, in relation to the filling of Cornelius Harsin's Lot, Reported:

“That on the 22<sup>d</sup> May 1815 an Ordinance [379] was passed directing the building of a Bulkhead from Ritter's Wharf to Webb's Wharf on the westerly line of West Street and to fill in the vacant space to the height of the Bulkhead from Washington Street to the Bulkhead.

The building of the Bulkhead was completed the same year: the filling in progressed slowly on the part of Mr. Astor & the Corporation and not at all on the part of Mr. Harsin (who was duly notified for that purpose.)

On the 6<sup>th</sup> of October 1817 an Ordinance was passed directing the regulating Charlton Street from Greenwich Street to West Street that part of said Street between Greenwich Street and Washington



Street was filled in by Messrs. Board & Anderson the proprietors of the Lots on the one side and John P. Ritter on the other. The Street commissioner in compliance with the several Resolutions of the Board passed 14<sup>th</sup> July and 8<sup>th</sup> September 1817 proceeded to fill the Block belonging to the Corporation between Washington & West Streets and King and Charlton Streets. The filling has been progressing to the present time and until the Block has been nearly filled, insomuch that the cave of solid earth has partly filled Charlton Street [380] and the soft earth and Mud from the bottom driven on to the westerly part of the Street and the water lot of Mr. Harsin's to the amount of \$1000 to 1500 dollars."

made and which is herewith submitted, the expense of which may be  
estimated at Four thousand Dollars. It is due to the Petitioner to  
state that he has been Lessee of this Ferry for more than Eleven  
Years, that he has been indefatigable in his endeavours to accomodate  
the public and during the whole time, it is not within the recollection  
of your Committee that the Corporation have expended One Cent  
towards any improvement of that Ferry, but the Petitioner has hitherto  
made all necessary improvements at his own individual expense. In  
the year 1811 he expended Five Hundred dollars for a bulkhead and  
Ferry Stairs at Brooklyn—In the year 1813—he expended the sum of  
Two thousand dollars for a pier at the same place—In 1816, the fur-  
ther sum of Nine hundred dollars for extending that Pier—in the same  
Year he assumed to pay the further sum of Four thousand five  
hundred Dollars for one [390] third part of the Westerly pier at Cath-  
arine Slip being the proportion which otherwise would have been  
borne by the Corporation—that latter sum however was advanced by  
the Corporation on his bond payable by installments with interest on  
which he has paid Twelve hundred and two dollars and twenty five  
cents leaving the sum of Three thousand three hundred and ninety

seven Dollars and Seventy five cents due for principal which together with the arrears of interest of Seven hundred and fifty Dollars makes a total of Four thousand and forty seven dollars and Seventy five cents still due from him on that bond—This sum your Committee recommend to be applied to defray the expense of the proposed improvement and such other accomodations as that Ferry may immediately require: It will be perceived that the plan offered by your Committee is to sink a Pier at the distance of about Thirty feet to the Eastward of the present pier extending out One hundred feet into [391] the River and as this will face the Slip it will be proper for the Corporation to be in possession of so much of it as shall be necessary for the purpose of a Slip or landing place for the ferry after the Lessees term shall have expired—Your Committee therefore recommend that a cession be taken from the Petitioner of all his interest and right to the outer end and Slip side of that pier as soon as it shall have been completed—and for the purpose of carrying the foregoing plan into effect—your Committee beg leave to offer the subjoined Resolution

“Whereas Rodman Bown Lessee of Catharine Slip Ferry is indebted to this Corporation in the sum of Four thousand and forty seven dollars and seventy five cents for principal and interest on his bond and this Corporation being willing to erect a Convenient pier or landing place and to make other necessary accomodations for that Ferry at Brooklyn

Therefore Resolved that the said Rodman Bown be permitted to expend that sum in the construction of such improvements, which shall go in discharge of the [392] said bond—Provided such improvements be made under the direction of the Street Commissioner—and provided also that the Said Rodman Bown shall cede to this Corporation all his right to the outer end and Slip side of such pier as soon as the same shall have been completed.

The Report of the Law Committee presented last meeting was called up and being read was in the words following:

That by Ordinance the Attorney to this Board is obliged once in every month to make a written Report to the Comptroller of every suit prosecuted by him under any Ordinance together with the sum



of Money, if any, recovered thereon; and the part, if any, paid to the informer; and lodge the Chamber- [393] lains receipt for the balance with the said monthly Report

On enquiring your Committee find that this Section of the Ordinance has never been complied with in any particular—Your Committee think the provisions in this section important in every respect. The report to the Comptroller would be an important document, containing facts upon which the board might found many salutary Laws: It would enable the Members to test our Ordinances by experience and practice. This Branch of the section is important in another view. The Members of the Board having access to the Report, while the grievances complained of in their respective wards were fresh on their memory, they could trace the courses pursued in each case and detect imposition or connivance.

The People at large also having a right to inspect these reports and knowing they were made monthly, would discover and represent to the board all irregularities.

The importance of these checks upon [394] our chief executive Officer is evident from the many unfounded reports in circulation concerning him.

To collect fines and penalties from the public is at best an unpleasant duty; Your Committee therefore think it the more necessary for this Board to adopt every possible means to convince the public that they are not only necessary, but that they are collected fairly and impartially.

The latter branch of the section directing the Attorney to pay over to, and lodge the receipt of the Chamberlain for the Amount so reported, with the Comptroller is important—because then the Attorney would necessarily submit his Accounts to the Board for examination, who would pass a warrant for what was thought his due; Whereas by the present practise he is always paid by monies retained in his hands when his accounts are submitted for examination and frequently before the services are performed. Indepen- [395] dent of the common truth, that he is a bad pay-master who pays before hand, Your Committee, can see no good reason why the poor fund should lose six months interest on monies collected for it's use.

In examining the accounts of the Attorney for the last six months your Committee find that in all suits for Five Dollars and under, he has charged a fee of Two Dollars; And for all Penalties over Five Dollars a fee of Five dollars is charged.

These charges would be about a fair compensation if an Attorney



were applied to in a single case; but where the number of cases reported by the Attorney for six months amounts to several hundred (the fees on which amount to between seventeen and eighteen hundred Dollars) besides the cases admitted by him to have been dismissed on payment of costs, and not reported amounting to a great number, Your Committee cannot but think the fees extravagant.

In justification of the present Attorney in this particular, your Committee think it necessary to say that he has followed the bills and charges made out by his predecessor [396] D. S. Jones Esq<sup>re</sup>—But on examining the last bill reported by M<sup>r</sup> Jones your Committee find that the whole charges made by him for Three Months services as Attorney amount only to forty eight Dollars although the charges are the same as made by the present incumbent. Then the suits brought did not exceed fifteen or twenty in three months but now they will Amount to at least Two Hundred. Your Committee have also examined the minutes of the Board for the resolution authorising the charges as made by the Attorney, and altho' the search has been made with care by the Clerk at the instance of the Committee, no other minute can be found on the subject than a Report of a Committee directing that the sum of Two Dollars shall be allowed the Attorney in all cases under twenty five dollars except in cases under the Charter for selling Liquor, where five Dollars is allowed and the same sum in all cases above Twenty five Dollars.

Your Committee have accordingly [397] subjoined a resolution to reduce the fees, but considering the precedent as having been established before the present incumbent came into office they have not thought proper to present a resolution to cause the surplus fees or amount to be refunded. In a former part of this report the practice of settling and dismissing suits and complaints by the Attorney is incidentally mentioned. Your Committee thought the investigation of this subject highly important to the honor and dignity of the board and of the party concerned. They accordingly examined it with great care, and attention and feel it a duty they owe themselves and the Attorney to state that in no instance could they find that he had received fines or penalties as a compromise although they examined upwards of one hundred supposed cases—They therefore beleive such reports to be without foundation, very probably arising from the circumstance of so many fines being collected. But while the Committee acquit him with justice in this respect they must condemn as impolitic and as an assumption of the rights of this [398] board, the very common practice of dismissing suits and offenders on pay-

ment of costs and that too in repeated offences by the same person—No resolution or authority granting this power can be found. Your Committee therefore are not aware that the board ever vested in a merely executive officer the right of dispensing Charity—How or when this practice first originated cannot now be ascertained; but your Committee are fully of opinion that it is an improper indulgence to be exercised by an officer—The board alone as the representative of the people and the responsible guardians of their morals have a right of enacting Laws and inflicting penalties; but if an officer has the right of dispensing with the penalties, he certainly has, as far as the right of dispensing is exercised, a right of abrogating those Laws and of superceding the power of the whole body of representatives.

The Committee therefore beg leave to offer the following resolutions.

Resolved That in addition [399] to the Monthly Report directed by ordinance to be made by the Attorney. That he also report to the Comptroller on the first day in each month after the month of May next all sums of money received by him as Attorney to this board; Whether fines or penalties have been received or not, and whether received as fees or otherwise

Resolved that the fees to which the Attorney of this Board shall be entitled from and after the first day of May next shall be as follows—For all penalties in actions the amount of which does not exceed Fifteen Dollars the sum of Two Dollars and fifty cents, and for all sums exceeding Fifteen Dollars the sum of Five Dollars and no more.

Resolved that the Attorney be instructed not to discontinue any suit commenced for or on behalf of this Board without an express order therefor: And also that he be instructed to prosecute all offenders whenever in his opinion the evidence is sufficient to sustain the action except in cases of particular hardship in which case he shall report the [400] same to the Board with a statement of facts requesting instruction thereon, And in case that at the next succeeding meeting of the board no instructions shall be given, he shall prosecute the same without delay.

The Report of the Finance Committee of the 29<sup>th</sup> of March instant on the Petition of Cornelius Harsin which had been referred to the Counsel and the report of the Counsel thereon of the 5<sup>th</sup> April instant were called up and read, and the Resolutions proposed by the Committee were considered, amended and agreed to—The Reports and Resolutions as amended were as follows

“That Mr Harsin received a grant dated the 31<sup>st</sup> day of July 1815 for the property alluded to, being 29 feet on [401] Washington Street and extending to the permanent Line in the Hudson River. That he petitioned the Board in December last praying to be permitted to reconvey to the Corporation said Grant, on their paying him the amount expended for improvements, which he stated at more than 2000. Dollars. That the said petition was referred to the Committee on Wharves, Piers and Slips, who reported on the 2<sup>d</sup> day of November following in favour of a cession of the grant; and as a remuneration for the improvements, That a Bond be executed in favour of Harsen for 1000 Dollars payable in one year without interest, which report was adopted. It is this arrangement which he wishes to relinquish, and in lieu thereof, to substitute the one proposed in his Petition.

The Committee cannot perceive any material objection to the proposition of Mr Harsen, except that it may be brought forward as a precedent for similar applications whenever grants from this board may prove unproductive; or [402] the convenience of the applicant be affected by an ordinance to improve his property. The Committee must admit however, that the permission already given Mr Harsen to cede his grant has established the precedent, and as they are satisfied no possible loss to the public can be sustained by the proposed arrangement, and as the adjoining property belongs to the Corporation, which they are now filling, and therefore will be put to no inconvenience by entering into new contracts; and, as the improvement of that part of the City will be facilitated by the operation, they propose the following resolutions

Resolved, that the Counsel be authorised to receive from Cornelius Harsen a Bond and a Mortgage for ground under water granted him by the Corporation on the 31<sup>st</sup> day of July 1815—together with his Deed for Two Lots adjoining said grant, as designated by the plan hereunto annexed marked A—And that the Counsel make the necessary searches as to title at the [403] expense of said Harsen.

Resolved, that on the Bond and Mortgage being executed for said property, the Street Commissioner be authorised to compleat

the filling and regulating of the same; and that a just and true account be kept by him of the amount expended for filling and regulating.

Peter Augustus Jay Esq<sup>r</sup> presented a Commission from the Hon. the Council of Appointment dated 6<sup>th</sup> of April ins<sup>t</sup> appointing him Recorder of the City of New York which was read and M<sup>r</sup> Jay took the several oaths prescribed by Charter and the Laws which [409] were administered by his Honor the Mayor in the presence of the Common Council and he took his seat as a member of the Board.

His Honor the Mayor laid before the board a certified Copy of a Law passed at the last session of the Legislature on the 13<sup>th</sup> April 1819—entitled an Act relative to Harman Street authorising the Corporation to suspend extending and enlarging said Street and to order [410] all the proceedings in relation to extending and enlarging the same to be vacated and annulled—Whereupon it was referred to the following committee to enquire into the circumstances in relation



to the Assessment and other matters respecting the opening of said Street and to report thereon to the Board—The Committee appointed were Aldermen W<sup>m</sup> F. V<sup>n</sup> Amringe John Morss George Buckmaster

A Petition of Anthony Dey for permission to construct a Vault at the corner of Nassau & Cedar Streets extending into the said two Streets with a permission also to vary the opening into s<sup>d</sup> Vaults from the mode prescribed by the Ordinance in that respect was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of Ward and Street Commissioner—to Report.

A Petition of Balthazar P. Melick in behalf of himself and the Inhabitants [411] in the vicinity of Spring Street, praying that the right of ferrying from that part of the City between Desbrosses and Christopher Streets across the Hudson to Weehawk or elsewhere may be granted to them for the term of Twenty one Years—was read and referred to the Ferry Committee, and the Alderman and Assistant of 8<sup>th</sup> Ward.

A Petition of Lewis Hartman for permission to occupy a part of the foot walk for the purpose of a Cistern to be constructed of durable materials—was read and referred to the Aldermen and Assistant of Ward and Street Commissioner, with authority, if in their opinion expedient, to grant the prayer of the Petitioner.

A Letter from the Rev<sup>d</sup> John Stanford on the subject of children and youth confined in the Penitentiary, stating that at their liberation they are left to the wide world without a friend to protect or advise them and recommending as a salutary measure that authority might be vested in the [412] commissioners of the Alms House to bind them out as in the case of Paupers—was read and referred to the Alms hous Committee.

And it was resolved that the Committee on Arts and Sciences, to whom a communication of M<sup>r</sup> Sandford of a concise Catechism for the use of the Children of the Alms house—was referred—be requested to report thereon at the next meeting of the Board.

A Petition from Thomas Dennison for relief from a Personal Tax assessed on him, and a Petition of a similar nature from Joseph L. Hayes—were read and referred to the Committee of Charity.

A Letter from Robert Ainslee addressed to Alderman Buckmaster as chairman of the Committee on the regulation of Greenwich Village was presented by him, and read. It's object was to urge as expeditiously as possible the construction of the Canal through Carmine Street to the North- [413] River—Whereupon the same was referred to the Committee on the regulation of Greenwich Village.



A Petition of Charles Udall, a measurer of Grain appointed by the Corporation of this City was received stating—that he was called upon to measure a quantity of Grain lying in a Vessel at Brooklyn on the Long Island shore, below Low water mark

That he understood the Jurisdiction of the City extended to high water mark on said shore and therefore he was in the lawful exercise of his commission—That notwithstanding he was prosecuted by the Corporation of Brooklyn as acting without a Commission from them within their Jurisdiction, and was fined and comp[e]lled to pay the sum of Twenty five dollars; and praying relief—Whereupon the same was referred to the Committee on Laws.

He also presented an Assessment for a Well and Pump in Arundle Street near Delancy Street which was confirmed and Morris De Camp appointed Collector.

He also presented the following Ordinances which were passed: Viz—for paving Grand Street between Broadway and the Bowery and John Targee, Abraham Bloodgood and Jacob C. Mott were appointed Assessors. For repaving the Bowery from Chatham Square to Grand Street and for widening the [415] sidewalks between Grand and Broome Street, and the same Assessors were appointed: for regulating & paving Greenwich Street from the South side of Watts Street to Spring Street—and Peter Hawes, John Targee and Roger Strong were appointed Assessors.

He also presented the following communication:

“The Street Commissioner is sorry to inform the Common Council that not only the Public Roads and Bridges have suffered severely by the late heavy rain, but that about 150 feet of the Bulkhead of the Battery, North of the Bridge has been completely demolished by that Storm—besides a considerable quantity of Earth is washed away, and

requires immediate attention, in order to prevent further encroachments. He would therefore respectfully recommend that the Superintendent of Repairs be authorised to procure a sufficient quantity of Rough Stone to line the breach lately made; and also more effectually to secure some other parts of the Bulkhead that is in great [416] danger of being destroyed.

Alderman King from the Ferry Committee stated to the Board that the Ferry house at Hoorn's Hook was greatly out of repair—Whereupon it was referred to the Superintendent of Repairs to make under direction of the Ferry Committee such repairs as were necessary.

The Committee on Applications on the [419] Petition of J. V. D. B. Vandoren—Reported as follows:

"The Committee of Applications to whom was referred the Petition of J. V. D. B. Vandoren for Guager have made the necessary inquiry and do Report in favor of the Petitioner being appointed to that Office, and beg leave to offer the following Resolution:

Resolved that J. V. D. B. Vandoren, the within Petitioner be, and is hereby appointed a Guager for the City and County of New York.

The Committee on Laws on the right of the Corporation to appoint Inspectors of Lumber, Reported:

That by the general terms used in the Charter granting power to the Corporation to regulate all trades and handicrafts carried on in the City, your Committee have no doubt but that the regulation of the [420] lumber business or calling may be included. In another

part of the Charter it is also granted to the Corporation to appoint Surveyors of flour &c, "and all other Commodities," and also to make any bye laws for the government of the inhabitants not inconsistent with the Laws of the Assembly, from which your Committee conclude that the right of appointing Inspectors as well as Measurers of Lumber is certainly vested in the Board. It remains however to ascertain whether the right given by the Charter has not been superseded or abrogated by the Act entitled "an Act for the Inspection of lumber" passed March 27, 1807.—By this Act the Council of Appointment are directed to appoint inspectors of Lumber for the City of New York; but by a fair construction to be given to the fifth Section the Committee is led to conclude that these Inspectors, if they have any exclusive right, have only an exclusive right [421] of inspecting Lumber to be exported, and therefore that the inspection of lumber for domestic use is still governed by the Charter concurrently with the Inspectors appointed by the Council of appointment. The latter branch of this Section (which is the only part creating doubt) which enacts that—"if any person other than those appointed by Law shall "be convicted of practising the duties of Inspector of lumber, to the "injury of said inspectors, such offender &c"—if meant to apply to inspectors under the Corporation can only allude to the inspection of lumber intended for exportation as from the context of the Act it is framed for the inspection of lumber for exportation. But without this construction of the Act your Committee think it fair to conclude from the phraseology of the branch of the section above quoted that inspectors appointed by the Corporation were not intended to be excluded, at least for domestic use; On the contrary, it is thought by the Committee that the expressions "other than those appointed by law" seem to leave room for a strong inference that the legislature recognized [422] the right of the Inspectors appointed by the Corporation to inspect lumber even for exportation—because it was known to the Legislature when this law passed that the Corporation had been in the practice of appointing inspectors for this special purpose; and if it had been intended to exclude Corporation inspectors it might have been done readily and unequivocally by altering the phraseology thus—"if any person other than those appointed by this "Law &c"—which would have put the question at rest as to inspectors for exportation:—On the whole your Committee are of opinion that the Act quoted creates a concurrent power with the Corporation, but does not abrogate their right—They can find nothing in the Statute repugnant to the exercise of this privilege by the Board, and are

therefore led to the conclusion that the Corporation has a right of appointing inspectors as well as measurers of Lumber."

Gilbert, Collector of the Arrearages of Taxes, refused to pay the Amount of Taxes due from them; Whereupon the said Communication was referred to the Committee [432] on Public Offices.

A Lease to Peter & George Lorrillard for 11 years from 1<sup>st</sup> May 1819—of a Lot of Ground on the Corner of Augustus Street and Tryon Row in the sixth ward, \$150 per annum. It contains the usual covenants for renewal.

A Deed to Robert R. Hunter for Lots N<sup>o</sup> 3 and 7 at the Albany Basin.

A Deed to Philip Brasher and James Fairlie of two Lots of Ground [45] N<sup>os</sup> 21 and 22 in third Ward on Fulton Street between Washington and West Streets—These Lots were purchased at the public sale by M<sup>r</sup> Brasher and are made out to him and M<sup>r</sup> Fairlie by his request.

The Finance Committee to whom was referred the subject of working the Avenues, both as to the manner of working and the mode of paying the expences: Reported:

[47] “That in examining the subject referred to them, they have confined themselves, on the present occasion, to the expense of working the 3<sup>rd</sup> Avenue only, and have accordingly attempted a calculation of the expense for compleating the whole of said Avenue—founded on the actual cost of that part already finished extending from 9<sup>th</sup> Street to 28<sup>th</sup> Street.

The whole extent of the Avenue from 9 <sup>th</sup> Street to Haerlem Creek is estimated at Six and a quarter miles, and has cost the Corporation for working as per the original contract.....	\$30.462.33
One mile of which has, during the last season, been regulated and paved, and cost—for to pay the Overseers of the Convicts—use of Carts and horses—Tools—Blacksmith work and other contingencies the sum of.....	\$4983.14
The men employed in working [48] the above mile were 85, and they worked 144 days each—equal to 12.240 days in the whole, which at 50 cents per day will amount to the sum of.....	\$6120.
Making the total cost for one Mile.....	\$11.103.14
The distance still to be compleated is about 5¼ Miles, and is estimated to cost on an average 11,000 dollars per mile, and will amount to the sum of.....	\$57.750.

The expence therefore of working 6¼ Miles of this Avenue to be compleated similar to the mile already worked will be 99.315 Dollars and 48 Cents.

The Committee beleive the foregoing estimates to be within the bounds of the probable cost, and they presume it will be conceded on all hands that the charge of 50 cents per day for the Labour of the Convicts is not only moderate, but considerably [49] less than the same work can be done by any other persons. The amount expended for Blacksmith work, Tools, the pay of the Overseers &c is taken from the Books kept by the Superintendant of the Alms house, where the several items are regularly entered and debited to the proper account; and the estimated value of the Labour performed by the convicts, is at least 50 per cent less than the lowest price given in this City to Labourers.

The object of the Committee has been to place the regulating and working of the Avenues on the same footing which the Law places

the paving: altering and amending the Streets—which authorises estimates of the expense to be made, and a just and equitable assessment thereof among the owners or occupants of all the Houses and Lotts intended to be benefitted thereby; and the Board having determined [50] on the 7<sup>th</sup> of October 1817—that one third of the expense for working the Avenues shall be paid by the property adjacent, the Committee can see no reason why the subject should be longer delayed, and therefore propose the following Resolutions.

Resolved, that the Street Commissioner be instructed to report an ordinance at the next meeting of the board for appointing assessors to assess on the property adjacent to, and fronting on the Third Avenue, the sum of 33.105 Dollars and 16 cents being One third of the estimated expense for regulating and working said avenue; and that said Assessment be laid on the property in proportion to the benefit derived, or to be derived from said improvement, and in the usual manner of laying [51] assessments for regulating and paving Streets

Resolved, that on said Assessment being confirmed by the Board, and a Collector appointed—it shall be the duty of such collector, in the first instance, to collect from the property fronting on that part of the Avenue which shall be compleated at the time of confirming the assessment as aforesaid, and in like manner on any portion hereafter compleated, until the whole assessment shall be collected.

Livingston, that he was not obliged to pay his taxes to the tenth ward Collector—and that the tenth ward Collector had no power to enforce the collection; As the assertions contained in each of these charges were known to be untrue by M<sup>r</sup> Gilbert, Your Committee would require satisfactory proof, before they could stigmatize him with being guilty of the conduct and consequent falsehoods imputed to him. But M<sup>r</sup> Gilbert has by the annexed papers, in the [55] opinion of your Committee, satisfactorily disproved the above charges made against him, though we think that his own affidavits, and certificates; show an imprudent conversation with M<sup>r</sup> Livingston, as for instance, we think it improper for M<sup>r</sup> Gilbert to have informed M<sup>r</sup> Livingston, that the Ward Collectors seldom distrained, as it is by threatening to distrain and sometimes actually distraining, that the payment of a considerable part of the taxes is made to them, it was therefore unbecoming an officer of the board, in his official capacity too, to have held such conversation. There is also a like objection to the observations of M<sup>r</sup> Gilbert to M<sup>r</sup> Living-

ston, "that there would be no additional expence if the tax was returned to his office." Tho' Mr Gilbert appears to have had this conversation incidentally and without any design to cause Mr Livingston to delay [56] paying his taxes.

In relation to the advertisement, signed W. Fish, read to the Board, Your Committee think that the annexed papers clearly show, that no blame is to be charged to Mr Gilbert by reason of that publication.

Your Committee wish to be expressly understood as in no way implicating Mr Palmer or the correctness of his affidavits so far as he states the facts within his knowledge. Your Committee in the examination of this subject have learnt that circumstances make it proper, that the Collector of the arrearages of Taxes should be required to make semiannual accounts to the Comptroller and that the Comptroller report thereon to the Board. Your Committee take the liberty to suggest (though this part of the subject was not regularly referred to them) the following [57] Resolution.

Resolved that the Collector of Arrearages of Taxes be required to make forthwith an account between himself, as receiver of Public Monies, and the Corporation, during the period which he has held the said Office of Collector. and that hereafter the Collector of arrearage of Taxes be required to make, semiannually accounts, and render the same to the Comptroller, on the first Monday of May and November in each year and that the Comptroller Report the same to the Board with such remarks as he may deem proper.

Passed May 11. 1819

1. Upon the appearance of five Aldermen and five Assistants, the Mayor, or in his absence the Recorder shall take the chair as President, and the members be called to order.
2. Immediately after the President shall have taken the Chair, the minutes of the preceding meeting shall be read by the Clerk to the end that any mistakes therein may be corrected by the Board.
3. The President shall preserve order and decorum, and shall decide questions of order subject to an appeal to the Board.
4. The President shall in all cases be entitled to one Vote, and no more.
5. Every Member, previous to his speaking, shall rise from his seat, and address himself to the President.
6. When two or more members shall rise at once, the President shall name the Member who is first to speak.
7. No person shall speak more than twice [98] to the same question without leave of the Board, nor more than once until every member, choosing to speak shall have chosen.
8. No question on a motion shall be debated or put unless the same be seconded. When a motion is seconded it shall be stated by the President before debate and every such motion shall be reduced to writing, if any member desire it.
9. After a motion is stated by the President, it shall be deemed to be in possession of the Board, but may be withdrawn at any time before decision or amendment.
10. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received, unless
  1. To amend it
  2. To Commit it
  3. To postpone it
  4. For the previous question, or
  5. To adjourn.

11. A motion to adjourn shall be always in order, and shall be decided without [99] debate

12. The previous question, until it is decided, shall preclude all amendments and debate of the main question, and shall be in this form—" Shall the main question now be put?"

13. Every Member who shall be present when a question is put, shall vote for or against the same, unless the Board shall excuse him, or unless he be immediately interested in the question, in which case he shall not vote.

14. A Member called to order shall immediately sit down, unless permitted to explain, and the Board, if appealed to, shall decide on the case, but without debate: if there be no appeal, the decision of the Chair shall be submitted to.

15. All questions shall be put in the order they are moved, except that in filling up blanks the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put.

16. Upon a division in the Board the names of those who vote for, and of those who [100] vote against the question, shall be entered upon the minutes—if any two Members require it.

17. In all divisions taken by the Board it shall be the duty of the Clerk to enter on the minutes the name of the member calling for the division,

18. No motion for reconsideration shall be in order, unless made at the same meeting, or in pursuance of notice then given for the next meeting after that on which the decision proposed to be reconsidered took place, except by unanimous consent.

19. All Appointments of Officers shall be made by ballot, unless dispensed with by the unanimous consent of the Board.

20. No Member shall absent himself without permission from the President.

21. All committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered by the Board. Committees appointed to report any subject referred to them by the Board, shall report a State of [101] Facts, and also their opinion thereon in writing; and no report shall be received unless the same be signed by a majority of the Committee.

22. Whenever the Doors are directed to be closed all persons, excepting the Members and the Clerk of the Common Council, shall retire.

23. A motion for the order of the day shall take precedence of

all other motions, and is to be considered immediately after the reading of petitions and original communications.

A Communication from the Street Commissioner stating that two Frame Houses which were erected on the Northerly side of Grand Street encroach upon [119] the Street and as the Street is about to be opened he recommend[s] said Houses should be removed—was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A Communication from the City Inspector stating that a Lot on Orange Street N<sup>o</sup> 1110 of Bayard's East Farm was in a state of Nuisance—was referred to the Street Committee.

A Report of the Street Committee on the Petition for paving Grand Street from Arundel Street to the East River which was presented on the 5<sup>th</sup> of May and laid for consideration was called up and referred to the Street Committee and the Aldermen and Assistants of 7<sup>th</sup> & 10<sup>th</sup> Wards.

