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
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

INTRODUCTION.

Ī.



HEN did the word Stationer come into popular use in England? We have already adduced at I. xxi, certain though inferential proof of the existence of the Craft of the Stationers so early as the 3rd August 1510: but how soon before that did the word, and the business it represented, find a home in this country? We cannot precisely tell.

The late Mr John Gough Nichols, F.S.A., read a paper * at a meeting of the London and Middlesex Archæological Society at Stationers' Hall on the 12th April 1860;

which is the best account of the later history of the Company as his grand-father's Notes, quoted by us at I. xxii, are the best of its earlier history.

In this paper, Mr Nichols discusses this word Stationer at some length; showing from Dv Cange and Leges Alfonso that it was current in the thirteenth century at Toulouse and Paris, and in Castile.

He also quotes the following definition from the *Promptorium Parvulorum* sive Clericorum, which was a vocabulary compiled from various previous authors by GALFRIDUS, a Dominican friar at Lynn in Norfolk, in the year 1440 A.D.:—

Stacyonere or he pat sellythe bokys, Stacionarius bibliopola

which would seem to prove the use of the word in England at that time.

But Mr A. Way, M.A., who edited the Camden Society's edition of the *Promptorium*, 3 vols. 1843—1865; while pointing out that Galffelds took this with other obscure words from an author and a work described by him as "Mirivalensis in *Campo Florum*," states that he has not been able to identify or trace either the writer or the text.

Therefore the quotation of Galfatous is no proof of any general use

of the word in England at the date of his work.*

Our belief is that the Stationers first developed into a separate business on the Continent, when the printing press began to multiply the (for that time) excessive numbers of copies to an edition. The printers wanting money to go on with, sold larger quantities of their editions at cheaper rates to speculators: who naturally but not necessarily were those who had been most accustomed to deal in manuscripts, and who in this way changing their business adapted themselves to the new order of things.

What Christopher Barker wrote in 1582 of English stationers in the reign

of Henry VIII. is probably also true of their Continental prototypes:

At whiche tyme and before, there was an other sort of men, that were writers, Lymners of bookes and dynerse thinges for the Churche and other vses called Stacioners; which haue, and partly in this days do vse to buye their bookes in grosse of the said printers, to bynde them vp, and sell them in their shops, whereby they well mayntayned their families.—I. II4.

The word stationer had therefore, in all probability, no general currency in England before the time of Caxton: and then came over from the

Continent with the newly developed trade in printed books.

In later times, as some of Mr Nichols' quotations witness, explanations were guessed at or made to fit the word. And indeed it is puzzling to know by what custom or confusion of the Dark Ages the old Latin technical word stationarii, which related to the keepers of a post-house or of a military guard-house, came in the process of time to be applied to the librarii, the scriveners or sellers of books. One of the most erudite of our present London publishers, Herr Adolf Trübner, has long had this subject in hand; and to his forthcoming work we must refer the reader.

[•] Mr Bridger has however pointed out to me a note in Liber Brown, fol. 24 b of the Records of the Commissary of London, in the Will Office at Somerset House; where against the registration of the will of Rober Horsie which is dated the 16th Nov. 4 Hen. IV., and was proved the Sth December 1402, is inserted in the margin the word Stacionarij: but whether this man was a seller of manuscript books or had anything to do with their production does not appear.

ESIDES the evidence adduced in the First Volume of the existence of the Craft of the Stationers; we are now able to give the following abundant and incontrovertible testimony on the subject: principally through the kind efforts of Mr Charles Bridger; who—besides rendering other valuable assistance—has volunteered to search in the Will Office for the wills of the more prominent printers, publishers, or booksellers mentioned in this *Transcript*.

Taking the facts chiefly in the order of date, and very briefly, we have first:—

6 September 1520. The following entry in the Corporation Records is the earliest piece of absolute proof of the Craft of the Stationers that we have yet met with, that is not found in a will.

Adhuc Die [i. e. Jovis] 6. Die Septembris [1520, 12 Hen. VIII.]

The vniuersitie [of] Cambrig[e] Item At this Courte now redde the letter Dyrected to the maior and aldermen from the voluersite of Cambryge concerninge diverse bokes to be bought and Solde and seesyd by oon Thomas Cotes Stat[i]oner Whervppon the sayd Thomas had in commandment to bryng in suche proves as he hath concerninge the premisses vpon Tewsday next

Et postes [die Mercurij] zjo die Septembris yt ys agreed that my lord major shall cause to be delynered to the Doctor of Honey Lane [i.e. to the Rev. William Lambert, S. T. B. the then Rector of Allhallows, Honey Lane, in Cheap Ward, London,] all such bo [o] kes as be Specyfyed. in the letters as he hath from Cambregge.—Repertory, 5. fbl. 65.

1501-1503. The earliest will connected with printed books that Mr Bridger has met is that of 'John Boeidens of London bookseller' living in the parish of Saint Clements, Eastcheap; which will is dated the 11th of October 1501, and was proved on the 30th March 1503 (22 Blamyr). Boeidens was apparently a naturalized Floming, and an immigrant from Antwerp. There is no allusion in his will to a Craft of Stationers.

1529-30. Mr Bridger has found Richard Pinson's will, bitherto not traced by any one. It is dated the 18th November 1529, and was proved the 18th February 1530 (15 Jankyn). There is no reference to printing in it: but the testator is stated to be of the parish of St Dunston in the West; and the printer lived 'in Fletestrete besides saynt Dunstons churche.' This will explains why Pinson had no successor of his name. At the time he wrote it, his son, also named Richard, was lately dead. The executrix was his daughter Margaret the widow of Steven Ward.

There is but one bequest which relates to his business; which runs thus:

Item I will that my two apprentices named John Snows and Richard Withers shall serve their yeres at the assignment of my executrix And at the lende of their said yeres my said executrix to make them free of my crafte And the said John Snows to have for

his part vj^{*} viij^d And the said Rychard Wythers to have for his parte xl^{*} paid to theym by th[e]handes of myn executrix yf the said John and Richard do serve their yeres as true apprentices ought to doo.

That the testator refers to his Craft and not to a Company, is a corrobora-

tion that he was the printer.

1529-1531. The will of John Taverner "citizen and Stacioner of London" is dated the 27th November 1529, and was proved on the 30th November 1531 (11 *Thower*). It includes the following bequest:

Item I gyue and bequeth vnto my crafte of Stacioners via viijd

1530. Among the *Trevelyan papers*, printed by the Camden Society, is the following entry:

Item. paid to Thomas Bart [he] let, printer by the Kingis warrant dated vij die Augusti anno xxij^{do} [1530] for printing of xvj hundrethe papers and bokes of Proclamation, for ordring and punishing of sundry beggers and vacabundes, and dampnyng bokes containing certain errours, after the rate of one penny every leffe viij' viij' L, 171, Ed. 1857.

1531-1532. "John Sedley of Southflete in the Countie of Kent Esquier / oon of the kinges Auditours in his Exchequer and Citezein and Stacioner in the Citie of London and late Wardyn of the Crafte of Stacioners" made his last will and testament on the 23rd February 1531. It was proved on the 15th November 1532 (20 Thower). It contains no further allusion to the Craft.

1534-1535. Wynkin de Worde describes himself as "citizein and Stacionner of London" in this will; which is dated the 5th June 1534, and was proved on the 19th January 1535 (22 Hogan). Besides bequests, chiefly in books, to his servants Robert Darby, Robert Maas, John Barbanson, Hector [?], Sinion [?], John Wislyn and Alabo; to Nowell the bokebinder in Shoe Lane, and to John Butler and James Gauer late his servaunts; there are the following provisions:—

Item I Remitte and forgine John Bedill citizein and stacionner of London late my seruaunte for his labour in executing the same my said testament and last will all suche monney and dettes as he owith me / which James gauen and John Bedill I make

myne executours of this my present testament and last will

And of th[e]ouersight and execucion of this my present testament and last will I make and ordere Renry Pepwell John Gowgh and Robert Copland Stacioners / And I bequethe to the same Henry for his labour as many printed bookes as shall amounte to the value of foure poundes sterling / And I remitte and forgive vnto the said John Gowgh for his labour all suche menney and debtes as he owith me and besides that I geve and bequethe vnto him as manny printed bookes as shall amounte to the value of foure poundes sterling / And I bequethe to the Said Robert Copland for his labour as manny printed bookes as shall amounte to the value of tenne markes sterling

1536. The will of John Rastell the printer is a singular document. He appointed Henry VIII. one of his executors. It is dated the 20th April 1536, and administration was granted—on the renunciation of executorship by the King—on the 18th July 1536 (3 Crumwell).

RASTELL was engaged on a *Concordance* at the time of his death; for the printing of which he provides in this will. He also therein states at length his religious bolief: but makes no allusion to the Craft of the Stationers.

1539-1541. Henry Pepwell—who, as we saw at I. xxi, was a Warden of the Craft in 1526-7—made his will on the 11th September 1539, which was proved on the 8th February 1541 (22 Alenger). He describes himself as "Citizein and Stacioner of London", and makes "my louing neighbour William boneham" one of the supervisors of the will.

1540. The short will of Robert Redman 'Stacioner and ffreeman of London' dated 21st October and proved 4th November 1540 (15 Alenger)

does not refer to the Craft.

1541-1543. We have printed at pp. 42-56 an interesting account, extending over nearly three years, of Thomas Berthelet with King Henry VIII.

1547. Mr Bridger's greatest find however is the will of William Middleton the printer. It is dated 4th June 1547, 1 Ed. VI., and was proved on the 17th of the same month (39 Alen). He describes himself as "Citizein and Stacyoner of London."

Item I gove and bequeth to every one of my Journeymen servantes that will willingly and truely exercise their service toward my wife after my deceas after suche sorte as they dyd to me one moneths wagis, that is to sey, to every of them except Hugh my Jorneyman to whom I gove and bequeth, but only ij after suche Rate as

they Receyue and take of me

Hem I will that Elizabeth my Wife and sole executrice vndernamed doo cause see and provide that all and every my apprentices, be made ffremen of the Citie of London Immediatly after and assone as any of their severall terms of Apprentishoode shall happen to be expired as shall honestly and obediently serve my wife in their terms of Apprentishode Then I will that every such apprentice shalhave paid and delivered to him xx* at the expiracon of his yeres

Three more entries from the Trevelyan papers will bring this present chain of testimony to a close.

The existence of the Craft of Stationers is therefore as certain as that of the Company which grew out of it. These quotations, besides giving us the names of many members of the Craft, also prove that the constitution and essential character of both Craft and Company were the same.

III.



ASSING now to a consideration of this instalment of the *Transcript*, the first thing that strikes one is the abundance and variety of its points of interest. It is quite impossible in this short preface even to enumerate them all. They lie partly in the Text, and partly in the Illustrative Documents with which we have been able to supplement it. We can therefore only very briefly touch upon them and pass on.

Now, perhaps for the first time, we may realize, if only but in outline, the general limitations and conditions under which it was alone possible lawfully to print anything in Elizabeth's reign. A knowledge of the printing monopolies of that time does help most materially to a clearer understanding of the genesis of the books in the Age of our Literature. If Shakespeabe had written on law, he could not have got the first printer he met in Cheap to have printed his book; but he must have gone either to Richard Tottle, or Charles Yetsweiet, or to their successors Thomas Wight and Bonham Norton. If he had wanted to have printed some of his songs with music he must have gone to William Byed or Thomas Morley or to their assigns.

The CRAMPING POWER OF THESE MONOPOLIES ON THE LITERATURE is therefore never to be lost sight of; and—with the well-known bashfulness of the writers of that time—accounts for the existence of so much manuscript Song and Prose, which would now-a-days have certainly come to the press. What Christopher Barker told Lord Burghley in 1582 about W. Seres' patent Towching the generalitie of all bookes of pryvate prayers graunted to the said Seres, they are in trueth of no suche value as they seems: but rather Do kepe back the infinite number of vnfrutefull prayer bookes, which unskilfull persons do contynually offer to make, see I. 116.

was only an expression of one form of this power. Whatever was thus privileged was at the mercy not only of the self-interest but of the self-will of the monopolist; and even of his passing whim or liking. Thus Richard Tottle in May 1583 had 'three presses and vseth but one,' I. 248, and being absorbed with a desire to set up an English paper-mill, I. 242, and a wealthy man besides, there was no power short of the abrogation of his patent—of which there is no instance in ELIZABETH's reign—to compel him to publish a law-book against his will; he being the only man in the country who could publish such a work, and notwithstanding that two of his presses were lying idle. For all that the patentees allege at p. 805; when there was no motive for money-making, for the most part there was no spur to publishing. So the

convenience of the monopolist was in this respect the measure of that portion of the literature within the limits of his privilege: and it was very fortunate that plays &c. were not sufficiently thought of as a paying property by the publishers of those days to induce any one to obtain a patent for them also.

It has therefore been thought very necessary to incorporate in this Volume a number of contemporary documents drawn from various sources, which explain to us the principal limitations fixed at that time on different

classes of books.

What a world of strife and conflict they reveal! Usually we have been taught to think only of the quarrels of authors; but what of the quarrels of publishers who are the nursing fathers of books? We must realize the strength, one might almost say the virulence of their trade competition. Was ever such a storm raised in the present day about a man opening a branch house of business, as rose about John Day taking that little shop in Paul's Churchyard in 1572, in which he, the Stationers' Company, the Dean and Chapter of Saint Paul's, the Lord Mayor and Court of Aldermen of London, the High Commission, and the Privy Council, were all at loggerheads; and all apparently to no purpose, I. 454.

So we must think of these printers and publishers as caring chiefly for their crowns, half-shillings and silver pennies. They bore the yoke of licensing as best they could, but only as a means to hold themselves harmless from the political and ecclesiastical powers. Their, business was to live

and make money; and keen enough they were about it.

This intense competition existed not only among the various publishers of London; but lead to a fifty years' war between the Stationers of London and

the University of Cambridge.

The Illustrative pieces presented here are by no means all that are extant on the subject: but have been selected, some because they are of primary importance and essential to our knowledge of the facts; and some as samples of many others of a similar character. Doubtless in the Public Record Office and among the Corporation Records at the Guildhall there are many papers and deeds connected with the history of printing in London which only await the energetic explorer. Our present purpose is to reprint these Registers: merely incorporating in this Transcript what will help us to understand them better. The future historian of the Stationers' Company, however, will be grateful for the first-fruits here ingathered.

It may be well also to note the varied nature of these documents. Besides many letters petitions &c. from individuals, the Stationers' Company, &c.; there are minutes of the Civic Authorities; royal licenses to print particular books, and letters patents to print whole classes of works; Secret Reports to, and Minutes of, the Privy Council; Bills of Complaint, Demurrers, Replies, Interrogatories, Examinations and Decrees in the Star Chamber, &c. &c.: whereby we may know somewhat of the framework of things.

IV.

HE next thing of which we are sensible is the Chasm in time between the former volume and this one. Of the five years, July 1571—July 1576, we have no other information from the Stationers' Company than is preserved in the sixteen pages of text at I., 451—474. For the blank of these years we are apparently indebted in the first instance to George Wapull the Clerk of the Company during that time, I., 465, who afterwards went to Norembegue, I., 509.

All the book-entries, entrances of apprentices and freemen, promotions

into the livery, fines, &c., of that period have gone for ever.

The Chasm is also very noticeable as marking the close of the first period of the history of the Company. A large proportion of the Charter-men had died in the twenty years which elapsed since the incorporation of this Mistery. The old leaders like John Cawood who died in 1572, Reginold Wolf

who died in 1573, and Richard Way, pass away: and new ones like William Norton, Christopher Barker, Francis Coldock, George Bishop, Richard Watkins come to the front. The same change is apparent in the lesser men. The names of Lucas Harison, Peter French, Thomas Colwell, John Awdley alias Sampson. Alexander Lacy, and others disappear: and are replaced by those of Henry Denham. Thomas Creed. John Windet, Abell Jeffes, Thomas Orwin, William Lowndes, and others.

But not only was the *personnel* of the Company changing, but the old spirit of it was gone. In 1577 we get the first trace of that Controversy in the Company which for a time reduced the Patentees to despair, nearly broke up the Company, and obliged the Queen in Council to interfere by appointing a Commission in 1582 of Dr John Hammond and Thomas Norton (the City Remembraneer, and the well-known joint-author with Lord Buckhurst of our first English tragedy Ferrex and Porrex) to enquire into the whole matter, and if possible to adjust it. These two after some months of endeavour not being able to assuage the Controversy: their Commission was further strengthened about June 1583 by the Bishop [Edwin Sandys], Dean [Alexander Nowell], and Recorder [Serjeant W. FLEETWOOD of London: the heads of whose report to the Council on the 18th July 1583 will be found at p. 783; the report itself being apparently lost. The sweeping Star Chamber Decree of 23 June 1586 finally concluded the agitation, and confirmed the power in the Company in the hands of the Master Wardens and Assistants; and of such as by cooptation should succeed them: with whom it has ever since remained.

V.

HERE are many incidental testimonies in this Volume both to the gradual prosperity and financial growth of the Company, and to the increasing power and authority of its Executive.

On the 28th January 1578, the fee for entering an apprentice was raised from vja to ija vja, see p. 82, which was the highest amount allowed by the law as fixed by the Act of 22 Hen. VIII., An Acte concerning the avoydyng of Exaccyons levyd vpon

The general fee for the entrances of books, which in the former Volume was varied considerably but was usually iiija, is in this Volume raised to the almost uniform charge of via.

As will be seen at p. 37, the fee for letting the Hall of the Company to the annual Wardmote Inquest of Castle Baynard's Ward—held during twelve days in January—trebled in ten years; being vjo viijd in 1579, xiijd iiijd in 1585, and xx* in 1589.

An inspection of the section of Fines for breaking of orders fully

confirms the fact of this growing wealth and power of the Company.

A new source of income was opened to the Society when the Queen's Printer, Christopher Barker, compounded on the 6th May 1579 for the Rentership, with a money payment of iiji, p. 849. The minute way in which the entry is worded, 'his Dispensation from the Rentership of this cumpanye for euer,' is a proof of the novelty of such a composition in the history of the Society.