A Letter was received from Alexander Robertson Secretary of the American Academy of the Fine Arts inviting the Members of the Common Council to visit their Gallery at [120] the opening of the Exhibition on the 18<sup>th</sup> instant which being read was accepted.

A Petition from John Anderson and Joshua Jones owners of Property on the North River between Vesey and Barclay Streets stating that there is great want of accomodation for River Craft in that part of the City and praying that orders may be given for running out piers from Vesey and Barclay Streets which being read was referred to the Committee on Wharves Piers & Slips.

A Letter was received from Joshua Barnard stating that he has been a long time employed in boring and searching for Coal Mines both in Europe and in this Country—that he beleives he has discovered a place on the Hudson River where a Bed of Coal will be found and tendering his services to search for the same, which being read was referred to the Committee on Arts & Sciences.

[121] A Petition from Jesse Wood for appointment as Assistant to 3<sup>rd</sup> Watch District was read and referred to Watch Committee.

The Council reported as follows:

“The Counsel begs leave to inform the Board that the Report of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the Cases of Market and Oliver Streets have been confirmed by the Superiour Court.

The Counsel respectfully recommends that Collectors be appointed to collect the Assessments, And as the Owners of Property fronting on those Streets are desirous that those improvements should go into effect immediately, he suggests the propriety of instructing the Street Commissioner to take the necessary measures for removing the buildings with all convenient speed,

The Commissioners appointed to estimate the value of Ground required for the purpose of extending the inclosures at the New Alms House have made their Report and it has been confirmed by the Superiour Court.

& Wall Streets, whereupon the same was referred to the Finance Committee authorising to act in the Premises.

“That the injury to the Battery occasioned by the Storm of Last Summer, owing to the state of the Bulkhead which supported the adjacent ground, is extended nearly around the whole of that Promenade; and unless some effectual measures are adopted to stop its progress, the next storm in all probability will destroy that part of the Bulk head still remaining, and carry [181] with it a great portion of the Earth forming the main walk of the Battery. The Committee are of opinion therefore, that no time should be lost by the board in adopting such measures as will be at least a preventative to further injury; as any delay will only tend to widen the breach and ultimately increase the expense of repairing it. The Subject is one of considerable magnitude, both as it respects the amount to be expended and the time required to compleat the work, and as the resources of the Corporation are inadequate to the necessary disbursement for such undertaking, without a Special tax for the purpose; and one Season is evidently too short to compleat the whole of the work, the committee are of opinion that the necessary sum should be raised by a special tax on the City, to be apportioned by the Supervisors among the several Wards, as in their judgement will be just and equitable; and that only so much of the work should be contracted to be done this summer, as will prevent the injury already [182] sustained from increasing, and preserve the earth forming the battery in the state it now is.

The Committee herewith present a Map and plan of the contem-



plated improvement being the same reported by a former Committee on this subject, except that the present line is extended 25 feet less in the River than the former was, and will in their opinion form a promenade sufficiently large for every useful purpose, and at the same time lessen the expense several thousand Dollars.

The plan proposed by the Committee is to form a reef of common dock stone on the line shewn by the Map to be raised to the height of Low water mark, and when compleated to have a surface of 15 feet at it's top. This it is presumed will be a sufficient foundation to erect such barrier as will resist the pressure of the water on the one hand, and the earth on the other. The Committee beleive that the construction of this reef will be all that can conveniently [183] be performed in the present summer; and even if more could be performed, the Committee doubt the policy of permitting it, as some time ought to be allowed for the settling of the Reef or foundation, besides the saving in expense, by procuring the filling to be done through the winter months and preparing the materials for building the wall or barrier will be considerable, and thus the work will be in progress against the next spring, when that part of the plan ought to go into full operation.

The estimates of the expense of making the Reef or foundation has been made with due care, and the Committee beleive it will not exceed the sum of 14,610 Dollars.

The manner of constructing the wall together with the expense of that part of the plan including the filling, and the means for raising the sum necessary to defray the whole amount required, will be reported hereafter, and the Committee therefore close this report by offering the following Resolution.

Resolved that the Street Commissioner [184] under the direction of this Committee, be instructed to enter into contracts for the construction of a Reef around the Battery, to be laid on a line designated on the Map accompanying this report, such Reef to be formed of common Dock Stone, and to be raised to the height of low water mark, and when compleated to form a surface at its top of 15 feet and at its base of 45 feet, & that he contract also for driving so many piles in order to designate the Line of said Reef as may be deemed necessary.

“The Street Commissioner to whom was referred the memorial of Leonard Fisher & others complaining of the Assessment for regulating and paving Collect Street.

Respectfully reports, that on the 23<sup>rd</sup> March 1818—an ordinance was passed for regulating Collect Street from Pearl to Canal Street—the expense of which regulation amounted to \$6.714.80 and which sum was regularly assessed on each of the four Blocks in proportion to the quantity of earth required for filling [193] each, and that \$300. only was assessed on the block owned by your Memorialists, at the time the Contract for filling & regulating was made, it was not determined when the Street should be paved, of course it was filled up rather higher than would have been necessary, if it had been known that the Street was to have been paved immediately after, as the Order for paving was given on the 29<sup>th</sup> June following. As it respects the complaint of your Memorialists, that the[y] have been overcharged for paving the Street, the undersigned has carefully examined the Assessment, and finds it correct, and has only to regret that the peculiar condition of the Street owing to its soft and unsettled state, should have required the work to be done in a more substantial & of course expensive manner than is usual, whereby it has been more burthensome to the owners of property on the Street generally as well as your memorialists.

The undersigned is of opinion that your Memorialists are not more intitled to relief [194] than the other proprietors on the Street, and who have paid their assessments without complaint.

[225] The Committee of Wharves Piers & Slips presented the following Report as follows;

"The Committee on Wharves Piers & Slips to whom was referred the Petition of Thomas Stag Jun<sup>r</sup> & others, requesting that South Street may be regulated & filled from Dover Street until it forms a junction with Front Street; and also the Report of a former Committee, recommending that said Street be compleated to the East line of John Clarks property; together with a Remonstrance against such termination—Report,

"That having given the subject due consideration and personally examined the situation of the premises they are of opinion, that no part of our City, lying so contiguous to the bulk of population requires improvement more than the place alluded to.

"The Corporation have at a considerable expence to the Public located a Slip between Roosevelt and James' Streets, and the owners of property in the vicinity of this place, have paid large sums in opening & improving Roosevelt Street, and are about increasing their expenditure [226] by widening and straightening Dover Street, and in order that they may realise the benefit they have a right to expect from these improvements, it is necessary in the opinion of your Committee, that the bulk head forming South Street should be made and compleated. The offensive situation of some portion of the premises forms an additional reason in the minds of your Committee, for recommending this measure to the Board; for in consequence of a large quantity of filth and mud carried to the River by the wash of the

drane through Roosevelt Street, and which is prevented from escaping to the Channel for want of a Current to draw it off, the deposit has so increased as to be left bare at low water, and has become offensive to those whose business or residence lays in that vicinity, as well as dangerous to the health of the Community.

Your Committee herewith present a Map of the improvement, by which it is contemplated to extend South Street, from [227] its present termination at Dover Street, to the Pier known by the name of Minturn & Champlin's Wharf, and which forms the West boundary of the Corporation Basin between James & Roosevelt Street.

"Your Committee have caused estimates to be made of the probable expense that will be incurred by the Corporation for their part of said improvement, and have no doubt that the amount will not exceed Five Thousand Dollars, this sum when added to the expense already incurred by the Location of a Slip near this Place, is perhaps greater than the state of the finances will warrant, and your Committee would feel much reluctance in recommending its expenditure did they not believe it indispensably necessary, and one which cannot be avoided, being the result of a deliberate act of the Board in extending the Slip much farther west than was originally contemplated. With these impressions on the minds of your Committee, they beg leave to recommend the [228] following Resolutions.

"Resolved, that the owners & occupants of Lots of Ground under Water, situated and fronting on South Street, between Dover and Roosevelts Streets, and as far East as the Pier called Minturn & Champlin's wharf, be required at their individual expense, to cause good & sufficient bulkhead to be sunk on the Southerly line of South Street, and that they have the same built and compleated on or before the first day of December next; and farther, that they cause the said Lots, together with the Streets adjoining, to be filled to the proper height and regulation on or before the first day of July 1820.

"Resolved that the Street Commissioner be instructed to prepare an ordinance conformable to the foregoing Resolution for the concurrence of the Board.

The same Committee on the Petition for running out Piers at foot of Vesey & Barclay Streets on the North River, Reported

"That from the situation of the premises and the extensive trade carried on in its vicinity, they are satisfied, that the building of Piers at the places designated by the Petitioners will be an important improvement to that part of the City; but although convinced of this fact, still knowing the paucity of the means possessed by the board, Your Committee could not recommend a measure which will cost so large an amount, without first resorting to every expedient within their reach to lessen the inconvenience; and they have therefore entered into arrangements with the Proprietors of the Lots in the vicinity on the one hand, & Mr P. Hone, the Lessee of the Hoboken ferry on the other, which in their opinion will considerably abate the inconvenience of a want of finances [230] on the part of the Corporation and at the same time prove a profitable undertaking to the proprietors and an addition to the public convenience.

The Committee herewith present a Map of the contemplated improvement, by which it may be seen, that in its present situation, there is a short pier extending 53 feet in the River & that the whole of the water on the South side, and 25 feet on the north belongs to the Corporation, (the Pier being built on the West side of Vesey street) & also that there is a sunken block laying 80 feet north of said Pier; The improvement intended by the Committee is to extend the pier at the foot of Vesey Street to the permanent line & to sink a cross block or L at its end; to rebuild the sunken block alluded to; & to build a pier at the foot of Barclay Street to extend 290 feet in the river—all of which is designated on the map accompanying this report

The arrangement made with Joshua Jones and his associates, by your Committee [231] provided the Board concur, will be, that they bind themselves to pay two thirds the value of the Pier now built at the foot of Vesey Street, and also disburse two thirds the expense of extending said pier to the permanent line, and the same as it respects the pier to be built at the foot of Barclay Street and to rebuild and improve the sunken block at their own expense. They are to stipulate further, that on their being paid such sum as shall be awarded for the expense incurred in building the pier at the foot of Vesey Street, they will relinquish all right and title to the same. The North side of the last mentioned pier, will be occupied solely for the benefit of the Ferry to Hoboken, and as the Corporation are not bound to furnish the Lessee with any accommodations except the

use of the bulk head at the foot of Barclay Street—The Committee have arranged with M<sup>r</sup> Hone, that he advance the amount necessary to pay for one third of the cost of that piece which he is to reimburse from the rent of the Ferry as it may fall due, until the whole amount of principal shall be [232] liquidated. By this arrangement it will be seen that the consideration to be paid by M<sup>r</sup> Hone for the use of the North side of the pier, will be the interest of the amount advanced, & that no present calls will be made on the Treasury for the expense to be incurred.

Your Committee have caused estimates to be made of the value of the old pier & also the probable cost of the piers to be built & have computed the amount which is to be provided for by the Board, exclusive of the sum to be advanced by M<sup>r</sup> Hone at \$5825 Dollars.

Your Committee are of opinion that the arrangement here proposed, under all the circumstances, is the most eligible that can be adopted by the Board for the improvement of that Section of our City. and they therefore recommend the passage of the following Resolutions,

Resolved that the Counsel be instructed to prepare an article of agreement, to be executed by Joshua Jones and his associates binding them to the payment of two thirds [233] of the value of the old pier at the foot of Vesey Street, & also two thirds of the cost of extending said pier to the permanent line, & of building a Pier at the foot of Barclay Street, and that they be further bound to relinquish all rights and title to the North side of the Pier at the foot of Vesey Street, whenever required by the Corporation, & paid so much of the amount expended as may be awarded by persons mutually chosen for the purpose.

Resolved that the Counsel also prepare an article of agreement to be executed by Philip Hone, binding him to pay one third of the expense of building a Pier at the foot of Barclay Street, and authorising him to reimburse himself for the principal thus paid, out of the rent of the ferry as the same shall become due & payable.

Resolved—that on the articles alluded to in the foregoing Resolutions being executed, the Street Commissioner be authorised to contract for extending the Pier at the foot of Vesey Street to the permanent line & for building a Pier at the foot of Barclay Street conformable [234] to the Map accompanying this Report.

Resolved, that Joshua Jones & his associates on complying with their engagements, be authorised to use and occupy, until the same shall be required by the Corporation, the North side of the Pier



already built, and also the one to be built at the foot of Vesey Street, and that they be permitted to rebuild the sunken block in the vicinity of said pier, and to occupy the same for their own use and benefit.

Resolved that [236] the Finance Committee be authorised to employ one or more persons, as they shall deem expedient, for the purpose of auditing, under the superintendence of the Comptroller the accounts of the Late Chamberlain of this City.

A Memorial from sundry Inhabitants of Oliver Street was received stating that in [248] opening said Street a Projection has been left of about 13 feet on the Corner of Chatham Row running down to the West side of said Street about 50 feet which destroys the symmetry of said Street and praying the Street may be straightened—

A Remonstrance from James M. Dominick against granting the prayer of said Petition was also presented and read

Whereupon the Memorial & Remonstrance were referred to the Street Committee and Alderman & Assistant of the 4<sup>th</sup> Ward.

A letter was received from Gabriel Winter stating that John A. A Memorial was received from sundry Inhabitants residing in the Bowery praying the Corporation will reconsider the subject of paving the Bowery above Broome Street and defer the same as from the pressure of the times it would be greatly distressing to many of those who would be assessed for said improvement, which being read was referred to the Street Committee.

A Memorial from sundry Inhabitants praying that the side walks in Greenwich Street from Watts to Charlton Streets be regulated & paved was presented & referred to the Street Commissioner with directions to report an Ordinance agreeably to the Prayer of the Petitioners.

[252] A Petition of James Gourlay to be permitted to sell Goods at Auction in Harman Street was read & referred to the Street Committee.

A Memorial from sundry Boatmen & Carmen complaining of the incapacity & unfitness of James Hunt Inspector of Firewood & praying his removal from Office was read & referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

A Petition of Solomon Seixas to be permitted to continue to sell Goods at Auction in front of his store in Wall Street between Water and Front Street was read and referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

A Memorial was received from Benjamin A. Akerly, visiting surgeon to the New York Alms house tendering his resignation of said Office and requesting an allowance may be made to him for Carriage hire paid by him on visits to the Alms [253] House during the period of his serving in said Office—Whereupon his resignation was accepted & the subject of compensation was referred to the Finance Committee.

"The Counsel Respectfully informs the Board that Mess<sup>rs</sup> Peter & George Lorillard object to the lease of the Lot of Ground in Augustus Street, upon the Ground that it contains no provision for the appointment of an umpire in the event of the persons who may be appointed to appraise the improvement (provided the lease should not be renewed) not agreeing. The order for the lease was that it should be upon the same terms (excepting as to rent) as the former lease for the same premises. That lease which was drawn according to the then established [260] form, contained no such provision.

The following communication was received from D. S. Jones Esq<sup>re</sup> late Counsel of the Board

“The subscriber begs leave to present to the Common Council an account for the [261] taxed costs and Counsel fees in the suit heretofore commenced by the United States against Jacob Hays and Aaron Williams Jun<sup>r</sup> which was defended by directions of the Common Council, and in which a Judgment has been obtained in favour of the Defendants—But without Costs as Costs are not recoverable against the United States.

The suit in question was an action of Trespass instituted by the District Attorney of the United States to recover damages from the defendants for seizing a certain quantity of Gun Powder belonging to the United States and which was seized by the Defendants by order of the Police Magistrates in consequence of that powder being transported through our streets contrary to a Law of our State.

The Circumstances of the Case are fully detailed in a Petition which was presented to the Common Council by the Defendants on the 30<sup>th</sup> day of December 1816—that Petition was referred to the Law Committee as appears by an entry in your Minutes Lib—32 page 79, and that [262] Committee reported in favour of defending the suit, which Report was concurred in by the Board—The Report of the Committee and Resolution of the Board concurring therein are to be found in the 32<sup>d</sup> volume of your minutes, page 99.

Mr Jay was associated with me as Counsel in the defence of the Cause, and I have with his concurrence charged a fee of \$100. for him, as well as the like for myself. The number of Patent Causes and other business before the Circuit Court of the U. S. where the Cause was tried prevented us from bringing on the Argument in this Cause until after the lapse of Two Terms at both of which as well as the Term when the cause was argued we were obliged to attend for the purpose. From the importance of the principle involved in this

case and the attention which we were obliged to give to the Cause I presume the fees charged by us will be considered as moderate,

The Committee on Ferries & the Alderman and Assistant of the 8<sup>th</sup> Ward to whom were referred the respective Petitions of Philip Earle & Balthazar P. Melick for a grant of a Ferry from this City to Wehawk—Reported

"That since these Petitions were presented M<sup>r</sup> Charles Watts of this City has become Proprietor of Weehawk and the Petitioners have united in a request that in case the Corporation shall grant a Ferry to that place that the same be [268] made to M<sup>r</sup> Watts. It will be recollected that the Petition of Philip Earle when presented was referred to the Committee on Ferries, who on the 29<sup>th</sup> of March last, Reported, in favour of making him a Grant for fifteen years without restricting him to any limits on the New York side, under a supposition that he was to use sail boats only and with a view to accomodate the Lower Markets. The Board being apprehensive that such a grant might interfere with the rights of the Lessee of Hoboken Ferry—recommended the Petition and Report thereon to this Committee—Since that Period the present applicant has at a great expense, constructed a Team Boat operating on entire new principles, being propelled with two horses only by means of inclined planes. this invention appears to be one of great utility, at all events it is worthy a fair and full experiment. A Boat thus constructed the Applicant is to place upon the Ferry upon the event of his obtaining a grant. This is a very ancient [269] Ferry, but since the improvement of the Powles Hook and Hoboken Ferries it has grown into disuse in a great degree for want of su[i]table boats to transport Carriages—It is evident that a good Ferry established between this City and Weehawk will in some measure diminish the profits of the Hoboken Ferry, but it cannot be said to interfere at all with the rights of the grantee of that Ferry, especially if it be located above the limits of that Grant. Moreover the Lessee of the Hoboken Ferry must have contemplated having



another Ferry established above, as his predecessor was bound to keep one at the foot of Spring Street which he declined to accept, after the most mature deliberation on this subject your Committee are of opinion that the public convenience requires a Ferry between this City and Weehawk, and they respectfully recommend that a grant be made to M<sup>r</sup> Charles Watts for the term of fifteen years from the first day of May last—the first five years at a nominal rent, the second Five Years at a rent of Fifty Dollars per Annum, and the last [\*268] five years at the rate of Two hundred Dollars per annum—That the limits shall extend from the north bounds of the Grant of Hoboken Ferry to Christopher Street on the New York side and a quarter of a mile each side of Wehawke on the New Jersey side. But that the Corporation shall not be restricted from establishing other Ferries within the limits above specified on the New York side to any other place than Wehawke. or the above limits on the New Jersey side. And that the Lessee shall be compelled to keep on the Ferry a good and sufficient Team Boat, and shall keep the Ferry regularly as well in Winter as in Summer and provide a suitable landing place on each side at his own expense and that the rates shall be the same as the Hoboken Ferry. Your Committee beg leave to submit the following Resolution.

Resolved, that the Counsel of the Board prepare a Lease to M<sup>r</sup> Charles Watts in conformity with the preceeding Report.

The following Report from the Mayor and Recorder on the subject of their visit to and Inspection of the Bridewell and Establishment at Bellevue, was presented.

"The Mayor and Recorder Respectfully Report ;

That pursuant to a late Resolution of the Board, we visited on the fourth instant the establishment at Bellevue, and passed the greater part of the day in inspecting the Apartments of the Alms house, Penitentiary & Bridewell.

We have the satisfaction to state that we found the Establishments in a condition, which does great credit to the Officers of the Board, who have charge of them. The apartments in general were clean and well ventilated, but some of them were not without that offensive smell common to Prisons, which it must be very difficult to prevent where there are crowds of [282] Children and so many infirm and diseased persons ; but which [ought] to be almost entirely obviated in the City Prison by attention to cleanliness and by the frequent & abundant use of lime.

By conversing with many of the Paupers and convicts, we gave them an opportunity of making complaints if they had any, but none were made : on the contrary they generally admitted that they were treated with humanity, and as well provided for as they had reason to expect.

Knowing that an opinion was entertained by some that persons were supported in the Alms house, who were not fit objects for such an Assylum, our attention was particularly turned to this subject ; but we could not perceive that a single person was there, as a pauper, who it was not obvious was properly considered as such. The increasing number of poor who must be supported by the Public Charity, and of Criminals, as well as the necessary augmentation of the Public Charges on those accounts are very naturally [283] beyond the expectation of those, who do not take into consideration that there is a proportionate increase of our population.

The Male & Female Hospitals, connected with the Alms House. deserve to be particularly noticed. The buildings appropriated to these uses are extremely well calculated to admit a free circulation of air, tho' they do not appear adapted to exclude either heat or cold when either is intense. Great attention appears to be paid to cleanliness as respects the rooms, the bedding and persons of the Patients. They seem to have all the advantages and comforts of competent nurses, proper food and medical aid. The Hospital Department of the Bridewell and Penitentiary is not so commodious, & does not, and probably need not afford the Patients the same comfort and advantages.

We think it our duty to call the attention of the Board particularly

to the situation of the female lunatics. They are now confined in that part of the building, from which the Male lunatics were lately removed, on account of the unfitness [284] of the apartments for their use. The only apartments which the Female lunatics have are small dark cells in the lower story of the eastern extremity of the Penitentiary, & a narrow gloomy passage which forms the entry to these cells. At the entrance of their Apartments are sinks, which receive the filth of a part of the upper stories, and from which the most offensive smells frequently arise. It is certain that these unfortunate Women who become Tenants of this Mansion thro' calamity are more comfortless than any confined in the buildings as a punishment for their crimes.

We beg earnestly to recommend to the consideration of the Board, the situation of the Children who are in the Penitentiary & Bridewell. There are now sixteen boys of from ten to sixteen years of age confined as felons. They have lately been in some degree separated from the Adult Convicts, and measures have been taken to give them instruction, but the benevolent intentions of the Board are as yet, very imperfectly executed. The Boys are not kept entirely apart, [285] The Buildings do not admit of their being so, without a sacrifice of more room than can be spared. At night they are shut up in cells by themselves, but in the day they mix with other convicts. Who are necessarily admitted into the same hall, While this is the case, it is in vain to expect that a Sentence condemning a child to the Penitentiary will have any beneficial effect, in his morals, on the contrary it is probable that his vicious inclinations will be strengthened by association with experienced Villains.

The Members of the Board, who are Judges of the Criminal Court, must often have felt how difficult it is, satisfactorily to dispose of these young culprits: if they are suffered to escape with a light punishment, they are sure to be presented at the Bar again, and very often it is evident that they are encouraged by, or made the instrument of older rogues. The Jury, as well as the Court, feel a reluctance to convict & condemn them, when it is believed that the infliction of punishment, by confinement in the Penitentiary, will tend to harden them in vice. [286] If they could be effectually secluded and be instructed, there would be room to hope that imprisonment would sometimes produce reformation. In that case a confinement of some length might be considered as a less punishment than a shorter one. It would often be a service to the Young Vagabonds who prowl about our streets in idleness and ignorance, to place them where they would be for some time rescued from both.



If a building were to be erected capable of accomodating fifty boys—their keepers, instructors &c: with a School room below and sleeping apartments above, it would be attended with the most beneficial effects. The Ground lately added to the Establishment would afford ample room for such a building. We understand it might be erected for a Thousand Dollars and we think that sum could not be better employed.

It is due to the Reverend Mr Sandford to mention the satisfaction with which we witnessed the good effects of his humane and [287] pious labours. The School for convicts is under his superintendence. The progress of the boys in reading and in their moral lessons *his* evidence of his abilities and attention. We were present at his performance of divine service in the Hall of the Female Convicts and witnessed the impression made by his exhortations and prayers on the feelings of many of the unhappy beings he addressed. We are persuaded that Mr Sanford is well deserving such countenance and support as will induce him to continue his exertions to ameliorate the condition of the poor wretches, to whom he devotes so much of his time and pains.

The City Inspector presented the following Report on Lot N<sup>o</sup> 1110 Bayards farm

"The City Inspector respectfully reports on the Lot fronting on Orange Street N<sup>o</sup> 1110 as deliniated on Bayards Map.

That John Gardner was ordinated on the 12<sup>th</sup> of April last to fill in said Lot, his Agent, however called at the Office and satisfied [306] the City Inspector that M<sup>r</sup> Gardner was not the Owner—he owned N<sup>o</sup> 1109, and complained that his Earth fell into N<sup>o</sup> 1110. On the said 12<sup>th</sup> of April Lots numbered 1111, 1112 and 1113 as above deliniated—W<sup>m</sup> Bayard, Owner—were also ordinated and complied with. M<sup>r</sup> Jarvis called at the Office shortly after and stated that the Lot N<sup>o</sup> 1110. had no owner, that it had been sold for non payment of taxes for a certain period of years, which period had expired about Two Years ago. Under these circumstances the City Inspector presented the Report of the 17<sup>th</sup> of May Ult—inasmuch as M<sup>r</sup> Jarvis complained that M<sup>r</sup> Bayards Earth also fell into the Lot N<sup>o</sup> 1110. Upon the return of his report the City Inspector called on M<sup>r</sup> Jarvis and on examination he found that the Lot N<sup>o</sup> 1110 was sold to Hector Scott as Agent for Nich<sup>s</sup> S. Bayard on the 27<sup>th</sup> of June 1811 for the space of 13 Years—so that there are nearly five Years of the lease unexpired but the same difficulties arise, as M<sup>r</sup> Scott [307] lives in Baltimore and M<sup>r</sup> Bayard in Georgia M<sup>r</sup> Jarvis farther stated that the said Lot is again to be sold for the Canal and other Taxes unpaid.



The City Inspector cannot see any difficulty in the Board's abating the Nuisance and incorporating the expense arising therefrom with the unpaid taxes—he has not been able to find any Law or precedent for posting an Ordinance on or near the Premises; He nevertheless presents an Ordinance at a short date for that purpose—should the Board recommend the Measure.

The Special Committee to whom was referred the Petition of certain Persons relative to Assessment for widening & extending Harman Street, presented a Report—Mr Stevens presented a Resolution explanatory of the Resolution proposed by the Committee [308] in their Report both of which were read & laid for consideration

The Police Committee to whom had been referred sundry Petitions presented the following Report

Respectfully Report

That the above Petitions respectively have been duly considered by the Committee. That they are satisfied that if any violation of the Ordinance of this Board has [309] taken place in the case of Mr Smith, above named, it was owing to the obstinacy of the Sawyer employed to saw the Wood, and not from any negligence on the part of Mr Smith who it appeared had provided himself with a Curb as required by the said Ordinance & had ordered the same to be used.

In relation to Mess<sup>rs</sup> Martinot & Roe it appeared that they caused the Straw to be removed from the Street immediately after they were notified.

Mr Colvin has satisfied the Committee that his statement is correct and that the Rates were taken from his Carriage by the Passenger who last occupied it, and that there was not any intention on his part to violate or evade any Ordinance of this Corporation.

In relation to Mr Lyon and Mr Goold it appeared that they were waiting at the Stand in the morning until the Office of the Clerk of

this Board was opened, that they might renew the rates for their respective Carriages which had been taken down the night [310] previous by some persons unknown to them and that while so waiting their respective Carriages were examined by the Officer. Your Committee are aware that the cases above mentioned relative to the Hackney Coaches require the strictest attention, and ought not to receive the least indulgence from this Board, without good and sufficient reasons are assigned. They have considered the above cases under these impressions and are induced to believe the Petitioners entitled to relief.

That in relation to the Petition of John Cannon, they are satisfied that Mr Cannon has had a fair and impartial trial and that relief ought not to be granted.

Mr Roff admits his screening Lime in the Street contrary to an Ordinance of this Board, and the reasons assigned by him for so doing are not satisfactory to the Committee.

Thomas Zabriskie has not satisfied Your Committee that there was sufficient [311] cause for leaving his Hack.

That in relation to the Petition of W<sup>m</sup> Brown and others inhabitants of Carmine Street; praying that this Corporation will prevent the erection of a Starch Manufactory in that Neighbourhood. Your Committee are of opinion that this Board ought not to interfere. If the Petitioners feel themselves aggrieved and are satisfied that the intended Manufactory will prove a Nuisance they have the right and ought to apply to the Grand Jury, and have the same indicted.