Similarly in 26th March 1588 Richard Greene, one of the Charter-men, compounded for the Under Wardenship by paying \mathbf{v}^1 , see p. 859: and this kind of fine proved so convenient a replenishment of the Company's exchequer that, on the 26th March 1602, three stationers, John Norton, James Robertes, and master keyle, were fined one after the other for not serving for Renter to the amount of £19 [=£190 in present value] in all, see p. 833; so that in that one day there was raised a sum almost equal to a whole year's income of the Company at the time of the Incorporation fifty five years before. Again on another day, the 26th March 1604, William Leake, John Standish, and Richard Field paid \mathbf{x}^{1} each [=£300 in present value], for a similar exemption from the Rentership, p. 837.

These fines for offices, witness on the one hand to the increasing importance of business claims; so that these several Stationers were content to pay such large sums, rather than sacrifice so much of their time to the affairs of their Guild: and on the other hand that the Company by the gradual rising of its money payments, was sharing in the general prosperity of the nation and its metropolis.

We have also cases of actual committals to prison at pp. 853, 860 and 824: which besides the ominous note in other cases of 'his ymprisonment for this offence is respited till further Consideracon and order herein be had,' testify to the accredited power now vested in the Court of the Company; though in many instances this note was only a threat to enforce the payment of the fine.

Another illustration of the increased authority of the Executive is found in the two Roosters of Searchers whose names are recorded in this Volume. The first on the 3rd September 1576, at p. 41, the second on the 11th January 1586, at p. 42. It is noticeable that it was only at this latter date that the 'Search dinner' was established.

This gradual accretion of authority was doubtless much strengthened by the favour bestowed on the Executive of the Company by the Archbishops of Canterbury and the Bishops of London (especially John Whitelft and Richard Bancroft); through the special control then permitted to these prelates over the products of the human mind.

VI.

HE rise of the Book Patentees was on this wise. Licenses for particular books or granted with a limited scope for seven or ten years, were of frequent occurrence throughout the whole reign of ELIZABETH. Of such we have printed those of John Day in 1559, at p. 61, and of Thomas Vantrollier in 1574, at p. 746.

There were also the usual letters patents granted for life, to Richard Tottell for law books on the 12th January, and to the winters Richard Torge and John Coward on the 24th March 1559.

Queen's printers, Richard Jugge and John Cawood, on the 24th March 1559.

These sufficed during the earlier years of the Queen's reign: but after, the deaths of John Cawood and Reginald Wolf, and about the period of the Chasm between this and the preceding Register a number of letters patents for whole classes of books were granted, sometimes for two lives—with no other justification than the personal favour of the Queen or of one of her ministers—which bred great trouble in the Company for the next ten years.

The following is a trial list of these more general patents and of some of the more limited and specific licenses in Elizabeth's reign; with the reference to their places on the Patent Rolls. We have given, at I. 114, the appraisement of the money value of those previous to December 1582 by perhaps one of the most competent of judges, Christopher Barker.

- 1559. 12 Jan. R. Tottell. A license 'to imprint all manner of books concerning the common laws of this realm.' For his lifetime. I Eliz. Part 4.

The withdrawal of so many good books into the hands of a few, pauperized the general publishing trade: so that the Bishop of London wrote on the 1st June 1583, "I was enformed [by the Wardens of the Stationers' Company] that printinge of laufull bookes and suche as be not otherwise appointed by hir Maiesties grauntes is not matter sufficient to maineteigne anye man withoute his losse," I. 246. The patentees had therefore eaten up the trade. This was of course much aggravated by the large number of Apprentices who had in former years been put to the trade, and many of whom coming to their freedom and having the means wherewith to start for themselves, found themselves prohibited from printing a book for which they would have contented the author and done well with themselves, through a prohibitory license for that particular class of book, for which there was no other ostensible or real justification than favouritism.

VII.

ATTERS were therefore going from bad to worse in the Company for some years after 1577.

To give the story of that Controversy in its fulness, is not possible in this Preface: but, in outline, the course which

events took was as follows:

The death of the surviving Queen's printer, Richard Jugge, in July 1577, seems to mark the beginning of the trouble. While the appointment of his successor was unsettled and in abeyance, the undated petition at I., 111, which however was written in the succeeding August, was presented to Lord Burghley. Among the significant to that memorial was Christopher Barker, then of the Drapers' Company and a bookseller, whose patent in succession to Jugge was signed on the 27th September following.

Next arose the 'griefes' of the bookbinders which were considered by

the Court on the 21st October of the same year, as recorded at p. 880.

At I., 478, we have the following payment in 1577—1578:

Item paid to him [i. e. Master Norton the barrister] for the Counsell and paines about the Troubles moved by william Lobley and his confederates xx*

This gives interest to the Recantation signed by five Stationers, of whom **Lobley** was one, on the 27 January 1578, preserved at p. 880, that their consenting to the exhibition of complaints against the wardens and ancients 'was not Donne according to their Duetie for which they are sorie' &c.

Doubtless it was in connection with this Recantation that the Upper Warden W. Norton paid off W. Lobleys pawn of xxvj^a viij^d to the Company, I., 477; for he ceases to mingle in the Controversy from this time forward. He was in fact brought out: and as we shall see it was only in this way, though on a larger scale, that the patentees finally, after six or eight years' struggle, secured the practical recognition by the 'Comminalty' of the Company, of the privileges granted to them by the Queen.

On the same 27th January 1578 the Court passed the replies to the petitions of the poor of the Company, which are recorded at pp. 881 and

882.

So far, the action of the Executive was considerate, but apparently inadequate. The large number of apprentices coming to their freedom, a stationary production of books, and the constant tendency to sweep all the best paying works into patents framed in the widest possible terms, seem to have created a feeling of hopelessness. Many must have felt what Robert Robinson pleaded in the Star Chamber on the 10th November 1585:

That he the said Defendant hath served heretofore by the space and tyme of eight yeares or thereabowtes as an apprentice to the arte or misterye of Printing, and for fyve yeares after or thereaboutes served in the said misterye as a Jornyman, laboring

and endeavouring by this houeste meane and facultie to get his lyving as a Dutifull Subject to her majestie, hoping also after so longe service and paynes taken he might be suffred in this kynd of honest and vsuall trade and occupation to have had and emioyed the same libertie and fredome for the mayntenaunce of him self his poore wyfe and children, as other her majesties subjectes Doe in suche lyke faculties misteries and occupacions. And Did not thinke yat thoroughe the gredye and covetous Desire of a fewe (who spare not to the Impouerishing of a greate number to enriche them selves) suche poore men as this Defendent is should be forced (after so longe service Done, so greate paynes taken, and so manye yeares spent to learne their occupacion) to seake some other meanes and wayes to lyve or ells to be servauntes vnto theise and suche lyke patentees and their Deputies Duringe all theire lyfe A thinge very hard and grevous, whereof this Defendant hopeth this Honourable courte will have Due consideracion and regard

And the said Defendant further saith that he this Defendant (thinking it lawfull so to Doe, in respect of his apprenticehode and education in yat mistery; by reason of the auncient customes and liberties of this realme th[e]inheritaunce of the subjectes thereof and by the statute made for artificers in the fyvth years of her highnes raigne) Dyd heretofore vse or exercise the said arte or misterye of printinge. pp. 796—797.

Or as Robert Bourne pleaded on the 3rd February 1586:

Ffor this defendant saith that he is a Citezein and ffree-man of the City of London, and that before such tyme, as he was made free he did serve as apprentice in the trade or arte of printing eight yeres, And so obteynyng somme skill in the same trade was according to the lawes and customes of the said Citie made free, and being free by the like lawes and lawdabable custome vsed within the said City from tyme whereof no memory of man is to the contrary, he may and ought as he thinketh freely vse the arte of printing of almanner of bookes, except suche as do appertein properly to her maiesties printer, And the rather because their liberties and free customes; are not onely confirmed by diners statutes as they are given to understand but also so approved by some actes of parliament as that it ordeyneth as he is enfourmed that all lawes made contrary should be voide.

Wherevpoon this defendant having nowe no other trade wherewith to lyve and maynteyne him self and his famyly then the arte of printing wherein he was brought vp doth think it no lesse vnreasonable to prohibit him from all labour, then to prohibit him from labour in his lawfull trade, which although by theis letters patentes all libertie of printing be not taken awaie: yet by theis and such other like priviledges to other particuler persons graunted some for printing of lawe bokes some for pealme bookes some [for] grammar bookes so[h]oole bookes Latyne Hebrus and Greke bookes, almanner of praier bookes bibles and service bookes, there is almost no liberty lefte for printinge but for ballettes and toyes and such like, which might with better reason be prohibited then the rest, and which will not suffice to maynteyne the printers not pryveledged and their famylies, as this defendant veryly thinketh with bread and water. pp. 802—808.

We can therefore readily understand that the more energetic of the unprivileged Stationers were not content to sit down for ever in this condition but would try and find a way out of it somehow or other. And so they fell to pirated editions: that is, pirated if the privileges were valid, not otherwise.

Thus gradually was organized a Secret Combination, not only for the production but the dispersion of the most popular school-books; falsely printing thereon the names of the patentees and in some cases also their arms or trade mark as well, and then sending them to the markets and fairs throughout the country.

John Day—backed up as he specially was by the Earl of Leicester—was at this time one of the strongest men in the trade: and it does argue courage on the part of this Organization that Roger Ward in retaliation for his imprisonment by certain Stationers in the Counter in Wood Street in London should have dared to order his journeymen and apprentices to print as many as 10,000 copies of the A. B. C with the little Catechism appointed by her Highness Injunctions for the Instruction of Children with Day's arms or trade mark thereon. Out of which arose the Star Chamber case between 7th February and 10th July 1582, which we have fully reprinted at pp. 753—769.

It is but another instance of the way school-books perish, that of this A. B. C, of which tens of thousands of copies were printed in Elizabeth's reign, there was not, at the time of our enquiry, a single copy, authorized or pirated, in the British Museum.

The Wardens of the Stationers informed the Privy Council about March

1583 that

Some of these vndernamed do print those priniledged Copies at their pleasure, and baue other as disordered as themselves, who runne vp or downe to all ye faires and markets through a great part of ye Realme, and make sale of them; whose charges in cariage with their expences in Innes and Alehouses and other places considered, with vehement suspition and some liklyhood of further disorder they returne home more poore then they went out, and so spoile ye whole trade of ye Company and deceaue her Maiesties subjects with bookes enilly and vntruely printed.

The chiefe of these are John Wolfe, John Charlewood, and Roger Ward printers: Henry Bamford compositor: Franck Adams a maker of writing Tables, William Lobley a Bookebinder: Abraham Kidson, Thomas Butter, and [William] Wright booksellers /

who are greatly animated by one Master Robert Neak a lawyer. p. 779.

One result of all these piracies is to throw a grave doubt as to the true printers of all the smaller popular English privileged books between 1578 and 1586. Even at that time, probably only the patentee himself could demonstrate by the paper, type, arrangement, ornaments, or the records of his own business whether a particular printed copy was a piracy or not: how then can we know?

Of all this concerted opposition John Wolf of the Fishmongers' Company rose to be the Director. If this *Transcript* does nothing else, it will certainly bring this printer into prominence. What John Day was among the patentees, this man became among the unprivileged. He was known at first as an Agitator. His great argument was 'I will live.' The Ancients of the Company in March 1583 framed thirteen counts against him and sent them to the Privy Council. Two of these show the character of the man.

7. Wolff and some of his confederate affirmed openly in ve Stationers hall, yat 'it was lawfull for all men to print all lawfull bookes what commandement seeuer her Maiestie

gaue to ye contrary '

10. Wolff being admonished yat he being but one so means a man should not presume to contrarie her Highnesse governmente: 'Tush,' said he, 'LUTHER was but one man, and reformed all ye world for religion, and I am that one yat must and will reforme the government in this trade,' meanings printing and bookeselling, pp. 781-782.

Well, he did reform the Company; but not wholly in the way he pro-

posed.

It is not possible for us to measure the injury that this Secret Organization did to the patentees. Very large impressions were struck off to bear the expense of any legal proceedings and for greater profit. And thus the patentees having first tried by favour to grab all legally by their privileges, were likely to lose all by these illegal proceedings.

The whole matter came before the Queen in Council, who appointed, apparently about Midsummer 1582, Doctor John Hammond and Thomas NORTON Commissioners to enquire into and if possible to compound

matters.

This Commission brought matters to a crisis; and for the next twelve-

month the Society was in great perturbation: both sides fighting hard.

The Commissioners found the patentees very reasonable and considerate; but could do nothing with the unprivileged. So the Commission was strengthened by three others, most dispassionately selected, viz. the Bishop. Dean, and Recorder of London: who confirmed the report of the former Commissioners and made their final award on the 18th July 1583, p. 783.

But what was more important than all their counsellings is the following

extract from their report:

Those that have presses and complaine against the patenties were not aboue iiij / wolf hath acknowledged his error and is releved with worke. p. 784.

As he might have had work before, as appears from his interview on the 14th May 1582, at p. 780; it may be fairly assumed that he was now honestly convinced that patents or some copyright equivalent to them were a necessity to book publishing: and no doubt he was largely instrumental in securing for the unprivileged those liberal provisions which are recorded in the course of the next twelve months.

The first of these was that large list of important works at pp. 786-789, which on the 8th January 1584 were given by the patentees wholly for the 'reliefe of ye poore of the saide Companic.' It is presumed that besides the workmanship, the entire profits of the sale of these works was so

appropriated.

In addition to this, where a Stationer being its owner did not care to reprint a work; or where a work had for a long time been out of print: by the authority of the Master and Wardens it might be reprinted by any of the unprivileged 'paying vid in le li, i. e. two and a half per cent. on its cost (i. e. labour, use of types and press, and paper).

Both the profits on the publication of the specified works and this perpetual royalty on the reproduction of these older books were carried to the Poor's Account; which is first noticed in these Registers in the Wardens accounts 1584—1585, at I., 512.

These liberal arrangements, with an increase in the number of books produced and the prevention of fresh vested interests by a stringent limitation of apprentices, apparently met the emergency of the case. And further content was ensured when John Wolf and Francis Adams, leaders in the agitation, were made in the autumn of 1584 two of the assigns of

Richard Day's patent; and thus fully bought out.

So that the patentees profiting by the quietude and being energetically supported by Archbishop Whitdiff carried the Star Chamber Decree on the 23rd June 1586: which, however preposterous some of its provisions might be, was the most important piece of legislation concerning the press as yet passed, and was only matched by the Star Chamber Decree of 11 July 1637, wherein Charles I.—as a part of a policy of tyranny and to gag the press—limited all the master-printers of London to twenty, besides the royal printers.

Thus this early conflict of Labour and Capital ended in both sides winning; and no such convulsion divided and disorganized the Company until the fight under the Commonwealth which is described at I., 583—593; wherein

the Ancients also most decidedly gained the day.

VIII.

HERE are four reasons why we require to know—apart from the information it may contain—the precise time of the first appearance of a book in print: as, in most instances, such appearance follows soon after its composition or translation. Its BIOGRAPHICAL RELATIONSHIP, as illustrative of the growth &c. of the author's powers. Its Level, relative to the general progress or retrogression of thought induction, &c. The date of the

COMMENCEMENT OF ITS INFLUENCE or power—whether spiritual moral or political—upon the men of its own age and on subsequent generations. And lastly to fix, for the benefit of posterity, the date of the currency of such words, phrases, allusions, manners and customs, &c., as are found in its text.

As the Book-Entries almost always relate to First Editions; their authority in determining the first appearance of books is very great. The year printed on the Title page (as 1587) if not limited by the contents of the work, may mean any day between the 25th March of one year and the 24th March of the next. Hence the great importance of the sequence of the Book-Entries in these Registers; checked as they always are by the regnal years. By these means we are able to ascertain almost the month of the publication; and in some instances the week.

In the present day, a large edition of a book is distributed to the principal booksellers on one day, so that the date of its birth can be fixed

with certainty, and is registered exactly at Stationers' Hall: but in the time of which we are treating everything was much slower and far less organized

and developed.

We must dismiss from our minds all our existing methods of large printing premises with a number of compositors in one or two large rooms. The composition then was not necessarily done in the master-printer's house where he kept his press. Of course such portion of it as was executed by himself and his apprentices was done there; but that which was committed to the journeymen compositors, who were for the most part householders, was probably done in their houses and paid for by piecework; a custom which was facilitated by most of the books then printed, being almost always in some one size of type. Therefore there could not be so much control exercised over the literature in respect to the guardianship of the type however easy it was for printers of that day to identify the printer of a book by its typography—neither do we find any such attempted; but only in respect to the custody of the hand printing press, which was doubtless well secured every night as a dangerous instrument, lest secret nocturnal printing should go on without the owner's consent. Instances of the secret use of printing presses will be found at pp. 816-817.

The total number of the London presses was therefore, for a long time, the measure—the University presses apart—of the lawful power to produce books in the kingdom of England Wales and Ireland. Hence the great importance of the list of all known presses in London in May 1583, which we have reprinted at I., 248; of a similar but imperfect list on the 9th May 1615, and of Sir J. Lambe's List in 1636 of the Master-printers of London as they succeeded each other in trade and place, both of which will be

reprinted in the next Volume.

An interesting decision is reprinted on p. 882. It was determined on the 24th November 1578, by virtue of the Charter, that Richard Skilders, a Dutch compositor and an admitted Brother of the Company, who possessed a press with type, &c., should not print for himself; for "that no person that is not of the comminalty of this company may not vse the art of printinge in this realme otherwise than in the servyce of the freemen of this mistery." So Skilders was assigned to Thomas Dawson to work as a journeyman compositor at weekly wages.

Where did the hand printing presses come from? Probably, from the

Continent.

Out of this claim of the Company to be the exclusive printers for all England arose in 1583 its long conflict with the University of Cambridge. The reason the brunt of this conflict fell on the University of Cambridge was that the Earl of Leicester's present of the printing press to the University of Oxford was not made till 1585; and also because Cambridge was perhaps in Elizabeth's reign the more active and important University.