Your Committee beg leave to offer the following Resolutions

Resolved, that the prayer of the respective Petitions of Abraham L. Smith—Martinot & Roe Andrew Colvin—John S. Goold—David Lyon—& Lawrence Anderson be granted on the payment of costs.

Resolved, that the prayer of the respective petitions of John Cannon—Henry Roff—Thomas Zabriskie & William Brown and others ought not to be granted.

the necessary inquiry and are of the opinion that the Petitioner is a proper person to receive that appointment. And ask leave to offer the following Resolution.

The Canal Committee presented the following Report on the subject of the sewers to be constructed on Thompson, Chapel & Collect Streets,

"The Committee on Canal Street beg leave to make the following Report on the subject of the Sewers to be constructed on Thompson, Chapel & Collect Streets as part of the plan heretofore recommended for the regulation of Canal Street.

That they have carefully examined the said streets and find that to get a sufficient descent for the said Sewers, and at the same time extend them so as to bury their heads below the surface of the Streets; The Sewer in Thompson Street will have to be extended One hundred & fifty feet North of Broome Street. That the Sewer in Chapel Street will have to be extended to within One hundred feet of Leonard Street & that the sewer in Collect Street will have to be extended to within fifty feet of Leonard Street: [314] That in order to ascertain the sense of the Owners of property on said Street in relation to said Sewers, Your Committee some time since directed the Street Commissioner to advertise the same. A Remonstrance from some of the Proprietors on Chapel Street was in consequence presented to the board and which was referred to the Canal Committee.

Your Committee have given the same that deliberate consideration which it is entitled to, coming from those who will have to pay a part of the expenses: The objections set forth in this remonstrance are—"that the street is already regulated and paved, that it will subject them to a very heavy additional expense for what they term a doubtful experiment—On the subject of expense Your Committee would remark that although the expenses will be very heavy in consequence of the Streets being already regulated & paved, yet they firmly believe that the property on the Street would be [315] benefitted far beyond the Assessment it would be subjected to; that in place of a muddy, wet street flooded by every rain, with wet cellars; they would have a hand-

some dry street, with dry cellars—the Sewer on Chapel Street being indispensably necessary as a branch of the one in Canal Street, the only question is how far it ought to extend, it is the decided opinion of the Committee that it ought to be extended at least so far as to bury it under the Street which it will do by continuing it to within One hundred feet of Leonard Street; it is also the opinion of the Committee that this sewer ought to be completed this Season.

Your Committee have also received a remonstrance from a number of the proprietors of lots of Ground on Collect Street objecting to building a Sewer on that Street at present it having been lately filled in on a muddy bottom and has not as yet had sufficient time to settle—The Committee are well satisfied that these reasons are well founded [316] and that the building of the Sewer in that Street ought to be postponed, at the same time they think it necessary that the distance it is to extend ought now to be determined, it is also the opinion of the Committee that it is not necessary that the sewer for Thompson Street should be commenced at present—but that the distance it is to extend ought to be determined—In order to carry the subjects herein recommended into effect, the Committee recommend the adoption of the following Resolutions.

Resolved, that the Sewer to be built in Chapel Street extend from Canal Street to within 100 feet of Leonard Street; that the Sewer to be built in Thompson Street extend from Canal Street to 150 feet North of Broome Street: and that the sewer to be built in Collect Street, extend to within 50 feet of Leonard Street and that the Street Commissioner prepare the necessary plans for the same.

Resolved that the Street Commissioner [317] under the directions of the Canal Committee take the necessary measures for building the sewer in Chapel Street and for repaving and regulating the Street, that the same be done by contract—to be paid for when the Assessments shall be collected.

[318] "The special Committee appointed to inquire & ascertain if any alteration was necessary in the level of Grand Street and to whom was referred the Petition of Owners & Occupants of Lots in that Street praying that an order might be issued for paving it

Respectfully Report, that they have viewed the said Street with particular attention and acquired all the information in their power to attain in relation to it. They learn that there has already been more than one expensive regulation of this Street and that the Proprietors had as they thought good reason to believe that the last would have been permanent. With this view of the subject and believing that the present level is not objectionable but that the ascent is moderate and not too great to allow an easy passage for loaded carts. Your Committee are of opinion that no alteration ought to be made in the level of said Street unless it be at the expense of owners of Lots on Streets in the vicinity who [319] may think it will be a material benefit to them. They therefore present the following Resolution.

Resolved that it is inexpedient at present to make any alteration in the level of Grand Street.

The Minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

His Honor the Mayor laid before the Board the Kalendar of persons confined in Bridewell reported by the Keeper with the following [326] observations thereon:

"From the foregoing return it appears that there were on the 19<sup>th</sup> of the present month 74 persons confined in the City prison: of these 3 are charged with Burglary

2 with Forgery

4 with grand Larceny. All these are indicted.

13 with Petit Larceny—8 of whom have been indicted and convicted. Several of the others are indicted but the trials have been postponed.

23 with Assault and Battery of whom 4 are indicted, 3 convicted and several of the others have been discharged since the return.

3 convicted of keeping disorderly houses.

5 charged as disorderly persons by the Police Office. 3 of them are sentenced as Vagrants by the Magistrates of the Police.

14 sentenced by the Police Office as Vagrants.

1 charged with an Assault and Battery with an intent to rob.

1 indicted for an attempt to commit Sodomy.

[327] 1 charged with a Highway Robbery.

1 indicted for perjury.

1 charged with Bastardy.

1 stopping a person in the night.

1 for examination.

Of these 30 are under sentence and ten are indicted. The remaining Thirty four cases were not disposed of or even taken up by the

Grand Jury because the papers which relate to them were not sent up from the Police Office, under an impression which the Justices had that after the Sessions commenced they were bound by law to refer all cases that might subsequently arise to the then next session. This error which *which* might subject persons charged with the most trifling offence to an imprisonment of several weeks has been pointed out and will be corrected. The business done at the last Session was less than usual owing to the Court having been necessarily suspended during two days of the term, and for this reason an unusual number of indictments remain untried.

A Letter from the Reverend Mr. Stanford transmitting to each Member of the Board a Copy of the Catechism composed by him for the use of the Children of the Alms' House and the Penitentiary which had been directed by the Common Council to be printed, was read & directed to be filed.

Petitions of John Wagner & John C. Cheesman offering themselves as Candidates for the office of Visiting Physician of the Alms' House in place of Dr. B. Akerly resigned, were read and referred to the Committee on Applications.

A Letter was received addressed to his Honor the Mayor from M. M. Noah, Printer to the Corporation, complaining that the Committee to whom had been referred the subject of printing the Charter had [329] given the work to another Printer which he considered an infringement of his rights under the Resolution of the Board which appointed him their printer. The same having been read was laid for consideration. It was afterwards called up, when Mr. Stevens, Chairman of the Committee to whom the subject of printing the Charter had been referred, presented Two Letters which he had received from Mr. Noah. After some discussion Alderman King moved that Mr. Noah have leave to withdraw his petition. The question being taken thereon it passed in the negative. It was then directed that the same be laid on the Table.

A Petition of William DeGraw for Stall No. 1 Grand Street Market; of Jonathan Weldt for Stall No. 40 Fly Market; of Elizabeth Brewer to rent the Cellar under the Washington Market lately held by Mr. Westervelt, and a complaint by the persons licensed to retail vegetables in the Fly Market that unlicensed persons (others than Farmers and Gardeners.) [330] are in the practice of forestalling the Market

and vending vegetables, which is injurious to the Citizens and to the persons who hold regular licences and praying that such persons may be restrained in future, were severally read & referred to the Market Committee.

A petition from Claudius G. Fontaine for remission of penalty recovered against him for selling goods by auction in the Street was read and leave given to petitioner to withdraw his petition.

A petition of James Oakley to be permitted to break ground and construct an Area at No. 114 Liberty Street was read and referred to the Alderman & Assistant of the First Ward with authority to grant the prayer of the petitioner.

A petition of Samuel Lloyd to be employed in making out the Jury List was [331] read and referred to the Committee on that subject.

A petition of Sarah Baker to be relieved from a judgment recovered against her for not reporting a Sick Boarder to the Health Officer was read and referred to the Committee of Charity.

A petition for a Well corner of Catharine and Henry Streets was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Ward and Street Commissioner to report an Ordinance therefor.

A petition of John Sleep, a native of Great Britain, praying pecuniary aid to enable him to return to the country of his Birth, was read and referred to the Commissioners of the Alms' House.

A petition of George Seaman for an appointment as a Measurer of Lime was read and referred to the Committee on Applications.

[332] A Memorial was received from James Edmonstone stating that the vacant grounds belonging to the Corporation in the vicinity of the City might with small expence be brought into culture and made very productive and offering his services for that purpose, was read and referred to the Committee on Public Lands and Places.

A petition of Frederick Ridabock a Fireman belonging to Fire Engine Company No. 24 stating that from some mistake by the former Clerk of the Common Council his appointment as a Fireman had not been entered on the minutes & though he had served the period prescribed by law yet he was not able to procure the necessary Certificate from the present Clerk for his discharge and praying relief. Which was read and referred to the Committee on the Fire Department.

[333] A petition of William S. Smith for permission to construct a vault in front of No. 83 Duane Street and a similar petition from Lucas and Riley for a vault in front of No. 27 and part of No. 25 Cliff Street, also a petition of Moses Dodd for a vault in Pearl Street

were severally read and granted on the usual terms and under direction of the Street Commissioner.

A petition of John Peterson praying time for payment of an Assessment laid on him for opening Anthony Street was read and leave given petitioner to withdraw his petition.

A petition of James B. Demarest praying repayment of an Arrearage of Tax in the Eighth Ward which he had paid to the Collector but which he lately discovered had been previously paid was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

A Memorial was presented from Abijah Hammond [334] proposing to convey to the Corporation for the purpose of a scite for a market Lot No. 1 being one of Four Blocks or lots of ground at Greenwich between Washington and West Streets, north of and adjoining to the line of the State Prison ground as designated on a map accompanying said memorial—he in consideration therefor to receive a grant of the right to the Water as far as West Street in front of the 3 lots Nos. 2. 3. 4. which was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

A farther petition was presented from George Robertson stating that the Committee to whom his former petition had been referred reported that a compensation was to be made to him for his lot by the Hebrew Society whereas it appears said Society received no benefit thereby, and urging that as his property was taken for public purposes the public should see that justice was done to him: which [335] being read was referred to the Street Commissioner and Counsel.

A petition from William Ferdon for remission of fine under Law respecting Carmen was read and referred to the Committee of Charity.

A petition of Le Grand Jarvis was received stating that he had executed a correct and accurate Map of the Sixth Ward for which if considered of utility to the public he would be satisfied with a reasonable compensation. The said petition was accompanied with a certificate from the Assessors of the 6<sup>th</sup> Ward stating that in their late Assessment they had tested the accuracy of said Map and had found great advantages from the same. Whereupon the petition was referred to the Finance Committee.

The Street Commissioner presented the following Assessments which were confirmed [336] and Collectors appointed on each. Viz

For regulating and paving Anthony Street and also Little Water Street and for repaving the Bowery from Chatham Square to Grand Street and Morris De Camp was appointed Collector; for repaving Orchard Street near North Street, for a Well and pump in Lombardy

Street near Corlaer Street and for regulating First Street from the Bowery to the First Avenue and John G. Betts was appointed Collector in each.

He also presented the following Ordinances which were passed and Assessors appointed therein: Viz—for regulating and paving Chamber Street from Washington to West Street and for regulating and paving Warren Street from Washington to West Street and Jacob C. Mott, Abraham Baudouine and John Brower were appointed Assessors, and for regulating and paving Liberty Street from Greenwich Street to [337] West Street and John Targee, Abraham Bloodgood and John Brown[er] were appointed Assessors therein.

The following person was appointed Fireman, the Chief Engineer certifying the vacancy:

“ Fire Engine Company No. 22.”

Michael Degroff, Ship Joiner, Division St. 7 ward vice Dougal McMichael, discharged.

The Attorney presented the following Report of complaints made to him: Viz. against Walter Bowne for not complying with an Ordinance for filling in a lot; against the Street Contractors on ten sundry complaints against them; against John L. Riker and Samuel Fitch for leaving their vaults open without a curb round the same; against John G. Respectfully make the following Report

We devoted the whole of Monday the 19<sup>th</sup> Instant to the examination of those highly important Public Institutions, and found the apartments in as good order and generally as free from filth and offensive smells as could reasonably be expected and the Persons who reside or are confined in them clean and orderly. In justice to the Gentlemen at the head of both establishments we must add that they received no previous intimation of our intended visit.

The Children in the Alms house and the Boys in the Penitentiary appear to have been much benefited by the instruction they have received, the writing of some of the Boys in the Alms House proves that they possess talent, and that their teachers have not been inattentive to the discharge of their duty. We particularly examined the Kitchen, Bake, [358] and Wash houses and found them in perfect order. The Manufactories are also in good order and apparently well conducted, on the limited Scale to which it is thought prudent now to confine them.

The Female Maniacs are still confined in the low uncomfortable situation described by their honours the Mayor and Recorder in the last Monthly Report, it however appears to us that the keeper does every thing in his power to have their apartments kept as well aired and clean as possible, and we were pleased to find that most of these unfortunate women are sometimes permitted to walk in the Yard.

There were about One hundred Convicts at work on the third Avenue, their appearance and deportment gave us great satisfaction instead of the squalid, emaciated Wretches that appear on trial in our Courts for offences against the Laws, it gave us pleasure to see clean, healthy, robust Men most of whom were labouring without apparent reluctance.

We cannot refrain from expressing our entire approbation of this mode of employing the unfortunate Men whose Crimes or Misdemeanors, subject them to exclusion from the more virtuous part of the Community.

Staples stating that the House N<sup>o</sup> 34 Hudson Street the property of his infant daughter is advertised for Sale on the 10<sup>th</sup> for non payment of Assessment for opening [371] Hudson Street to amt of \$309  $2\frac{8}{100}$ —that an application to authorise the Sale of same is now depending in the Court of Chancery, that the present intended Sale would generally depress the value of said property and praying time may be given to the first of November for paying of the Assessment. A Petition from Elizabeth Ruckle stating that a Lot corner of Duane and Hudson Street was advertised for Sale by the Street Commissioner on the 10<sup>th</sup> inst for Non payment of Canal Street Assessment—that the same is the property of her infant Children and that an order has lately been obtained from the Court of Chancery by the Guardians for sale of same & praying farther time to make payment of the Assessment due—Also a Petition of Elisabeth Evertson stating that a small house and Lot in Thompson Street near Broome Street was advertised for sale for non payment of Assessment thereon and praying further time for [372] payment—and a Petition from James Riker for farther time to pay an Assessment

laid on him for opening Hudson Street were severally read and referred to the Finance Committee and the Street Commissioner was directed to delay the sales of the foregoing property until the further order of the Board.

A Letter from John Nitchie Esq<sup>r</sup> to the Clerk transmitting a Copy of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Report of the American Bible Society for each of the members of the Common Council & their Officers was read and the Clerk was directed to acknowledge the Receipt of the Same and to present the thanks of the Common Council for this mark of attention.

A Petition of Schuyler Baxter for release of a Judgement recovered against him for violating an Ordinance of the Corporation was read and referred [373] to the Committee of Charity.

A Petition of Edward Hitchcock Lessee of Public Wharves stating that the Bridge or Stairs at Whitehall had been carried away by the late storm and praying it may be repaired was read and referred to the Committee on Wharves Piers & Slips.

A Complaint of sundry Inhabitants of Greenwich Village of being much annoyed by certain persons of color practising as Musicians with Drums and other instruments through the Village was read and referred to the Committee on Police.

A Petition of John Givan for permission to construct a Vault in Cedar Street was read and granted on the usual terms under the direction of the Street Commissioner.

A Petition of John Sutton [374] Master of French Ship L'Eugenie was presented stating—that he was engaged at Antwerp by a Company denominated the Swiss Colonization Society to take a number of Passengers intended to make a Settlement on the Illinois or Missouri Territory—that he was engaged to land said Passengers at Amboy in New Jersey—that unacquainted with this Country he was informed Amboy was contiguous to and in the waters of the Hudson of New York that he accordingly came into the Port of New York but without landing any of his passengers proceeded directly to Amboy where he landed the Passengers and their Baggage the whole of whom have no intention of coming to this State but have made contracts for lands in the Missouri & Illinois Territory—that after landing said Passengers at Amboy he came to this City and has been prosecuted for violation of the Law respecting [375] Alien Passengers and praying relief

Whereupon the same was referred to the Police Committee with authority to remit the Penalty if in their Judgement proper.

A Petition of Michael Larkin for remission of fine for selling

Liquor without License was read & referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

A Petition of Benjamin Weaver for remission of fine incurred for keeping Hogs within his yard upon which he was imprisoned—was read & referred to the Committee on Public Offices with power to remit the fine if they judged it expedient.

A Petition of Arnold J. D. Bowser praying release from a judgment obtained against him for casting offensive substances in the Street and on which he was in Prison was referred to same Committee with like powers.

[376] A Remonstrance from a number of Freeholders and Inhabitants against the proposed widening of Frankfort Street between William Street & Chatham Street was read & referred to the Street Committee and Street Commissioner.

A Petition of Charles McCarthy was presented stating that he is Lessee under the Corporation of certain Ground in Cherry Street—that an Encroachment was made on his Lot by an adjoining Tenent holding under the Corporation, that he heretofore made complaint to the Corporation of said encroachment, and was directed to have recourse to legal remedies therefore, but was deterred from the same by the expence and trouble thereof—that he understands that the Corporation are or will be in possession of the said adjoining Lot and he now prays relief—Whereupon the same was referred to the Alderman & Assistant of 4<sup>th</sup> Ward.

[377] A Remonstrance of William Lawrence and others Proprietors of Ground and of Water Lots situate between Dover Street and Roosevelt Street remonstrating against an Ordinance of the Corporation of the 28<sup>th</sup> of June last ordering the owners & Occupants of Lots of Ground under Water fronting on South Street between Dover and Roosevelt Street to cause a Bulkhead to be made on the most Southerly line of South Street and praying on account of the extreme pressure of the times and as the said measure is not required for public convenience that the said Ordinance may be repealed was read & referred to the Committee on Wharves Piers & Slips.

A Petition from sundry Inhabitants was received stating that there are two small markets at the Lower end of Grand Street—One of which is sufficient for the accomodation of the Inhabitants and praying that the old one or one first erected may be [378] removed—was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Memorial from Sundry Inhabitants complaining of a large de-



posit of Manure at the foot of Pelham Street highly offensive to the Neighbourhood was read & referred to the City Inspector.

A Petition for a Well near the corner of Market and Banker Street was read & referred to the Alderman and Assistant of Ward & Street Commissioner to report an Ordinance therefor.

A Memorial from the President and Directors of the Manhattan Company praying extension of time for filling up certain Lots of Ground on Bleecker Street bounded by Mercer and Greene Streets was read and time extended to 1<sup>st</sup> November next.

[379] A Petition of W<sup>m</sup> G. Ward to be appointed a City Weigher was read and referred to the Committee on Applications.

A Petition for extending the limits of Greenwich Market was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition that Ludlow Street between Grand & De Lancy Street may be paved was referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition of James Trivett was received stating that he has obtained a License for carrying on the trade or business of a Pawnbroker and Dealer in second articles—that neither his License nor as he understands the Law on that subject restricts him to carry on said business at one place only—That he has been prosecuted by the Attorney of the Corporation for exercising said business at more than one place and praying said suit may be [380] withdrawn—Whereupon the same was referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

"That circumstances unavoidable have prevented Joshua Jones and his Associates from carrying into effect the [387] Resolutions of this Board relative to the building of the piers at the foot of Vesey & Barclay Streets. Mr. Jones on his part has always been ready to perform his share of the contemplated work but owing to the severe indisposition of Mr. Burger and the refusal of one of the parties to join in the expence the business is at present suspended. Mr. Jones however proposes, with the permission of the Board, to join with the Corporation in building the pier at the foot of Vesey Street conformably to the Resolution passed the 14<sup>th</sup> of June last, provided he may be permitted to extend the sunken block in front of his property one block and one bridge in the River.

"The Committee are of opinion that the building of the pier at the foot of Vesey Street is the most important part of the whole plan as it completes a convenient and spacious slip between Fulton & Vesey Streets in the immediate vicinity of the Washington Market and will add much [388] to the general accommodation of that part of the City, and is at the same time the most economical method of effecting the object that can be adopted. They therefore propose the following Resolutions:

"Resolved that on Joshua Jones's complying with the terms of a Resolution of this Board passed the 14<sup>th</sup> of June last so far as relates to the pier at the foot of Vesey Street the Street Commissioner be instructed to contract for said pier agreeably to said Resolution.

Whatever may have been the causes for delay in carrying into effect this tribute of respect to a gallant officer your Committee are of opinion that no censure ought to rest on the

members of this Board who, your Committee are persuaded, entertain a high sense of the services rendered and the intrepidity & skill displayed by the brave men who fought and bled in defence of the injured rights of our country during the late war, and who therefore could not have refused this meed of approbation had they been apprized of its non-performance. The Committee have no doubt, therefore, that the Board will accord with them in opinion that it is both expedient and proper to fulfil as soon as practicable the pledge given by their Predecessors and they offer the following Resolution accordingly:

"Resolved that the Committee on Finance be instructed to present to the widow of the late Captain James Lawrence [392] a piece of plate with suitable devices and inscriptions indicative of the gallantry and skill of her late husband in the capture of the British Sloop of war Peacock by the American Sloop Hornet under his command, agreeably to a Resolution of the Common Council passed the 29<sup>th</sup> day of March 1813."

Furman Esqr. and that there are about 22 acres on the middle Road which is used as pasture for the cows belonging to the Alms' house and Penitentiary. This being all the property your Committee know of that could be benefitted by the skill and ability of Mr. Edmonstone, and as the policy of taking the paupers and convicts at any time from under the control and superintendence of the proper Officers would be extremely questionable, they therefore beg leave to present the following Resolution:

The Report of the Special Committee to whom had been referred the petition of certain persons relative to the Assessment for widening and extending Harman Street, which was presented on the 12<sup>th</sup> of July last and laid for consideration, was now called up and being read was amended & the Resolutions adopted in the words following:

“That from the representations of the agents of those interested in this improvement it appears to be the general wish of all the parties that the Assessment made by the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment should be set aside and that new Commissioners should be appointed. The agent for the Rutgers’ family has offered in their behalf to enter into covenants [398] for paying all Assessments which may be laid upon property which was leased by them prior to the 1<sup>st</sup> day of January 1813, provided the tenants agree to add the interest of their assessments to their rents. At the time last mentioned the members of that family entered into mutual covenants to relinquish (as soon as their leases should fall in) so much of their ground as might be necessary to make all their streets 60 feet wide. All leases subsequent to that time contain very explicit covenants that the tenants shall pay all Assessments for improving streets. With respect to such of the lots fronting on Harman Street as belonged to the Estate of Mary McCrea they were devised by her to the executors of her will upon certain trusts and the executors do not possess the power of making any arrangements with their tenants. One of them however (Mr. Crosby) has given the Committee assurances that they will petition the Legislature for power to make [399] similar arrangements with respect to lots belonging to that estate and that upon their being so empowered they will make arrangements accordingly.

“With respect to the expences of the last Assessment the Counsel



of the Board & some of the Commissioners of Estimate & Assessment have been consulted and they unite in opinion that those expences can be included in a new Assessment. Under these circumstances the Committee recommend the adoption of the following Resolution: Viz.

"Resolved that upon the members of the Rutgers' family entering into covenants to pay all Assessments for widening & extending Harman Street which may be laid upon lots leased by them prior to the first day of January 1817—provided the tenants will agree to add the interest of the same to their rents, that the Counsel of the Board be directed to take the necessary measures for the appointment of new Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment for widening and extending [400] Harman Street in the manner heretofore directed."

The minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

A petition was presented from sundry owners situated in Collect Street stating that they understand a remonstrance [407] has been made against extending the Canal across to Leonard Street in consequence of the ground not being sufficiently settled: that they are of opinion the ground is sufficiently settled and therefore pray the said Canal may be extended this season across Franklin Street. Whereupon the same was referred to the Canal Committee.

A Memorial was received from Garritt Sickels, keeper of the City Prison or Bridewell, stating that by a late regulation of the Court of Exchequer he is deprived of the fees attached to his office & praying relief: which was referred to the Board of Supervisors.

A Letter was received from Classon Martin resigning his appointment of Assistant Keeper in the Penitentiary. Whereupon Resolved that said resignation be accepted.

A Petition was received from Thomas Lusk praying the appointment of Assistant Keeper to the Penitentiary: which being read [408] Resolved that the prayer of the petitioner be granted and he was appointed to said office accordingly.

A petition of Joseph Madden to be relieved from a penalty incurred by keeping a dog without having him registered—and similar petitions from Edward Rerigan and John C. Teale were read & referred to the Committee on Public Offices with authority to remit the penalty incurred.

A Remonstrance from a number of Inhabitants against the removal of a pump from the corner of Market & Banker Sts. was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the 7<sup>th</sup> Ward

A petition from John Whitaker for remission of fine incurred by driving a Hackney Carriage without a licence was read and referred to the Police Committee.

[409] A petition from William Matthews for further time for payment of an Assessment laid on him for opening Henry Street; a similar one from Samuel Ratcliff respecting an Assessment laid on him for opening Hudson Street; a similar one from Margaret Thomas for opening Oliver Street, and a request of John Charles for payment of an award made to him for damages incurred in opening Grand Street—were severally read and referred to the Finance Committee.

A petition that Essex Street be paved between Grand & Broome Streets was referred to the Street Committee.

A petition of James Riker complaining of an undue Assessment on his property for opening Hudson Street was presented and after several motions of reference was finally referred to the Committee on Assessments.

A petition from sundry inhabitants of Thomas [410] Street complaining of the situation of a Well in said Street & praying its removal was read and referred to the Alderman & Assistant of the 5<sup>th</sup> Ward.

Owen were read and referred to the Committee on Public Offices. Street and from Henry to Christopher Street be paved was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A Representation that the Cellar under Duane Market kept by Mrs. Lounsberry [411] was kept in good order was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A petition from owners in and about Laurens Street that a Drain from Canal to Broome Street be constructed was read and referred to the Canal Committee.

A Memorial from sundry owners of lots residing at Greenwich, praying that the regulations respecting the Sewer and other improvements may on account of the great pressure of the times be for the present delayed, was read and referred to the Canal Committee. The same Committee were however authorised to proceed on the contract made respecting the Sewer if they should deem it necessary & expedient.

The Street Commissioner presented Assessments for paving Greenwich Street from Watts to Spring Street and for paving Hudson Street from Beach to Canal St. which were confirmed and John G. Betts was appointed Collector in each.

He also presented a Return of Delinquents [419] on the following Assessments and warrants were ordered to issue to Noah Jarvis for collecting the same—Viz.

for widening Grand Street,  
for opening the Sixth Avenue,  
for paving Leonard Street, and  
for a Well & Pump in Essex Street.

He also presented the following Ordinances—which were passed: Viz. for regulating & paving Elm Street from Canal to Hester Street, and for regulating & paving Rynder Street between Canal & Hester Streets, and John Targee, Abraham Bloodgood & Benjamin Crane were appointed Assessors: Also for building a Sewer in Clarkson Street, Carmine Street & Sixth Avenue to within 500 feet of Greenwich Lane: also for building a circular Culvert or Sewer in Amity Street from the intended Sewer in the 6<sup>th</sup> Avenue to the Manetta Ditch or so far as to receive the Manhattan Water, and Jonathan Thompson, Henry Howard and Ezekiel Bishop were appointed Assessors: also for regulating [420] and paving Ludlow Street from

Delancey to Grand Street and John Brown[er], Abraham Baudouine and Haviland Weeks were appointed Assessors.

The Special Committee to whom was referred the memorial of John, Robert and Samuel Swartwout, Reported:

“That the Memorialists a few years ago purchased about 4000 acres of Salt Marsh situate in the State of New Jersey but in the vicinity of this City: that they have since with immense labor and with great expence by means of embankments and ditches succeeded in draining & reclaiming a large portion of this marsh and rendered it fit for arable, meadow, pasture and garden ground:

“That as the memorialists state (and the Committee have no doubt of their accuracy) they have made about  $7\frac{1}{2}$  miles of embankment and 120 miles of ditch and have expended upwards of One hun- [421] dred and fifty thousand Dollars.

“The memorialists pressed with the burthen of this expence and unable without assistance to proceed with their operations apply to this Corporation for aid, not by any loan of money but by creating and loaning to them 6 per cent Stock of the Corporation to the amount of One hundred & twenty thousand Dollars, and they offer to give satisfactory security for the punctual payment of the interest and for the eventual redemption of the Stock.

“The Committee have considered as well the reasons which have been offered by the Messrs. Swartwouts as those which seem to render it inexpedient to comply with their request.

“It is well known that the quantity of fertile land in the immediate vicinity of this City is remarkably small. Our Markets are supplied with vegetables almost wholly from the west end of Long Island and from a very few spots on the Jersey shore. Our hay is principally brought from a distance and few Cattle [422] are fattened for our consumption except in distant pastures. The milk, too, which is used in the City is produced by cows kept in the City itself or its suburbs or else within a very limited tract in its neighbourhood. It therefore requires no argument to shew that a considerable increase of land suited to all these purposes would be an acquisition of great public importance. More gardens would lower the price of vegetables. More meadows would diminish the price of hay. A large addition to the pastures within the circle of a few miles would reduce the expence of milk and have a beneficial influence on our meat market. Within a few miles of this City there exists a marsh of immense magnitude yielding in some parts a coarse hay of inferior quality and value and in others nothing but rushes and other useless plants. The Messrs.

Swartwouts have proved by actual experiment that the whole of this marsh may be converted into a fertile soil, at once valuable to the proprietor [423] and beneficial to the inhabitants of this City. But this successful experiment has been made at the expence of great anxiety and a large fortune.

“Your Committee would be afflicted should an undertaking so public-spirited and so useful terminate in loss to its projectors and discourage others from imitating their example: and if the Corporation could consistently with the duty which they owe to their constituents comply with the prayer of the memorial every member of the Committee would rejoice.

“But the debt of this Corporation already exceeds a million of dollars. The expensive improvements which it will probably be necessary to make will considerably increase it: and under such circumstances it would scarcely be discreet to augment it still farther by the addition of One hundred & twenty thousand dollars. It is true that this sum would eventually be repaid, but to throw stock to so large an amount into the market at the time when the Corporation [424] will be obliged to raise money for its own use must tend to depress the price of their stock and in some degree to impair their credit. There are other considerations which have weight. The Committee fear to set the example of lending money on the responsibility of this Corporation to so great an extent for the purpose of encouraging undertakings commenced not only, beyond the boundaries of the City but beyond those of the State. The promoting of such plans seems rather the province of the Legislature than of a local Corporation. The money of our citizens is intrusted to this body for local purposes: and tho’ the liberality of the inhabitants of New York will never suffer them to watch their representatives with a niggard jealousy in their expenditures for objects of public importance, yet it may be questioned whether they would be content to see a precedent established for grants of such magnitude in aid of projects carried on in other States and only indi- [425] rectly beneficial to themselves.

“Upon the whole the Committee tho’ feeling the most sincere desire for the success & prosperity of the Memorialists & their undertaking cannot recommend the granting of their request. They therefore respectfully propose the following Resolution:

“Resolved that this Board consider the undertaking of Messrs. John, Robert & Samuel Swartwout to drain the salt marshes in the neighbourhood of this City as one of public utility & feel an interest

in its success, but that it is not at present expedient to comply with the prayer of their Memorial."

The Committee consisting of the Alderman and Assistant of the 4<sup>th</sup> Ward, to whom was referred the petition of Charles McCarthy presented a Report which was read & referred back to the same Committee with the addition of the Counsel of the Board.

The Street Committee, to whom was referred the petition for and the remonstrance against widening Frankfort Street presented a report which was read and laid for consideration.

The Committee of Charity, on the petition [427] of William Ferdon, Reported:

"That from his extreme poverty they think him a fit object of relief. They offer the following Resolution:

"Resolved that the penalty recovered against William Ferdon for not having his proper number on his cart be remitted on payment of costs."

The Street Committee on the petition for paving Ludlow Street reported in favor of the same and the Street Commissioner presented an Ordinance therefor which was passed.

The Market Committee, to whom was referred the petition that the old market at the foot of Grand Street may be taken down, Reported:

"That the market alluded to is old [428] and out of repair, and that owing to its having been built long before the regulation of any of the Streets in its vicinity took place it is badly situated and stands in a part of the Street much too narrow for the purpose, which is the cause of inconvenience to those who pass it with Carriages and injurious to the provisions exposed there for sale: while the market erected a few rods nearer the East River is in good repair, having been built but a few years, is much more spacious, sufficiently elevated above the Street and stands in a space at least one third wider than the other. Your Committee are of opinion that one Market house is ample to accommodate the population of that part of the City, and therefore that the removal of the one required by the petitioners will not lessen the convenience while it will add to the improvement of the neighbourhood. They are therefore satisfied, having viewed the premises, that the prayer of the petitioners [429] ought to be granted and offer the following Resolutions accordingly:

"Resolved that the Street Commissioner be instructed to sell at public auction the old market house situated in Grand Street near Goerck Street with this condition that the same be removed and the Street filled and levelled on or before the 10<sup>th</sup> day of September next.

"Resolved that the Butchers who are licensed for stands in said Market be permitted to occupy stands in the Market near the River and that the Market Committee be instructed to designate such stands."

The Committee on Wharves, Piers and Slips to whom was referred the Memorial of William Lawrence & others in relation to completing [430] South Street from Dover to Roosevelt Street, Reported:

"That they are informed and believe that considerable inconvenience will be experienced by some of the memorialists should a compliance with the ordinance be insisted on, but they are nevertheless still of opinion that the improvement is both necessary and important to the public as well as indispensable to that part of the City, and no other inducement could operate with your Committee to recommend a postponement of the ordinance but a persuasion that some of the proprietors are so situated as to make it almost impossible to perform its

requirements by the time limited, and must therefore, unless the time is extended, be driven to the necessity of forfeiting their water grants and all right, title and interest therein.

"The following resolution is therefore offered for the consideration of the Board.

"Resolved that the time limited [431] by an ordinance of this Board for causing a bulkhead to be sunk and completed on the most southerly side of South Street between Dover and Roosevelt Streets passed the 28<sup>th</sup> of June 1819 be extended to the 1<sup>st</sup> day of August 1820; and that the time limited by said Ordinance for filling up the Street and lots with good and wholesome earth be extended to the 1<sup>st</sup> day of April 1821, and that the Street Commissioner be instructed to notify the owners and occupants of lots and ground under water fronting the premises accordingly."

The Canal Committee, on the request of the Contractors for payment of their third Instalment, Reported:

"That they have received the within application from the Contractors of the Sewer in Canal Street setting forth that they have completed [432] the same except the curbs and grates to the Culverts, which from the unregulated state of the Streets they are unable to finish, and that the Street may not be in a state to have the same completed for some weeks. They therefore ask for the payment of their third instalment to which they are entitled when the said Sewer is completed.

"The Committee are of opinion that the said Contractors are in justice entitled to their said third Instalment as the finishing of said culverts is owing to the unregulated state of the Street and that it would be unjust to keep them out of the said payment until the street was put in a state to have the same completed. To complete these culverts will cost from 2 to 3 hundred dollars and the Fourth Instalment, which is payable 60 days after the sewer is completed, is ample security for their completion. The Committee therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

"Resolved that the Finance Committee be directed to pay the contractors of the Sewer in Canal Street their third Instalment, provided



they receive the same in bonds payable when the assessment is collected with interest."

His Honor the Mayor informed the Board that he had called this Special meeting at the request of the Canal Committee who [440] wished to submit to the Board a remonstrance respecting the proposed Sewer in Clarkson & Carmine Streets and also their report on the subject.

A memorial was presented from sundry landholders and inhabitants of that part of Greenwich likely to be affected by the erection of a Common Sewer thro' Carmine and Clarkson Streets, stating that they have learnt with regret that an opposition has been made to the immediate execution of that work and praying that it may be immediately commenced, was read and laid on the table to be considered on the coming in of the report of the Canal Committee on that subject.

A Memorial from Lewis and Joseph Webb, stating that they have taken out Water grants in front of their lots on the North River and have filled in the Streets & erected bulkheads thereon, that the contemplated [441] Sewer thro' Clarkson Street will deprive them of the use of the water in front of their lots and will be extremely injurious to them, wherefore they request a Committee to be appointed to view the premises & report their case to the Board, was presented & referred to the Canal Committee.

A petition of David Crane to be relieved from a penalty incurred under the law against forestalling in the market was read and referred to the Committee of Charity with authority to remit the penalty.

A memorial from the Trustees of St. Philip's Church in Collect St. stating that they have erected a place of worship & a school house for the use of people of color, that they have been called upon for payment of an Assessment on the lots occupied by them for opening

Anthony Street, that they have no funds to discharge said assessment & praying to be relieved therefrom, was read. Whereupon the same was referred to the Finance Committee [442] and the Collector in the mean time directed to delay collection.

A memorial from the Fire & Marine Insurance Companies of the City, calling the attention of the Common Council to the situation of the Register's Office in the City and representing that from the manner it has heretofore been conducted it does not furnish in all cases the evidence of *of* actual and existing incumbrances on real estate while they often exhibit as such those which have been long satisfied and cancelled, stating also the great necessity of a correct general Index of the Records, was read and referred to the Committee on public Offices.

His Honor the Mayor presented the Kalendar of prisoners confined in the City prison or Bridewell on the 16<sup>th</sup> inst. as returned by the Keeper which was directed to be filed. The Mayor mentioned that upon his visits [443] to the Bridewell he always found it in a state of neatness and cleanliness which he believed was not surpassed by any similar institution.

A petition of Abraham Davis for time to pay an Assessment laid on Two lots of which he was lessee on Grand Street was read and referred to the Finance Committee and in the meantime the Collector was directed to delay the collection.

The Street Commissioner presented an Assessment for regulating McDougal Street from Bleecker Street to the grounds of John Ireland and for regulating Sullivan Street to the ground of John Ireland, which were confirmed and John G. Betts appointed Collector in each: Also an Assessment for repaving Division Street from the Bowery to Orchard Street, which was confirmed and Morris DeCamp appointed Collector.

[444] He also presented an Ordinance for a Well and pump in Bancker Street between Market and Pike Streets, which was passed and Abraham Baudouine, John Brower and Haviland Weeks were appointed Assessors.

The Canal Committee, to whom had been referred the petition of a number of the owners of property in the vicinity of the Common Sewer intended to be made thro' Clarkson & Carmine Streets & part of the 6<sup>th</sup> Avenue praying that the building of the said Sewer may be suspended, reported:

"That altho' the said petition was referred to them with powers to proceed with the said work if after considering the objections of the said petitioners the Committee should deem it proper so to do, but

as there is a difference of opinion in the Committee as to the propriety of proceeding and as it is a question of considerable importance on account of the heavy Assessment to which it will subject the property [445] deemed to be benefitted, and as the petitioners are the owners of a considerable part of this property the Committee think it a question proper to be submitted to the Board for their determination.

"Among the objections urged by the petitioners against proceeding with the work the following are the most prominent: That the distressed state of our commercial affairs and the total stagnation of business has rendered money so scarce that it would be oppressive to most of the owners of land to raise wherewith to pay the Assessment, that many of them would be compelled to dispose of their property which under present circumstances would not bring one half of its value: That the state of improvements in that neighbourhood does not require that the said Sewer should be immediately built but that it might be & ought to be delayed until the state of improvements called for it when property in its vicinity would be more valuable & productive & would be better able to bear the expence.

[446] "The Committee are satisfied that many of the objections of the petitioners are well founded, but that the state of improvements near the lower part of the line of the contemplated Sewer and the decayed state of the temporary one in Hamersley Street is such that unless the permanent one is now built it will be absolutely necessary to make a new temporary one on Hamersley street to be extended to the east of Varick Street which will cost from 2 to 3 thousand dollars and which in all probability will have to be done at the expence of the Corporation, for, if it was to be assessed on those benefitted the Assessment would be so extensive that the laying & collecting of it would cost nearly as much as the work: but if the permanent one was to commence immediately the present temporary one might be made to answer until the permanent one was so far done as to receive the waters from it.

[447] "The Committee would state another difficulty in suspending the work: That in pursuance of the resolution of the Board they advertised for and received proposals, and that the proposal from Mr. Wallace was accepted and the Street Commissioner was accordingly directed to enter into a contract with him for the same, that understanding a petition would be presented to the Board to suspend it the Committee directed the Street Commissioner to suspend the execution of the contract until farther orders. Mr. Wallace now states that 'previous to the Street Commissioner's information of the said

suspension he had entered into engagements for materials &c. for said work, and that in case the same should not go on he would sustain considerable damage for which he would expect to be indemnified by the Board. As it is incumbent on the Committee to express their opinion with the facts they submit the following resolution:

“Resolved that it is expedient that [448] the Sewer on Clarkson and Carmine Streets and part of the Sixth Avenue be commenced immediately and that the Street Commissioner is hereby directed to proceed with the same.”

The reading of the petition was called for and it was accordingly read. The question was then taken on the report of the Committee and the resolution proposed by them and the same was carried in the Affirmative.

The same Committee, to whom was referred the petition of a number of the proprietors of houses and lots of ground in Collect Street praying that the Sewer in Canal Street may be extended up Collect Street to Franklin Street, Reported:

“That in the opinion of the Committee from the unsettled state of a greater part [449] of Collect Street which has been but recently filled it is to be apprehended that it would be liable to considerable settlement but that it might be extended 100 feet south of Pump Street without much apprehension. The Committee are of opinion that the state of the neighbourhood requires that it should be extended thus far. They therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

“Resolved that the Sewer on Canal Street be extended up Collect Street 100 feet south of Pump Street & that the same be done by contract to be paid for when the Assessment is collected and that the Street Commissioner under the direction of the Canal Committee take the necessary measures to carry the same into effect.”

The minutes of the two last meetings were read and approved.

A petition of James Gillender, Master of the Ship Hector, for relief from a penalty said to be incurred by breach of the law [451] respecting landing Alien passengers was read and referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

A similar petition from Captain Tupper, Commander of the Brig Eliza, was referred to the same Committee with authority to grant relief as they shall judge fit.

A petition of John Baldwin for remission of tax laid on him in the year 1817 stating that he was discharged by an act of insolvency in January, 1818, was read and referred to the Committee on Assessments.

A petition of A. P. Maylie for permission to construct a vault in front of No. 61 Dey Street was granted on the usual terms under direction of the Street Commissioner.

A petition of Christian Buhler praying relief from a fine said to be incurred under the Pawnbrokers' Law was read and referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

[452] A petition from John Anderson & Son was received stating that from circumstances detailed in their petition they considered themselves entitled to the use of the wharf opposite to their lots lying on West Street between Vesey and Murray Streets; that they accordingly placed thereon a quantity of plaister of Paris; that they have lately received notice to remove the same, and praying relief. Whereupon the same was referred to the Committee on Wharves, Piers and Ships.

A petition of Mead Darrow for extension of time for payment of



an Assessment for opening Grand Street was referred to the Finance Committee.

A petition of Chapin Ward was received, stating that he is heir at law to his brother George Ward and as such is entitled to one half of the estate and effects of his said brother: that said George died intestate [453] and the proceeds of his estate have been paid by the public Administrator to the City Treasurer: that one half of said proceeds has been paid to Adam Hill who was entitled to the same, and praying the remaining half part may be paid to him, which being read was referred to the Counsel and Comptroller.

A petition of Jacob Valentine for relief from payment of a fine for keeping a dog without being registered stating that he is blind and that the dog was his guide in passing thro' the streets, was referred to the Police Committee with authority to remit.

Petitions were received from Alexander Anthony for Stall No. 34 Fly Market; from H. Lyon for same Stall; from Samuel Low for a Stall in same market; from John H. A petition of the Trustees of the Hamilton Free School at Harlaem near Fort Wash- [455] ington, praying some further pecuniary aid to furnish their School room, was read and referred to the Finance Committee to report.

A petition of Joseph Pell for remission of fine incurred by non-compliance with an Ordinance respecting a nuisance, was referred to the City Inspector.

A petition of Peter Van Blarcom for remission of fine for not



having his number painted on his cart was granted on payment of costs.

A petition of Robert Matthews for remission of fine for encumbering the Street with building materials was granted on payment of costs.

A petition of Joseph Madden for remission of fine for not registering a dog was read and referred to the Police Committee.

A similar petition from Jacob Jackson was referred to the same Committee.

[456] A petition that Thompson Street be paved from Spring Street to Broome Street was referred to the Street Committee.

A petition from Inhabitants residing near Potters' field complaining of the interment of the dead at that place and praying the Corporation to establish a Cemetery at a greater distance from the settled parts of the City was read and referred to the Committee on Public Lands and Places.

A petition of James D. Board that Washington Street between Vesey and Barclay Streets may be regulated and paved, was referred to the Street Committee.

A petition of John L. Hamilton to be appointed a Measurer of Grain was referred to the Committee on Applications.

A petition of Lewis K. Storm for relief from a fine said to be incurred by driving a [457] Hackney Carriage without a licence was referred to the Police Committee.

The iron bars that will be of use were sent to the public yard and the remainder was sold for the sum of Forty three Dollars which will be paid into the Treasury, the purchaser to remove the same by the 10<sup>th</sup> instant & to fill up the Cellar by the 20<sup>th</sup> inst."

The Chief Engineer reported that at the request of the African Methodist Society he had removed Engine house No. 31 from their ground corner of Leonard and Church streets, that they had offered a situation on another part of their ground for which he recommended an agreement should be made. Whereupon the same was referred to the Committee on the Fire Department.

The City Inspector presented the following communication respecting a house in Orange Street occupied as a Slaughter house—Viz.

That said house had been sold for taxes and that the time for which it had been sold had expired. Whereupon the same was referred to the Counsel to take measures to put the Corporation in possession and if there is no legal impediment thereto to direct the Superintendant of Repairs to take possession of the same.

[463] The Counsel presented the following agreement and leases which were directed to be duly executed: Viz.

An agreement between the Corporation and James Wallace for making a Canal in Clarkson and Carmine Streets and in the Sixth Avenue.

Also an agreement with Luther Bloomfield for making a Canal in Chapel Street.

Also an Agreement with John Anderson for building a Wharf or pier into the North River near the foot of Vesey Street.

Also a Lease to Charles Watts of a ferry to be established between the northern boundary of the limits of the grant of the Hoboken Ferry to Philip Hone and Christopher Street and the usual landing place at Weehawk and to any other place on the New Jersey shore not exceeding  $\frac{1}{4}$  of a mile therefrom.

Also Two Leases to Cornelius R. Duffie of lots of ground at Kip's Bay which were sold on the 6<sup>th</sup> of March 1817 for nonpayment or the Assessment for opening the 3<sup>d</sup> Avenue [464] one of which was sold for the term of 80 years for 159 dollars and 57 cents and is bounded as follows—Viz. All that certain piece of land, owner unknown, situated at Kip's Bay in the 9<sup>th</sup> Ward of said City bounded southerly by land now or lately belonging to James Jarvis and by lands now or lately belonging to James McCreedy, westerly by the 3<sup>d</sup> Avenue, northerly by lands belonging to Maria Duffie & others, executors of the Will of John Duffie deceased, and easterly by the centre line between the 2<sup>d</sup> and 3<sup>d</sup> Avenues, the said piece of land having heretofore been intended to form part of a road or way thro' Kip's farm to be called Susan Street.

The other lot was sold for the term of 30 years for 186 dollars & 3 cents and is bounded as follows—Viz—All that certain piece of land, owner unknown, situated at Kip's Bay in the 9<sup>th</sup> Ward of the said City bounded easterly by the 3<sup>d</sup> Avenue, southerly partly by lands now or lately be- [465] longing to James Chesterman, partly by



the road or way called Elbert Street and partly by lands now or lately belonging to Cornelius Roosevelt deceased, westerly by the Centre line between the 3<sup>d</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Avenues and northerly partly by lands now or lately belonging to Maria Duffie and others, executors of the will of John Duffie deceased, partly by the road or way called Elbert Street and partly by lands now or lately belonging to Abraham Russell, the said piece of land having heretofore been intended to form part of a road or way thro' Kip's Bay to be called Kip's Bay Street."

The Committee on Public Offices, to whom was referred a Memorial on the subject of causing an Index to be made of the public Records in the Register's Office of the City, Reported:

[468] "That they have given this subject the consideration which its importance and interest to the community appeared to require. In considering this memorial your Committee have of necessity been led also to consider the memorial of Garritt Gilbert Esqr, the Register, which was presented to the Board in the month of September last and referred to a Committee but it appears that it never was reported upon or farther acted upon by the Board.

"In the memorial of Mr. Gilbert a variety of facts are stated to shew the negligent and highly reprehensible manner in which the papers and records of that office have been kept and your Committee are constrained to admit that the representations in the memorial of the Register have been made to appear to your Committee substantially correct.

"It appears as stated by Mr. Gilbert that there has been no 'General Index of Mortgages' continued for about 3 years [469] succeeding May 1815 tho' the Statute is imperative in requiring such general Index of all the books of mortgages and incumbrances to be made by the Register.

"Again the Statute points out the manner in which mortgages shall be cancelled, which is by making a Minute of the Certificate of discharge or satisfaction piece in the books of registry, and yet there appears to have been within the last 12 or 15 years about 800 of these discharges or satisfaction pieces in relation to which some of the preceding registers have not complied with the statute but have left the Mortgages on record uncanceled, and tho' the discharges are on file in the office yet the statute required the additional duty of minuting them on record and allowed a compensation therefor and it is important that it should have been done.

"There is much irregularity, as well as deficiency in the books of

the office; no uniform system as to certain classes of conveyances has ever been pursued.

[470] "In the books of conveyances have been recorded Insolvent Discharges, Powers of Attorney, Certificates of Manumission, Articles of Agreement &c. &c.

"While your Committee express an opinion that this state of things should be remedied, they admit that it is the duty of the State to see that their own officers do their duty and that they should remedy evils attendant on such omissions of their officers, Yet the probability is that as this is a question of interest only to our City the State would not incur the necessary expence. Under this view of the subject we recommend to the Board to meet the wishes of the highly respectable petitioners and to incur the expence necessary to put this Office on a proper footing. What these expences will amount to is a subject of some uncertainty. Mr. Gilbert has estimated the expence of indexing the books of conveyances at 10 dollars per volume and there are about 200 volumes of this description [471] and about 50 of mortgages, but your Committee are satisfied that it can be done for much less. For making the minutes of the discharges or satisfaction pieces the Statute allows the register 25 cents for each certificate which will make a further expence of One hundred and fifty or Two hundred Dollars.

"Your Committee think that the expence should not deter the Board from the undertaking. The subject is important and has interested the attention of our citizens almost all of whom are in one way or another interested in titles of property being clear and indisputable.

"Your Committee conclude by offering the following resolution:

His Honor the Mayor stated that in consequence of a consultation with the Board of Health it was deemed expedient to call a meeting of the Common Council to sanction expenditures which were likely to be incurred during the prevalence of the present malignant [5] fever and also to consult as to what further measures of precaution might be necessary to be pursued at the present crisis.

Mr. Stevens presented the following resolutions which were unanimously adopted: Viz.

“Resolved that the Commissioners of the Alms’ house be directed to provide for the support of the poor inhabitants who may remove to the places provided for them by the Board of Health, and also to provide medical Assistance for the sick who may be removed:

And farther

That this Board will make provision for all necessary expences which the Board of Health may incur in removing & providing for the poor owing to the present pestilential disease.”

It was moved that the Doors be closed. Upon the question being taken thereon the Board was equally divided and the Mayor gave his vote in the Negative. So the motion was lost.

[6] An Ordinance was presented by the Recorder entitled ‘An Ordinance to prevent the spreading of malignant diseases in this City’ which was read by Paragraphs and agreed to. On the final question of agreeing to the Ordinance it was carried in the Affirmative. The Ayes and nays having been called by Mr. Stevens were as follow:

A petition of Mary Simonson on subject of a house built by her husband on a leased lot which lease had expired two years [9] ago and they had since paid several Assessments on said lots and the Corporation had now entered into possession of said property and praying repayment of said sums, was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A petition from William Shaw for permission to remove a frame house from the College Yard in Park Place to the corner of Fourth and Thompson Streets was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the 3<sup>d</sup> Ward with authority to grant the request.

A request from the Treasurer of the New York Free School Society for payment of \$1500 granted to them by the Legislature was referred to the Finance Committee.

A complaint from sundry Inhabitants of the Situation of a lot between Fulton Street and Peck Slip was read and referred to the City Inspector.

[10] A petition of N. U. Tompkins for permission to construct a

cistern in front of his house at the junction of Pump & Division Streets was read and referred to the Street Commissioner.

A petition that another room may be assigned to the Justices of the Marine Court as a Court room was read and referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

A complaint of the course of the Gutter in Front Street was referred to the Street Committee and Street Commissioner.

A petition of Henry M. Van Solinger for permission to construct a Vault in front of No. 51 Cedar Street was granted on the usual terms under direction of the Street Commissioner.

A petition for a Well & Pump in Carmine St. and for one near Herring Street were referred to the Alderman & Assistant of the Ward and [11] Street Commissioner to report an Ordinance therefor.

A petition of Elizabeth Gardner for herself and Elizabeth Doan praying that the houses Nos. 60 and 62 in Harman Street may not in the contemplated widening of Grand Street be removed until next spring was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A Petition of William J. Furman for permission to remove a frame house from Roosevelt Street to a lot in Batavia Lane both situations being within the Fire Limits was referred to the Counsel for his opinion as to the legality of such removal.

A petition of Elijah Guion was received, stating that he is possessed of an undivided right in lot No. 32 Oliver Street upon which an Assessment is laid for opening said Street, that measures are now taking for a settlement of the right in said lot [12] and praying an extension of time for payment of said Assessment, which was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

A petition of Robert Thorburn for appointment of Measurer of Grain and a similar petition from Jacob Brinckerhoff were read and referred to the Committee on Applications.

A petition of John Kent for a Stall in Corlaer's Hook market: of George Paff for Stall No. 2 Essex Market: of Frederick Hegel for a stand to sell Sausages in Washington Market and of Joseph Lawrence, occupant of Stall No. 45 Catharine Market for permission to transfer the same for a few months during an absence from this City were severally read and referred to the Market Committee.

A petition from Daniel Marsh and others, butchers, was received stating that they have been a long time in the habit of using certain [13] patent scales for weighing meat in the market which have not hitherto been objected to by the former Sealers of Weights and Measures; that the present Sealer Joseph P. Simpson has informed them

that such scales are not legal and they have therefore incurred a penalty, and praying relief. Whereupon the same was referred to the Market Committee.

A Complaint from sundry inhabitants in Greenwich Street near Cedar Street that the owners of lots corner of Greenwich and Cedar Streets have piled lumber on the side walks to a considerable height to the great annoyance of the neighbourhood and praying relief, was referred to the Street Commissioner.

A petition from Jacob Warner & William King was presented, stating that an Order was issued for a lease for lot No. 265 William street to said Warner but the lease has not been [14] made out and praying that the lease may be now made for said lot to William King. Upon reading said petition the Comptroller reported:

"That the petition of Jacob Warner and William King which has been read was intended to have been presented at the last meeting of the Board, and in order to facilitate the object contemplated thereby he would now represent that a Lease was prepared by the Counsel in March last to Jacob Warner for the house and lot of ground belonging to the Corporation, No. 265 William Street, for 7 years from the 1<sup>st</sup> of May 1819 at an annual rent of 320 dollars. In consequence of illness & other causes Mr. Warner has not executed the lease but paid the quarterly rent due the 1<sup>st</sup> of August last. It is respectfully recommended that leave be given to William King to take a similar lease for the property from the above date 1<sup>st</sup> of May 1819 and that the Counsel be authorized to prepare the same. The rent which has been paid will be carried [15] to the credit of Mr. King's account.

He also presented a Communication recommending that Reade Street be regulated and paved from Washington Street to the Bulkhead with so much of Washington Street as may be necessary to make it conform to the regulation of Reade Street and he also presented an Ordinance conformably thereto, which was passed and John Targee, Abraham Bloodgood and Benjamin Prince were appointed Assessors therein.

He also presented Ordinances for regulating Bleeker Street from McDougall Street to the Sixth Avenue, for regulating and paving Thompson Street from Spring Street to Broome Street, and for regulating Wooster Street from Spring Street to Lispenard's line. which were passed and the same persons appointed Assessors in each.

He also stated that the lower end of Harrison Provost and Beach streets from Washington [18] Street to the River and North Moore, Hubert and Laight Streets from Greenwich street to the River required regulating and paving and he presented Ordinances agreeably therefor which were passed and Abraham Bloodgood, John Brower and Abraham Baudouine were appointed Assessors in each.