The press work being done at home and much of the composition being sent out; it is evident from pp. 881-2, that the binding was wholly sent out:

the books being ordinarily issued in the beginning of the week and returned at its close, or earlier if need were.

Most of the smaller publications, which constituted the majority of the issues from the press, were published unbound, or as we should now say 'stitched.' The best binders, as indeed all the printing paper down to about 1588, came from France. As the larger works therefore only as a rule came to the binders' hands; we need not be surprised at there being in 1597 but forty-seven freemen binders in London, and they too apparently belonging to several Companies.

IX.



HE present Volume furnishes us with the regulated numbers which then constituted an impression. At p. 885, an authority is recorded on the 3rd August 1583 for the printing of an impression of 750 copies of the Queen's *Injunctions*: but the utmost ordinary recognized limit was 1,250 copies, see pp. 43 and 883; and that was irrespective either of the size, price, or popularity of the book.

This again rested on a question of wages. For the point was virtually this, that for every 1,250 copies the master printer should be put to the cost of resetting the work in type. For it would in many instances have been better for him to have kept his formes of type standing a good long while, or to have printed off much larger numbers to his first impression, than to have incurred this fresh expense. Consequently much work was in this way made for the compositors; and this is the chief explanation of the multiplicity of editions of popular books, varying only in the minutiæ of spelling, that we find in those times.

Double impressions of 2,500 or at most 3,000 copies off a forme were allowed in editions of *primers* and *catechisms*, *proclamations*, *statutes*, *almanacks*, and in cases of books set in smaller type (brevier and nonpareil down to 1587, and afterwards nonpareil only, see p. 883).

Of the *Grammer* and $\Delta ccidence$ four Double impressions or 10,000 copies of each annually were allowed to be printed; and in 1587 it was decided (p. 883) that should further impressions of these be needed in

any one year, even those should consist of only 1,250 copies.

All these high numbers, however, related chiefly to school books; then the most lucrative of publishing properties: and now among the rarest books extant, so completely have they been thumbed out of existence. Of the highest portion of the Literature, especially the lyric or dramatic poetry (the Shakespearean Quartos for instance) there was probably a much smaller number printed; possibly not more than from 750 to 1,000 copies at the outside.





TH a realization of these facts, let us consider the section of Book-Entries.

Two points are now abundantly clear from a study of these Registers; which must never be lost sight of in considering the book-entries of ELIZABETH's reign that are contained in them.

A THE PRINCIPAL MOTIVE FOR THE RECORDING IN THESE SUB-LEDGERS OF THE WARDENS' ANNUAL FINANCIAL ACCOUNTS, OF THE TITLES OF BOOKS, WAS TO BECKON FOR THE FEES WHICH WERE CHARGED FOR SUCH ENTRANCES.

Had there been no fees there might never have been any book-entries. As it is, money is occasionally brought to account, without the titles being given: and many unprivileged books doubtless appeared without either payment or registration.

B BOOKS PUBLISHED UNDER SPECIAL LICENSES OR MORE GENERAL LETTERS PATENTS NEEDED NO OTHER AUTHORITY: and therefore not coming to the Wardens' hands for licensing are usually not recorded in these Registers; which are therefore principally the authority-books for the unpriviledged publishers or for priviledged ones when issuing books not included in their licenses or patents.

It may also be pointed out that very few works are registered to the Master or Wardens of the year; though they might be active publishers at the time.

These limits in the scope of the Registers are no detraction from their intrinsic merits, as they record hundreds of works of which copies have yet to be found; or as they fix the dates of the first appearance of thousands of books which are now known to us; or as they are the sole authority respecting the *personnel* of book production; or as they lay bare to us the conditions under which alone books could be lawfully printed at that time.

When, besides, we remember the English books secretly printed at home or openly printed on the Continent; we see that the Registers do not record at the utmost more than one half of the Literature: and therefore we must by no means be surprised if works should turn up of which at present

we have no knowledge whatever.

Many titles of books occur for the first time in these Registers in the Transfer Lists on assignments from one printer to another, though they may have been originally published years before; which is another evidence of the incomplete registration.

These Transfer Lists are important as often containing the stock in trade of a publisher at his decease or giving up business, and therefore as

including his best paying books.

It is unfortunate that no index was attempted if only of the publishers' The want of it led to the oft-recurring salvo jure cujuscunque, or its English equivalent, "Provided that if this booke belonge to any partie by force of anie former enterance or Righte whatsoeuer, That then this enterance to be voide," p. 614.

It may also be observed that when a publisher issued an account of some execution, sea-fight, 'monster,' &c., that he almost always issued a ballad on it as well. Where therefore we find the former, we may look for the latter;

just like male and female.

The increase of the minimum fee to Sixpence has already been noticed.

It is clear from the Star Chamber case of J. Day v. R. Ward and W. Holme at pp. 753-769, that where an Edition was the joint venture of several Stationers; that, very often, a Stationer supplied, or as it was then termed, did 'lay on' his own paper for his portion of the impression: as we find ABRAHAM NEWMAN say at p. 763, that by the bargain between him and R. Ward he "was to Delyuer him so many Reames of paper as" he "should have Reames of bokes and so to paye but for the prynting of the same." Therefore it may well be that copies of such impressions printed off the identical same types may vary in the paper mark of the sheets used in its production.

Among the licences for books will be found at pp. 503, 512, the entries for playing cards to Ralph Bowes Esquire, whose renewed patent we have

seen at p. 16, was granted on the 13th June 1588.

It was after this renewal, on the 23rd September 1588, that Master Bowes was admitted to the freedom of this Company by redemption, see p. 703; and the first entry of the 'moulds' was made on the 18th of October following.

The apprentice to Master Bowes at p. 163 was evidently employed in

the manufacture of playing cards.

The subject of the licensing of the press at this time, and how far it was the expression of the mind of the English nation, is too large for our present space; and must be reserved for the next Volume.

XI.

HE date when a man took up his freedom is the earliest date on which he could lawfully print or publish a book for himself. Section of 'Freemen admitted' is therefore of such importance in fixing the earliest date for undated books, that after it had been all printed off we submitted its printed text to a yet further comparison with the Original. We have added, at pp. 28-29, a Trial List of most of the London Printers and Publishers towards

the end of ELIZABETH's reign.

It is curious that whereas the taking up of the freedom was associated in the early days of the Company with the payment of a breakfast; in this Volume it is connected with the payment of a dinner.

The other three Sections deal with the 'Apprentices,' 'Fines for breaking of Orders' or 'for compounding for offices,' and 'Promotions to the Livery.'

The last Section of Decrees and Ordinances' is, as stated at p. 879, not

allowed to be reprinted in this Transcript.

The Fines increase both in number and amount as time goes on. One curious point about them is the systematic way in which they were wholly or partially remitted to members of the Company: affording another illustration of that perennial characteristic of our English legislation and administration; never to interfere unless absolutely compelled to, and then not to push the law to its utmost rigour but to mitigate it as far as propriety will admit. We think however we detect a lurking disposition to give any outsiders that came within the jurisdiction of the Company the full benefit of their fines,

It was a very plucky thing to fine so big a man as the Queen's printer, Christopher Barker, on the 22nd of May 1586, p. 858; just as he and his associates were carrying the Star Chamber Decrees.

By the term 'disorderly printed,' for which fines were often inflicted; we are to understand incorrectly or carelessly printed, as well as printed against

other men's privileges.

Taking the thirty years' record as a whole, the fines cannot be thought excessive: though they by no means touched the secret printing of the time; of which we have been able to give a glimpse in the secret report on the authors and dispersers of the MARTIN MARPRELATE tracts at pp. 816—817.

The Advancement to the Livery, with the yet rarer cooptation into the Court of Assistants—both exceedingly capricious—concern chiefly the personal history of the favoured Stationer. They only affected his bookproducing power by permitting him to have more apprentices; but were the necessary preliminary stages to the attainment of the Wardenship and Mastership.

There is a singular case at p. 847, where Oliver Wilkes refusing, on the 18th August 1578, to serve on the Livery was fined 40s. [=£20 now]

with the option of imprisonment if he did not pay it: which he did.

XII.

HE object of this Transcript is to bring its period very nigh to us. Like a great telescope, it resolves the aggregate galaxy of that Age into its individual efforts and geniuses. By it we may realize not only how great a time it was; but what a large effort was made—spurred, it is true, by the hope of immediate gain—to insure the memory of its Action and Thought to after generations. In which effort we must recognize the Publishers and Printers as

accessories and fellow-workers with the Reporters Thinkers and Imaginers: and we shall the more gratefully do so, as a deeper and a wider knowledge leads us to appreciate that Literature as one of the greatest earthly blessings

that the English-speaking races have inherited.

This Transcript may help us to understand the genesis of the books of that time by assisting us to an all surrounding knowledge of them; from the paper and print which formed their bodily substance, through all the purgatory of labour and money matters, to the fifth-essence of mind contained in them: and so lead us to some sure canons of criticism respecting their text.

The multiplicity of editions of popular books we have seen at p. 23 was a mere question of journeymen's wages. Therefore while the literal variations in such editions—especially in the constant variations then recognized in spelling—diminish in importance; we must, on the other hand, the more carefully distinguish between the impressions themselves. Separating the Reprint-editions, the sole motive to which was merely money for the workmen the printer and the publisher; from the Originative-editions, wherein the author either purified polished or enlarged his earlier thought; and in which, besides money, he had ever a care for honour, reputation, and especially for that satisfaction which is the meed of all earnest literary workers, the consciousness that he had been true to himself and that he had done his best.

FURTHER NOTES ON THE PRESENT TRANSCRIPT.

HE principles of the transliteration of the text of the Registers into the type of this *Transcript*—which are clearly laid down at I., 37—40, have been adhered to in this volume. The purpose, of course, is to reproduce the Registers just as they are, reserving the consideration of their testimony to the Literature for an after study: and also by the

use of various types, to bring out the mind of each entry into the sharpest possible clearness and definition.

A few incidental matters however in this volume need a short explanation.

2 George Strevens had the impudence to insert against such entries as struck him, g*s. These sacrilegious initials have been omitted in this reproduction: together with the pencil marks of William Herbert to such entries as he extracted for his edition of Ames' Typographical Antiquities 1784—1790.

There are also a very few idle ascriptions of authorship inserted in the margin—such as 'Elderton' at pp. 396 and 416, 'master whetstone' at p. 404, 'Lyllye' at p. 430, 'Nashe' at p. 499, 'T. Lodge' at p. 530, &c.—which, being apparently an indifferent imitation of the original handwriting, may be interpolations. They add nothing at all to our information.

With these exceptions, there seems no reason to question the purity of the written text.

- 3 Richard Collins at p. 35 portioned out the Register into six sections: but their chronological thread will be found at pp. 1—4. The sixth and last section of Decrees and Ordonnances is omitted in this Transcript as explained at p. 879.
- 4 A large number of entries cancelled by strokes occur in this Volume; which cancellation has also, at a considerable cost, been reproduced herein.
- 5 As Ryce Jones came to his freedom on the 22nd April 1577, p. 674; wherever after that date Rychard Jones' name is written Ryc Jones it has been allowed so to stand; leaving the certain identification of either Stationer to Volume V.
- 6 Many of the entries were not all written at the same first time: and especially 'Tout payé' 'Dinner paid' or simply 'paid' were, as the colour of the ink shows, written at a later date.
- 7 The Illustrative documents—gathered from various sources—will be found to throw great light on the history of the Stationers' Company and on the conditions of book production at the time.
- 8 The Transcript is the labour of mere vacant moments; and is realized concurrently with the discharge of onerous and responsible duties in a busy official life: working early and late that it may be accomplished. Nevertheless the utmost exactness is sought after. Minute errors and inconsistencies are inevitable in the pioneer edition of such a work: but substantially, and that without any doubt, the reader has here printed, the written text in its purity.

1541—1566 **A.D.**

1541-1543. Thomas Berthelet's account with King Henry VIII.

That distinguished royal printer Thomas Berthelet died shortly before the establishment of the Company, and his name only occurs at I. 35 and 41; yet he must have held a position among the members of the Craft of Stationers of equal prominence to that which we find John Cawood holding in the

earlier years of the incorporated Guild.

Mr Bridger having drawn our attention to the following recent acquisition to the Manuscript Department of the British Museum, Add. MS. 28,196; we have given it here at length as a valuable and interesting record of the sort of works that were supplied to the king by his printer who was also his bookbinder, as giving prices of books in that day, as showing what a busy time the royal printer had of it when the Parliament was sitting, and as throwing incidental light upon our Reformation literature. All the works were of a serious nature. The king evidently obtained his supply of the lighter literature from some other source. The amount of this account, fully equal to £1,200 of present money, certainly justifies C. Barker's description of the printers of Henny's reigh, that they were of 'good credit and compotent wealth' I 114. potent wealth, I. 114.

The three editions of the New Testament in English and Latin were probably those printed in 1538 by

Robert Redman and HERRY NICHOLSON.

This book of accounts, which is also suggestive in many other ways, was purchased for the British Museum on the 8th January 1870.

[This is Queen Elizabeth's first licence to W. Seres, and does not include the reversion to his son. It is interesting among other things for telling us of the elder Seres' imprisonment in the previous reign.]

LIZABETH by the grace of GOD &c To all printers bookesellers and Stationers and to all other our Subjectes, gretinge knowe ye that where we be duly informed how our louyng Subject William Seres of our Citie of London Stationer and bookeseller had by the graunt of our late deare brother of worthie memorie kyng Edward the Sixt licence to printe all maner of prymers that then were and from thensfurth should be Sett forth agreable to the booke of Common prayer at the same tyme established And in the tyme of our late deare Syster Quene Mary was not onlie defeated [i. e. deprived of the feat or art of printing this privilege] theref to his great

losse but was also imprisoned long tyme and deprined of gre[a]t multitude of the said primers and also of other great nombres of bookes which tended to his viter v[n]doyng. We be pleased to give this graunte and by theis presentes for vs our heyres and Successours do of our speciall grace mere mocion and certeyn knowledge give and graunte full power and aucthoritie priviledge and licence vnto our said louyng Subject wylliam Seres and to his assignes for and during the tearne of his naturall life to imprinte or cause to be imprinted aswell all maner of bookes of pryvate prayers vsuallie and

wythiu our Realmes and Domynions whatsoeuer they be, in any maner of wyse to imprinte or cause to be imprinted any of the aforesaide bookes that the sayd John Daye shall by aucthoritie of this our licence ymprinte or cause to be imprynted or anye parte of them but onely the sayde John Daye and his assignes upon payne of our highe indignacon and that every offendor therin shall forfaicte to cure use fortie Shillinges of laufull money of Englond for every suche booke or bookes at any tyme so printed contrarye to the true me[a]ninge of this our present Licence and Priviledge over and besydes all suche booke or bookes so Prynted to be forfaited to whomsoever shall susteigne the chardges and seu the sayde forfaiture in our behalfe. Willinge therefore and commandinge all our officers and Mynisters as they tender our favour and will avoid our displeasure and indignacon for the contrarye that they and every of theym yf nede shall require to aide and assyste the sayd John Daye and his assignes in due exercisinge and execution of this our present licence and Priviledge wyth effect accordinge to the true meaninge of the same. EING enformed by this berer John Bodleveh that vppon his late sute to you for the renewing of his privilege with longer tearme, for the reimprinting of the late Geneva Bibls by him and his associates sett foorthe, you suspended to give your furderaunce vitill you had hearde our advise. So it is that we thinke so well of the first impression, and reviewe of those whiche have eithens travailed therin, that we wishe it wold please you to be a meane that twelve yeres longer tearme may be by speciall privilege graunted him, in consideracon of the charges by him and his associates in the first impression, and the reviewe sythens susteyned. ffor thoughe one other

special bible for the churches be meant by vs to be set forthe as convenient tyme and leysour hereafter will permytte: yet shall it nothing hindre but rather do moche good to have diversitie of translacons and readinges And if his licence hereafter to be made, goe simplye foorthe without proviso of our oversight as we thinke it maye so passe well ynoughe, yet shall we take suche ordre in writing with the partie, that no impression shall passe but by our directon consent and advise. THE BISHOPS' BIBLE, 1568.

[The Bishops' Bible is a very noble specimen of English typography. It is a great folio volume printed in a large type and in double columns. It contains two copperplate engravings, one of the Queen, and the other of the Earl of LEIGESTER. If we would realize how the Queen and her favourite looked when they were in the glory the one of her beauty, the other of his manhood; we must study these two engravings. Similarly in a woodcut initial B there is an exquisite portrait of Sir W. CEGLI now forty-eight years of age and before he grew a beard. We more often realize the old whiteheaded Burghler than the younger CEGLI whose piercing eye and calm face in this portrait are but an index of his clear intellect and wise penotrating insight.]

19 January 1562. Portion of a Letter from Richard Cox Bishop of Ely, to Sir W. Cecil, advocating a new translation.

YR I have perused a lytill treatese called Apologia ecclesia Anglicanae [by Bishop Jewell] And geve GOD h[e]arty thankes for it because it is bothe godly and fynely handled. It will De muche good, not only in confirming and comfourting the trew Christians in all places of Europe, but also in stopping of the mowthes of aduersaryes, or in forcyng them to spewe out, all that thei haue to say. It is marvelouse well Don to set uppe men abowte such maters. I am sure that neither in kyng henry nor kyng bewardes tyme our late soueraynes / was any suche ko[e]ne sworde Drawen / to cut the aduersaryes. And for as muche as thei can Do so excellently, It shall not

be amisse, ye sett them styll aworke, to make sum breiffe and handsum confutation of the principall argumentes that the papistes make and glory in ffor the primacie, for the abused masse, for their counterfecte catholick church / and such like. That as Eckius enchiridion is commonly in the handes of every of them, so the trew catholick might have a lyke we[a]pon in a redynes, to Defende them selves from all falsho[o]d

A nother thing there is worthy to be considered / The translation of the bible to be committed to mete men and to be v[i]ewed ouer and amended. I called upon [for] it in bothe my masters tymes [Henry VIII. and Edward VI.] sed frustra. Yet GOD be praised ye have men hable to Do it thoroughly. Thus muche I signific to you because GOD hath apoyuted you a speciall instrumente to the furtherance of His heavenly truthe, vnder so gratious a soversyn / who I trust Doth not mislike the apologic

YR I wryte to you the more seldem, because I contynew in consyderation of your weighty and Dayly affaires, and the importunitie of a numbre who let not to lade you with letters, yet sumtyme I must trouble you beinge to me as I thanke GOD ye ar[e]. I wo[u]ld earnestly either by me selfes, or rather by you crave of the Quenes maiestic that she wolde Distribute emong the best learned of her clergye, the whole body of the bible, to be ouerseen and consydered, and the translation Diligently to be perused, to th[e] intent one vniforme translation might be used in all churches of her graces realme. A noble an acte as Prolome Dyd by hys 70tio [i.e. the seventy Jews

who translated the Septuagint.] The Dinersitie of translations make a fowle gerre [gear] in churches at this Day. Many good men are greved at it. And our Satans lawgh at it. And GOD nothing pleased with the colde handling of his cause. The whole bible may be Dinided in to partes, And such as shall be thought mete, to have their portion appoynted to be Don[e] / agaynste a certayne tyme. At which tyme all the travailers to me[e] te together and to conferre as her highnes shall appoynte. Darke and Dowtfull places wo[u]lde be Declared as their cum[e] in order with with playne and breffe notes. Inkhorne and curiouse termes would be sho[w]ned playne and vsuall English sowght for. This was my request to our old masters of blessed memorye [i. e. in the reigns of Henry VIII. and Edward VI.] If our gratiouse mistres now would accomplish this godly acte, she would do GOD high service et ego interim canos meos letius ad miseros deducore

Jugge] after his great charges to be longer deferred / I have caused one booke to be bound as ye see which I h[e]artelye pray yow to present favorablie to the Quenes Maiestie with your ffrendlie excuse of my disabylitie, in not coming my self

I have also wrytten to the Quenes Maiestie, [a letter] the Copie wherof I have sent yow the rather to vse your oportunitie of deliuerie, yf your Prudence shall not thinke them tolerable,

And bicause I wold yow knewe all I here send yow a Note to signifie: who first traveiled in the dinerse bookes, though after them sum other pervsing was had, the Letters of their Names be partile affixed in the onde of their bookes / Which I thought a polecie to showe them, to make them more Diligent, as Awnswerable for their Doinges / I have remembred yow of such observacons as my first Letters sent to them

(by your advise) did signifye / Yt may be that in so long a worke thinges have [e]scaped which may be Lawfull to enerie man Cum bona venia to amend whan they find them

Non omnia possimus omnes./

The Printer hath honestlie done his Diligence, Yf your honour wold obtain of the Quenes highnes, that this edicon might be Licensed and only [solely] comended in publike reading in Churches, to drawe to one vniformitie, yt weare no greate cost to the most parishes and a Relief to him for his great charges susteined. The Psatters might remayn in Queres [the Choirs] as they be much multiplied but wher[e] of their owne accord they wold vse this Translacon.

Size I pray your honour be a meane that Jug[ge] only may have the preferment of this edicon, for yf any other shuld Lurche him to steale from him thes[e] Copies: he weare a great Loser in this first doing And sir without Doubt he hath well descrued to be preferred A man would not thinke that he had devoured so much payne as he hath susteined /

Thus I wish your honour all grace vertue and helth as to my self. ffrom my house at Lamhith this fifth of October. [1568].

I have byn bolde in the forniture [i. e. prefatory matter] with fewe wordes to expresse the incomperable valewe of this Treasour amonge many thinges good

profitable and bewtifull, ye have in possession. yet this only necessarie, wherof so to thinke, and so to believe, maketh your Maiestie blessed, not only here in this your governance, but yt shall Advance your Maiestie to attaine at the last the blisse everlastinge, Which after a longe prosperous raigne over vs, Almightie GOD send yow, as Certainlie he will, for the [che]rishinge [of] that I which HE Loveth best, of which is pronounced that Duomodocunque Celum et terra transibunt Verbum tamen DOMINI manebit in eternum



30 DECEMBER 1579. THE BISHOP OF LONDON REPORTS THE ARREST OF W. CARTER.

IGHT honorable and my sing[u]ler good Lord I have founde out a presse of pryntynge with one Carter, a very Lewd fellowe, who hath byne Dyvers tymes before in prison for printinge of Lewde pamphelettes. But nowe in searche of his Howse amongest other naughtye papystycall Bookes, wee have founde one wrytten in Ffrenche inty[t]led the innosency of the Scotysshe Quene a very Dangerous Book wherin he [i. e. the writer] calleth her the heire apparant of this Crowne. he enveyth agaynst the Execucion of the Duck of Norfolke, Defendeth the rebellion in the north, and Dyscourseth agaynst you, and the Late Lord keper [Sir N. Bacon] I Doubt not but that

your Lordshipp hath seene yt / neverthelesse I thought good to signyfye thus muche vnto your Lordshipp that you maye Deale with the fellowe (who ys nowe neare you in

the Gatehowse) as to your wysdom shall seme good. I can get nothinge [out] of him, for he Dyd Denye to answere vppon his othe / when your Lordshipp shalbe at any Leasure to Deale in the matter: I will sende to you the wardens [i. e. of the Stationers' Company], which will enforme yow further of an other Booke, which ye abrode wherin her maiestie ye towched / and of certayne other news formes of letters [type] which he hath made and will not confesse them

Thus with my humble Deutye vnto your Lordshipp I take my leave from my Howse at London by Pawles this xxxth of December 1579

Respecting this man, STOWE thus writes-

On the 10. of January [1584], as at sessions holden in the Iustice hall in the Old baily of London, for gaole delivery of Nowgate, William Carter of the City of London, was there indicted, arraigned, and condemned of high treason, for printing a seditious and trayterous booke in English, entituled, A treatise of schieme: and was for the same (according to sentence pronounced against him) on the next morrow drawne from Newgate to Tiborne, and there hanged, bowelled, and quartered. And foorthwith against slaundorous reports spread abroad in seditious bookes, letters, and libels thereby to inflame our countrey men and her maiesties subjectes, a booke was published, intituled A Declaration of the favorable dealing of her maiesties commissioners &c. which booke also I have caused to be set downe in the continuation of the chronicle first collected by Reigne [i.e. Reginald] Wolf and finished by Raphael Holenshed.

[The next sixty pages are chiefly occupied with details of the eventful Controversy by which the Stationers' Company was at this time nearly rent in twain. Partly by the absorption of the best paying books into privileges, partly by the proportionately large number of apprentices which had of late come to their freedom and the equally large number then serving their time, the producing power had outstripped the demand for books, and the general avowed printing trade had come into a deplorable condition. C. Barker stated in December 1682, there were '22. printing howes in London, where 8. or 10. at the most would suffise for all England, yea and Scotland too,' I. 144. Yet in the following May these printers, now increased to twenty-three, had only fifty-three presses between them. Out of the desperation of making a living and a natural desire to get on themselves; had originated among the poorer members of the Company that secret Organization for the producing and selling of privileged books, which in a short time inflicted great loss on the patentoes and gave rise to this four years' strugglo.

While this fight was in preparation inside the Company, outside and beyond it there was considerable dissatisfaction in some minds at the lighter and more popular literature which had been and was still

dissatisfaction in some minds at the lighter and more popular literature which had been and was still growing into favour: especially as not having been drawn into patents, it was free to the smaller printers

growing into favour: especially as not having been drawn into patents, it was free to the smaller printers and the younger publishers.

Of this dissatisfaction the following draught of an Act is a curious record. It would have made the opinions of the 'godly learned' the measure of the Literature; whereas it came to be a much more varied and bright thing than that.

This Restraint for printing was originally sketched out in 1577: and is here given as corrected in 1580 by William Lambards, the author of the Perambulation of Kent.

It is noticeable that this draught Act, as revised by Lambards, proposed to take away from the Bishop of London all the control of the metropolitan presses which he had hitherto exercised as the Ordinary of that disease 1

W. LAMBARD'S CORRECTED DRAUGHT OF AN ACT OF PARLIAMENT FOR THE RETABLISHMENT OF THE GOVERNORS OF THE ENGLISH PRINT.

An acte to restraine the licentious printing selling and vttering of unproffitable and hurtfull Inglishe bokes.

FOR as muche as the arte of printing bookes (a most happie and proffitable invention) is now of late tyme greatly abused, partly by the covetousnesse of some that doe occupie the trades of printing, binding, buying, and selling bookes, and partly by the vnadvised enterprise of sundrie persons, which doo take vpon theim, either for glorie, or gaine, to devise, penne, gather, or translate, and to set foorthe in the Inglishe tongue, sundrie bookes, pamfletes, Poesies, ditties, songes, and other woorkes, and wrytinges, of many sortes and names serving (for a great parte of them) to none other ende

(what titles seever they beare) but only to let in a mayne Sea of wickednesse, and to set up an arte of making lascinious ungodly love, to the highe displeasure of GOD, whose guiftes and graces bee pitiefully misused thearby to the manifest injurie and offence of the godly learned, whose prayee woorthie endevours and wrytinges are thearfore the lesse read and regarded to the intollerable corruption of common lyfe and manners, which pestilently invadeth the myndes of many that delight to heare or read the said wanton woorkes, and to no small or sufferable wast[e] of the treasure of this Realme which is thearby consumed and spent in paper, being of it selfe a forrein and chargeable comoditie. BE IT (for remeadie hearof) ENACTED, by the Queenes most excellent maiestie, the Lordes spirituall and temporall, and the comons in this present

Parliament assembled, and by the auctoritie of the same. That the Deane of the Cathedrall Churche of Sainct Paule within the Citie of London for the tyme being, The Desne of the Cathedrall churche of Sainct Peters in Westminster for the tyme being, the deane of the Arches in London, and the Recorder of the said Citie of London for the tyme being, and eight other persons the same to be iii readers benchers, or vtter barresters of or in the fowre principall Innes (or howses) of Courte, comonly called the Inner temple, the middle temple, Lincolnes Inne, and Grayes Inne, (that is to saye, two suche persons of eche of the said Innes, or howses) and to bee from tyme to tyme, named and appointed severally, by the Benchers, Readers, and auncientes of evarie the said Innes (or howses) shall from henceforthe be called GOVERNOURS OF THE INGLISHE PRYNTE. And that no parson or parsons shall from hencefoorthe printe for him selfe, or for or vuder any other or otherwise offer to sale, or ytter, any copie, worke, or wryting whatsoever heareafter to be printed eyther in the Inglishe tongue only, or in any other language and the Inglishe tongue jointly althoughe the same shall have bene at any time before putte in printe, valesse the same copie, woorke, or wryting, shalbee first allowed and licensed to the printe, by the said Governours of the INGLISHE PRINTE or by some three of theim (whearof the said Deane of Sainct Paules the said Deane of Sainct Peters or the said deane of the Arches to bee one) under the propre hand wryting of suche of the said Governours, as so shall allowe, and licence And valesse also that the said allowance and licence togeather with the propre names, surnames, and additions, aswell of suche of the said Governours' (as shall so allowe and licence, as is aforesaid) as also of the author, penner, or translator, and of the Printer of the saide copie woorke or wryting and of him or theim for or vnder whome the same shalbe printed (if any suche shalbe) and togeather with the verie daye of the monethe and yeare of our lorde CHRISTE in which the same shalbee first begonne to bee printed shalbe plainly and distinctly esett foorthe and printed and be conteyned in the first or second page of the said copie, worke, or writing, when it shallbe offred to sale or vttered

And be it further enacted by the autoritee aforesaid, that if any copie, work, or wryting whatsoever, shalbo hereafter printed, offered to sale, or vttered contrary to the forme order and true meaning of this present acte or with any material alteracon addicion or Diminution therein to be had or made, after suche allowance and licence as is provided in this acte, vnto which alteracon etc, such of the said governours as had before by vertue of this acte, given suche allowance and license shall not be privie and assenting That then aswell the Printer thearof as also suche other Stationer, printer, or bookeseller (if any suche shalbe) for or vodor whome the same shalbe printed) shall lose and forfaite the summe of xxii to bee levied of his or their goods and cattails, to the vse of the Queenes Maiestie, and shall also from thenceforthe lose all and everie benefite of suche priviledges and grauntes as he or they shall then have of or for the printing of any other copie, woorke, or wryting what-soever: And shall bee moreover from thencefoorthe for ever disabeled, and vtterly Debarred, to exercise (otherwise then as a meniall servaunte to any other) any of the trades of printing, binding or selling of Bookes. And that then also it shall and may bee lawfull to any parson or parsons whatsoever, to seise, take, and baue to his or their proper vse or vses, all and everie suche booke and bookes as shall be printed contrarie to the fourme and meaning of this present Acte and shalbee offered, opened, or set out, to the sale, in any place or places whatsoeuer

Provided neuerthelesse, that this acte or any thing therein conteyned, shal not in any wise preindice nor be preindiciall to any person or persons, for or concerning the printing, offering to sale, or vttering of any copie, worke, or writing that shalbe hearafter allowed and licenced vnder the proper handwriting of any Archbisshop of this Realme of Inglande to be printed So alwayes that the said allowance and licence,

together with the proper name and surname of the larchbishop and name of his See and together with the names and surnames of the Author, penner, or translator and printer, and setter on worke and together with the verie day of the months and years in whiche the same shall first beginne to be printed, Bee plainly and Distinctly set foorthe and printed and Do in the first or seconde page of suche copie, worke, or wryting, when

it shalbe printed, put to sale, and vittered

Provided also that this acte, or any thing their in conteyned shall not in any wyse extende to the printing, putting to sale, vttering of any Statutes of the parliament of this Realme of Inglande or of any proclamacons or publique orders, ordinances declaracons commaundements whatsoener lawfully proceeding eyther mediately or immediately from and under the name or auctoritie of our souereigne Ladie the Queenes maiestie, or of any the articles of any convocation or Synode of the cleargie assembled by lawfull ordre, but that the same and everie of theim shall or may be printed offred to sale or vttered in suche manner and forme, as if this presente acte had never been had or made

governors of the company of Staconers and your saide pore orators wherein contrary to your honnours commandement we your pore orators coulde neither attayne by waie of supplicacon or otherwise that we might come before the saide Comyssioners to showe our greefes and to open our pore estates, but againste all lawe equitie and conscience they do seke to disannull vs your saide orators both of that we have served for, and also to bring vs our wyves and children into moste extreme mysery, contrary to the good meaning and intent of your honnours.

To the right honorable the lord high Treasorer of England /

IGHTE humbly compleyneth to your honor your poore orator william Seres. That whereas my late father by the good meanes and favour of your honor obteyned of our late sovereigne lord Kyng Edward the Sixte a certen priviledge to ymprynte all manner of prymers psalters and psalmes Which priviledge was taken from hym in quene Marres tyme and synce that by the further helpe and goodnes of your honor was eftsoones graunted to hym and to me during the lyff of the longest lyver of vs with an addicon to prynte all bokes of pryvate prayers. As by the patent thereof yt doth and maye more pleynely appeare My sayd father beinge in his latter yeres not soo

well hable to attend and followe the busynes of pryntinge as he had byn afore assigned the snyd priviledge with all his presses letters stock and copies which in his whole lyff he gott for a certen yerely rente to one **Henry Denham** who hath taken vij youge men of the company of staconers to joyne with hym in the same, and my sayd father bound me not onely to contrybute $\mathbf{x}\mathbf{x}^{li}$ a yere to my mother duringe her lyff but also to releyve my brother and sisters le[a]vinge to me no other parte of his goodes but onely the sayd priviledge which in dede I had by righte of Survyvor and is my whole and onely staye of lyvinge

Nowe so yt is and yt maye please your honor that certen yo[u]nge men of the said company beinge desirous for their owne pryvate comoditye and gayne to have the said priviledge and all other the like priviledges taken awaye, Have exhibyted a bill of compleynte to her maiesties most honorable privy counsell wherein they pretend that in Iustice yt standeth with the best pollicye of this realme that the printinge of all good and laufull bokes be at libertye for every man to prynt without grauntinge or allowinge of any priviledge by the prynce to the contrary And in dede they doe not onely go about to derogate the princes awthoritye aswell for grauntinge of suche like priviledges as also of all lycences for the transportacon of clothe welle beare and suche like saying in expresse termes that the privilege for sole printinge of all bokes is agaynst the lawe and that her maiestie oughte not to graunte any suche But also they goe about to sett at

libertye the feate of pryntinge both to all prynters and to all free men of the citye of London whether they be skilfull therein or not Whereby they would have more libertyo geven to prynters and pryntinge then ever was synce the fyrst Invencon thereof flor yt appeareth by the auntyent orders of stacyoners hall by which the Craft that preceded the Company is evidently intended that no copie of any boke grete or small should be prynted before yt was brought thether and beinge there allowed yt is our order that no man should prynt any other mans copie And besides that yt is evydent that priviledges thereof for certen special bokes was ever graunted by the prynce ffor in the most parte of all auncyent prynted bokes we reade theis wordes (cum privilegio ad imprimendum solum) and many recordes may be found of the same whereby yt may well appeare that the prynce or magestrate had over care to comptt the pryntinge of all good bokes specially of the best sorte to some speciall men well knowne and tryed for their fidelitye skill and habilitye whereof divers examples may be shewed aswell here in England as in all other c[h]risten Contryes and the reason ever was for that pryntinge is (of it self) most daungerous and pernycious if it be not streighted and restreyned by polity and order of the prynce and magestrates

And therefore the said Complaymentes being disordered perverse and daungerous persons doe oppose them selves agaynst the quenes maiesties prerogatyve seakings under pretence of doeinge good to them selves and a fewe others to take awaye the due and laufull righte of sondry others and to procure to them selves and to all other the like disordered persons libertye to prynt good bokes and thereby also for more gayne covertly all manner of unlaufull bokes as may easily appeare to your honor if it please

you to take consideracon of them and their cause

Yt pleased the quenes maiesties most honorable prive Counsaile to comptt the hearynge of the said compleynte to master Doctor Hamond and master Thomas Norton who proceded to the examynacon thereof and fyndinge the said Compleynauntes intent to be to derogate the quenes maiesties prerogative not onely as touchinge the grauntinge of priviledges for pryntinge but also for sondry other lycences wyshed the said Complainantes no furder to attempte that course shewinge vnto them the inconvenyency that would ensewe of the same wherevppon they seamed to renownce their sewte affyrmynge that they me[a] nt not to overthrowe priviledges but craved that there mighte be somethinge appointed for them to prynt wherein they were also satisfyed by frendly agreement throughe mediacon of the said *Comyttees [i. e. Commissioners.]