He also presented a return of Delinquents on the Assessments for opening Oliver Street, whereupon a Warrant was ordered to issue to the Collector for collecting the same.

He also presented a Communication respecting an Ordinance passed 24<sup>th</sup> March 1817 directing a Bulkhead to be built on the westerly line of West Street between Courtland and Duane Streets, which was referred to the Committee on Wharves, Piers and Slips.

"That on the 13<sup>th</sup> April 1807 Charles M<sup>c</sup>Carty obtained a lease from the Corporation of a lot of ground at the corner of Cherry and Roosevelt Streets which lot was therein described as bounded in the rear by a lot of ground heretofore leased by the Corporation to Jedediah Waterman and as containing 20 feet front & rear and in length 71 feet be the same more or less.

"Mr. Waterman's lease bears date in the year 1804 and is described as containing 75 feet 10 inches in length. It appears from a Survey made by Edward Doughty one of the City Surveyors that Mr. [23] Waterman's lot extends only 75 feet 10 inches in length and that Mr. McCarty is in possession of a lot of but Sixty six feet in length. Mr. McCarty's lot of course falls short of the extent described in his lease five feet. It has been settled by adjudications of the Supreme Court of this State that when land is sold by limits and bounds that they are to govern and that the grantee has no remedy if the ground falls short of what is mentioned in the Deed provided the boundaries are correct. It is contended by Mr. McCarty and admitted by Mr. Waterman that he once paid to Mr. Akerly, who formerly leased the property from the Corporation which is now leased to Mr. McCarty, an annual rent for the use of the five feet now claimed by him. Mr. Waterman says that he was induced to do this in consequence of Mr. Akerly's claiming it, but that upon having it surveyed and finding that he had no more ground in his possession than was described in his lease he refused to pay any rent for it.

[24] He also contends, and nothing is made to appear to the contrary, that not only himself but a Mr. Van Zandt who formerly leased the same ground from the Corporation always had the five feet in question in their possession.

"Under these circumstances the Counsel is induced to think that the boundaries as contended for by Mr. Waterman are correct and that Mr. McCarty has no legal claim to the five feet in question.

"With respect to the small gore along Roosevelt Street the Counsel for the same reasons is of opinion that Mr McCarty has no legal claim to it farther than to the rear of the lot in his occupation. This gore is described as being bounded southerly by a piece of ground being in front of a lot of ground heretofore leased to Jedediah Waterman, and altho' it is described as extending 71 feet in length yet as the boundaries must govern he has no legal claim to a greater extent than to Mr. [25] Waterman's ground.

"The Counsel is also of opinion that Mr. McCarty has not any just claim to the premises in question farther than to Mr. Waterman's line. Mr. McCarty was in the occupation of his lot before he obtained his last lease. He consequently knew the extent of it. He could not have been deceived by the incorrect description of its length. He must have been sensible that the Corporation did not intend to

lease him ground which had already been leased to Mr. Waterman or to lease any part of the Street lying in front of his lot."

The Alderman and Assistant of the Second Ward in performance of their visiting duty to the Alms' house and Penitentiary Establishments, Reported:

"That in their examination of these Establishments they have found them in [26] general in such order and condition as reflects credit on their Superintendants. An improvement as to the cleanliness of the Alms' house Establishment is certainly obvious, tho' perhaps there is still room for additional improvement in relation to this important particular.

"The children in the Penitentiary are now kept separate from older offenders and considerable attention is paid in teaching them the common branches of Education: but as these unfortunate young culprits, if they ever so far reform as to obtain an honest livelihood, must obtain it by manual labour it may be doubted whether it would not be for their benefit and the interest of the community that they should be employed in such manner as to give them habits of manual industry and the knowledge of some trade rather than exclusively to occupy their time in school.

"In relation to the Female Lunatic [27] apartments they are certainly not as spacious and comfortable as could be wished: fortunately their number is not great. We think the Corporation will find it advisable to remove this class of lunatics, as well as the male lunatics, to the Hospital when the buildings of that establishment shall be extensive enough to accommodate them: and it certainly will be for the advantage of the patients who cannot be properly provided for or attended to in either the Penitentiary or Alms house. The removal of the lunatics will give additional room, which is already required, as the paupers at the present time much exceed those of the preceding years at the same season. The want of work & employment for the ensuing season will no doubt greatly add to the present increased numbers.

"Emigration is a fruitful source of pauperism to the City. The State at large, or rather the agricultural part of it derive all the benefit of immigration, while the expences and evils are entailed on our City. [28] The subject deserves the particular attention of the Corporation: and perhaps it would be advisable to appoint a Committee to obtain

all the facts in relation to foreign immigration to the City, the proportion of them who become chargeable to the Community and the expences of their support, with a view to present again this subject to the consideration of the Legislature."

"That as the Corporation are merely acting as agents of the parties for collecting the Assessments and paying them over to the persons damaged by the improvement the petitioners can have no claim for the indulgence required. Your Committee have nevertheless good reason to believe that to press the payment of the money at this moment would be the cause of great inconvenience, if not a sacrifice of the property interested, and they therefore, in consideration of the peculiar situation of our City recommend that an extension of time be granted and offer the following resolution accordingly:

"Resolved that the time for the payment of the amount assessed on the property of Mead H[D]arrow be extended to the 1<sup>st</sup> day of September 1820, and on the amount assessed on the property of John Minuse to the [30] 1<sup>st</sup> day of December next; and on the amount assessed on the property of Sherath Israel to the 14<sup>th</sup> day of March 1820: and that interest be charged on the several amounts for the time thus allowed."

They offer the following resolution:

A Letter was received from John J. Howe, dated the 20<sup>th</sup> instant, resigning his office as House Physician to the Alms' House. Whereupon Resolved that his resignation be accepted.

The Recorder presented a law entitled "A Law to prohibit for a limited time the sale of Old clothes and bedding within the City of New York" which was read by paragraphs and passed.

[32] Alderman Morss presented a law entitled "A law to repeal a law entitled 'a law for the appointment of a City Intendant and prescribing his duties'" which was passed.

The following resolution was presented by Alderman Morss and adopted:

"Resolved that there shall be three Street Inspectors appointed by this Board to be subject to the direction of the Street Commissioner who shall divide the City into three districts and assign to each of the said Inspectors his respective district:

And that it shall be the duty of the said Street Inspectors to attend unto and perform all the duties heretofore performed by the City Intendant as well as the duties heretofore performed by the Street Inspectors in their respective districts:

And that the said Inspectors shall be allowed each Two dollars per day including Sundays for their services."

The Board proceeded to choose the persons [33] to fill the said offices when Jonathan Pinkney, Samuel Hutchings and Abraham Ackerman were chosen.



Alderman King, agreeably to a recommendation of the Board of Health, presented the following resolution, which was adopted:

"Whereas it is the duty of the Watchmen during the present season to remain in the City and attend to the performance of their duty, and particularly to guard the property of such of the inhabitants as have temporarily removed therefrom: And whereas the said Watchmen in the performance of their duty may endanger their health: As an inducement, therefore, for the said Watchmen to remain at their posts, it is

"Resolved—that in case any watchman shall become sick during the present season and by those means unable to attend to his duty, such Watchman shall be furnished with medical assistance at the expense of this Board and his regular pay shall be continued [34] notwithstanding his inability to perform such duty."

On motion of Alderman King

"Resolved that a warrant issue in favor of Pierre C. Van Wyck Esqr. for Five hundred dollars on account of his bill of fees heretofore presented to the Board of Supervisors."

Alderman Kip presented the following:

"Resolved that the Street Commissioner be and he is hereby authorised to extend the contract with John Anderson for building an 'L' on the South side of the Pier now building at the foot of Vesey Street in like manner as the 'L' now contracted for on the North side of said pier."

[43] "The[re] were, as appears by the within Return 54 persons in confinement in the City Prison at the date hereof, of whom 1 is charged with perjury: 4 with Grand Larceny: 6 petit larceny, 2 of whom are indicted and their trials postponed at their solicitation: 5 assault and battery, several of whom are under sentence: 1 committed by the magistrates of the Police Office under the Statute relative to persons abandoning their families: 1 misdemeanour under sentence: 13 committed and sentenced as vagrants: 1 for examination: 5 paupers for transportation to their last place of settlement by the Commissioners of the Alms' House: 1 disorderly: 2 for keeping disorderly houses, one of whom is sentenced: 7 under sentence to be sent to the penitentiary according to their sentences: 4 paupers. Total 51. 3 prisoners under the authority of the United States, 1 for murder under sentence of death to be executed on the 29<sup>th</sup> inst. & 1 of them for piracy—Total 54. The Mayor has visited [44] the prison and found it in the usual good order."

A petition was received from Cyrenus Beers, stating that 106 barrels of flour were shipped to him from Alexandria for sale by a house at that place: that the same were presented by him to Adam Mill, Inspector of Flour at this port for inspection: that upon examining the same he found them deficient in weight to the amount of 382 pounds

on the whole number of barrels: that the wrong (if any was intended) was not committed either by petitioner or by those who shipped them to him upon whom the penalty if inflicted will fall and praying remission of the same: whereupon the same was referred to Aldermen King Westervelt Parker

[45] A Communication was received from Thomas Eabanks, explaining a mode of constructing privies and water closets in public and private buildings which will prevent the noxious effluvia generally arising from such places—which was read and referred to Aldermen McQueen Taylor Mr. Hammond.

A Memorial was presented from several members of the New York Bar and others, stating that the room at present occupied by the Register of the City and County was not sufficiently spacious to give the necessary accommodation for the keeping of the Records and recommending that another more spacious room be assigned to him, which being read was referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

A petition from Patrick Caulfield and Patrick Toole of this City merchants, stating that they have been prosecuted on a charge [46] of using light weights and measures: that the present Sealer regulated their measures in June last and by an accident they were altered but are now again regulated and praying relief. Whereupon the same was referred to the Committee on public Offices.

A petition from sundry Inhabitants that a lamp may be placed in the alley leading from White Street to Franklin Street was read and referred to the Lamp Committee.

A petition of Israel Langdon for remission of a penalty incurred by his Son by disorderly conduct on the Battery and for which his son, has suffered an imprisonment of one week, was read and the fine remitted on payment of costs.

Petitions were received from William Bath for a stall in Fly Market: from William Somerville for a Stall in Spring Street Market: from John J. Fink and [47] Isaac Vaughan to be permitted to exchange with each other Stalls No. 12 & 14 Washington Market, and of J. G. Trosler and Esther Baldwin for hucksters' Stands in Washington Market—were severally read and referred to the Market Committee.

A petition from John Hatfield, stating that he is a licensed cartman; that his cart being out of repair he made use of his son's to cart two or three loads, and that he has been prosecuted by the Attorney therefor and praying relief—was referred to the Committee of Charity with authority to remit the penalty if in their opinion proper.

A petition of Dr. William J. Belden to be appointed to the office of Resident Physician of the Alms' house accompanied with a recommendation of the physicians & surgeons of the State prison, was read and laid on the Table.

[48] A petition of Manuel Joseph to be permitted to construct a cistern in the street in front of his house No. 8 Bancker Street in the 4<sup>th</sup> Ward, was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Ward and Street Commissioner to report.

A petition of James Brooks in behalf of the Estate of Richard Speaight praying a speedy determination respecting the opening of First Street from the Bowery to Broadway, was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A petition of Patrick Monaghan for remission of fine for selling liquor on the Sabbath was read and referred to the Police Committee.

A petition for a Well and Pump near the corner of Burton and Bedford Streets was referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Ward and Street Commissioner to report [49] an Ordinance therefor.

A petition from sundry Inhabitants that Hubert Street may be regulated was referred to the Street Committee.

A petition of Charles Thurston for remission of fine incurred by one of his boys bathing on Sunday contrary to law was referred to the Committee of Charity with authority to remit.

Petitions were received from Nicholas Schureman, Elizah Guion, Amos Jordan, Azel Conklin, George Reynolds and Oliver Waldron for appointment to the office of Captain of the City Watch for the 2<sup>d</sup> district; and of Ebenezer Whiting, Holly Waterbury and Nathaniel L. Astin for appointment of Assistant to the City Watch of the same district: which were severally read and referred to the Watch Committee.

A petition that the Sidewalks in Elizabeth Street between Broome and Spring Streets [50] may be paved was referred to the Street Committee.

A petition from owners of property in Gold, Beekman and Fulton Streets, praying that Gold Street may be widened & straightened between Fulton & Beekman Streets, was read and referred to the Street Committee and Alderman and Assistant of the 2<sup>d</sup> Ward.

A petition was received from John Anderson stating that he made a Contract with the Corporation for building a pier at the foot of Vesey Street: that he had sunk five of the blocks but that by some unforeseen circumstances one of the blocks sunk in one night ten feet owing to the muddy state of the bottom: that the Inspector could not

of course give him a Certificate of the completion so as to entitle him to the first payment. He therefore prayed that the first payment might be made [51] and the subject referred to the investigation and direction of a Committee. Whereupon the same was referred to the Committee on Wharves, piers and Slips.

A petition of Lewis Derauche for remission of a personal tax assessed on him of \$6  $\frac{30}{100}$  which from his reduced circumstances he is unable to pay, was read and referred to the Committee of Charity.

He also presented a corrected Copy of the Assessment for regulating and paving Broadway from Bleecker Street to Art Street as the one that was confirmed at the last Common Council was incorrect. Whereupon it was resolved that the confirmation made of the said Assessment on the 20<sup>th</sup> ulto. be & the same is hereby revoked, annulled and made void, and resolved that the present assessment now presented be and the same is hereby confirmed and that Morris De Camp [53] be and he is hereby appointed Collector of the same.

A petition of Peter McCartee, Auctioneer, for permission to sell goods at auction in the Street in Broadway in front of the house to which he has removed during the prevalence of the late epidemic—and of Oliver Dodge to be permitted to sell in front of the corner of Fulton & Water Streets—were read & referred to the Street Committee with authority to grant the prayers of petitioners.

A petition of George Peterson for relief from judgment recovered against him for discharging a gun in the City contrary to law was read and resolved that the Attorney discharge petitioner from Suit without costs.

A petition of Edward McLaughlin, Excise Officer in the City & County of New York, praying some additional compensation for his services was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

[70] A petition from John Lee for a Stall in Grand Street Market was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A petition from John Van Arsdale & J. N. Johnson, Inspectors of Firewood, 5<sup>th</sup> District praying an alteration of the limits of said district was read and referred to the Aldermen & Assistants of the 2<sup>d</sup> & 4<sup>th</sup> Wards with authority to make the alteration if they deem it advisable.

A petition of Benjamin Watson, Register of Dogs, that his account might be referred to a Committee for Settlement accompanied with a statement of his account was read & referred to the Police Committee.

Petitions were received from Ebenezer S. Blatchley & Cornelius C. Blatchley for relief from taxes assessed on them in lieu of Military services, they not being liable to the same. Which were referred to the Com- [71] mittee on Assessments.

A petition of John Jackson praying remuneration for services rendered in Mayor's Office while the Tavern Licences were issued was read & referred to the Finance Committee.

A petition from Eber Wheaton praying relief from an assessment laid upon a Tenement erected by him for a School House and used as such, was read & referred to the Committee on Assessments.

A petition was received from Benjamin P. Benson stating that he is proprietor of a Mill near Harlaem, that by the 3<sup>d</sup> Avenue crossing the Stream over which his Mill-dam is built his mill is deprived of water & praying permission to erect his floodgates inside of the Bridge of the 3<sup>d</sup> Avenue—which being read was referred to the Road Committee.

A petition was received from Nicoll & Augustus Floyd as agents for certain heirs of George Clinton [72] deceased, praying that no forfeiture may be incurred by non-compliance with an Ordinance of the Corporation passed 17<sup>th</sup> May last directing the building of a bulkhead along the west of West Street by the said heirs as owners of certain lots fronting on West Street and praying an extension of the time for complying with said Ordinance—which being read was referred to the Committee on Wharves, Piers & Slips.

A petition was received from Isaac F. Coutant, Sexton of Trinity Church, praying remission of fine incurred by interring a corpse in the Grave yard of said Church at a less depth than 6 feet as by law directed, which was referred to the Police Committee.

A petition from Stephen Baker and Charles W. Sandford for remission of a penalty incurred by non-compliance with an Ordinance respecting filling in certain lots on Canal St. was read and referred to the City Inspector.

A petition of Joseph Rogers for relief from penalties incurred by him in relation to some dead Animal burned by him and also for driving a Cart without being numbered, was referred to the Committee of Charity with authority to remit the penalties.

A petition of John J. Westervelt for permission to build a Brick Cistern in the Street in front of No. 53 North Moore Street, was read & referred to the Alderman & Assistant of the Ward & St. Commissioner.

A petition of George Betts for payment of services in suits of the Corporation, where Corporation have been nonsuited or discontinued was read & referred to the Finance Committee.

Petitions were received from Captain Rivry of the French Ship L'Ehre and Captain Lewis of the Schooner Hope stating that they have [76] brought alien passengers in their vessels and that having no consignees they are unable to procure Sureties in a Bond for them & praying they may be permitted to commute for them on the terms pre-

scribed by the Resolution of the Common Council. Whereupon resolved that it be recommended to his Honor the Mayor to direct that Commutations for the said Alien passengers be received, and it was resolved that the consideration of the subject of permitting Commutation be referred to the Finance Committee.

A petition of Christian Brown and of Samuel Buckbee for appointment as Assistants to the Watch of the 2<sup>d</sup> District were read & referred to the Watch Committee.

A remonstrance from the Inhabitants residing in Ludlow Street between Grand & Broome Sts. against paving the same was referred to the St. Committee.

A petition of Philip Hone to be permitted [77] to erect certain wooden buildings at the foot of Barclay Street for the accommodation of Hoboken Ferry was read & referred to the Ferry Committee with authority to grant the request of petitioner.

A petition of sundry Inhabitants that the Exchange Slip may be filled up on a line with South St. was referred to the Committee on Wharves, Piers & Slips.

A petition from the Inhabitants residing in the vicinity of the Horse Market, complaining of it as a great inconvenience & praying that it may be removed was referred to the St. Committee.

A Memorial was received from the Inspectors of Bread representing that the present Assize of Bread was established some years since at the request of the Bakers in consequence of the high price of fuel &c. that an increase of profit of  $7\frac{5}{100}$  on the barrel was allowed which made the whole profit on the barrel \$4.25 cents: that in their opinion circumstances justify a reduction of the profit so as to allow them a [78] profit of \$3. and recommending the same.

The Counsel also presented to the Board Articles of agreement signed by Henry Rutgers, Catharine Depeyster, Ann Bancker, and William B. Crosby relative to Harman Street, together with the following report:

[91] 'John Beekman who is one of the members of the Rutgers family is now absent and has not signed the agreement. The Counsel however is assured by Mr. Crosby that Mr. Beekman has not any lot under lease on the North side of Harman Street. The agreement provides for the payment of all Assessments for widening Harman Street which may be imposed upon lots leased by them prior to the 1<sup>st</sup> of January 1813 upon the conditions mentioned in the resolution of the Board. The time fixed in that resolution was the 1<sup>st</sup> of January 1817. They however decline entering into an agreement to pay any



Assessments excepting upon lots leased prior to the 1<sup>st</sup> January 1813 and allege as a reason for so doing that they had then determined to widen all their Streets and that very explicit Covenants were introduced into all leases after that term requiring their tenants to pay all Assessments & that their rents were regulated accordingly. The agreement is not signed in behalf of Catharine Hedges for the reasons stated in the report of the Committee.

[92] "The Counsel also herewith submits to the Board a petition to the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate & Assessment in the case of Harman Street for the purpose of having it signed & sealed provided the before mentioned articles of Agreement are satisfactory. As the Supreme Court meets this day it will be necessary in order to save the Court that it should be executed before the next regular meeting of the Board."

It was moved by Alderman Mann that the Articles of Agreement as reported by the Counsel be accepted and be directed to be duly executed. The question having been taken thereon viva voce by Ayes & Nays, Alderman Mann moved that the question be taken by the members rising.

Those in the Affirmative having risen and having been counted and those in the Negative having also risen & been counted, [93] Alderman Mann then moved that the question be taken by calling the ayes & nays. The Mayor declared that according to the practice of the Board the motion was out of order. Alderman Mann appealed from the opinion of the Chair to the Board, and moved that the ayes & nays be taken. The question being taken on the appeal & those who were of opinion that the direction of the President was right voting in the Affirmative & those of the contrary opinion voting in the negative it was carried in the Affirmative as follows:

The Alderman & Assistant of the 4<sup>th</sup> Ward and Street Commissioner, to whom was referred the Petition of Manuel Joseph, presented the following report: ‘That [95] having personally viewed the premises & street where it is proposed to build the Cistern they are of opinion that the prayer of the petitioner ought to be granted. They therefore beg leave to offer the following resolution:

“Resolved that Manuel Joseph be permitted to build a cistern in front of his house No. 8 Bancker Street not to exceed 36 Superficial feet on the usual terms.”

The Minutes of last meeting were read & approved.

A Communication was received from Peter Schemerhorn stating that he held a Bond from the Corporation for \$15000 due on the 1<sup>st</sup> November next at 6 per cent per annum which they may [104] either discharge or renew *the Bond* with interest at 7 per cent per annum. Whereupon resolved that a new Bond be executed to Mr. Schermerhorn with interest at 7 per cent per annum.

A petition from Leicester Carrington was received stating that on the 1<sup>st</sup> of January last past he enclosed \$350. in a Letter to Nathaniel Smith, Post Master at Torrington, Connecticut, and at the same time \$50 in a letter to Amzi Tallmadge, Plymouth; that the Mail containing said letters was robbed and the money taken therefrom; that he understands & believes that the persons who committed said robbery have been apprehended by the Police Magistrates of this City

and the money recovered & paid over to the City Treasurer; wherefore he prays the same may be paid over to him. Whereupon resolved that it be referred to the Police Committee.

A further petition of Oliver Vanderbilt, [105] requesting his claim to compensation may be referred to Arbitrators was read and leave given to withdraw the petition.

A petition of George Fisher for relief from a fine incurred by occupying the Cross walk in the Street with his Cart was referred to the Committee of Charity with authority to grant the prayer of petitioner.

A Memorial of Ann Rogers praying payment of interest on the sum due to her for ground taken contiguous to the New Alms' house was read & referred to the Finance Committee.

A petition of Richard P. Hall for appointment as Superintendant of the Hay Scales at Kip's Bay was referred to the Committee on Applications.

A petition of John Ellis Jr. for remission of penalty for selling liquor without licence was read and referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

[106] A petition of Robert Pearsall for relief respecting a Militia fine was referred to the Committee on Assessments.

A request of the Managers of the State Lottery for the use of a room in the Basement Story of the Hall for the drawing of the Lottery was referred to the Committee on Public Offices with authority to grant the request.

A petition from Moses Dodd requesting that he may pay the rent & Assessment due from him to the Corporation by an order on Mr. Haviland Weeks, Contractor for the Canal in Collect Street, was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

A Memorial of William Hall of Boston in Massachusetts, stating that he has invented a Machine for cleaning and sweeping chimnies & praying the patronage of the Corporation, was referred to the Committee on Arts & Sciences.

[107] A petition of Messrs. Cambreleng & Pearson for remission of penalty incurred by the Brig Iris's occupying a station in the Corporation Dock in the North River, was referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

A petition of Lewis Valloo was presented stating that he is owner of House No. 56 Harman St. that it would be attended with great inconvenience to remove the same and praying it may be permitted



to remain until the final regulation of the Street; which being read was referred to the Street Committee.

A petition of David Munson, Lessee under the Corporation of house No. 1 Chatham Square the Lease of which will expire on the first of May next, and praying for the reasons therein stated that the lease may be renewed to him, was referred to the Finance Committee.

A petition from Thomas Teats for relief from penalty incurred by not having his Weights regulated [108] by the Sealer of Weights & Measures, was referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

A Memorial was received from Sundry Inhabitants in behalf of Isaac Valentine, stating that a Suit had been commenced against him for removing dirt from the Street, which dirt had in fact been left by the Street Contractors until it had become offensive to the neighbourhood and praying the Suit may be discontinued; which was referred to the Committee on public Offices with authority to direct the said suit to be discontinued.

The Attorney reported the following complaints which had been made to him which were referred to the Committee on Public Offices: Viz—against Captains Howard, Green, Fosdic, Grafton and Davis for lying with their vessels in Burling Slip & interfering with the coasters; also against the Captain of the Ship Atlantic for not [109] obeying an order for removal so as to give a birth to another Vessel.

He also reported that a judgment had been obtained against Jacob Stagg, a porter, for not having his number & rates on his barrow, that said Stagg was poor and had since complied with the law—which was referred to the same Committee.

He also presented a statement of the facts in the case of John Hatfield, a Cartman, and his son—which was directed to be referred to the Committee of Charity.

The following person was appointed Fireman, the Chief Engineer certifying the vacancy:

The City Inspector, on the petition of Baker & Sandford, reported: "That he has examined with attention the lots alluded to and finds that they are now filled in with earth to a level with the adjoining lots. The few lots on which stagnant water rests do not belong to the Memorialists. The owners of these last named lots have been ordained to correct the same, which when completed will remove every remaining nuisance, and as the Memorialists, with [111] other proprietors of property there, state that they are in treaty (in order to meet the growing improvements in that quarter) to raise to the necessary height their lots, it is respectfully recommended that the penalty incurred by the Memorialists be remitted on payment of costs."

The Street Commissioner presented an Ordinance for a Well & pump in Franklin Street near Broadway—which was passed & Abraham Baudouine, John Brower & Benjamin Prince were appointed Assessors.

He also presented the following Assessments which were confirmed: Viz. for a Well & Pump in Bancker Street near Market Street; for paving Essex Street from Grand to Broome Street & Morris De Camp was appointed Collector in each, and for a Well & Pump in Carmine Street near Varick St. and John G. Betts was appointed Collector.

[112] The Comptroller presented a report to the Board stating that there had been paid into the Treasury from the 17<sup>th</sup> March 1819 to this day for commutation of Alien Passengers \$11,819. which was directed to be filed.

The Counsel presented a Communication on the subject of the opening of Lispenard Street, which was referred to the Street Committee & Counsel.

He also presented for acceptance a Lease from Jedediah Waterman to the Corporation for a house & Lot in Roosevelt Street leased from him by the Committee of the Fire Department and also the counterpart

of said Lease. Whereupon said lease was directed to be accepted & the Counterpart executed.

He also, agreeably to order presented "A Law to amend a law" for establishing the Assize & for regulating the Inspection of Bread"—which was passed.

[113] The Finance Committee, to whom was referred the Comptroller's List of Balances due the Corporation on the 1<sup>st</sup> day of May last, reported the following resolution:

The same Committee, on the subject of Commutation for Alien passengers, reported:

"That they have bestowed on this subject the consideration which its importance merits. They confess, however, that the question presents difficulties on both hands not easily obviated [114] except by the exercise of a sound and well guarded discretion: for if bonding only is permitted you have the risk of failure in the sureties to encounter, and if proper sureties shall be hard to obtain, which is generally the case, a strong inducement is given to evade the law by clandestine landing or the entry of the vessel at some contiguous port when the passengers are thrown upon us unperceived and unsuspected: and on the other hand, if all are permitted to commute an inducement is held out to foreign governments to rid themselves of their paupers at a trifling expence and with little trouble. Your Committee are of opinion, therefore, that the plan heretofore pursued of bonding or commuting according to circumstances is more conducive to the interests of the City than if it was confined to either the one or the other without discretion.

Your Committee do not hesitate to give it as their opinion that so far as Commu- [115] tation has been permitted by his Honor the Mayor no injurious consequences have as yet ensued: for altho' there appears to have been no account kept by the Commissioners of the Alms' house, whereby it may be known what number of those who

have commuted has become chargeable on the City, they nevertheless have good reason to conclude that the number is comparatively small & that the amount received has been more than sufficient to bear the expence. Your Committee are of opinion, however, that the price of commutation for each passenger ought to be Five Dollars instead of three as at present, and that, for the purpose of forming a more correct judgment as to the loss or gain by the operation a register should be kept by the Commissioners of the Alms' house shewing the number of each description of Aliens that shall become chargeable on the City. To carry the foregoing suggestions into effect, the Committee propose the following resolutions:

"Resolved that hereafter on the arrival of any vessel at this port with Alien Passengers his Honor the Mayor be, & he is hereby authorized [116] to leave it at the option of the Captain or Consignee of such vessel either to bond in the usual way for securing the City against such aliens becoming chargeable thereon or of paying the sum of Five dollars in lieu of said Bond for each Alien so arriving: Provided, however, if in the opinion of his Honor the Mayor the said option shall in any case operate injurious to the public interest, bonds shall be insisted on with the necessary sureties.