But shortly after one John wolff a fyshemonger assocyatinge hym self and incensynge them they changed their myndes and ever synce the said wolff and somme of them have laboured and yett doe laboure to overthrowe all suche priviledges as her

majestie hath graunted or can graunte

Wherevon the said Comyttees fynding them so disordered would have bound them to appere before her maiesties most honorable privye counsell which they agreed and promysed to doe but after conference had with their Abettors they vtterly refused the same and doe still prosecute their said Compleynte to her maiesties most honorable privye counsell garnyshinge the same with pretences of the libertyes of London and the comon welthe of the sayd company and sayenge that the quene was deceyved by those that were meanes for obteyninge of such priviledges

Whereof I your honors poore Orator William Seres thoughte it my duetye to enforme your honor both for that I receive the benefytt of my priviledge by your goodnes and also for that I trust your honor will geve me leave still to flye to you for succour in all my just causes see longe as I shall not deserve the contrary Most humbly prayeng your honor that forasmuche as the said Complainantes doe still intrude upon your poore orators priviledge and nowe synce their said Compleynte more obstynatly pryntinge his bokes then they did afore which in shorte tyme will growe to dyvers grete inconveny-

T may please your good Lordship to accept of your most bounden, this simple boke of note of the Death etc weekly in London and the out paroches adiovning from the yere 1577, hetherto.

May it further please you to know, that of late certaine inferiour persones of the stationers setting vp prosses, moe than I think England may beare, having not wherewith to finde their presses work, Did contrarie to the Royal lettres patentes and a decree in the starre chamber enterprise to print other mens copies forbidden to them and printleged to other by her maiesties lettres patentes, where some were obteyned by your Lordships good meanes,

specially for your old honest seruant master Seres and his sonne. This autorite of privileging your Lordship knoweth to be due to her maiestie, to have been vsed by her progenitors and to be vsed by all Chrestian princes. These inferiors have printed those privileged copies, and have made petition to the Counsell that they may be allowed so to do. and Carrying their petition they putt it in execution by order from my lordes signified by master secretarie [Sir Francis Walsingham]./ Master Doctour Hamond and I travailed to amend the cause. The Quenes patentees yelded as much as in courtesie or reason we would desire. One Wolf a fishmonger vsing printing taking vpon him as a capitaine, was content with no agreement but generally affirmed that he may and will print any lawfull boke notwithstanding any commandement of the Quene, and to that end he hath incensed the popularitie of London. as in a common cause somewhat Daungerously.

Against the Quones proclamation he is gone to the court, under pretense that he is seruant to master George Goring whom he stirreth to mainteine him in this case. Master Goring hath written to me for him, as appereth by his letter which I send your Lordship and therein semeth to signific that he will seke to your Lordship for relefe of Wolf his man. That your Lordship may be informed of the case when he shal sue to you, I have sent you bothe his letter and a copie of my answer, wherein the truthe shal appere, which I beseche your Lordship to consider. A more ample declaracon of the mater and the decree of the sterr chamber remaineth with master secretarie whoe hath dealt in this case for the Amend [?] and justice honorably

Master Hamond and I in our conscience have done truely and Dutiefully, and we know your Lordship will maintaine the Quenes just autoritie, so we trust we having served sincerely shall not be defamed. I beseehe your Lordship to take all my services in good part. And so I leave to troble your Lordship.

Master NORTON and master barker after my very harty commendations These are to desier you both notwithstanding my small acquaintaunce for the which I am to expect but small frendship yet the cause beinge so good and resonable and the man who serueth me so well] and outherwise I am the more desirous knowene vnto me bothe that I may by your meanes to do him som good, and specially for that he sayth that you are the men in whom the [sett]linge of the whole cause doth consist, wherfore first before, I would enter into the knoledge of yours controugraies or that I would deale eather with my lord treasurer or outher I am ernystly to requyer you to deale favourably with my man and for that the chefe commoditie of the trade is growne into priviledges that you wold be so good as to set him and his on work who[m] he hath now in his house in consid[e]ratyon of the great charge that he hath bin at this longe time that he hath continued in that trade and that be hath no onther meanes to get his livinge withall or els to geue him for all such thinges as he hath concerninge printinge as much as it hath cost him and he shall gene ouer his trade so that by this meanes he may be the better able to paie enery man his owne which request beinge so resonable that I am perswade[d] it shall haue fauorable likinge and such satisfaction as he desiers, I assure you that in what soeuer I may steed you here in co[u]rt with any my frindes or outher my endeuor I will in such sort be gratfull, as it neuer shall repent from the co[u]rt this xviijth of october 1582. you of this co[u]rtesy

Sir

AFTER heartie commendacons. I have your received Letters to master Barker and me in favor of Wolf your man. I am sorie that your man hath chosen to make yow his patrone in such a cause wherein you must oppose your self as adversarie Either to Wolf your man, or to your mistresse the Quene and to all her maiesties servantes and other to whome her highnes hath in like case ben gracious by her prerogative.

Ffor the mater, I have done and will do for your man as much as I am able, reserving my dutie to the Quene, and without wrong. I procured your man to be deliuered out of prison. I treated for a charitable order toward him and the rest in his case, I brought the Quenes patentees to yeld so much as Doctor Hamond and I with the rest apointed by the Counsell, did think, and I suppose yow will think, reasonable to be demaunded, and whereunto those that then were present and in your mans case did agree and confessed them selues charitably vsed, which I will make appeare to yow when you will. Afterward when your man was delinered by my meanes we declared that agreement to him and fower other that came with him. In the meane time your man had confederated with other and had agreed to set them selues against the Quenes whole prerogative touching printing, and he with the other fower refused all louing agreement, and stood vpon this point that they were freemen, and might print all lawfull bokes notwithstanding any comaundement of the Quene, and that the Quenes comaundementes in this case were no lawe, nor warranted by law. We

finding him in this humor, and that he had brought other into the same, agreed to bind them to defend this mater before the Counsell. And considering that in such a populous citie such popular mater was not onely very hye reaching to the crowne; but also dangerous for sedition, they having labored to make it a comon cause of libertie, and openly prayed the state of the Citie to ioyne with them as in a common cause against the Quene, and refusing to be bounde to abide the Counselles order, we thought meete to certific master Secretarie [Sir F. Walsingham]

Now your worship may consider how meete a case this is for yow to fauor: this being added that hereupon your man though resident in the Citie, and among the meanest; yet under colour that he is your man hath runne to the Court, continuing there without regard of the proclamacon

touching the infection.

If he will returne to accept reason by way of moderation and fauor to be had of the Quenes patentees, I will (if I may have leave) ioyne in labor the best I can for him, and yow shalbe iudge whether I so doe or no. If he persist against the Quene in denyeng her whole prerogative for preuiledge of bokes which her progenitors have allwaye vsed, and which all Christian princes do vse, and which in president of other her prohibitions toucheth her royal dignitie, and is opposed to such a nomber of her maiesties grauntes to her servantes and other. I knowe not how to help him, nor dare intermedle for him, and yow must geue me leave to say that I have made the case knowne vnto yow and geuen yow warning of it /

The Privileges now extant are these

Barker the Quenes printer by office and patent hath, Bibles, statutes, proclamacons, and other English bokes published for the Quene /

Master FFLEWEE the Quenes latine printer hath the grammar and accidence as [his] predecessor [had] and yet he hath dispersed it among .v. householders of the Companie

master Nicasius [Yetsweigt] hath reuersion

John Daie at sute of my Lord of Leioester hath the psalmes in meeter / and the little A. B. O and catechisme, which A. B C and catechisme, he hath dispersed to vij or Eight householders of the Companie, and if he had it not the Quenes printer sheld have it by office

William Seres at sute of my L[ord] Treasorer hath primers and psalters: which if he had not the Quenes printer shold have by office. He hath also all bokes of privat prayers, but for those he hath yelded that if your man or any other brother [i.e. of the Stationers' Company.] shall procure any such boke to be made, whereof the patentee is not the first printer, they shall have it notwithstanding his priviledge, also he hath dispersed the vse of his priviledge to vij or vij householders of the companie, and will abide any reasonable order

BIRD, and TALLYS her maiesties servantes have musike bokes with note, which the complainantes confesse they wold not print nor be furnished to print though there were no previlege. They have also

ruled paper for musike /

Binneman at the sute of my Lord of LE[1]CESTER and master Vice

chamberlaine [Sir C. Harron], hath *Dictionaries* and *Chronicles*, wherein yet be yeldeth asmuch as **Seres**, and in the meane time hath dispersed a great part of his priviledge, and is redy to disperse more among householders of the Companie /

Marshe and VAUTROLLIER haue certaine speciall schole bokes, wherein yet when they be spoken with it is thought they wilbe

reasonable.

Otherwise we finde none to haue privilege, but generally as your man, and all other printers haue, which is to have the sole printing of such bookes as any learned man shall make at their charge or geue vnto them. And it were greatly to the hurt of the vniuersities and learning, to take from them the roward for travailing in making or translating of bokes, which must nedes be if he that rewardeth the Learned man shold not have the profit thereof/

When you shall trausile to my L[ord] Treasorer and other in this case. I suppose yow shall not finde them redie to geue ouer her maiesties right, nor to acknowledge that them solues have ben meanes to deceaue the Quene in her grauntes, nor to geue a hard prejudice against the Quenes other grauntes. If any her majesties grauntes had been viduely gotten, or abused to the wronge of other it might be reformed, and I wold willingly doe my seruice that waye but yow shall not find it so, and this being offered by the parties, your man refuscth and impugneth the whole prerogative, wherein I think yow of your wisdome will not assist him, nor troble my Lordes.

So resting redie to doe any thing reasonable in obsequiousnesse to yow

or to any toward her maiestie I bid yow farewell.

OST humble sheweth vnto your Honour the wardens of the poor Companyo of the Stacioners that where as on Thursdaye laste beinge the xxv. of this monethe of October [1582] vppon occation of Distruste of the contemptuous dealinge of certeine lude Prynters, agaynste her Maiesties Letters Pattentes as otherwyse againste all goode Orders of our poore Companye, we caused a searche and veiwe to be made, by tow discreate persones in euerye Pryntinge house, thereby to vnderstand and take notice what energy Printer had in workinge accordinge to a laudable vse warranted by Charter to our saide Companye vnder her Highnesse greate seale of

England. But so it is right Honorable and our singuler good Lorde, that comminge to the howse of one Roger Warde A man who of late hathe shewed himselfe very

contemptuous againste her Maiesties high prerogatiue and offering to comme into his pryntinge house to take notice what he did, the saide Roger Warde fainynge himselfe to be absente, hys wyfe and servantes keepeth the Dore shutte againste them, and saide that none shoulde comme there to searche neither woulde in any wyse suffer any man to enter into the howse, by lykelyhoode whereof, and of tow good proofe he printeth what he lysteth, and persisteth in the same behaviour tyll your Honoure of your singular goodnesse vouchsafe to take order to the contrarye, as we hope of your vertuous inclination to Iustice you will as well againste the saide Roger Warde as other most presumptuous and insolent persons, of whome the most Honourable master Secretarye Walsinghame can further informe your Lordshippe.

To the Right honorable and their very good Lord, Sir WILLIAM ORCILL knight of the most honorable Order of the Garter, Lord High Treasurer of England, and one of her Maiesties Privy Counsell.



N most humble maner sheweth vnto your Honor your poore and dayly Orators a great many householders vsinge the trade of Stationers within the City of London, that whereas we have allready divers times made sute vnto your Honors for reformation of divers abuses, and great inconveniences which are alltogether vsed, and the boldlyer maynetayned vnder your honors names, which if redresse be not had in time wilbe a great discommodity to the common wealth, as may appeare by the Articles which we have set downe for more manifest proofe of their dealinges, which we delivered vnto them on the tenth day of this moneth of october 1582, which thinges like-

wise having bene three times moved before the Lord Mayor and the Court of Aldermen, where master Norton was contented we should deliver up our answeare by learned Councell, as we have done, the which we hope master norton will shew unto your honors. Wherevpon we are now by all meanes possible sought to be hindered by master Norton the Councellor, and who is alltogether hired agaynst us, for that he sayth, he hath authority to imprison us, except we will enter into such unreasonable bondes, being coulored with an outward shew of good meaninge, as neither law nor Justice would permitte. But all men may thinke that if there were eyther conscience, reason or law on their sides, they might as willingly have it tryed before my Lord Mayor or otherwise by law as we, who neyther have the ability ne yet frendes of such countenaunce to

beare it out withall as they have. Wherefore these are most earnestly for GODs cause to desire your honors fauorable dealinge, and that we may have the benefite of this Realme. ffor which fauor we and all ours, as our bonden duety commaundith vs. will dayly pray for your honors prosperous estate and happy dayes, longe to continue.

N all humblenes sheweth and lamentablic complayneth vnto your honnour your dailie oratours the most parte of the poore artificers occupieng the facultie of ymprinting within the Citie of London That whereas they heretofore did exhibite their pitifull complaint to her highnes most honourable privie Councell for nedefull redres of many great wronges done vnto your poore oratours by a fewe priniledged persons using the foresaide trade of printyng: And the same remayning remayning as yet in your honnours custodie, and not preferred whereby reformacon may be obteyned So it is right honourable that synce the exhiting thereof, and notwithstanding

that cause in controllersie betwene some of your oratours and the sayde priniledged persons dependeth in sute in the high court of Starre chamber undetermined: the same priniledged men haue taken away sundrie your saide oratours goodes of great value, comitted some of their poore servauntes to diverse prisons where some are yet remayning at ymportable charges to their great hinderaunce and vtter vndeing if this

rigorous dealing be permitted.

In consideration whereof it may please your Honour being a good Patrone of Justice and refuige for th[e]opressed of your accustomed clomencie and at the humble contemplacon of many poore men to preferre their saide peticon that some good order may be taken there aboutes and that your Honnour will vouchsafe (in the meane tyme vntill oportunitie serue for he a ring of the cause) to adres your lettres for the release of those which are or shall be comitted to prison And as by this your honourable meanes your saids oratours just complaint shall according to the equitie thereof be herde and descided and they vnburdened of further pretended [intended] opression against them So will they as espetiallie bounde Dailie pray to GOD for preservacon of your honnours in helth longe lif[e] and felicitie /

would seem from the following considerations to have been written in February or March 1583.

1. Wolf, as stated by the Privy Council Commissioners on 18th July 1683, had 'acknowledged his error and is releved with worke,' see p. 784. This must have been in the previous June: for on the 1st II. 778

July 1583, see p. 688, he was translated from the Fishmongers' to the Stationers' Company; and that translation was the outward sign that he, for his part, had withdrawn from the strife. This complaint was therefore palpably written before 1st July 1583.

2. It was also written in the wardenship of C. Barker and F. Coldock who sign it; which period ex-

tended from July 1582 to July 1583.

3. It was also evidently written after Woll's delivery from his second imprisonment, this time in the Clink, where he was in December 1582, see I. 144. The Privy Council Commissioners had obtained his delivery from his first imprisonment on some date before the 23rd October 1582, see p. 774. It is clear from the agitation described in the Articles that some time had clapsed since this second release. This

from the agitation described in the Articles that some time had clapsed since this second release. This letter therefore must have been written in the first six months of 1583.

4. Wolf's house was searched for printing-presses on the 27th May 1583; see I. 499 and 248. This letter is manifestly prior to that search. Therefore the date of the interview between C. Barker and J. Wolf' ye 14 May last past' must refer to 1582, and not 1583.


5. Easter Day in 1682 fell on 15th April, about a month previous to the interview, if in that year; which is an insufficient interval to allow for Barker's giving Wolf printing work to the amount in present value of £800. Therefore 'Easter last past twelve moneths' must mean 26 March 1581; and so this letter to be written before Easter Day 1583; which fell on 31st March of that year. The carliest dated work printed by J. Wolf that is quoted by Herburt (c. 1171, Ed. 1785) is dated 1579.

8. The approximate date of this Representation is therefore March 1583.

7. Wolf having been apprenticed to John Day for ten years on the 25th March 1562, I. 172; was probably born about 1547, and therefore now about 35 years of age.]

Europe doe) to grant authoritie by her letters Patentes vnto some persons to serve her highnes in ye Realme, by publishing suche bookes, workes, and volumes as her Maiestie by her speciall licence in her said letters patents hath given vnto them; for ye which to their great charge, they have or ought to have provided presses, letters [type], or other furniture requisite. All which notwithstanding some of these vndernamed do print those printledged Copies at their pleasure, and haue other as disordered as thomselves, who runne up or downe to all ye faires and markets through a great part of ye Realme, and make sale of them; whose charges in cariage with their expences in Innes and Alchouses and other places considered, with vehement suspition and some liklyhood of further disorder they returne home more poore then they went out, and so spoile ye whole trade of ye Company and deceaue her Maiesties subjects with bookes euilly and vntruely printed.