"Resolved that all monies so received be paid to the Chamberlain and be appropriated to the foreign poor and that the Comptroller render quarterly to the Corporation a statement thereof.

"Resolved that the Commissioners of the Alms' house be instructed to register in a Book provided for the purpose all such Aliens as shall become chargeable on the City within two years from their arrival and, as near as may be, the amount of such [117] charge, designating those who have been bonded for from those who have paid the commutation and such other particulars tending to shew the operation of the two systems as to the loss or gain to the City, and that the Clerk of the Common Council be instructed to furnish the Commissioners from time to time with such information touching Alien passengers as they may require "

" That they have no knowledge of Mr. Jackson as a public Officer or of his services as such, and if they have not misunderstood the explanation given by his Honor the Mayor [118] on this subject the charge of the petitioner for services rendered is altogether unauthorized. They therefore offer the following resolution:

" Your Committee are aware of the ap- [119] parent impropriety of increasing the Salaries of Officers appointed by the State, while they are compelled to borrow large sums to defray the ordinary demands on the Treasury: they nevertheless submit to the Board whether in the present case a public Officer who by his diligent & unremitted attention to the duties of his office has increased the revenue to a large amount should not receive a pittance sufficient to keep his family from starvation & beggary. The petitioner has a large family to support consisting of 11 souls who in the vicissitudes of life have experienced their full share of sickness & other misfortunes and the Salary he receives is hardly sufficient, as the Committee from their own experience can testify, to supply the common necessities of life. They have concluded to submit to the Board, therefore, the propriety of granting a temporary relief to the petitioner by allowing him, in addition to his present Salary  $\frac{1}{2}$  per cent on the net revenue collected which will be an increase of about 350 dollars per annum and they offer the following [120] resolution accordingly:

" Resolved that Edward McLaughlin, the present Commissioner of Excise, be and he is hereby authorized to retain for his own use and benefit  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent on the net amount, after deducting his salary and

expences, of the revenue received by him as Commissioner of Excise during the present year."

The Committee are of opinion, therefore, that the prayer of the petition ought to be granted: but as that part of the City is much frequented by vessels with the produce of the country during the fall months and as the extending of the Sewer cannot be executed during the prevalence of frost it has been judged expedient by your Committee to defer the execution of the said work till next spring, and they propose the following resolution accordingly:

A petition of John Beattie, Catharine Grim and David Grim in relation to 25 feet reserved on Lot No. 1. belonging to the former estate of John Dykeman deceased, bounded on the east by Bowery Lane, part sold to a Mr. Smyth. and also 25 feet on said lot, part sold to Mr. Alexander, which property has been taken possession of, and praying the interference of the Board, was read & referred to the Street Committee and Street Commissioner.

on Pet. of John Grant

(omitted to be entered Oct. 25. see page 120.)

The Committee on Wharves, Piers and Slips, to whom was referred the petition of John Grant, praying that he may be released from keeping the Wharf on the west side of Pike Slip in repair, Report:

"That the petitioner owns a front on Water Street of 126 feet and holds a grant from the Corporation for the ground under water in front of his property extending 200 feet in the East River to Front Street: That he is bound by said grant when the lots shall be filled up to make and keep in repair a street of 24 feet wide on the easterly side of his property adjoining Charlotte, now Pike Slip: That for reasons unknown by your Committee a pier has been sunk by the agents of the Corporation about 7 feet west of the line of said Slip, which [151] occupies between 30 and 40 feet of the water right of the petitioner and is within 35 feet of the Wharf originally built by Dunlap and Grant.

The petitioner therefore complains, and in the opinion of your Committee very justly, that instead of the pier built by the Corporation being a benefit to him it is a serious injury, inasmuch as no revenue whatever can be derived from the west side of said pier, there being barely room for one vessel at a time to lie between that and the Wharf of the petitioner, when had not this encroachment been made on his water right he would have had room for two or three vessels a-breast of each other without inconvenience.

"The pier alluded to was built at the expence of the Corporation, is badly constructed & has already cost considerable sums for repairs,

upwards of a thousand dollars of which, as stated, has been paid by the petitioner & he is now called on to make further repairs to a large amount.

"Your Committee feel it to be their duty at all times to guard & defend the interest of the Corporation when [152] it can be done on just and equitable principles, but in the present case they are compelled to confess that they cannot see either justice or equity in claiming from the petitioner an expenditure of money for an object from which he has not, neither can he, from the nature of things derive the least advantage, but on the contrary which to him must prove a serious inconvenience. The Committee are of opinion therefore that the said pier ought to be repaired & kept in repair at the public expence, & they offer the following resolution accordingly.

"Resolved that the Superintendant of repairs be directed, under the instruction of the Street Commissioner, to cause the pier forming the West side of Pike Slip to be repaired in the most economical manner & at the public expence: provided said Grant relinquish any right or claim which he may have to Wharfage for vessels lying on the west side of the said pier."

The minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

A Letter was received from James Campbell stating that by joint resolution of the two houses of the Legislature at the last Session John Morss, Francis Cooper and himself were appointed Commissioners to report among other things on disposing of the State Prison [154] that as it is probable the Commissioners may under certain circumstances

recommend the Sale of the same they took the liberty of informing the Corporation thereof and request to know if they would be inclined to become the purchasers. Whereupon the same was referred to the Finance Committee.

A petition of Catharine Hubbard, Widow of Ruggles Hubbard deceased, was presented stating that an account for rent on Lots Nos. 84. 110. 163. and 188 Common Lands leased by her husband had been presented to her, that her said husband died insolvent and that she has not had nor does she ever expect to receive any Assets for her said husband's estate; that she is willing to surrender to the Corporation the Lease of said lots and prays said surrender may be accepted. Whereupon the same was referred to the Finance Committee with authority to accept the Surrender.

[155] A petition of David Churchill, Master of the Brig Pizarro, stating that he had hauled said Brig into Burling Slip by direction of the Harbour Master Captain Rogers: that he received a Notice from A. Sherman, Corporation Attorney stating that he had incurred a penalty by lying in said Slip: that the Attorney had received Ten Dollars from petitioner and recommended an Application to the Corporation for relief, and praying to be relieved from said fine: A Similar petition from Samuel Grafton, master of the Brig Robert Cochrane was also presented and read.

Whereupon both were referred to the Committee on public Offices with authority to give the relief required.

A petition of Thaddeus Smith for further time to pay a sum due by him to the Corporation was referred to the Finance Committee with authority to grant the prayer of petitioner.

A petition from Henry Barclay was received [156] stating that he has been ordered by the Street Commissioner to remove from his premises No. 7 Broad Street a Water Closet which communicates with the public basin: that said Water Closet is merely for the conveyance of water & of no offensive matter & praying a Committee may examine into the situation of the same. Whereupon it was referred to the Alderman & Assistant of the First Ward with authority to permit the continuance of the same.

A Memorial from a number of Inhabitants complaining of the practice of vessels from the eastward laden with fish lying for a length of time in Coenties Slip, selling their cargoes by small quantities & engrossing the births in said Slip to the exclusion of Coasters, was read and referred to the Committee on Wharves, Piers & Slips.

[157] A petition of Elizabeth Sagerson, whose husband John Sa-

gerson died with the late Epidemic, praying relief, was read and referred to the Commissioners of the Alms' house.

A petition of Charles F. Bunner for appointment as a City Weigher and of Henry Hutchings to be appointed to aid in enforcing the laws respecting the Sabbath, were read and referred to the Committee on Applications.

A petition of Eliphalet Wheeler, guardian of the Infant heirs of John Norman deceased, praying further time for payment of an Assessment due by estate of J. Norman deceased for opening Fourth Street, was read and referred to the Finance Committee with authority to grant the prayer of the petition.

A petition of Richard Suydam to be permitted to remove at his own expence a pump now on the side walk fronting his house No. 65 Pearl Street a few feet from its present situation [158] was referred to the Alderman & Assistant of the First Ward with authority to grant the prayer of the petitioner

A petition of William Bruce, praying relief from fine incurred by not taking out Excise Licence in due season, was read and referred to the Committee of Charity.

A petition for a Well and Pump near intersection of Spring and Thompson Streets and for one at the corner of Spring and Lawrence Streets were severally read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Ward and Street Commissioner to report an Ordinance therefor.

A petition of Joseph Houston for relief from penalty incurred, as stated, by using weights not regulated by the City Sealer, was referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

A petition that the expences of removing [159] the Well and privies may be included by the Commissioners in their Estimate of expences was referred to the Commissioners of Assessment on Oliver Street.

A Memorial was received from Messrs. Edward and William M. Hitchcock, stating that various circumstances had occurred which had materially affected and injured them in relation to their contracts for Docks & Slips and for the Street Manure and praying a Committee may be appointed to whom they may make an explanation, was read & referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

A Petition of James Haggart was received stating that he purchased from Francis Fowler the lease of the School room in Rose Street and the School Furniture thereof; that he is informed by the Corporation Collector a balance of rent was left unpaid by Mr. Fowler for which his property in said School room is liable, and praying relief, was read



& referred [160] to the Finance Committee with authority to grant relief.

A petition of James Boyd, whose wife is Administratrix on the estate of Archibald Smyth, stating that an Assessment has been laid on Lot No. 446 Greenwich Street owned by petitioner and on an adjoining lot belonging to the estate of said Archibald Smyth, that from various circumstances the estate of said Smith is not now in a condition to pay the said Assessment, and praying an indulgence of 3 months for the payment thereof, was referred to the Finance Committee with authority to grant relief.

A petition of Joseph Cleghorn praying to be restored to his Station as a Watchman from which he had been removed, was referred to the Watch Committee.

A Memorial of Joseph Joshua Dyster [161] was received, stating that he has invented a mode of propelling Boats far Superior to the present mode by oars or paddles and praying the patronage of the Corporation; whereupon the same was referred to the Committee on Arts and Sciences.

A Communication from the Sealer of Weights and measures recommending that Scales and weights be sent to the office of the Sealer for correction and adjustment was referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

A petition of Jacob Smith Jr. to be employed in repairing the hose of the Fire Engines was referred to the Committee on the Fire Department.

A Letter was received from Samuel D. Craig Esqr. stating the difficulty of procuring the attendance of Witnesses on prosecutions under Corporation Ordinances & suggesting the propriety of a Law to compel them to enter into recognizances for that purpose: which was referred to the Committee on Applications to Legislature.

The Street Commissioner presented the following respecting the pier west side of Pike Slip:

“That he furnished Mr. John Grant with a copy of the Resolution passed on the 25<sup>th</sup> ulto. relating to the pier at Pike Slip: that he has since called at the Office and left a verbal message that he would not accede to the terms.

“The undersigned has had a survey taken and an Estimate made of the expence of repairing said Wharf which will amount to at least fifteen hundred dollars.”

(signed) J. McComb St. Comm<sup>r</sup>

Whereupon resolved that he proceed in repairing said Slip.

[164] The Street Commissioner presented an Assessment for paving Washington Street from North Moore to Watts Street: also for repaving Greenwich Street 17 feet 8 inches southerly of Albany Street to 26 feet 9 inches southerly of Carlisle Street: also for paving Carlisle Street from Greenwich Street: also for paving Cedar Street from Greenwich Street to the Bulkhead, and for regulating and paving Church Street from Lispenard Street to Canal Street—which were severally confirmed and John G. Betts appointed Collector in each.

The Comptroller presented the following on the City Treasurer's account:

"That on the 4<sup>th</sup> inst. he received from the Chamberlain the enclosed account current of cash received into the Treasury and paid out by Warrants from April 24 to October 31. 1819 inclusive.

"Agreeably to a Law of the Common Council, passed the 24<sup>th</sup> day of April last [165] he has compared said account current with the books in his Office. The amount of cash received and paid, from April 24<sup>th</sup>, is correct, excepting 16 cents, an error in paying a Warrant on the 6<sup>th</sup> of September last. In consequence of an examination of the books kept by the late Treasurer and those in the Comptroller's Office, and which has not yet been completed, the Chamberlain has stated the amount actually received by him exclusive of the balance in the Treasury at the time of his entering into office. In a letter of the 4<sup>th</sup> inst. he observes that he has furnished an account current of monies received and paid from the date of his appointment, preferring this to taking up the balance of his former account, which embraced items received for account of the sinking fund. Sundry payments for interest on City Stock are not brought into view in this statement.

"Since the closing of this Account a Bond has been handed to the Treasurer for \$40,000. authorized by the Board on the 18<sup>th</sup> October last & reported in the cash account on the 25<sup>th</sup> ultimo.

[166] "There is also an account current with the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to the 1<sup>st</sup> inst. which is found correct and agrees with the books in this office, excepting the sum of \$12.74 balance in favor of the Commissioners when the present Treasurer came into office and which amount is also omitted for the reasons before mentioned."

whereupon the account was directed to be filed in the Office of the Clerk of Common Council.

The Counsel presented a Communication, stating that all the owners of the property on the easterly side of Oliver Street had agreed to the same arrangement as to those parts of the Street which are to be closed as on a former occasion excepting William L. Simers who had not yet been consulted, and as to the expediency of consulting him the Counsel [167] had doubts, as an arrangement with him might interfere with the future improvement of Henry Street and recommended that it be referred. Whereupon it was referred to the Street Committee.

The Counsel also presented a Lease to William L. Simers for 2 pieces of land Nos. 407 and 408 in the 10<sup>th</sup> Ward, owned by ———

Lawrence, situated on First Street which were sold to said Simers on 6<sup>th</sup> March 1817 for 17 years to satisfy an Assessment for opening 2<sup>d</sup> Avenue. Whereupon said Lease was directed to be executed.

He also presented the answer of the Corporation to the Bill in Chancery filed by Samuel St. John and Joseph Scofield for foreclosing a mortgage upon certain property mortgaged by John A. Graham to the Corporation. Whereupon the same was directed to be duly authenticated by the Corporate Seal & signature of the Mayor.

He also, agreeably to order presented the Draught [168] of an Ordinance entitled a "Law to prevent hogs running at large in the City of New York" in the words following:

"Be it ordained by the Mayor, Alderman & Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, that from and after the ——— day of ——— next it shall be lawful for any person to cause any hog which shall be found running at large in any of the public Streets or places in said City to be sent to either of the public pounds in the said City, and if the owner of such hog shall not pay to the Keeper of such pound ——— dollars for the use of the person who caused such hog to be sent to such pound, together with the fees of the keeper and all reasonable charges for feeding and keeping such hog (not exceeding 12 cents for every 24 hours such hog shall be impounded) within 6 days thereafter that then it shall and may be lawful for such keeper to sell such hog at public vendue, [169] giving at least 48 hours previous notice of such sale by advertisement to be affixed upon the outside of the door or gate of such pound, and out of the monies arising from such sale to retain in his hands his fees and charges for feeding and keeping such hog and of such sale and to pay over the residue thereof to the person who caused such hog to be impounded."

It was moved to strike out the words 'Southward of'—which was agreed to. It was also moved to strike out the word 'Ten' which was also agreed to. A motion was then made to refer the Bill to a Committee, which was negatived. It was then moved to strike out the words 'for replevying' and agreed to. The question was then taken on agreeing to the Ordinance so amended and as above set forth and it passed in the Negative. The Ayes & noes, having been called by Alderman Taylor were as follow:

[170] The Counsel made a Communication on the subject of a suit that he was instructed to commence against the heirs of Peter P. Van Zandt for the recovery of an Acre of land lying on the old Boston Road; whereupon the same was referred to the Finance Committee.

The City Inspector presented Ordinances for correction of sundry nuisances, which were passed:

The Special Committee, to whom had been referred the objections against the Canal Street Assessment, Reported:

"That they have endeavoured to bestow all the attention and consideration on the subject which its importance requires: [171] that they have heard the petitioners by their Counsel and obtained information and explanations from the Assessors. The petitioners object to the Assessment because in their opinion all the property intended to be benefitted by the Sewer has not been Assessed and of course too great a proportion has fallen on them, and assert that the Sewer was necessary to carry off the water from some ground which is not assessed, particularly the Collect ground and Lispenard's Meadow, and that some of the property which is not assessed is as much benefitted as the lots on Canal Street; that the Corporation possesses no powers but such as are derived from the Legislature, and that the Assessors were bound to conform to the law of the State which authorised the making of this Sewer and directed the expence to be assessed on all those benefitted. They complain that the Assessment is disproportioned and unequal within the limits to which it is confined and state that the Corporation sanctioned a much more extended Assessment when Canal Street ground [172] was purchased for a Water course.

"Your Committee fully agree with the petitioners in the opinion that it was the duty of the Assessors to assess all that were benefitted by the construction of the Sewer, but cannot think with them that this principle was not the basis on which this Assessment was founded.

"In the opinion of the Committee so extended an Assessment as the one alluded to by the petitioners would not have been just and correct when the ground for a water course was purchased at a great

expende and the cost paid by all the lots from whence it was supposed the waters would flow into this outlet. The owners thus acquired a right of passage for their water thro' Canal Street as a common water course, and to those at a distance from this Street it could not be particularly interesting what kind of Sewer was constructed, but to the lots on Canal Street and in its vicinity [173] it was of the greatest importance, as is fully proved by the result, lots there having increased in value at least 100 per cent, as your Committee are informed since it was concluded to build this expensive Sewer.

"It appears that the Assessment extends on each side of Canal Street about 400 feet and is considerably reduced on each lot as the distance increases, obviously because the nearest are most benefitted by covering what was an offensive open kennel which constantly emitted disagreeable & perhaps noxious effluvia.

"Your Committee have paid particular attention to the complaint of inequality and disproportion in the Assessment on lots in the same or similar situations and are satisfied, after hearing the explanations and reasons assigned by the Assessors in every questionable case that a more just discrimination could not have been made.

"With these impressions and views of the subject referred to them your Committee cannot hesitate to recommend the confirmation [174] of the Assessment: they therefore respectfully offer the following resolution:

"Resolved that the Assessment for constructing Canal Street Sewer, as reported by the Assessors, be confirmed."

which was approved, the resolution adopted, and on motion Noah Jarvis was appointed Collector of said Assessment.

The Alderman and Assistant of the 3<sup>d</sup> Ward presented the following report of their visit to the Bellevue Establishment:

"That agreeably to a resolution of the Board they have inspected the Establishment at Bellevue and have the satisfaction of being able to state that in their opinion every attention is paid to the comfort of those who by misfortune or other causes have been under the necessity of taking up their abode in the [175] Alms' house. The whole number now in that Establishment is 1751. Viz. 445 men, 500 women, 479 boys and 327 girls.

"In the Hospital there are 67 women & 63 men, who are visited

daily by the physician of the House and weekly by the reverend Mr. Stanford, Chaplain to the Institution.

"There are 28 men in the apartment for maniacs whose situation appears to the Committee as comfortable as can reasonably be expected in an Establishment on so large & extensive a Scale.

"The Schools appear to be well attended. In the one there are about 250 boys and in the other 110 girls.

"About 300 of the paupers are kept constantly at work, some at the Stone Quarry in breaking out and dressing Stone for a Wall contemplated at some future day to enclose the whole of that Establishment, others at carding, spinning, weaving, shoe-making &c. by which means nearly the whole of the clothing used by the paupers is manufactured by themselves from the raw materials, and the remainder of [176] such as are able are employed in the necessary work of the Establishment, cooking, baking &c. or as nurses for the sick, aged and infirm.

"In the Penitentiary there are 197 males and 136 females. Of the former about 100 are kept daily at work on the roads and Avenues, and of the latter a large proportion have been committed as Vagrants.

"The Committee are of opinion that a large proportion of paupers at present in the Alms' house are Aliens and their children, or from parts of the United States other than the City or even State of New York."

The Finance Committee, on the petition of Moses Dodd, reported:

"That in their opinion it is inexpedient for the Board to enter into said arrangement inasmuch as it would interfere with the duties of the [177] Collectors charged with the collection of the several sums due by the petitioner and by those means introduce a method of transacting public business at least exceptionable and unprecedented, if not injurious to the correctness necessary in keeping the accounts. They therefore propose the following resolution:

The Street Committee and Counsel, to whom was referred the Communication of the Counsel respecting Lispenard Street, presented a report which was laid for consideration.

The Police Committee, on the petition and account of Benjamin Watson, Registerer of Dogs, reported:

"That they have had Mr. Watson's account together with the objections of the Comptroller under consideration and are of the opinion that the Comptroller's objections are correct. Your Committee, however, think that Mr. Watson ought to [179] be refunded the monies which he has expended for printing and posting hand bills, and also for the services of the persons employed by him to carry the law into effect, such aid being absolutely necessary, also the monies expended by him for a horse and cart.

"The Committee have annexed to this Report Mr. Watson's account made out according to their views on the subject and which makes a balance in favor of Mr. Watson of 358 dollars and 35 cents instead of 574 dollars and 78½ cents as stated by Mr. Watson. They beg leave to offer the following resolution:

"Resolved that Mr. Benjamin Watson's account be settled upon the principles stated in this report and that a Warrant issue in his favor for 358 dollars 35 cents to be paid out of the first monies in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated."

A presentment of the Grand Jury held at the Sessions in November instant, stating that the repeated escapes of the prisoners from the Penitentiary required the attention of the Municipal authorities, was read and referred to the Police Committee.

A memorial from Robert Benson and David S. The Committee on Public Offices, to whom had been referred the petitions of Caulfield & Toole, Richard Kirby and Patrick Gartland, Reported:

"That the facts in these cases are similar, so far as your Committee have had an opportunity of judging of them. By the statement of the City Sealer the deficiency in their respective weights and

measures were and had been for a long time very [219] considerable.

"Your Committee are not disposed to charge these individuals with intentional fraud, tho' they do think them from the representations of the City Sealer guilty of gross negligence in not seeing that their weights & measures were more correct. The injury to the public is the same whether an individual gives light weight and short measure thro' negligence or design, and on the whole your Committee think that the suits in these cases should proceed & therefor offer the following resolution:

"Resolved that the Attorney proceed in the suits commenced against the persons mentioned in this report."

Resolved that the Counsel be instructed to prepare a petition to the Legislature, together with a Law authorizing [276] the Corporation to assess on the real and personal estate in this City a sum not exceeding 150,000 dollars to be applied to the rebuilding and regulating the Battery, said sum to be collected in instalments of 25,000 dollars each year and to be apportioned by the Supervisors of the County among the several wards as in their judgment will be just and equitable, and also authorizing the Corporation to borrow the

whole or any part of the said sum of 150,000 dollars, for the payment of which the proceeds of said tax shall be pledged."

A motion was made to strike out the following words 'And to be apportioned by the supervisors of the County among the several wards as in their judgment will be just & equitable.'

The question being taken thereon it passed in the Negative. The Ayes and Nays, having been called by Al- [277] derman Taylor, were as follow:

The Finance Committee, having been informed that a large sum of money amounting to 37,422 dollars is due the Corporation by the General Government for awards paid to persons on Long Island and elsewhere for damage done their land in erecting the fortifications during the late war, and it being the opinion of your Committee that the money is justly due the Corporation and that [279] an effort ought to be made for the recovery of the same, they have concluded to recommend to the Board that a respectful memorial be presented to the Congress of the United States and that a person be sent to Washington to make such explanations on the subject as may be deemed necessary, and they propose the following resolution accordingly:

Resolved that the Counsel be instructed to prepare a respectful Memorial to the Congress of the United States, praying that a law may be passed authorizing the Secretary of the Treasury to liquidate the accounts of the Corporation for the amount paid in satisfying the claims of persons damaged by erecting the fortifications on Long Island or elsewhere during the late war and also for manning and equipping Gunboats during the said War.

Resolved that the Committee on Finance be authorized to appoint a person to repair to Washington with said Memorial and to give such explanations on the [280] subject of the claim of the Corporation as may be proper and necessary; provided the expence of said mission shall not exceed the sum of 200 dollars.

The Finance Committee, on the petition for and the remonstrance against filling in Old Slip, reported:

That they have had the subject under consideration, and in order that the parties might have an opportunity of explaining their views more fully to the Committee, two gentlemen on each side of the question were invited and did attend a meeting for the purpose. Your Committee have endeavoured to weigh with candor [281] and impartiality the reasons offered for and the objections against the measure and have concluded as the best opinion they can form that it is inexpedient to fill up said Slip. Without giving any opinion as to the origin of the Fever, whether it is local or imported, your Committee may be permitted to say that the fact of the existence of such a basin as the Old Slip in this City does not prove that yellow or malignant fever is generated by it, any more than by Coenties Slip, Coffee house Slip, Burling Slip, Peck Slip or James' Slip, all of which are nearly the same as to situation and some of them much worse in condition; and if the power of generating yellow fever is good reason for filling up the Old Slip, it will hold equally good for filling up all the others--a measure, it is presumed, too absurd to be seriously recommended.

The cost of carrying the object of the petitioners into effect, in the opinion of your Committee cannot be estimated at a less sum than 30,000 dollars; and, while they [282] are unable to see the necessity



of the measure, they are unwilling to burthen the owners of property in the vicinity with an expence so great and that too in opposition to the remonstrance of a large majority of them.

Your Committee beg leave to remind the Board also that one third of the cost for filling Slips is paid from the Public Treasury, and as it is well ascertained that the disbursements for the next year will not only absorb the ordinary Revenue but all that can be obtained through the Legislature, they cannot recommend a measure which will only tend to embarrass the finances of the City without producing any beneficial result.

Your Committee beg leave to suggest one other consideration against the measure referred to their consideration. There is no subject which has been so much insisted on for the last [283] three years and has engaged so much the attention of the Board as that there is a want of Slip room in this City, and, altho' during that period there has been an annual expenditure of 60,000 dollars and more for that purpose and 3 or 4 new Slips have been added to those in public use, we are still occasionally informed that more room is wanted and more money is required to build piers and enlarge the public basins. It would therefore, in the opinion of your Committee, be the worst of policy to comply with the wishes of the petitioners and thereby lessen the Slips on the one hand by filling one of them up, while on the other we are expending a large sum yearly to increase and enlarge them. With these considerations the Committee propose the following resolution:

Resolved that it is at present inexpedient to fill up the Old Slip."

That your Committee believe it is well known to every member of this Board that the Humane Society has been established [300] in this City for many years. It was first organized for the purpose of giving food and other aid to suffering prisoners confined in the gaol of this City, and the benefits of the Institution have since been extended by the Managers by the gratuitous distribution of Soup to the indigent. The Managers convinced of the utility of this Charity are still desirous of continuing their exertions for relieving the Prisoner and the indigent poor, but from the pressure of the times they find that many of the sources from which they have hitherto received aid have now failed while the calls upon them for assistance have increased. Their

funds, it is believed, are not adequate to the expected demands of the ensuing winter and they ask for pecuniary aid. The Committee are of opinion that the request of the Society ought to be granted and they beg leave to [301] offer the following resolution:

The contract with the said Anderson binds him to complete the pier alluded to on the 1<sup>st</sup> of October last in such manner as is therein described, and that the work shall be approved by the Committee and Street Commissioner and be upheld and kept in repair by the Contractor for 8 months thereafter; by which it is evident that not only the risk in sinking the Blocks but the stability of the whole work for a period of 8 months is to be borne and supported by the person making the Contract and that these risks were to be taken into calculation in estimating the amount of cost.

The Committee, considering that the Contractors were performing their contract to the utmost of their power, [320] directed the Attorney to inform the Contractors when any complaints were made against them but to commence no suits without the direction of the Committee. Under these instructions the Attorney communicated from time to time the various complaints to the Contractors. It is for this service, principally, of entering the complaints and communicating the notices to the Contractors that the Attorney renders his Bill of about 315 dollars. It is proper to observe that this Bill is made out in conformity to the letter of the standing Resolution of the Board. The circumstance of there being a large number of these complaints and a general direction that there be no suits commenced and the fact that several of these complaints were usually included in one note or notice is probably sufficient to make it proper that the [321] Bill should be made up on other principles than charging \$5. in each case.

But your Committee are decidedly of opinion that, whether the whole or part of this is paid, the Street Contractors should be relieved from the payment of it altogether.

The Contractors have already paid the Court costs in all the suits commenced against them, and a variety of circumstances have rendered their Street contract a very losing concern. Under all the circumstances, your Committee would offer the following resolutions.

which was approved and the Comptroller directed to prepare a Warrant in favor of Mr. Craig for the balance due from the Corporation on account of the Estate of Edward Rogers, upon receiving the usual Bond of indemnity.