The chiefe of these are JOHN WOLFE, John Charlewood, and Roger Ward printers: Henry Bamford compositor: Franck Adams a maker of writing Tables, William Lobley a Bookebinder: ABRAHAM Kidson, Thomas Butter, and [William] Wright booksellers / who are greatly animated by one Master Robert Neak a lawyer. These persons, notwithstanding their euill dealing have generally beene well intreated, as if it may please your Honors you may see by this one example of Christopher Barkar his dealing

First about E[2]ster last past twelve moneths Barkar wished John wolfe to liue in good order, for ye better increase of his wealth, as also of his credit, and not to print mens copies priuiledged, nor to withstand her maiesties gracious fauour bestowed vpon some of her most dutyfull subjects: Wolfz seeming to take good liking thereof, promised if he might haue worke not to print any more any other mens copies. Barkar then perswaded ve said Wolfe to translate his freedome from ve Fishmongers to ye Stationers, that ye said Barkar and others might lawfully set him on worke, and then he should be sure to have all ye favour yat reasonably he coulde aske. Wolfn made promise so to doe though [that] he ment nothing lesse appeareth by ye sequele; wherevoon Barkar although he greatly feared [was very doubtful] and charged him, yat he was not able to print any thing for him yat might stand with his [Barker's] credit, left his owne presses vnwrcught, and set him on worke, whereby he carned of Barkar to ye value of 80th and more, which work was so vntruely and cuilly done, yat it was not onely to Barkars great hinderance, but an exceeding discredit to all his owne labours,

But now WOLFE finding him selfe of more abillity then before, printed dinerse mens copies without exception and thereupon hath growen much trouble. Notwithstanding all this vpon ye 14, day of May last past, Barker sent for ye said Wolfe, and demanded of him why he printed ye Copies belonging to his office [i.e. as Queen's Printer]: he answered, 'Because I will live': but much more talke having past between them, Barker replyed saying, 'Wolfe, leave your Macheuillian deuices, and conceit of your forreine wit, which you have gained by gadding from countrey to countrey, and tell me plainely, if you meane to deale like an honest man: what you would haue.' Wolfe answered: 'Yf I should come into your Company I would have allowance of my five Apprentices, I would be provided whereon to live, and I would have ye benefite which now I have in mine owne Company. Barkar answered him, 'Touching your .5. Apprentices, it is against our order, yet for quietnes sake, I would be a meane as far as I can yat you shall iniov them. To prouide you a liuing, that is ye worke of GOD onely, vpon whose prouidence you must depend, yet I dare promise you after a sort, yat being of our Companye you shall have good and gainefull copies whereon you may liue in measure, and yet not print other mens copies. Touching ye lo s ne of 20 which you have in your Company; We stationers are very poore and haue no land, but ye house we sit in, and our whole stock is vnder 100^H and yet I will do what I may to procure you 20^H thereof vpon good security.' Wolfe making obscure or doubtfull answeres herevnto, Barker willed him to take adwise and resolue himselfe what he would stand vnto 'And as for my copies which you have printed' said he 'you and I will reasonably agree.' But even at that tyme, although Wolfe denied to have any more of Barkars Copies in Printing his servants were in work of ye same, as within .4. houres after was manifest. Whereupon Barker gaue him ouer, as a man unreasonable to deale withall.

Further of Wolff and his confederats misdemeanour they are partly touched in these Articles following, which in some part concerne aswell her Maiesty as your Honors, and therefore we most humbly pray, that they may be considered of, as shall seeme best to your most godly wisedomes, Vnto whos most honorable determinations we submit our selues humbly praying yat they may in some sort be restrained till ye Commissioners have certified.

Barkars offer out of his own proper right for ye reliefe of the poore of ye Company vpon condicions./

- 3. Wolfe being friendly perswaded to live in order and not print mens priviledged copies, for which to their great charge they had provided presses, letters [type], and other necessaries, answered 'he was a freeman, and had as great a priviledge as any of them all,' and yat 'he would print all their bokes, if he lacked work.'
- 4. Wolff for his contempts against her Maiesties grants being committed to ye Clink there resorted vnto him divers poore men of sundry companies, as vnto one to be a meane to make them rich.

5. Wolfe after being at liberty and his confederat[o]s, vowed themselves to withstand her Maiesties grantes wholy, as one of them named Franck

Adams said 'he was bound in 10011 to follow that cause.'/

6. Wolff gathered conventicles of people in his house, in ye Exchange, and in ye Church, called Sainet Thomas of Acres so disorderly, yat some of themselves fearing some hurley burley to followe, departed away, as they confessed.

7. Wolfe and some of his confederats affirmed openly in ye Stationers hall, yat 'it was lawfull for all men to print all lawfull bookes what com-

mandement seener her Maiestie gaue to ye contrary.'

8. Wolfs denied obedience to her Maiesties commandements further then in ye written or printed lawe were contained, in matters specially of printing, wherof he is now somewhat reconsidered in words, neuerthelesse in execution continueth ye same vnto this hour, saying 'he will liue.'

9. Wolfe hath oftentimes delivered most disloyall and unreverent

speaches of her maiesties gouernement, not once giving her highnesse any honorable name or title, as 'She is deceaued', 'she shall know she is deceaued', Also 'she is blindly lead, she is deceaued'.

10. Wolfe being admonished yat he being but one so meane a man should not presume to contrarie her Highnesse gouernmente: 'Tush', said he, 'Luther was but one man, and reformed all ye world for religion, and I am that one man, yat must and will reforme the gouernment in this trade,' meaning printing and bookeselling.

11. Wolfe and his confederats made collections of money of divers her maiestics poore subjects, perswading them to overthrow all principledges, and being demanded why he did so, answered 'his purse was not able to maintaine

so great a Cause as vat they had in hand.'

12. Wolff and his confederats inceused ye meaner sort of people throughout the City as they went, yat it became a common talke in Alehouses, tauernes and such like places, whereupon insued dangerous and valutiful speaches of her Maiesties most gracious gouernment.

13. We omit for tediousnes many such like disordered parts, as also how through these euill examples ye poor of our Company being animated against their Elders, were ready to offer vs violence, euen when we were together in our common Hall studying to do them good: yea our seruants also aswell Apprentices as Journemen became disobedient, and our Apprentices married wines, and for a time did what they list./

14 June 1588. The University of Cambridge appeal to Lord Burghley their Chancellor against the seizure by Wardens of the Stationers of the presse &c. of their printer, Thomas Thomas.

[This appeal was occasioned by the search instituted by the Bishop of London, as reported by him on the 1st June 1583, see I. 246.]

UR humble duties to your honour remembred, whereas we understande by your honours lettres that certains of the company of the Stationers in London haue sought to hinder th[e]erectings of a print [i.e. a printing press] within this university of Cambridge and to impugue ye auntient privilege graunted and confirmed by divers Princes for yat purpose to the greate benefitt of ye universitie and advancement of Learning. Theise are in most humble manner to desire your honour not somuch in respect of Master Thomas (who hath alredy receaved greate iniury and damage at theire handes) as in the behalf of the university (which findeth yt self very much

agreed with ye wrongfull detayninge of those goodes wherewithall as we are persuaded in right and equity they ought not to meddle) to continue our honorable patron, and to direct your favorable warrant to the wardeynes of ye Stationers yat he may have his presse delivered with speede, least yat by theiro meanes as he hath bene dissapoynted of master whittakens his booke, so by their delayes he be prevented of other bookes made within ye university, and now redy for ye presse. As for ye dowbtes which they rase (rather in respect of theire private gain and commodity, and to bringe ye universitys more auncient primiledges in this behalf then theirs under theire incisdiccon at London, then for any other good consideracon, ye decidinge or perill whereof also partaineth not to them.) we dare undertake in ye behalf of Master Thomas whome we know to be a very godly and honest man that the presse shall not be abused eyther in publishinge thinges prohibited, or otherwise inconvenient for ye Churche and state of this realme. And this we promisse the rather for yat his grace (whereof we have sent a copy to your

honour by him self) was graunted vnto him vpon condicon yat he shold etande bounde from tyme to tyme to such articles as your honour and ye greatest part of ye heades of Colleges shoulde tye him vnto. And for ye conference wherevnto your honour moveth vs. yf yt shalbe your honour's pleasure we as desirous of peace and concorde (the premisses considered) shalbe ready to shewe our willingnes therevuto, yf yt shall please the company of ye Stationers in London to sende hither some certains menne from them with sufficient authority for yat purpose.

Thus most humbly desiringe yat his presse may no longer be stayde, and hopinge yat your honour will furder our desire hearein, we do in our dayly prayers commend your lordshippe to the blessed tuicon of the almighty. ffrom Cambridge this 14, of

T may please your good Lordships. We have according to your honorable pleasure trausiled in the mater of complaintes of the Stationers, and we the Bishop, Deane and Recorder do finde that Doctor Hamond and Thomas Norman the former Comissioners have therein done vprightly and with care to releue the poorer sort so farr as might be with justice and preserving the right of her maiestias regal autoritie, and therefore wee hearing what the parties could saie thereunto, have wholly concurred in opinion with the said Docter Hammond and Thomas Norton, and for so farr as they proceded we haue enserted their former aduises into this our answere, and for the residue

which they did not perfit [perfect], and wherein more is by your order comitted to vs all together, than was to them two before, we have with one consent vpon hearing what hath ben alleged, on both partes vniformely agreed in the whole that we doe now certefie. And specially among other thinges we find that howsoeuer the complainantes had no great causes to complaine at the begining; yet even for those thinges [as] that there was meane in charitie to releue them they were so prouided for in the former orders certefied vnto your Lordships that the greatest thinges now comitted to vs. were well ordered to be ended before

In the ordering and certefieng hereof we have followed the maner prescribed in your Lordships letters which we beseche you to take in good part submitting the whole to your honorable iugementes with this that in our opinions it shalbo very requisite both for the church and state, and for preservacon of her Maiesties right and mens private interestes and for auoiding of confuse doeing whereby might arise hurt of all sides, that

wheresoeuer any printing shalbe vsed either in the vniuersities or elsewhere there be good foresight of assurance for like orders to be kept as in London. And so we leave to troble your Lordships.

Extract of the Commissioners order about the Stationers.

[We have marked the relative subordination of the clauses in this brief Extract by (1) (2) &c., and by (a) (b) (c) &c. The original full report which would give us much information on this subject is apparently lost, and we have not met with any copy of it.]

(1) Nor meet that sondrye men should print one booke, therefore her Maiestie not graunting priviledge, [that] the companie do order emongest them selves that he which bringeth a booke to be printed should use yt as a priviledge.

(2) That to vphold her maiesties priviledge by putting into execueon the Decree in the Starre Chamber [29 June 1566] their Lordships to write their Letters to the Highe commissioners to that effect, without the which their inconveniences would follow

- (c) no great bookes of valew to be printed

We the Master, Wardens, and others of the poore companye of the Stationers in moste humble wise complayne vnto your good Lordship of the manifold abuses and disorders done and committed against all order and authoritie by divers evell disposed and disorderly persons of the saide Companye, specially at this tyme by one Roger Warde whose contemptuous misdemeanure and his insufficyencye to yse the arte of printinge hathe binne sheowed before your good Lordship and the reste of the moste honourable Councell with whom the Commissioners appoynted by your Lordship and their honors, have dealt and cannot bringe

to conformitie as maye appeare by their certificate deliuered to your honours Who with newe prouision of printinge stuffe hathe and doethe not onely printe any booke what he lustethe without allowance either by one authoritie or other, but also bookes warranted by her highnes letters patentes to other menne: And the same sellethe and dispersethe into the Citic and contreve to menne of other artes wherby the poore companye sustaine greate losse in [?sti]ckinge the sale of them to the vtter vindoinge generally of vs all, and perticularly to the greate decaye of vij poore yonge menne of the saide Companye who baue and execute a priviledge graunted to William Seres for a yearely rente; for paymente wherof they stande bounds with their frendes in greate sommes, notwithstandinge their good dealings with the company and their lardge yeldinge of the beste parte of the said prinilege for reliefe of the whole companye, and out of that priviledge only reserve to them selves the little primer, and vsuall psatter, bothe of which are printed in greate nombres by the said Warde not regardings the charitable order for the poore sett downe by the foresaide Comissioners nor yet caringe for the forfeiture of twoe severall bandes wherin he standethe bounde to her Maiestie, the one not to prente any more disorderly, th[e]other to bringe in suche bookes as he so had printed. Of which none perfourmed, yet still resistinge with delayes all vauall and customable serches for printinge, kepinge Servauntes and prentizes against all order beinge a man without all gouernement. How daungerous a thinge yt is for suche a one to have the Chardge of printings we leave to your honors Wisdome. In Consideration wheref and for the care we have of the good quiet of our Companye nowe after greate troubles and beinge in reasonable quietnes and in good hope of better, Were it not for this and suche like disorder, We moste humbly praye your honor to gene vs suche assistance as by your honors aucthoritie as we maie bridell the offenders and disturbers of oure common quiet and specially this moste daungerous persone and those he settethe on worke, and we as duety byndethe, will praye vnto Almightie GOD for your honors longe life with all healthe and prosperitie./

Realme or in any Infunctions, Letters Pattentes, or Ordinaunces passed or sett for the, or to bee passed and sett forthe by your Maiesties most excellent Graunt, Commission or Aucthoritie, And that whosoever shall offende against the sayd Ordinaunces shall not onelye forfeite all such bookes and Coppies as shalbe so printed, But also shall from thene elforth neuer vsse or exercise nor take benyfite by any vsing or exerciseing of the feate of printing, and shall susteyne three Monethes ympricsonement without Bayle or Mayneprise and yf he be not before bound with suerties that he shall truely observe the said Ordinaunces then he shall also forefeite for everie offence Tenn Pound, And wheras also in the said Eight yere of your Maiesties most gracyous Raigne it was lykewyse in your said highe and most Honorable Court of Sterr Chamber Decreed, that noe person shall sell, vtter, put to sale, bynde, stiche, or sow any bookes or Coppies printed or to be printed, Contrarie to any letters pattentes or Ordinaunces passed or sett forthe, or to be passed or sett forthe by your most excellent Maiesties graunt, Commissyon or aucthorytic vppon payne of forfeiture of all such bookes and Coppies and for everie booke Twentie shillinges as by the said decree remayneing in the said Court amongst other thinges it doth and map at large appeare /

And whereas likewyse your Maiestie by your graycis letters pattentes under your brode seale of Englande beareing date at Gorhambury the six and Twentie day of August [1578] in the Nyntenthe yere of your Maiesties most gracyous Raigne did of your especiall grace Certayne knowledge and meere motion graunt and gine lycence and Priniledge vnto John Day and your said subjecte Richard Day and to the longer liner of them for terms of the [i]r lines and to the assignes of them or eather of them to ymprint or cause to bee imprinted the booke called the Psalmes of David in Meeter with notes to sing them, And the A. B. B. C. with the lyttell Cathecisme in Englishe, or the same bookes so printed Contrarie to your Maiesties said letteres pattentes of lycence and Priniledge shall sell or put to sale, sow, stich, or bynde, or cause to be solde, vttered, or put to sale, sowed, stiched or bounde being printed, or to bee printed by any other then the said John Day and Richard Day or eather of them or the assignes of them or eather of them vppon paine of your Maiesties highe indigna-

tion And that everie offendour Contrario to the effecte and meaneing of your Majesties said letteres pattentes shall forfeite to your Maiesties vse fortie shillinges of lawfull mony of England for everie such booke or bookes or any parte of them so to be sold, vttered, or put to sale, stiched, sowed or bounde contrarie to the meaneing and effecte of your Maiesties said lycence and Priviledge, and shall also abide such penalties, forfeitures, punishementes, and order of bonde as by the decrees before mentioned is expressed, as by your Maiesties said letteres pattentes amongst diners other thinges more at large doth and may appeare,

After which letteres Patentes so by your Maiestie graunted as aforesaid, the said John Day is deceased, and your said subjects Richard Day, by his sufficiente dede Indented beareing date in the six and Twentie yere [i.e. between 23 July (the date of his father's death) and the 16 November 1584] of your Maiesties raigne bath nominated and appointed the residue of your said subjectes (that is to say) Edward Whyt[e], Willyam Wright, Thomas Butter, John Wolfe and frauncis Adams to be his Assignes and Deputies for the executing of your Maiesties said letters pattentes, who presuming that they should quietly and peaceabely enjoye the benyfite of your Maiesties said graunte, Hane to their great Costes, expences and Charges made provition for all

And farther your said subjectes Complayneth and sheweth vuto your excellent Maiestie that Henry Carr, Thomas Mane, Symonde watersonne, Thomas Cadman, John Perin, Sampson Clerke, William Licke [i. c. WINTER OF 1585-6. MEMORIAL OF EDMUND BOLLIFANT AND HIS PARTNERS IN THE MATTER OF E. BUNNEY'S WORK THE RESOLUTION; WHICH IS SUPPORTED BY THE MASTER WARDENS AND ASSISTANTS OF THE STATIONERS' COMPANY.

[This is another testimony to the great keenness of the competition in the book trade at this time.]

To the righte honnorable the Lordes and others of hir maiesties moste honnorable pryuye Counsell.



N moste humble wise sheweth vnto your honors: That where a booke called the Resolution was firste allowed to be printed by my Lord. Archbisshop of Canterbury his grace, and after accordinge to the Charter of our Companie vnder the greate Seale of Englande entred in our hall boke [see p. 435] to be the Copye of John wighte Bookeseller, vppon condicion that we your poore Orators, namelye, Nynian Newton, Arnolde Hatfeild, John Jackson, and Edmonde Bollyfant, shoulde be the onelye woorkemen thereof; which beinge the moste vendible Copye that happened in our Companie their manie yeeres, woulde have kepte vs in worke for a longe tyme: But to our

greate preiudice and hindraunce as also to the losse of the owner of the saide Copye, Joseph Barnes Prynter at Oxford ymmediatlye printed one ympression of the saide booke; Notwithstandinge ye said John Wightz for reverence and good will to the valuersytye then sente his sonne to Oxford, to buye the saide ympression of the said Barnes, and paide him readye monney for yt to his contentement: Wherevppon the saide Barnes made faithfull promise yat he would thenceforthe never reprinte the same booke: And yett notwithstandinge the said wightes curteous dealinge the saide Barnes beinge furnished with monney by him, forthwith ymprinted twoe ympressions more, contrarye to all honestye and reason, and contrarye to his faithe and promise: which others perceyvinge to passe without Controlment, printed also ye said booke to our great hindraunce, and thereby disfurnisshed vs of woorke for the moste parte ever since.