The Attorney presented sundry reports on complaints submitted to him—which were referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

The Report of the Committee on Applications to the Legislature on dividing the Mayor's duties and the [341] resolution presented by Alderman Allen on appointing a First Judge of this County, which had been laid for consideration on the 20<sup>th</sup> of December last, were called up and agreed to in the words following:

‘Report of the Committee.’

In the opinion of your Committee it is a matter of much moment to the good people of this City to have a permanent First Judge, of competent abilities, to preside in their Court of Common Pleas.

In the formation of this opinion your Committee have not been influenced by any personal inducements. Their deliberations have been guided by considerations grounded on principles of practical utility and the necessities of the people; and they wish expressly to be understood that this report is not intended to have any personal bearing. On the contrary, your Committee are of opinion that the season of peace and prosperity, when the morals of the people are pure and reason unobstructed in her course, [342] is the most fit time to establish the foundations of an independent judiciary.

In the completion of this end, it was in the opinion of your Committee very desirable to avoid any increase of the public burdens, already much too great; and, in the consideration which they have been enabled to give the subject, it has appeared to them that the best mode of obtaining the object sought for will be by relieving the Mayor from the duty of presiding as First Judge in the Court of Sessions, the Court of Common Pleas and also from holding the Court of Exchequer: that the Recorder should preside in the Sessions, and that there should be

appointed a First Judge in & for the City and County of New York, to preside in the Court of Common Pleas and to hold his office during good behaviour or until 60 years of age, [343] and also to have the like powers as a Commissioner as the Recorder: and that the organization and style of those Courts should respectively remain as they are now, except as to the presiding judges: that in the sickness, absence or inability of the First Judge, the Recorder should preside in the Court of Common Pleas, and in case of the sickness, absence or inability of the Recorder, the First Judge should preside in the Court of Sessions.

Your Committee are aware that this system will not give permanency to the Presiding Judge in the Court of Sessions, but they have not perceived that the public voice has yet been exerted to that purpose & they have not deemed it expedient to go farther than public sentiment seemed to require.

They have also considered the subject in regard to the compensation to be secured to the First Judge & the Recorder, and it appears to them that, in consequence of relieving the Mayor from his judicial duties [344] in those Courts, a reduction of 2,000 dollars may reasonably be made in his Salary and given to the Recorder as a compensation for his services in the Sessions, and that the fees of first motions in the Court of Common Pleas be taken from the Recorder and given to the First Judge, which, with the usual fees for chamber business, will it is supposed be a sufficient compensation to these officers. Your Committee therefore respectfully submit the following Resolution:

Resolved that the Counsel be instructed to prepare the draught of a law in conformity with the foregoing Report, and also the usual petition to the Legislature praying that the same may be passed.

Resolved that the Counsel be farther instructed to insert a clause in the Bill to be prepared on the subject of appointing a First Judge of this County &c. repealing so much of the Act, passed on the 20<sup>th</sup> of April 1818, as authorizes any of the Aldermen of this City, as Judges of the Court of Common Pleas, to execute the Act for relief against absconding & absent debtors and the act for relief in cases of insolvency.

Alderman Allen presented the following:

Resolved that the Comptroller be instructed to pay to the Con-

tractors for building the Sewer in Canal Street a Bond for 22,032 dollars 45 cents, being the balance due them on said contract, and that such bonds bear interest from the 27<sup>th</sup> of December last and be executed in the usual manner by the President of this Board.

Which being read was agreed to.

[346] On motion of Alderman Hone, the Report of the Special Committee on the Battery of the 13<sup>th</sup> December 1819 was called up, an amendment proposed by Alderman Allen agreed to, and, after some discussion, the consideration thereof was postponed until the 1<sup>st</sup> day of June next and the Committee discharged.

The minutes of last meeting were read & approved.

A petition of William Lambert for a cistern in front of No. 77 James Street, and of Samuel Martin & others for one in First Street near the First Avenue, were read and referred [350] to the Aldermen and Assistants of the Wards and Street Commissioner.

A petition of Carlo Galiardine for some employment under the Corporation, was referred to the Committee on Applications.

Petitions from James Buckmaster, George Betts, John Campbell, Ebenezer Burling and C. Gay for appointment as Clerks to the District Courts about to be established in this City; from William Pearsall for appointment of City Measurer; from John Knapp for appointment of Weighmaster with permission to erect Hay Scales near Fort Gansevoort, were severally referred to the Committee on Applications

A petition from William Sanford complaining of Assessment for paving Washington Street, was read & referred to the Committee on Assessments.

[351] A petition of Elizabeth Allen, praying that part of the funds raised by the sale of the property of Margaret Clark deceased, taken possession of by Mr. Whitehead Fish, then Chamberlain of the City, be restored for the support of Mary Clark, the daughter of the said Elizabeth Clark, was read & referred to the Comptroller.

A petition of Henry Webb, praying to have exchange for \$3.50 of Corporation Notes defaced, was read & referred to the Finance Committee.

A petition of Sarah Denny respecting an improvement made by her husband William Denny, deceased, in the construction of pumps, was read & referred to the Committee of Charity.

Petitions from White & Willis and from Smith & Mills for remission of fines incurred for selling liquor contrary to law, was read & referred to the Police Committee with power.

A Representation from Peter Myer, stating [352] that in consequence of opening the 8<sup>th</sup> Avenue there is now a Road on each side of his house and also one from the old road to the 8<sup>th</sup> Avenue, all within 100 feet of the door of his dwelling, and requesting permission to close the present Cross Road and to open & work 130<sup>th</sup> Street at his own expence—was referred to the Road Committee with power.

A petition of Thomas M<sup>c</sup>Cready, stating that by a mistake in copying the tax book of the 1<sup>st</sup> Ward he was assessed with \$19.35 more than was intended by the Assessors, with certificates from the Assessors and Collector to that effect, was read and referred to the Committee on Assessments.

The Annual report from Benjamin Prince, the Public Administrator, was received and referred to the Finance Committee.

The Street Commissioner stated to the Board that while attending to his duty in causing the Streets to be cleared of incumbrances he was compelled to notice the disagreeable situation of the walks around the public buildings, especially during the winter season: that said walks

were formerly cleared under [354] direction of the Superintendent of the Alms' house & the Keeper of the Bridewell, and, as the partial clearing of said walks is expensive, tho' imperfectly done, he suggested that some arrangement might perhaps be made to have this service performed by the people in Bridewell. He also suggested the propriety of a resolution authorizing him to cause the snow to be removed from the pavement in front of vacant houses & lots or of such whose owners could not be found. Whereupon the same was referred to the Committee on Public Lands & Places with power.

He also presented the following Return of delinquents on sundry Assessments—which were confirmed & Warrants issued to Morris De Camp, Collector, for collecting the same: Viz. For paving Essex Street from Grand to Broome Street; for paving the Bowery from Grand to [355] Broome Street; for regulating Fourth Street from the Bowery to 6<sup>th</sup> Avenue: for a Well & pump in Henry Street, and for a Well & pump in Arundel near Delancey Street.

He also presented an Assessment for regulating & paving the lower end of Duane and Reade Streets and one for paving part of Sullivan Street—which were confirmed and John G. Betts appointed Collector in each.

He also presented an Ordinance for a Well & Pump in Broome near Sullivan Street, which was passed & Abraham Bloodgood, John Brower & Abraham Boudouine were appointed Assessors.

He also presented an Assessment for paving Market Street from Harman to Cherry Street—which was confirmed and Morris De Camp appointed Collector.

The Attorney reported sundry complaints [356] submitted to him—which were referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

The Counsel presented for execution a deed to John Suydam of Lots No. 5 and 9, and a deed to Garrit Storm of Lot No. 20 near Washington Market, purchased by them of the Common Council at the public sale under the direction of the Comptroller; which were ordered to be duly executed.

The Council, on the subject of closing part of Oliver Street, presented a communication—which was read & the consideration thereof postponed.

The Road Committee, on the petition of David S. Jones & others, reported:

That the Commissioners who were appointed to assess the amount of benefit and damage in opening the 6<sup>th</sup> Avenue did award as the [357] amount of damage to the land of Samuel Jones (the Messrs.



Jones) the sum of 73 dollars: but by their subsequent declaration, which is subjoined to this report, state that no allowance was made for surplus earth on account of the uncertainty in which that matter was involved: And, as your Committee have learned by an inspection of the profile, and also by information derived from the Street Commissioner, that an alteration has taken place in the elevation of the Streets &c. in that vicinity (since the report of the Commissioners) which leaves a large surplus of earth on the premises alluded to, the Messrs. Jones having received no compensation for it, your Committee are of opinion that they should have leave to remove the surplus earth in front of their premises on the 6<sup>th</sup> Avenue. They, therefore, beg leave to offer the following resolution:

Resolved that Samuel Jones, William Jones, Elbert H. Jones and David S. Jones have leave to remove the surplus [358] earth in front of their land on the 6<sup>th</sup> Avenue, under direction of the Street Commissioner.

Alderman Thorp, on the subject of rebuilding & regulating the Battery, presented the three following resolutions:

1. Resolved that the Counsel be instructed to prepare a petition to the Legislature, together with a Law authorizing the Corporation to assess on the real & personal estate in this City a sum not exceeding 150,000 dollars, to be applied to the [361] rebuilding and regulating the Battery, said sum to be collected in instalments of 25,000 dollars each year and to be apportioned by the Supervisors of the County among the several wards as in their judgment will be just and equitable and also authorizing the Corporation to borrow the whole or any part of the said sum of 150,000 dollars for the payment of which the proceeds of said tax shall be pledged.

2. Resolved that the Clerk of this Board be instructed to cause to be inserted in one or more of the newspapers printed in this City, and also in the paper printed by the printer of this State, a notice of the intention of this Corporation to apply for the aforesaid tax and the object for which it is required, such notice to be in conformity with the laws on that subject.

3. Resolved that on the passage of the law authorizing the aforesaid tax, the Street Commissioner be authorized to enter into contracts, under direction of a [362] Committee to be appointed for that purpose, for building the wall agreeably to the plan and description heretofore submitted and for filling up the space between the contiguous

ground and "for any other matter necessary to complete the whole plan."

The Second resolution was adopted.

On the question of agreeing to the first and third, they were both carried in the Affirmative as follows:

Affirmative. Mr. Recorder; Aldermen King, Morss, Taylor, Thorp, Allen; Assistants. Bolton, Stevens, Crane, Davis 10.

Negative. Aldermen Anthony, McQueen, Mann: Assistants Westervelt, Parker, Brittain, Board, Hammond 8.

The former Committee on the subject of the Battery having been at the last meeting discharged, a new Committee was appointed of [363] the following Members: Aldermen Taylor Hone Allen King Morss Thorp & Assistant Brittain

The following resolution was presented & agreed to:

Resolved that the Committee on Applications to the Legislature be directed to enquire into the expediency of extending the Fire Limits from the intersection of Cherry and Clinton Streets up Clinton Street to Division Street and down Division Street to the Bowery.

The Report of the Finance Committee on the City finances, made December 27, 1819, was called up & read as follows:

The Finance Committee have conceived it to be their duty to lay before the Board the result of their enquiries and [364] examinations into the state of the City Finances. This duty appears to be imposed upon them more from the construction of the City government than from precedent, as it does not appear that heretofore any estimates have been reported to the Board of the probable receipts and expenditures upon which a judgment could be formed of the amount necessary for the disbursements of the next ensuing year. The Committee are of opinion, however, that reports of this tenor are equally as necessary in conducting the financial department of this City as in governments of more extensive territory or of greater population; and until some such system is adopted and regular appropriations are made for every particular item of expenditure and the Board restrained from exceeding such appropriations, financial embarrass- [365] ments will continue to exist and the City Debt will eventually increase until it becomes a burthen on our citizens and a serious injury to their prosperity.

The Committee are not prepared to say that it ought to be considered the duty of the Finance Committee to prepare these annual exhibits; for from their own experience they are satisfied that few men will be found to continue long in an office that requires of them, in

addition to other duties, the time and labor necessary, under the present arrangements of the accounts and the scanty means afforded by the Departments, to prepare a statement sufficiently correct to be depended on. The principal object of this Report, however, is not to bring forward any new system of Finance but merely to state the amount of the probable receipts and disbursements for the next year and the means proposed by the Committee to supply the deficiency.

The calculations entered into by the [366] Committee are founded on an average estimate of the receipts and expenditures of the last three years, adding to, and deducting from particular items such sums as their experience and judgment would warrant: which result in the following amounts:

The payments into the Treasury from the ordinary sources of revenue for the year 1820 are estimated at \$112,299, and the ordinary expenditures for the same period at \$485,776, leaving a deficit in the receipts (see statement A) of.....	\$373,477.00

The means proposed by the Committee for raising this deficit are as follow:

1. A Tax of \$250.00, and in addition to add the amount to be paid to Common Schools, the insolvent returns of the present year and the expence of collecting the whole; which together are estimated at .....	\$270,000.
2. To fund in stock bearing an interest of 6 per ct. per annum....	400,000.
To which add the bonds issued in part payment for the Sewer in Canal St. and which are to be repaid from the Assessment now in progress .....	60,000.
And the amount paid for forming the reef at the Battery, to be repaid to the Treasury from a special tax for the purpose.....	17,266.
Making a total equal to the deficit.....	\$747,266.

The amount already funded being [368] \$900,000. the least sum at which the City debt will stand at the close of the next year is \$1,300,000.

The Committee have selected two subjects of expence, both of large amount, for the purpose of doing away an impression they believe to be generally entertained that the cost of these improvements are principally, if not altogether, disbursed from the receipts. They refer to the improvements in opening, widening & extending Streets in the City, in opening and working the Avenues and Roads and in repairing, enlarging & otherwise improving the public docks & Slips.

The amount expended more than has been received, agreeably to the account opened in the Comptroller's Book on that subject, for improvements in opening Streets for a period of only 19 months, is \$103,666  $\frac{9}{100}$ ; and the [369] amount paid on the same principle for surveying, opening and working the Roads and Avenues is \$142,884  $\frac{11}{100}$ —(see statement F.)

The Committee are unable to account in a satisfactory manner for the cause of this large difference; but they presume a portion of the amount on Streets arises from the insufficiency of the Assessment in the first instance; from the value of one third of the buildings removed to be paid by the Corporation, and gores of land assessed to them but of little value. And the amount paid on the avenues arises, in some measure, from the same cause, together with the expence for working, for which as yet nothing has been collected from the owners of the property in their vicinity.

The amount paid on docks & slips, more than has been received, for about 5 years, is \$132,058  $\frac{89}{100}$ —(see statement G) and is to be accounted for by the annual cost of repairs necessary to the public piers, the purchase of private property for public Slips [370] and the building of new piers in different parts of the City. A deduction ought to be made from this sum, however, of about \$30,000—for filling Dey Street Slip and that now filling at the foot of Charlton Street.

The Committee have proceeded with their estimates on the presumption that no extraordinary expenditure will occur either in the present or the next year: the two expensive improvements, therefore, viz. the new Fly Market and the Battery, are kept out of view; and if the Board should decide to enter on one or both of them, the expence must be provided for from means not taken into calculation by this report.

The Committee have frequently had occasion to remind the Board of the situation of the finances and the increase of the City debt. In [371] 1817 an estimate was entered into for the purpose of ascertaining the probable amount of the receipts and disbursements for the next year; and the result was, that altho' the taxes were increased \$70,000—

there still remained a deficit to be provided for by loans of \$107,828: and nearly the same result was produced entered into the succeeding year. The taxes then recommended are now collecting, and the difficulties at that time anticipated by the Committee, and now experienced by the Citizens in their payment, owing to the extraordinary situation of the times, are a sufficient apology for not recommending an increase of their amount. Altho' the results of these estimates were not communicated to the Board in a formal report, it must be within the recollection of the members that they have frequently been brought into view when some favorite improvement was under consideration & urged as a reason why the expence should not be [372] incurred. The sale of public property in 1817-'18 is the cause that the deficits of those years were considerably less than now reported: and the only reason the Committee have to offer for not recommending a larger amount of tax at this time, is the pressure of the times and the consequent inconvenience to those who have to pay them.

The Committee beg leave to recommend to the Board the strictest economy in their expenditures, & that no new expence be entered upon or new improvement undertaken, except such as are absolutely necessary or imperiously called for.

The time for the meeting of the Legislature having nearly arrived, and it being necessary that application should be made to that honorable body authorizing the tax and loan alluded to in this exhibit the Com- [373] mittee propose the following Resolutions:

Resolved that the Counsel be instructed to prepare a Bill to be presented to the Legislature, authorizing the Corporation to assess on the real and personal estate in this City the sum of \$250,000, and such additional sum as will be sufficient to raise the amount payable to Common Schools and the insolvent returns of the present year, together with the expence of collecting the whole sum.

Resolved that he also be instructed to prepare a Bill authorizing the Corporation to borrow a sum not exceeding \$400,000 and to issue for the same certificates of Stock bearing an interest of 6 pct. per annum, payable quarter yearly, and that he report such Bills to this Board, together with respectful petitions to the Legislature for their concurrence.

The Counsel informed the Board that the reports of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the cases of Washington and Gold Streets had been confirmed, and he [406] recommended that Col-

lectors be appointed to collect the same. Whereupon John G. Betts was appointed Collector in the former and Morris De Camp in the latter.

A Communication was received from the Comptroller on the subject of the defective manner of assessing personal property in the City of New York—which was read and referred to the Committee on Applications to the Legislature.

The Committee to whom was referred the resolution for instructing the Counsel to prepare a petition to the Legislature to authorize the Common Council to abandon the projected removal of the Fly Market, presented a Report, the consideration of which was postponed.

[407] The Committee appointed to draft rules and regulations for the government of the Penitentiary, presented a report accompanied with an Ordinance which was approved and the Ordinance passed. Their Report was as follows:

The Committee &c. report for the consideration of the Common Council the accompanying Ordinance and state that the establishment of further regulations may, in the opinion of your Committee, with great propriety be left to the Commissioners, who are charged with the general superintendence and government of the Alms' house, Bridewell and Penitentiary and who are duly authorized to make all necessary rules and regulations for the government of the same.

The Ordinance presented was as follows:

[408] A Law for the government of the Penitentiary and for other purposes.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, in Common Council convened—That there shall be appointed by the Common Council a sober and discreet person to be called and known by the name of the "Keeper of the Penitentiary," who shall keep all persons committed to him, in the same manner and under the same penalties as the Sheriffs of the other Counties, in the gaols of the respective Counties, the criminals committed to them. He shall be allowed an annual salary of one thousand dollars, payable quarterly; and shall, before he enters on the duties of his office, take and subscribe an oath, before the Mayor or Recorder, that he will [409] faithfully execute the duties of the said Office.

Section 2. And be it farther ordained—That there shall be appointed by the Common Council three Deputy Keepers, at an annual Salary of Four hundred and fifty dollars each, payable quarterly.

Section 3. And be it farther ordained—That there may be appointed from time to time by the Commissioners of the Alms House, Bridewell and Penitentiary a number of Assistant or out-door keepers, who shall have the charge and safe keeping of the prisoners during their employment on the roads or otherwise: And the said Commissioners shall have power to employ four of the said Assistant keepers as Watchmen for the Penitentiary and to allow them such additional compensation for that service as they may think reasonable: And the number of the said Assistant Keepers shall not exceed Ten.

Section 4. And be it farther ordained—That no allowance shall be made to the said [410] Keeper of the Penitentiary, or to either of the said Deputy keepers, for family expences, either in furniture or provisions: Provided, nevertheless, that the Keeper of the Penitentiary, but not the Deputy keepers, may be permitted to make use of the ordinary supplies of the House for himself and his own proper family; and the said Deputy keepers, but not their families, may eat at the said Penitentiary of the provisions furnished for the use of the House; but the family of no Deputy Keeper shall be permitted to reside in the said Penitentiary.

Section 5. And be it farther ordained—That no corporal punishment, for improper conduct or disobedience, shall be inflicted on the prisoners by the Keeper of the Penitentiary, or his deputies or Assistants, until report is made to the Commissioners [411] of the Alms house, Bridewell and Penitentiary; but it shall be the duty of the said keepers or Assistants to confine offenders until a hearing and decision of the said Commissioners.

Section 6.—And be it farther ordained—That all Officers, agents and persons employed in and about the said Alms house, Bridewell and Penitentiary (except where by law they are differently provided for) shall be appointed by the said Commissioners of the Alms house, Bridewell and Penitentiary.

The Committee on Laws, on the petition of Philip Briggs, reported: That under the particular circumstances of the case they recommend a remission of the penalty & a discontinuance of the suit, on the payment of the costs, and offer the following Resolution:

Resolved that the penalties forfeited by Philip Briggs be remitted,



and that the Attorney be authorized to discontinue [412] the suit against him, on payment of all costs.

Reports were received from the Aldermen and Assistants of the several Wards composing the Four Districts in which are to be held the Courts lately organized, on the subject of convenient rooms for holding the same—which were severally read as follows, the reports approved & the Resolutions adopted.

I. The Aldermen and Assistants of the 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>d</sup> & 3<sup>d</sup> Wards reported: That they have, in compliance with a resolution of the Common Council passed Monday the 17<sup>th</sup> inst. made enquiry for a proper place to hold the Justices Court in for the First District and have found but two [413] that can be procured which in their opinion would be suitable; one in the present Court Room in Wall Street, with a small apartment annexed that would answer for a Jury Room. The rent will be \$56  $\frac{25}{100}$  from the 1<sup>st</sup> February to 1<sup>st</sup> May.

The other is the Long Room No. 1 Spruce Street, with the use of a Jury Room and of the fixtures, all of which are offered for twenty dollars. As no place nearer the centre of the District can be procured at present, it is therefore proper to offer the following Resolution:

Resolved that it be the duty of the Alderman of the First Ward to agree with James Connolly for the Long Room No. 1 Spruce Street on the terms proposed by him.

The Building now occupied by Justice Bartlett as the 6<sup>th</sup> Ward Court, situate in Tryon Row; which may be had, with the fixtures at \$150 per annum or \$200. for 15 months.

Also the lower part of that large and commodious new Brick building, situate in the 4<sup>th</sup> Ward and owned by Mr. Young, near the division line of the two Wards, fronting on Duane Street and immediately in



the rear of the lot on which Tammany Hall stands and being a part of the same; altho' perfectly distinct from it, having an entry of its own: which premises may be had from the present period until May 1. 1821, making 15 months for \$200. and for every succeeding year for \$150.

Your Committee would therefore recommend that the last mentioned [415] building be taken for the purposes contemplated, as being every way superior and much more convenient than the former, it being sufficiently large to partition off into three rooms—viz. Court, Clerk's and Jury rooms, and at a trifling expence.

The Committee on Applications to the Legislature, on the resolution respecting the assessing of benefits on the opening of Streets, Reported:

That they have considered the subject and are of opinion that the public good requires the repeal of so much of the 178<sup>th</sup> Section of the Act to reduce several laws relating particularly to the City of New York into one act as authorizes the Commissioners of estimate and Assessment to assess any part of the estimated value of any building or buildings to be removed [419] by virtue of the said Act upon the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the said City of New York.

Your Committee are induced to recommend the adoption of this measure, as well on account of the embarrassed state of the finances and the necessity there is of retrenching the public expences, as also from a conviction that large sums are annually paid by the Board for removing houses in order to open or alter Streets, which does not benefit the public in any degree proportioned to the expence. They therefore respectfully recommend the following resolution:

Resolved that the Counsel be instructed to prepare the draught of

a Law in conformity with the foregoing report and also the usual petition to the Legislature praying that it may be passed.

The Counsel presented a Memorial to the Legislature on the subject of the Battery, with an Act corresponding thereto. Whereupon ordered that the Memorial be duly executed and, with the Act, transmitted forthwith to the Legislature.

He also presented the following resolutions respecting the Clerks of the Justices Courts—Viz:

Resolved that the Clerks of the Assistant Justices shall respectively be allowed as a compensation for their services [422] a salary of 750 dollars, payable quarterly by a Warrant upon the Treasury of the said City.

Resolved that the said Clerks shall respectively attend at their offices for the transaction of business from 9 o'clock in the forenoon

till one in the afternoon and from 3 o'clock in the afternoon until sundown on every day, except Sundays, throughout the year and at all such other times as the Assistant Justices to whom they shall be respectively appointed Clerks shall hold their Courts.

Resolved that the Mayor be authorized to approve the Bonds which the said Clerks are required to give before they enter upon the duties of their offices.

Resolved that the Clerks shall be appointed annually on the first Monday of February and shall receive their Commissions to hold their [423] offices during the pleasure of the Common Council, and upon being so appointed shall be required to enter into new bonds as aforesaid.

Resolved that the following places be provided for the accommodation of the Courts to be held by the Assistant Justices—Viz.

For the Court to be held by the Assistant Justice for the 1<sup>st</sup> 2<sup>d</sup> & 3<sup>d</sup> Wards No. 1 Spruce Street.

For the Court to be held by the Assistant Justice for the 4<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> Wards No. 11 Duane Street.

For the Court to be held by the Assistant Justice for the 5<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> Wards part of the house at the North west corner of Desbrosses and Sullivan Streets.

For the Court to be held by the Assistant Justice for the 7<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> Wards, part of the house at the South west corner of Chrystie and Bayard Streets.

Whereupon the said resolutions were read by paragraphs, the blanks filled & adopted.

[424] On motion of Alderman Allen for the appointment of Clerks to the District Courts, The Board went into Ballot for the said purpose—when Joshua L. Pell was duly elected for the 1<sup>st</sup> 2<sup>d</sup> & 3<sup>d</sup> Wards, John Campbell for the 4<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> Wards, George Betts for the 5<sup>th</sup> & 8<sup>th</sup> Wards and William H. Smith for the 7<sup>th</sup> & 10<sup>th</sup> Wards. Agreeably to the reports of the several Aldermen and Assistants of the respective Districts, the places for holding the Courts were designated as follow :

For the 1<sup>st</sup> district at No. 1 Spruce St.

2<sup>d</sup> district “ No. 11 Duane St.

3<sup>d</sup> district N. W. corner Sullivan & Desbrosses Sts.

4<sup>th</sup> district corner of Chrystie & Bayard St.

This being a Special Meeting of the Board, the reading of the Minutes of last meeting was dispensed with.

His Honor the Mayor informed the Board that he had called this [429] meeting in conformity with a request of the Citizens expressed at their late meeting in relation to the destructive fire at Savannah. He then read the Report of the Committee of the Citizens of New York and an Address from the Mayor of Savannah to the Citizens of the United States, and informed the Board that the said Committee were now in waiting at the Mayor's Office to attend the Common Council.

The Committee of Citizens were then introduced by Alderman Hone of the First Ward and their Chairman, William Bayard Esqr. stated to the Board the request of the Citizens.

Alderman Allen then presented the following preamble and resolutions:

Whereas a Committee appointed at a Meeting of our fellow-citizens, held on the 25<sup>th</sup> instant, have requested that the Common Council will appropriate 20,000 dollars, or such other sum as they may deem proper, to the relief of the sufferers by the [430] late fire at the City of Savannah; and altho' the members of this Board duly appreciate the benevolent motives of the gentlemen who have made this request and individually feel disposed to grant every aid in their power to the suffering Inhabitants of that City, they nevertheless are of opinion that the powers delegated to the Common Council will not authorize any appropriation of money except for purposes specially connected with the local concerns of this City—Therefore

Resolved that in the opinion of this Board the Common Council do not possess the power of appropriating the funds of this City to any



foreign object whatever and therefore that it is inexpedient to comply with the request made by the Committee of Citizens for soliciting donations for the sufferers by the late fire at Savannah.

[431] Resolved that the Members of this Board, in their individual capacity, will render every assistance in their power to forward the benevolent object of the meeting of Citizens by soliciting donations, and otherwise for the distressed inhabitants of Savannah.

Whereupon the same were adopted and ordered to be published.

The Minutes of the two last meetings were read and approved.

A petition for a Well and pump in Mott Street near Grand Street was read and referred to the Alderman and [433] Assistant of the Ward and Street Commissioner.

A petition of John Whitaker for relief from penalty incurred under the Hack Law was read and referred to the Police Committee with power.

A petition from William Paulding & others praying that an Ordinance be passed for extending and making the Sewer in Chapel Street to Duane Street. And from Samuel Paxton for permission to sell at auction furniture in front of his Store corner of Chamber and Chapel Streets were read & referred to the Street Committee.

A petition of John Norman, Abraham Dally and others, Ex<sup>rs</sup> of the estate of J. Norman deceased, praying time to pay Assessment for regulating Fourth Street, was read & referred to the Finance Committee with power.

A petition of Morris Oakley and others, residents of Pike and Henry Streets, for a Watchman [434] to be stationed at the corner of said Streets, was read and referred to the Watch Committee.



A petition of John P. Aymar for appointment as Measurer of Grain, was read & referred to the Committee on Applications.

A petition of Jacob Crocheron, complaining of an Assessment on his Stable in Marketfield Street on account of a mistake in copying the books of the Assessors, was read and referred to the Committee on Assessments.

A petition of John Edwards praying that a Committee be appointed to examine the principle on which his Scale beams are constructed, was referred to the Committee on Arts & Sciences.

A petition of sundry Inhabitants residing in the vicinity of New or James [435] Slip to have the same filled in from Water Street to the South side of Front Street, and from James Neaf to be employed by the Corporation in cleaning docks and Slips with a Machine invented by him, were severally read and referred to the Committee on Wharves, Piers and Slips.

A petition of J. M. Hall, stating that he had invented a method of improving Barrel or Firkin Butter and praying permission to vend the same in the markets of this City, was referred to the Market Committee.

A petition of Henry Heiser for remission of fine incurred for non-compliance with an Ordinance directing him to fill in certain Lots between Greenwich and Washington Streets, was read & referred to the Police Committee.

The Street Commissioner presented a communication relating to interest being charged on different Assessments after confirming the [436] same—which was read and referred to the Committee on Applications to the Legislature.

He also presented a return of Delinquents on an Assessment for regulating North Street and for a Well & Pump in Walker Street—which was confirmed and John G. Betts appointed Collector.

He also, on the subject of charging interest for Canal Street Sewer, Reported:

That the Assessors for laying the Assessment for the Sewer in Canal Street charge interest thereon for three months up to the 8<sup>th</sup> February next and he would suggest the propriety of public notice being given that interest will be charged on all sums remaining unpaid after that day.

Mr. Hammond presented the following Resolution—which was adopted:

Resolved that the Report of the Finance Committee of the 27<sup>th</sup> Dec. 1819 be once published in the several News papers usually employed by the Board.

On motion of Alderman Hone, the Resolution of the 10<sup>th</sup> of January and the Law presented at the last meeting providing for the expence of extending the Battery were called up and read. He then moved to reconsider the same, which was carried.

It was then moved by Alderman Hone to alter the Law by striking out the words [438] “according to the benefit and advantage which ‘they shall be of opinion that it will be to the freeholders and inhabitants of said Wards respectively”—which was carried.

On the question of agreeing to the Bill as amended, a division being called, it was carried in the Affirmative.

Affirmative. Mr. Recorder. Aldermen Hone, Morss, Taylor, Thorp. Messrs. Bolton, Stevens, Tallman, Davis.

Negative. Aldermen Anthony, Mann, Allen, Messrs. Crane, Westervelt, Parker, Brittain, Board, Hammond.

The Board being equally divided on the question, His Honor the Mayor gave the casting vote in the Affirmative.

The Bill as agreed to was as follows:

“An Act to provide for the expence of extending the Battery in the City of New York & for other purposes.”

[439] Whereas the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York have by their Memorial to the Legislature represented that they are desirous of extending and improving the Battery in said City and have prayed for permission so to do and also for authority to impose an Annual Tax of \$25,000. on the estates real and personal of the freeholders and inhabitants of and situated within said City until the sum of \$150,000. shall be raised for the purpose of meeting the expence thereof, and have also prayed for permission to create a public debt to enable them to raise money for that purpose

until the said sum of money shall be raised by tax as aforesaid: Therefore

Be it enacted by the people of the State of New York represented in Senate and Assembly—That it shall be lawful for the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York to extend the said Battery into the Bay and North & East Rivers such distance as they may deem proper, not exceeding [440] 500 feet: And farther that all the title of the people of this State in and to the land and the land under water in front of and adjoining the said Battery and extending from thence into the Bay and the North and East Rivers a distance not exceeding 500 feet shall be & the same are hereby vested in the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York and their Successors forever to remain for the purpose of extending the said Battery for a public Walk & for erecting public buildings and works of defence thereon but without any power to dispose thereof for any other use or purpose whatsoever and without any power of selling any part thereof.

And be it farther enacted—That the Mayor, Recorder and Aldermen of the said City or a majority of them, of whom the Mayor or Recorder shall [441] be one, shall be and hereby are empowered as soon as conveniently may be after the passing of this Act and once in each and every year thereafter until the sum of \$150,000 shall be raised by tax for the purpose before mentioned to order & cause to be raised by tax on the estates real and personal of the freeholders and inhabitants of and situated within said City and to be collected the sum of \$25,000.

And be it farther enacted—That it shall be lawful for the Mayor, Recorder & Aldermen of the said City, or a majority of them of whom the Mayor or Recorder shall be one, to apportion the said Tax annually in such manner as shall appear to them just and equitable among the several & respective Wards of the said City, to have the said Battery extended and improved in the manner which has been or which may be determined upon by the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened: And farther that [442] they shall order and cause the said Tax from time to time to be assessed, levied and collected out of the estates real and personal of the freeholders and inhabitants of and situated within the said Wards respectively, in the same manner as the taxes for defraying the contingent expences of the City and County of New York shall be assessed, levied & collected: And further that the whole of the proceeds of the said taxes shall be appropriated either to defraying

the expence of extending and improving the Battery as aforesaid or in redeeming the debt authorized to be created by this Act.

And be it farther enacted—That it shall be lawful for the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty of the City of New York to create a public debt not exceeding \$150,000 and which shall bear an interest not ex-[443] ceeding 7 per cent per annum.”

Alderman Mann then gave notice that he would move for a reconsideration of the question at the next Meeting of the Board.

On motion of Mr. Stevens it was Ordered that the Bill as amended and Memorial be duly authenticated & transmitted to the Legislature.

The Minutes of last meeting were read & approved.

His Honor the Mayor laid before the Board a letter dated 31<sup>st</sup> January 1820, from Lieutenant Smith by order of the War Department of the United States, stating that the War Department will co-operate with the Corporation [2] in the contemplated repairs and extension of the Battery to the extent of the Estimate furnished by the Corporation for that part of the work passing thro' the United States' Lines provided the sum appropriated by Congress for Fortifications will authorize the application of the amount of the Estimate to that object: Which Letter was directed to be filed.

A Report was received from the Trustees of the Savings' Bank made in pursuance of the Act entitled "An Act to incorporate an association by the name of a Bank for Savings in the City of New York": which Report was referred to the Finance Committee.

His Honor the Mayor stated that, in pursuance of a request made to him by the Board of Health he had revised the Health Law and made such alterations and additions as experience had proved necessary, which he presented and the same being read was [3] approved and it was referred to the Committee on Applications to the Legislature to prepare a suitable Memorial to the Legislature to accompany the said Bill, and his Honor the Mayor was requested to have the same duly authenticated in the recess of the Board and transmitted to the Legislature now in Session at Albany.

A petition of Cornelius C. Meyers to be appointed to the Office of Wood Inspector, was read and referred to the Committee on Applications.

A Memorial from Henry Carpenter, stating that he had been applied to by several persons to build machines for cleansing Slips & Basins called Mud Machines, that among other reasons he was prevented therefrom by the Patent right of that Machine being vested in the Corporation and requesting their aid in the premises, was received and referred to the Committee on Wharves, Piers & Slips.

[4] A remonstrance from sundry Inhabitants against filling in James' Slip was read and referred to the same Committee.

A petition of Hugh Smith to be permitted to continue to remove the earth from the upper end of Harman Street until the first of April next, was read and referred to the Street Commissioner with authority to grant the prayer of the petitioner.

Petitions from Asa Gurnsey, Silas Barremore and Thomas Cambell for the appointment of Superintendant of the Mud Machine were referred to the Committee on Wharves, Piers and Slips.

A petition from Abraham Stagg, stating that he contracted with the Corporation for regulating and paving Grand Street from Broadway to the Bowery, that he has performed said Contract and praying payment of the same, was referred to the Street Commissioner [5] to report the facts thereon.

A Memorial was received from a Committee on behalf of the Inhabitants of the Town of Brooklyn, complaining of the manner in which the Ferries between the City of New York and Brooklyn are conducted and of the non-performance of the lessees of those Ferries of the covenants contained in their Leases and requesting a conference with a Committee of the Corporation on the subject. Whereupon the same was referred to the Ferry Committee.

A Memorial of Robert Moore was presented, stating that he owns about 6000 acres of unimproved land in Pike County, State of Pennsylvania; that if the Corporation will advance to him the sum necessary to pay laborers for wages and subsistence he would employ a number on those lands and could from the profits of their labor reimburse the Corporation: which was referred to the Finance Committee.

[6] A Communication from the City Sealer on the subject of his Office was read and referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

The Comptroller presented a statement of an extra account of A. Sherman, Attorney of the Corporation, which was referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

The following persons were appointed Firemen, the Chief Engineer certifying the vacancies:

“Fire Wardens of the 10<sup>th</sup> Ward.”

Henry Willet, Blacksmith, Bowery, 10<sup>th</sup> Ward—vice John Smith, exempt.

Dan<sup>l</sup> Townsend—gardener—Bowery. 10<sup>th</sup> Ward—vice Jno. A. Hardenbrook. resigned.

“Fire Engine Company No. 4.”

Alex<sup>r</sup> S. Miller—Accountant—31 Anthony St. 5<sup>th</sup> Ward—vice William Winterton—resigned.

“Fire Engine Company No. 18.”

Hugh Laing—Mercht. 38 Beekman St. 2<sup>d</sup> Ward—vice Dixey Crosby—Removed from City.

[7] The Street Commissioner presented an Ordinance for a Well and Pump in Mott near Grand Street, which was passed and Abraham Baudouine, Abraham Bloodgood and John Brower were appointed the Assessors.

The City Inspector reported that Lot No. 627 Bayard's East Farm was in a State of Nuisance and required to be filled up, that no owner had appeared for it and he recommended its being filled in by the Corporation: Which was referred to the Street Commissioner with authority to act in the premises.

The Committee on Assessments, on the petition of Jacob Crocheron, Reported:

That they are satisfied from the annexed Certificate that the mistake of the Assessors complained of by the petitioner was made in copying the Books. Your Committee therefore beg leave to recommend the following Resolution:

Resolved that Mr. Jacob Crocheron [8] pay the Collector one tenth of the amount assessed to him on the Lot and Stable belonging to him in Marketfield Street in lieu of the amount assessed thereon.

Alderman Allen, Chairman of the Finance Committee, reported that in pursuance of the authority given to them by the Resolution of the Common Council, they had appointed J. Morton, the Clerk of the Board, the agent of the Corporation to endeavor to effect a settlement of the demand of the Corporation against the United States for monies paid by the Corporation for damages done to lands by the erection of

fortifications during the late War; that the agent had, agreeably to the instructions of the Committee, proceeded to Washington and having returned from thence had [9] made a report of his proceedings which he begged leave to present to the Board: Which having been read was ordered to be filed. The Communication and accompanying documents were as follow:

"Letter to Chairman of Finance Committee."

To Stephen Allen Esqr.

New York Feb. 7. 1820

Sir

I have the honor to inform you that, agreeably to the directions of the Committee of Finance, I proceeded to the City of Washington to endeavor to effect a Settlement of the Claim which the Corporation have against the United States for monies paid by them for damages done to lands by the erection of fortifications during the late war.

I was, as you are apprized, prepared with a Memorial from the Corporation to the Congress of the United States on the subject. Considering the claim as one coming within the powers of the War Department for settlement, I was of opinion that it would be best in the first instance to make the application [10] to that office; and after conversing with the Senators from this State and some of the Members of the House of Representatives from this City and State, I was confirmed in this opinion and accordingly prepared a Memoir or Statement of the case which was presented to Mr. Calhoun, the Secretary of War.

As a part of the negotiation of the Corporation with the Government of the United States in relation to the defence of this City was transacted while the President, Mr. Munro, was acting as Secretary of War, satisfied as I was of the fairness and justice of our claim, I thought it would have a favorable effect upon the issue of my negotiation if I could bring before him a statement of our claim and the documents which I had to produce in favor of it. I accordingly waited upon the President and after stating to him briefly the nature of our claim I observed to him that as some of the important parts of the negotiation upon [11] which the claim was founded had been transacted under his own direction, while acting as Secretary of War, I had prepared a copy of the Statement which would be furnished to the Secretary of War and begged leave to lay it on his Table that he might be apprized of the nature of the claim previous to the Secretary's consulting him respecting it. He received the Statement and said that he would give it a careful perusal.

Some days after, I waited upon him and he informed me he had

read with attention the Statement; that he considered the claim as just, and that he would give directions to the Secretary of War to put it in a train of adjustment and settlement. I shortly after waited upon the Secretary of War, who shewed to me the instructions he had received from the President on the subject and, at my request, he furnished me with a certified copy of it, which is annexed hereto (marked No. 1.)

[12] That I might have written testimony to produce of the mode in which the settlement was made, I addressed the annexed note (marked No. 2) to Mr. Calhoun and received from him the reply (marked No. 3)

It may be proper, Sir, here to observe that the Awards of the Arbitrators, upon which our claim is founded, were not to be found on the files of the War Department where, from the information of the former agents of the Corporation, I was led to expect to find them. My opinion is, however, that during the recess of Congress, when the Clerks of the War Office will have leisure to give a more perfect search, they will be found. At any rate duplicates can be procured to supply their place should they not be ultimately met with on the files of the Department.

As the negociation for the settlement of this claim was commenced under your directions, I trust I may be permitted to congratulate you on its favorable issue: [13] for that ultimately the Corporation will be reimbursed cannot be doubted.

**No. I.**

"Letter from the President to Secretary of War."

The Secretary of War,

I have examined the Documents, the most important of which it seems are now for the first time presented, in support of the claim of the Corporation of the City of New York for monies paid by it for ground taken for fortifications and on which fortifications were erected under the direction of the principal Engineer in 1814 for the defence of the City, and am of opinion that it ought to be allowed.

I well remember having had intercourse with deputies from the Corporation at that period and the considerations which [14] had

weight with the President in deciding on the measures to be taken for the defence of the City. Attacks were expected to be made on our principal cities, particularly on the City of New York, by the immense force which Great Britain had then at her command. The utmost solicitude was felt for their safety and the whole effort of the Government exerted in making preparations to repel them. The Treasury was embarrassed and the Loan of a Million of dollars offered for the defence of New York was accepted with pleasure.

No works could be built without taking the land wherever it would be necessary to place them, which could not be done without making to the owners compensation for the injury they might sustain thereby; and I am satisfied that it was intended and understood that no delay should proceed from that cause, but that a part of the money thus loaned should be thus applied.

It is, however, probable that the appropriation, if the estimate is voted, may be sufficient to pay a part, if not the whole of the claim, toward the close of the year. Should this not be the case, its payment will be provided for in the estimates for 1821.

A petition of Pattison Jolly to be allowed on his Assessment for Grand Street a sum he has advanced to Abraham Stagg the Contractor for regulating said Street; A petition of Noah Jarvis, as Agent for Stephen Van Rennselaer, requesting that the sum of \$40. be deducted and allowed to him from the amount due to Abraham Stagg, Contractor for regulating Grand Street, to compensate for work done to said Street by him in consequence of the neglect of said Contractor; And a Communication from the Street Commissioner, to whom had been referred the petition of Abraham Stagg praying payment for contract for regulating Grand Street, stating that said Stagg had not fulfilled his contract, were severally read and referred to the Street Committee.

[26] A petition of Jacob Boyce for Stall No. 18 Washington Market, and of John Keyser for Stall No. 22 same market—were read and referred to the Market Committee.

receipt of the same and to forward a Copy of the Inspector's report of the diseases and interments during the past year.

A Letter was received from Moses Rogers enclosing a Copy of a Memorial intended to be presented to the Legislature from the Inhabitants of the First Ward, remonstrating against the application of the Corporation to the Legislature for a Law to raise the sum of \$150,000. for the purpose of repairing and extending the Battery, presuming it [28] was the intention of the Corporation to assess upon the First Ward a greater proportion of said expence than upon the other Wards. Whereupon the same was referred to the Committee on subject of the Battery.

A petition of a number of the Inhabitants of Harlaem, praying that a Market for the Sale of Horses may be established in said Village, was read and referred to the Alderman & Assistant of the 9th Ward.

A petition for a Well and Pump in Mott Street between Grand and Broome Streets, was read & referred to the Alderman & Assistant of the Ward and Street Commissioner to report an Ordinance therefor.

A Memorial was received from William Hendrick, Patentee of the Forcing & Lifting Pump, stating a former petition presented by him offering to contract for the use of said Patent, and accompanied by Certificates [29] from certain firemen of the utility of said pump as experienced at a late fire in Cheapside Street, was read and referred to the Committee on Arts & Sciences.

A petition was received from Smith Bloomefield, stating that in August last he contracted with the Corporation to build a Sewer thro' the centre of Chapel Street; that he has completed the same agreeably to Contract and praying payment for the same: which was referred to the Canal Committee.

A petition of John Guest to be appointed to the Office of a City Measurer, was read and referred to the Committee on Applications:

Resolved that the Counsel be instructed to prepare the draught of a Law to amend the 'Act to reduce several laws relating particularly to this City into one Act,' making it obligatory on every master of any vessel arriving from any foreign port or from any other of the United States (whether he shall enter his vessel at the Custom House or not) within 24 hours after his arrival to report in writing on oath to the [40] Mayor or Recorder the name, age and occupation of every

person who shall have been brought as a passenger in such vessel, upon pain of forfeiting the sum of 100 dollars for every Alien and 75 dollars for every other person neglected to be reported as aforesaid: and the owner or consignee of such vessel or cargo shall be liable as well as the master for any penalties thus incurred: and if any passenger, not being a Citizen of the United States, shall have been landed from any vessel within 50 miles of this City, with the intent of proceeding to it, the master, owner or consignee of such vessel or cargo shall be liable to a penalty of 500 dollars for every person so landing & entering this City: and farther that every alien who shall land in this City or enter it in any other manner, with the intent of residing in it, shall within 24 hours thereafter report himself to the Mayor or Recorder and give an account under oath of the means by which [41] he entered the City or be subject to imprisonment until he shall render the information required.

That during the progress of building said Sewer the said Contractor has repeatedly refused to comply with the directions of the Street Commissioner and the said Superintendant in relation to the workmanship and materials thereof, but went on in building the said Sewer in his own way regardless of the directions of the said Street Commissioner and Superintendants and of the covenants contained in said contract, in consequence whereof the said Superintendant [76] has refused to approve the said work and to give a certificate thereof,

and the Street Commissioner refuses to accept of it as being completed according to the contract.

By the contract the Contractor is to be paid for the work as the Assessment to be imposed therefor is collected. In consequence of the difficulties as above stated no measures have as yet been taken to make the Assessment. Of this the Contractor complains as a great hardship, as he is thereby kept out of a large sum of money.

Under all the circumstances of the case the Committee are of opinion that it would be inexpedient for the Board to interfere, but that the subject should be left with the Street Commissioner with powers to make such arrangements to adjust the same as may be just and equitable. They therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

The Committee of Wharves, piers and Slips, on the Memorial of sundry Inhabitants respecting obstructions experienced by Market Boats at Coenties Slip by vessels from the eastward occupying the same for a length of time for selling fish, reported:

That they have had the subject of said petition under consideration, and, in order that a correct understanding of the grievances complained of might be had, a personal conference with a Committee of the petitioners was requested and obtained by your Committee. The evils complained of by the petitioners are that within the last 2 or 3 years vessels from the State of Massachusetts, wholly laden with salted fish, have almost exclusively occupied the Coenties Slip for the purpose of retailing their said cargoes, thereby driving from their accustomed place of resort the river craft with produce and the Market Boats from [80] the surrounding country to the great injury and inconvenience of the Inhabitants of the neighbourhood and of the petitioners in particular. Your Committee are informed and believe that many of the petitioners have contributed largely toward the accommodation for Sloops and Market Boats in that part of the City and have also loaned money to the Corporation at less than legal interest for the purpose of building the necessary piers in that vicinity, beside ceding to the public a valuable water right between Coenties and Exchange Slips without any claim on the Treasury whatever for said cession or the awards of large sums by a jury for improving and increasing the value of their property as in a case very recent in another part of this City. The only consideration expected by the petitioners for the sacrifices thus made was an improvement in their business by the accommodation offered to vessels bringing the produce of our country from this and the ad- [81] joining States; but of this they are now deprived by the admission of vessels to the said Slip not entitled by the Corporation ordinance to enter on yearly pay.

The Committee are of opinion that the complaint of the petitioners is well founded and calls for the interference of the Board, and that measures ought to be adopted to remedy the evils they are experi-

encing; but they do not feel themselves authorized to recommend any addition to the piers in that part of the City as the measure, in their opinion, is not imperiously called for and the finances of the Corporation will not permit additional expence for that object.

The Committee therefore recommend that an Ordinance be passed excluding all vessels from lying in Coenties Slip from and after the day of                      next, except such as are designated by law as vessels which are to pay a yearly wharfage on their first coming to lie at any of the Wharves or Slips belonging to the Corporation under the [82] penalty of                      dollars for each day such excluded vessel shall lie at or occupy any of the said Wharves or Slips: and the Committee offer the following resolution accordingly:

The representations made by the Trustees in their report and the facts they have stated as occurring in the course of their operations are conclusive evidence to your Committee that the influence of example is exciting an emulation among the depositors both salutary and commendable; and in proportion as this disposition to save and economise is fostered and encouraged, your Committee believe the moral condition and domestic happiness of the objects will be improved and established.

The Committee will not trespass on the time of the Board by any further remarks on the merits of this Institution; altho' much might be said to establish the fact of its general utility. They were of opinion, however, that the report of the Trustees ought to be published for general information by order of the Board; but presuming this could not be effected without [84] considerable expence they have con-

cluded to recommend that it be filed and therefore propose the following resolution:

[88] The Counsel reported to the Board that the Chancellor had refused to grant an injunction to stay the collection of the Canal Assessment: which report was directed to be filed.

He also reported that the Supreme Court at the last January term appointed Philip Hone, Henry J. Wyckoff, and Thomas Storm Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the case of Dover Street and that they had all refused to act; that he had therefore proposed another petition to the Supreme Court for the appointment of other Commissioners which he presented. Whereupon it was resolved that the subject be referred to the Committee on Assessment and the Alderman and Assistant of the Fourth Ward.

He also, agreeably to order, presented a Memorial to the Legislature and a Bill to be enacted into a Law entitled [89] "An Act to amend an Act entitled An Act to reduce several laws relating particularly to the City of New York into one Act"—so far as relates to the importation of passengers"—which being read were approved, and directed to be duly authenticated and transmitted to the Legislature now in Session at Albany.

He also, agreeably to order, presented a Memorial to the Legislature and a Bill corresponding therewith to be enacted into a Law



entitled "An Act relative to the opening and laying out of Streets in the City of New York," which being read were in the words following:

(Memorial.)

To the Honorable the Legislature of the State of New York in Senate & Assembly convened

The Memorial of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York respectfully sheweth—That [90] the laws relative to opening and laying out Streets &c. in the City of New York empowers the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment to assess any part not exceeding one third of the estimated value of buildings which it may be necessary to remove upon your memorialists: That in the exercise of this power it has sometimes happened that heavy sums have been assessed upon your Memorialists when the peculiar benefit which individuals have sustained in consequence of such improvements has far exceeded the whole expence of making them.

Your Memorialists would farther represent that the revenues of the said City are barely adequate to meet its ordinary expences and that they find it indispensibly necessary to guard against any other expenditures.

Your Memorialists therefore pray that your Honorable Body will be [91] pleased to pass a Law respecting so much of the said Act as empowers Commissioners to assess every portion of the value of Buildings which it may be necessary to remove in order to open or improve streets upon your Memorialists.

All which is respectfully submitted.

(Act.)

An Act relative to the opening & laying out of Streets in the City of New York.

Be it enacted by the people of the State of New York represented in Senate and Assembly—That it shall not be lawful to and for the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, under and by virtue of so much of the Act entitled "An Act to reduce several laws relating particularly to the City of New York into one Act." as relates to the opening and laying out of Streets &c. to assess any part of the value of any building or buildings which it may be necessary to remove for the purpose of laying out and forming or extending [92] and enlarging or otherwise improving any Street or public place in any part of said City on the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, any thing in said Act to the contrary notwithstanding."



On the question of approving the same, it was carried in the Affirmative.

The ayes and nays having been called by Mr. Stevens were as follow:

Affirmative. Aldermen. Morss—Taylor—Thorp—Allen. Messrs. Tallman—Crane—Parker—Brittain—Board—Hammond.

Negative. Aldermen Hone—King—Anthony—McQueen—Mann. Messrs. Bolton—Stevens—Westervelt.

The Attorney presented a complaint made against Captain Allen of the Schooner Telegraph for laying his vessel in Fly Market Slip; also against William Rhinelander for leaving open his vault in Broad-[93] way without a curb around it; also against Samuel Y. Allaire for selling liquor without licence with a petition from said Allaire on the subject: which several complaints were referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

The Report of the Committee on Retrenchments, presented last evening and laid on the Table, was called up and being read was in the words following:

The Committee appointed to enquire and report if any and what retrenchments can be made in the expenditures of this Corporation report: that the present expenditures of this Board, when viewed in relation to the ways and means by which they are to be disbursed is a subject of serious alarm which should command their prompt and immediate attention: that for a number of years last past (which may be called years of prosperity in comparison with the present) the amount collected from the various sources of City Revenue, together with a large oppressive direct tax, has been insufficient to meet these expenditures and to provide for the deficiencies the Board has been obliged to dispose of public property to a large amount and to create a City Debt which at this moment amounts to near \$120,000: that it will take nearly if not the whole amount of the City Revenue to pay the interest of this debt, leaving no other resources to defray these expenditures but by resorting to a direct tax.

From the present depression and stagnation of every kind of business and scarcity of money, the sources from which the City Revenue is derived is likely to be seriously affected. It is also apprehended that from the same causes the greatest difficulty will exist in the collection of the taxes. From these causes it is believed that unless some vigorous and efficient measures are immediately adopted to [95] lessen the expenditures, these effects in the course of the present year will be at-

tended with pecuniary embarrassments, to remove which it will become necessary to increase the City Debt.

Under these impressions your Committee have proceeded to the enquiry referred to them. Among the subjects of expenditure, the first that has commanded their attention is the Salary of the Officers and the pay of persons employed or paid by the Board. They find that in most cases their salaries and pay have been from time to time increased during the progressive increase of the necessaries of living; that it is not only just but at this particular crisis it is incumbent on the Board, when the causes which induced them to increase their pay no longer exist, to accompany the same with a corresponding reduction.

There is another consideration which has had some influence on the Committee and which they think will [96] be duly appreciated by the public spirit of the incumbents themselves: that the amount of the reductions is so much taken from the burdens of the community at large now suffering under the severe depression of the times.

The Committee are therefore of opinion that a reduction of the salaries and pay of the Officers in the employ of the Board or paid by them ought to be made; that the situation of the finances of the Board demands it and that the present cost of the necessaries of living justifies it. They therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved that the Salary of the Mayor as reduced by the foregoing resolution, commence from the 4<sup>th</sup> inst. the day of his reappointment and that [99] the salaries & wages of the other officers & persons, as reduced by the said resolution commence from the 1<sup>st</sup> day of March next.

Resolved that the Counsel of the Board be directed to report an Ordinance to amend the several ordinances affected by the foregoing resolutions so as to make them in conformity thereto.

The Committee have had under their consideration the subject of the Office of the City Inspector and it appears to them that this office might be abolished without much if any inconvenience to the public and

that its duties could be performed by the Clerk and Assistants to the Board of Health; but as some doubts exist in the Committee as to the expediency of the measure at this time, they have laid it over for further consideration.

By the foregoing resolutions the reduction of expenditures will be upwards of \$16,000, on \$100,000. and if a correspondent reduction takes place in the other items of [100] expenditure the Committee have strong hopes that they may be brought within the ability of the Board to meet them without any increase of the City Debt; but to do this will require the exercise of great economy on the part of the Board.

The Committee intend pursuing the enquiry and beg leave to submit the present as only a report in part.

It was then moved that the subject of the pay to the Captains, Assistants and Watchmen of the City Watch be referred to the Watch Committee, which was agreed to.

It was then moved that all that part of the Second resolution relative to the Mayor be stricken out, which after some discussion was agreed to.

The question was then taken on agreeing to the 3<sup>d</sup> resolution—which was carried in the Affirmative.