And where yt hathe happened that a booke Compiled by the reuerend Master Doctour Bilson, to be Commytted to the saide Barnes to be prynted at Oxford, we your poore Oratours (by Barnes his meanes) wantings worke, and not knowings otherwise howe to helpe our selues beganne to prynte the saide booke: In which tyme your Honours being informed that we did prynte ytt verye false, commaunded vs to proceade

noe further; and lastelye by warraunte from your honors our house was entered and our prynting tooles taken awaye, and one of vs Commytted to prison, where he as yett remayneth to our great Chardges and hindraunce: Howbeyt we have not onelye printed the booke more true butt have alsoe refourmed manie grosse errors in the same by Barnes Commytted: And we knowinge that the Charter of the said vniversitye dothe not prohibyte vs to ymprinte annye thinge, neither doth it extends to warraunte him to printe annye thinge there by hir maiesty elsewhere prohibited, but is onelye a liceuce to printe suche thinges as are necessarye for their vse, of which they are the fyrste publishers; And soo thinckinge that we shouldo not justelye in this our proceadinge, we have printed a greate parte of the saide booke to our vtter vndoinge (excepts your honors be gratious Lordes vnto vs).

Wherefore we moste humblie beseebe your honors, (of your accustomed elemencye) to release our saide partener, and that yt would please your honors, that we maye have our woorkinge tooles delivered vs agains to get our Lyvinge withall; And that your honors would voutchsafe to take order yat the saide Barnes give vs reasonablie for paper and woorkemanship of see muche of the saide booke as we have donne. And for the former Iniury donne vnto vs by him, we referre yt to your honors wisdommes to be

considered.

And we and all ours (accordinge to our bounden dueties) shall alwaies praye vnto God for youre honnorable estates Longe to contynue./

We vnderwritten with all humblenes beseehe your honors, to be good and favourable vnto these poore men in this their peticon

OSTE humblie sheweth vnto your excellente Maiestie your faithfull and obediente Subiectes ffrauncis fflower, Christopher Barker, John Wyghte, William Norton, John Harrison, Garet Dewes and Richard Watkins That Wheras in the eighte yere of your Maiesties moste graciouse raigne it was (emongste other thinges in your highe courte of Sterr Chamber) decreede that noe person shoulde printe or cause to be ymprinted, any booke or coppie againste the forme and meaning of any Ordinaunce Prohibicon or Comaundemente contained or to be contained in any the Statutes or lawes of this Realme or in any Injunctions letters Pattentes or

Ordinaunces paste or set for the by your most excellent Maiesties Graunte Comission or

aucthoritie And whoe soever shall offende against the saide Ordinaunce shall not only forfaite all suche bookes and Coppies as shalbe so printed, but also shall from thenceforthe neuer vse or exercise nor take benefit by any vsinge or exercisinge of the feate of printinge, and shall sustane three Monthes ymprisonmente without Bayle or Mainprise, and if he be not before bounde with suerties that he shall truly observe the saide Ordinaunces then he shall also forfaite for every offence Tenn poundes As by the saide docree remainings in the saide Courte it doth, and maye (emongst other thiuges) appear

And Wheras also your Maiestie by your graces letters Pattentes (vnder your greate Seale of Englande) bearingo date at Westminster the fliftcenthe days of december [1573] in the sixteenth yere of your moste happie raigne, did of your especiall grace, and meere mocon give and Graunte vnto your said Subjecte FFRAUNCIS FFLOWER, the Office of printinge, for your Maiestie your heires and successors in the languages of Latten, Greeke and Hebruc, And also the office of the Printer to your Maicstie your heires and Successors in the saide Languages and every of them And also Licence and full aucthoritie to ymprinte not only all and singuler Grammer bookes Greeke or Latten althoughe entermixte in any manner with the Englishe tonge And also the C[h]artes Maps and all suche like Writinges, which to your Maiestie your Realmes and Dominions or People in the saide Tonges and Languages or in any of the same at any time hereafter maye be Necessarye or by any meanes Conveniente to be used and also to prepare and provide to your Maiesties vse so many and such Manner of bookes As your Malestie hereafter shall will or Assigne to be prepared And farther by the said letters Pattontes your Maiestie hathe made ordaigned and Constituted your saide Subjecte FFBAUNCIS PFLOWER to be your Typographe Printer and booke seller in the premises and every parcell therof as is aforesaide To have enjoy and exercise the said Office, and all other the premises to your saide subjects and his assignes, by hym or them or by his or their sufficiente deputie or deputies during the Natural lyfe of your said Subjects FFRAUNCIS FFLOWER And farther your Maiestie to the intente that your said Subjects FFRAUNCIS FFLOWER shoulde the better take the benefit and advantage of your Maiesties saide Graunte by the same your letters Pattentes your Maiestie hathe straightely Charged all your Subjectes that they shall not presume to entermedle withoute the licence of your saide Subjects or his Assignee or Assignes Deputie or deputies) to imprinte vtter or sell any the Bookes C[h]artes or Mapps aforesaide vppon payne of fforfaiture of all and singular the bookes C[h]artes or Mapps aforesaide so to be ymprinted vttered or soulde And also to incurr your Maiesties moste grevouse displeasure for the same

of her highnes raigne) Dyd heretofore vse or exercyse the said arte or misterye of printinge. And Did also before the said bill exhibited and since the Date of the said Letters Patentes mencioned in the said bill without the consent or licence of the plainantes or any of them Imprint or cause to be Imprinted Diverse of the bookes mencioned in the said bill called the Accidence (the certayno nomber he this Defendant can not now sett Downe) and the same or some of them hath also vitered and sold or cawsed to be sold or vitered, thereby to maynetayne him selfe and his poore estate which he then thought and yet thinketh was and is lawfull by the lawes customes and statutes of this realme for him to Doe. Which his printing and vitering of the bookes aforesaid was not Done by the said Defendant in or for contempt of her maiestic or of the said Decree mencioned in the said bill as by the said complainantes is verye vntruly suggested for the Defendant sayeth that he did not knowe and vnderstand at yet time of his printing or vitering aforesaid of any suche decree mencioned to be made in this honorable courte, and therefore yf of ignorance he hath any wayes Done contrarye to the said Decree (yf any such be) he hopeth (in respect he is onely charged with wilfull contempt and disobedience) he shall be excused in this Honorable courte.

the sayd letteres Pattentes /



To the Queenes most excellent Maiestie /



Pattentes or Ordinaunces passed or sett forthe, or to be passed or sett forthe by your maiesties most excellent Graunte, Commissyon, or Aucthoritie, and who soever shall offende against the said Ordinaunce shall not onely forfeite all such bookes and Coppies as shalbe so printed, but also shall from thenceforthe neuer vse or exercise nor take benyfite by any vsing or exerciseing of the feate of printing and shall susteyne three Monethes ymprisonment without Bayle or Mayneprise, and yf he be not before bound with suerties that he shall truely observe the said Ordinances then he shall also forfeite for everie offence Tenn pounde as by the said decree remayning in the said Courte it doth and may amongst other thinges at large appeare,

And whereas also your Maiestie by your graces Letters Patentes vader your

great scale of England beareing date at Westminster the fliftenthe day of December [1573] in the Sixtenthe yere of [your most happy] Raigne did of your especiall grace and mere motion give and grant vnto your said subjects FFRAUNCIS FLOWER the office of printing for your Maiestie your heires and successors in the Languages of Laten, Greake, and Hebrue and also the office of the printer to your maiestie, your heires and successors in the said Languages and everie of them, And also licence and full aucthoritie to imprinte not only all and singular Bookes written or made in Latten, Greake, and Hebrue or in any of the same languages of what sort soever they shall happen to be but also all and singulare Grammer bookes Greake or Lattyn althoughe intermixte in any manner with the Englishe tongue and also all C[h]artes Mapes and all such lyke writinges which to your Maiestie your Realmes Domynions or people in the said tongues and Languages or in any of the same at any tyme hereafter may be necessarie or by any meanes Conveniente to be vsed, And also to prepaire and provide for your Maiesties vse so many and such maner of bookes as your Maiestie hercafter shall will or assigne to be prepared, And farther by the sayd letters Patentes your Maiestie hath made, ordeyned and Constituted your said subjects FFRAUNCIS FFLOWER to be your Tipographe printer and bookeseller in the premisses and every parcell theref as is aforesaid. To have cnicy and exercise the said office and all other the premisses to your said subjecte and his assignes by him or them or by his or theire sufficient Deputie or deputies during the naturall life of your said subjects ffrauncis fflower, And further your Majestic to th[e] intent that your said subject FFRAUNCIS FFLOWER should the better take the benyfite and advantage of your Maiesties said graunte by the same your Letters Pattentes your maiestie hath straightly Charged all other your subjectes that they shall not presume to entermeddell without the lycence of your said subjects or his assigns or assigns deputie or deputies to imprinte, vtter or sell any the bookes, C[h]artes or Mapes aforesaid vppon payne of fforfeture of all and singulare the bookes, C[h]artes or Mappes aforesaid so to be imprinted, vttered or sold, And also to incurre your Maiesties most grevous displeasure for the same,

After which letters Pattentes so by your Maiestie graunted as aforesaid your said subjects ffrauncis fflower by his sufficiente deed Indented beareing date the six and Twentie day of December [1573] in the sixtenthe yere of your most gratious Raigne did nominate depute and appoints your said subjectes Christopher Barker, John Wighte, Willyam Norton, John Harrison, Garete Dewes and Richard watkines to be his assignees and deputies for the executing of your maiesties said letteres Patentes, who accordingly to the [i]r greate Costes and expences have made provision for all thinges necessary for

the due executeing of the same,

Nevertheles so it is and yf it pleas[e] your most excellent Maiestie that about six Monethes sence Edwards Smythe, Robarte Bourne, and Henry Jefferson inhabiting within your Maiesties Cittie of London knowing and vnderstanding of the decree aforesaid and knowing also of your maiesties said letters Pattentes and the Contcutes of the same, yet in Contempte of your Maiestie and of the decree aforesaid made in that behalfe in your said most Honorable Courte, the said Edward Smythe, Robarte Bourne, and Henry Jefferson have put in print without the lycence witting or Consente of any of your subjectes aforesaid Two Thousan [d]e or two thousan [d]e partos of the Bookes Cauled the Grammer being one of the bookes graunted by your Maiesties Letters Pattentes vnto your said subject FFRAUNCIS FFLOWER and to his assignes and Deputies, And the same bookes so by them imprinted contrarie to your Maiesties express Commaundemente as aforesaid they have published and disperced in such sorte as your said subjectes can not attayne to the knowledge Wher they are become to the great los[s]e and hinderaunce of your sayd subjectes and to the evill example of all others, In somuch that excepts your most excellente Maiestie with the advice of the right Honorable the Lordes of your prinie Counsayle sitting in the said highe Courto of Sterr Chamber doe take some spedy order for the punishement of the said offendors according to the Decree aforesayde, the said Contemptuous and disobedient parsonnes togeather with divers such other as them selues are, will not sticke to attempte the breakeing of all other your Maiesties Commandemente Conteyned in the lyke your letters Pattentes to the defaceinge of your Maiesties princely prerogative in that behalfo, and to the vtter overthrowe of the sayd science of printing /

The defendances by protestacon not confessinge any thing in the said bill of Complaint material to be aunswered vnto wherewith they are therein charged to be true, for answer to the same bill they sayen and first the saide Robber Bourne for him self saith, that before the bill against him and others exhibited in this honorable Courte, he did not knowe or understand the ordynaunce and decree in this most honorable Court ordered and decreed in the viijth yere of her maiesties Reigne, and in the said bill of complainte recited and menconed to contains such matter and effecte as he doth nowe plainly conceye is in the same ordynaunce expressed menconed and declared. And therefore if uppon straight construction of the same decree he shalbe thought to have donne any thing contrary to the same, which he wittingly and willingly would not have donne in respect of the great reverence and due regard he hath to those honorable personnes by whose meanes the same was decreed, the Defendant then saith for his excuse, and that verie truely, that it was ignorantly donne, and therfore doth humbly crave pardon:

But this defendant sithens the same bill of Complaint exhibited against him having with sound advise and consideracon of his Counsell lerned in the Lawe, considered all the matters therein conteyned Doth thinke that he bath not donne any thing either contrary to the true meaning of the said decree or contrary to any lawes or statutes of this Realme by printing of the bookes menconed in the said bill of Complainte. And that his case being well digested and understoode, he hath most just cause to complaine against the Complaynantes for Wronges and oppressions offered by them to him, as he thinketh, then their Complaynantes have by their uniust su[i]tes to

vexe and trouble him.

ffor this defendant saith that he is a Citezein and ffree-man of the City of Loudon, and that before such tyme, as he was made free he did serve as apprentice in the trade

or arte of printing eight yeres, And so obteynyng somme skill in the same trade was according to the lawes and customes of the said Citie made free, and being free by the like lawes and lawdabable custome vsed within the said City from tyme whereof no memory of man is to the contrary, he may and ought as he thinketh freely vse the arte of printing of almanner of bookes, except suche as do appertein properly to her maiesties printer, And the rather because their liberties and free customes; are not onely confirmed by divers statutes as they are given to understand but also so approved by some actes of parliament as that it ordevneth as he is enfourmed that all lawes made contrary should be voide.

Wherevpoon this defendant having nowe no other trade wherewith to lyve and maynteyne him self and his famyly then the arte of printing wherein he was brought vp doth think it no lesse vnreasonable to prohibit him from all labour, then to prohibit him from labour in his lawfull trade, which although by theis letters patentes all libertic of printing be not taken awaio: yet by theis and such other like priviledges to other particular persons graunted some for printing of lawe bokes some for psalme bookes some [for] grammar bookes sc[h]oole bookes Latyne Hebrue and Greke bookes, almanner of praier bookes bibles and service bookes, there is almost no liberty lefte for printinge but for ballettes and toyes and such like, which might with better reason be prohibited then the rest, and which will not suffice to maynteyne the printers not pryveledged and their famylies, as this defendant veryly thinketh with bread and water,

And this defendant further saith that beside the wronge donne to him and others by theis particular Letters patentes, that the comon wellth receiveth hurte thereby as he hopeth manyfestlye to prove, for by this kynd of monopoly theis bookes beinge brought into one or somme fewe fewe mens hands the said pryuyledged personnes often rate the prizes [prices] thereof, very ne[a]re do[u]ble somuch as others might well aforde the same, And howsoener the same are printed with defaultes, they must be bought where otherwise amonges choice, the subjectes might make their choice of the best and best cheape for their advantage, which is beneficiall to the commen we[a]lth which nowe they can not do to their hurte. Uppon which reasons and other of like ymportance this Defendant hathe h[e]ard it credibly reported, that by the opynyon of divers lerned in the lawes of this Realme, such grauntes by Letters patentes are voide, which this defendant doth humbly praie (because the case is brought nowe in question) that it may receive somme ordynary triall and Judgement according to the ordynary course and rules of the commen Lawes of this Realme, wherewithall this Defendant, and all others being in the like cases touched ought to rest satisfied /

And this defendant further saith, that vppon this opynyon that the Letters patentes mencyoned in the said bill of Complainte are not good and availeable in Lawe, that by the true meanyng of the decree made in this honorable Court in the viijth yere of her maiesties Reigne, which was to prohibite all personnes from printing or bringing into this Realme ymprinted, any booke or Copy against the fourme or meanyng of any ordynaunce prohibition or comaundement conteyned in any statutes or lawes of this Realme or in any luiunctions or Letters patentes or ordynaunces passed or set fourth by her Maiestie, this defendant is not to be charged as he thinketh by the said ordynaunce or decree, for that the whole course and meanyng of the said ordynaunce is as he thinketh to restrayne the prynting of bookes not fitt to be prynted, and not to restrayne somme personnes from printinge of thinges that are lawfull and fitt to be prynted, and to gyve liberty to somme one or two others only to printe the same, being as this Defendant before hath declared neither profitable to the comon welth, nor agreeing with equity as he thinketh in respect of the particular right that this Defendant and other printers have in their lawfull trade, wherein some of the Complainantes have offended in doing the like if this be accoumpted an offence.

Of all which matters this defendant doth most humblie beseche this honorable Courte to have good consideracon and regarde, for that the case doth not only concerne this defendant to the perill of his estate but also many more of his trade and arte of printing and by example is like to be drawne to the ymmynent daunger and hurte of very many others of her maiesties louing and faithfull subjectes, if order and redresse be not had hereof in tyme, as it is particularly knowne to somme of the Complainantes who have heretofore wisshed to have given large sommes of money to have all pryveledges dissolved as noysome and hurtfull to the comon welth Without that, that this Defendant did knowe the same decree to be in such sorte as it nowe appeareth or that this Defendant did print any bookes in contempt of the said Decree for he thinketh that neither by Lawe nor by the true meanynge of the said decree he is to be charged or tro[u]bled in this case, which he praieth may be tried by Lawe

And the said Henry Jefferson th[e]other Defendant for him self saith, that being ignorant of the said Decree, and having served seven yeres apprentice in the trade of a printer and bookeseller, was hired by the said Robert Bourne th[e]other Defendant to serve him in the trade of a printer for the printing of the said bookes mencioned in the bill of complaint and was to have a weekely allowance or wages of the said Roberte for his paynes according to their agreement, which this defendant for ought is yet declared thinketh he might lawfully do, All which matters this defendant is re[a]dy to averre and prove as the Courte shall award and praieth to be dismyssed with his Costes on this behalf wrongfully susteined

4 May 1586. The arguments of the Patentees in favour of privileges for books.

[This paper was evidently intended to justify the Star Chamber decree of the 23rd June following, then under consideration.]

To the right honorable the Lordes of her maiestics previe Counsell./ The humble peticion of her maiestics Patentees for pryntinge.

AIE it please your honors, of your accustomed goodnes and Justice, to have consideracon of the reasons and peticon herevute annexed and with convenient spede to take somme order for reformacon of the disorders therein menconed, because they tende to the weaknyng of her Maiesties Prerogative and the vudoing of all her highnes Patentees for prynting. And your orators shall according to their duties praie to GOD for the preservacou of your Honors

Reasons for maynetenance of Privileges for printing./

Inprimis All princes in Christendom, where printing is vsed, doe graunt

privileges, somme for yeres som for life and some in fec./

In this Realme, the Quenes maiesties noble progenitors, have from tyme to tyme graunted privileges ever synce the saide mistery was first vsed in the lande which were alwaies held good

Then her maiestics Prerogative being no lesse then the prerogative of her highnes predecessors it seemeth greate bouldnes in those which nowe impugne her maiestic herein and that without peticon to her highnes, with declaracon of the inconvenyences if any were seeing also that heretofore, her maiestics patentes for printing, have not onclie ben

allowed of, but fortified also by a decree made in the starre chamber in the Eight yere of her Maiesties reigne, by inflicting punishmentes to the infringers of them./

But for the conveniency of privileges It were very necessary for the common welth, that none shoulde prynt at all, but suche as are authorised from her maiestic beinge knowne men. ffor if every man maie print, that is so disposed, it maie be a meanes, that heresies, treasons, and seditious Libelles shall often bee dispersed, whereas if onelie knowne men doo prynte this inconvenyence is avoided./

Also priviledges, are occasion, that many bookes are nowe prynted, which are more beneficial to the common welth, then proffitable to the pryutor, for the Patentee beinge benefeted otherwise by Bookes of profitable sale is content to bestowe parte of his gayne in other bokes, which are within the compas of his patent, verie beneficiall for the common welth, and yet suche whereby the printer shall scarse reape the Tenth parte of

his charge: which Bookes wolde never be prynted if privileges were revoked./

And further if privileges be revoked no bookes at all shoulde be prynted, within shorte tyme, for comonlie the first prynter is at charge for the Authors paynes, and somme other suche like extraordinarie cost, where an other that will print it after hym, commeth to the Copie gratis, and so maie he sell better cheaper then the first prynter, and then the first prynter shall never vtter [sell] his bookes. Besides the Seconde prynter maie better the first ympression either by notes, tables, difference in paper or volume (as it is easier to amende then first to invent) which will also hynder the sale of the firste prynters bookes to his vtter vndoing. These inconvenyences seen enery man will strayne curtesie who shall begynne, so farre that in the ende all prynting will decaie within the Realme, to the vndoing of the whole company of Staconers.

Then for the price, if the patentee should exacte out of reason, because no man may print the booke but hym self. this is to be remedied by the statute of 25. H. VIII. /

If the workemanship of the patentee be worse then it ought to be, this semes, to be

a condicon in lawe annexed to the office, whereby he shall forfeite the same./

Aswell for these reasons as many other which your honors can best conceave of, your orators hope, your honors are perswaded, that their priviledges are to be vpholden / And therefore are humble suters, That it woulde please your Honors to decree some punishement that maie be certenlie inflicted voon the impugners of her Maiesties saide grauntes, for vulesse your honors doo prouide somme suche redresse all Patentees shalbe vtterlie vndon and those impugners themselves nothing advantaged, for the reasons aboue recited./

whether the linformations Delivered were true, who proceeding by autoritie of their Lordships warrant finding the said warde and others offending in the premisses Did therevppon sease their presses lettres and Bookes so printed contrarie to her Maiesties saide grauntes and committed the offendours to prison: Forasmuche the said warde for himselfe and the rest Dothe anouche that they were guiltles of ye matters wherewithe they have been charged and Doe desire they make be heard in their Defence: they [the Bishop and his assessors] are Desired to call the saide warde and the rest on the one partie and the masters and wardens on the other partie and effectuallie to examine what hath ben Don by vertue of their Lordships said warraunt, and whether the parties committed were inculpable of the matters charged upon them, for the better Discerning wherof, they are Desired to heare the parties on bothe sides at Large with sucho proofes and witnesses as made be produced, and thereuppon to certifie what they shall have found together with their opinions of the men and the matter &c.

HAT they doe cause one Simon Drynerwater and John Hunt whome (as it apperethe by their lettres of the first of this present June) they have committed to the Custodie of the Sheriffe, together with one John Lyon Butcher vppon occasion of a Coffer with cortaine bookes and other valuabilithinges found in a woodpyle of the said Lyon, to enter into bondes with sureties for their personall apparaunce before their Lordships by a Daye to be fixed: And that Lyon ye butcher be committed to prison for so long time as they shall thincke meete for his punishmente: And further that they cause the bookes to be deliuered to the Bishopp of Peterboneugh.

HEREAS sondrye Decrees and Ordynamics have vpon grave advice and deliberacon been heretofore made and published, for the repressinge of suche greate enormyties and abuses as of late, more then in tyme paste, have been commonlye vsed and practised by dyvers contentyous and disorderlye persons professinge the arte or mysterye of Pryntinge or sellinge of bookes And yet notwithstandinge the saide Abuses and enormyties are nothinge abated; but (as it is found by experience) doe rather daylye more and more encrease to the wilfull and manifeste breache

and contempte of the said ordinances and decrees to the great dyspleasure and offence of the Quenes most excellent maiestic by reason whereof sondrye intollerable offences and troubles and disturbances have happened aswell in the Churche, as in the Civill government of the state and common wealthe of this Realme, whiche seeme to have growen because the paynes and penaltyes conteyned and sett downe in the said ordynaunces and decrees have been to lighte and small for the correctyon and punishement of see greivous haynous offences, and see the offendors and malefactors in that behalf have not been see severelye punished as the qualytye of their offences have deserved. Her maiestic therefore of her most godlye and gracyous disposytion, being carefull that spedye and due reformacon be had of the abuses and disorders aforesaid; And that all, persons vsinge or professinge the arte, trade or misterye of pryntinge or sellinge of bookes, should from henceforth be ruled and directed therein by some certayne and knowen rules and ordynaunces whiche should be invyolable kepte and observed, and the breakers and offendors of the same to be severelye and sharpelye punished and corrected hathe straightlye charged and required the moste Reverend in GOD the Archebyshop of Cantebbury and the righte honorable the Lordes and others of her highenes pryvye Councell, to see her maiestye said moste gracyous and godly intencon and purpose to be duelye and effectuallye executed and accomplished./ Wherevpon the said moste reverend father and the wholle presence sittings in the honorable Courte this xxiijih dayo of June in the eighte and twentieth yere of her maiesties reigne vpon grave and mature deliberacon, haue ordayned and decreed that the ordynaunces, constitueous, rules and artycles here after

followinge fromhenceforth by all persons be dulye and invyolablye kepte and observed, accordinge to the tenour purporte and true intent and meaninge of the same, as they tender her maiesties highe displeasure, and as they will answere to ye contrarye at their vttermoste perill. Vis.

1 May 1588. The University of Cambridge again appeal to Lord Burghley against the Stationers' Company.

URE humble duety to youre Honour remembered &c. Wheras ther hath bene an ancyent privilege, graunted to the Vniuersitie for the mysterie of printinge, and the same by her most excellent Maiestie in oure Charter most gratiously confirmed, and of late yeares by your honours favourable approbation put in practyse: May it please your Honour to vnderstand, that the case standing as yt dothe, we find yt a verie hard matter, eyther for oure Vniuersity to maynteine this royall privilege, or for oure Printer to doe anie good by his trade, by reason of the Companie of Stationers and Prynters in London: who as they have heretofore taken divers of his Copies [i. s. whet

we should now call Copyright works], and printed them againe, to his great losse and hinderance, so doe they still threaten to attempt the lyke hereafter: namely and specially with a Dictionarie of his owne compiling, and lately set oute by him: and this they challenge as their owne right and proper Copie, by vertue of a generall Clawse, graunted to them from her Maiestie To prynte all Dictionaries whatsoever: which generall Clawse, eyther for Dictionaries or anie other bookes, if vnder your Honours correction we may interprete, in our judgment extendeth to suche bookes and Dictionaries only, as were then extant, when this graunt was made, and not to any that should afterward come forthe. For elles might yt be verie prejudiciall, and hinder the setting forth of manie good and profitable bookes, if learned men might not make choyse of their printer, eyther to reape the frute of their laboures themselves, or otherwise bestowe them on whome they thought good: but must all come to the printers in London only, and have their workes publisht by them. Whiche practyse of their supposed privilege, hath already greatly discouraged and almost vtterly disabled our Printer to goe forwarde in his trade: in so muche as we perceave, yf it be not looked vnto in tyme, yt will tourne to the vtter overthrowe of printing in our Vniuersitie for ever.

Thes[e] reasons thus moving vs, we are bold to become humble suters to your honoure, that you would be so good patrone, as to oure wholle Vniversity at all tymes, so to oure pore Printer at this tyme, as to become a meanes to her highnes in this behalf, that as of her gratious goodnes heretofore she hathe confirmed our Charter for the mysterie of Printing, so nowe also it may please her maiestie, for to privilege to our Printer, as well the foresayde Dictionarie of late by him set forthe, as also hereafter from time to time anie suche booke or bookes, as he shall lawfully and according to order appointed in that behalf, print, or cause to be printed: So as both we may mainteyne a print [i. c. a printing press] in oure Vniversitie with credyt, according to her Maiesties intent and the tenore of our Charter, and also oure Printer may followe his trade with some profyt, and not be molested, as heretofore, to his great hinderance and impayring of his pore stock.

Thus hoping that as you are wont, so still your Honour will be readie to procure her maiestie to showe this, and all other gratious favour, nedefull for the maintenance of good learning, to her pore Vniversitie, we cease for this tyme to trouble your Honour any further: beseching the Almightie to blesse you and all yours, with long continuance and great increase of true honour to the good of this his Churche and common wealthe. 7 FEBRUARY 1589. LETTERS PATENT TO JOHN SPILMAN FOR THE EXCLUSIVE MAKING OF WHITE WRITING PAPER FOR FIFTEEN YEARS.

[It is quite clear from this patent that some brown paper mills already existed in England. T. Churon-vard wrote his Sparke of Friendship &c., 1588, with reference to these mills.]

LIZABETH by the grace of GOD &c To all to whome theys presentes shall comme greeting Whoreas we for certen good consyderacyons vs moving haue leased vnto our welbeloved seruant and naturall Denyzen John Spylman Goldsmythe of our Jewelles for certen yeres yet enduring certen our milles in Dartford in our Countrye of Kent whiche mylles our said servant at hys owne costes and charges hathe made and converted into paper milles And there nowe maketh and entendeth to contynue the making of whyte writing paper to the great and common vtilytic and profitt of thys our Realme and especyallye

for the setting on worke of many poore men for theyr better releife. Knows ye therefore that we mynding aswell the furtheraunce of so good and necessarye a worke As also regarding the greate expences of our said servant aswell alreadye bestowed and hereafter to be disbursed and spent in and about the said milles of our speciall grace certen knowledge and mere mocyon haue given and graunted and by theys presentes for vs our heyres and Successors do give and graunt vnto our said servant John Spylman full sole and lawfull privilege lycence and authoretye That he the same JOHN SPYLMAN his servantes Deputies and assignes Englishmen Denizens or straungers onelye and none other person or persons whatsoever within thys our Realme shall and maye from henceforthe for and during the space of Tenne yeres gather provide and buye all and all manner of lynnen ranges Scrolles or Scrappes of parchiment peeces of lyme leather shreddes and clyppinges of Cardes and old fyshing nettes fytt and necessarye for the making of all or anye sorte or sortes of whyte wryting paper Streightlye charging forbydding and commaunding all and euerye other person and persons whatsoener wythin thys our Realme that neyther they nor anve of them other then suche as shalbe therevato laufullye and suffycientlye appointed and authoryzed in that behalfe by our sayd servant vpon payne of our highe indignacyon and displeasure And as they and everye of them will annawere the contrarye at they ryttermost perilles And vpon payne of forfeyting of the sayd lynnen ragges scrolles or scrappes of parchment shreddes Clippinges of Cardes and old fyshing nettes Shall during the said terme presume either openly or privatlye to provide buy or bargaine for anie maner of lynnen ragges scrolles or scrappes of parchment peeces of lyme lether and shreddes and clyppinges of lether and Cardes and old fishing nettes whatsoever or otherwise to carryo and transporte auye suche lynnen ragges scrolles or scrappes of parchment lyme lether shreddes or Clyppinges of Cardes or old fyshing nettes to anye parte or partes beyond the seas for any cause vse or purpose whatsceuer.

And for that our said servant John Spylman his executors admynistrators and assignes shall or maye the better and more amplye take and receive all suche commodytye and benefytt towardes hys said great travell and expences as maye be had and gotten by reason of the said paper milles. We therefore straightlye charge forbidd and commaunde all and everye our subjectes wythin this our Realme under the payne and penaltye aforesaid that neither they ne anye of them shall during the sayd torme presume or goe about to fframe buylde or erecte anye mill or milles wythin thys our Realme wherein anye mauner of paper whatsoever shalbe made wythout the lycence and consent of the sayd John Spylman And also that no person or persons whatsoever shall from henceforthe during the sayde terme worke or make or cause to be wrought or made anye manner of paper whatsoever, in anye mill or milles alreadye made erected or used for broune paper milles wythin this our Realme wythout the specyall lycence and consente of the said John Spilman

And We do further will and command all and everye our Instyces mayors Sheryffes Bayliffes Constables and all other our Offycers mynisters and subjectes of this our Realme for the tyme being to whome yt shall apperteyne That ye and everye of yee shall shall not onlye permytt and suffer our sayd servaunt and hys executors and hys or theyr Deputies and assignes sufficiently eauthorised onely and none other to use and enjoye the whole effects and benefytt of thys our privilege wythout anye your lett disturbance or contradicyon. But also that yf anye other person or persons shall obstynatly wilfully and dysobedyentlye repugne thys our commanudement priviledge or lycense eyther in buylding or making anye newe mill or mylles wherein any manner of paper shalbe made as aforesaid or in making anye manner of paper at anye mill or mylles alreadye builte or made or els in providing buying or bargayning for any lynnen ragges acrolles or acrappes of parchement or peeces of lyme leather or shreddes or Clyppinges of Cardes whatsoeuer ye doe arreste attache and punyshe everye suche person and persons so offending or vpon the requeste of our said servaunt ye do bring or send the same person or persons so offending before the lordes of the privic Counsell of thys our Realme for the tyme being there to recease such condigne punyshment for suche contempt and to make suche recompence to our said servaunt John Spilman as to the said lordes shalbe thought meete and convenient Anye Acte lawe statute ordynaunce provision proclamacyon vse Custome restraint prohibicyon heretofore had made vsed or ordained or hereafter to be had made vsed or orderned or anye other matter cause or thing whatsoever to the contrarye hereof in any wise notwythstanding.

PROYYDED ALLWAYES that in case the said JOHN SPILMAN his executors or assignes shall convert the said lynnen Ragges Scrolles and other thinges aboue specyfied to anye other vse then to the making of whyte writing paper as ys abouesaid And shall at anye tyme hereafter during the abouesaid terme of yeres discontynue the making of white wryting paper wythin thys our Realme by the space of syxe monethes without good and laufull ympediment. Then we declare this our present graunt shall cease and be forthwith voide And the said Stylman his executors and assignes to full from the benefitt thereof Anye thing before mencyoned to the contraryo notwithstanding.

[This most valuable paper is endorsed in Lord Burghley's own hand with the above date. Of the three printers mentioned in it Robert Waldegrave is familiar enough, Henry Sharpe took up his freedom on the 16th June 1579, see p. 680, and also I., 292, and John Hodgkys or Hodgkyns may possibly be the John Hodgettee of pp. 130 and 713. Sir R. Knightley and Mr Wyston were afterwards tried and heavily fined by the Star Chamber, but Archbishop Whitreiff good naturedly procured a remission of the fine. Strype has printed a similar Memorandum to this, in his Annals, III., Orig. paper 68, Ed. 1824.]

Breife instructions towchinge the Printer and place of Printinge the 8. first bookes of Martin and ye Minerall Conclusions, all beinge printed in a Dutch letter [type].

T is discovered, that one comminge aboute Hallowen-tyde [1 November 1588], and allso about Candlemas last [2 February 1589] to an acquayntance of his at Northampton, was both the sayde tymes broughte by his sayde frende to Sir Richard Knichtleys to see the Printer of Martin, viz Robarte Walde-grave, of whom at both the sayde tymes he received some of the Libells newlye printed. He was offred by his sayde frende to see allso Martin, as he termed him; but he did not, because he coulde not staye.

One of Sir RICHARDE KNIGHTLEYS men beinge at wyne about Easter last [30 March 1589] with an acquayntance of his in London, tolde him that be had then brought up from his sayde Master to the Earlo of Herrforde a letter and a

litle packett of writinges or bookes, which when ye Earlo had seene, he willed the servante to tell his brother from him, that 'he liked not that course': addinge, 'that as they shoote at Bishopps now, so will they doe at the Nobilitie also, if they be suffred.'

The sayde servante then also told vnto his acquayntance that the bookes were printed there; that *MARTIN* was there, and went apparelled in greene; and that ye paper, or such thinges they needed was allwayes sent downe from a Spurrier [a maker of spurs] dwellinge about Pie Corner neere West Smythfeild, who sent thither and receyved thinges from thence.

Master Baker of Northampton tolde Sharpe, that some of the Libells were printed at Sir RIGHARD KNIGHTLEYS, and so there was a speeche. [JOHN] PENRYE resorted

much to Sir BICHARD KNIGHTLEYS

Towchinge the printings of the two last Lebells in a little Romaine and Italian letter [type].

The letter that these be printed in, is the same that did printe the *Demonstration of Discipline* aboute Midsommer was twelve moneth [24 June 1588], which was printed by **Walde-grave** neere Kingston vpon Thames, as is discovered [See I. 528.]

When his other letters [type] and presse were defaced about Easter was twelve moneth [7 April 1588], he saved these lettres [type] in a boxe vnder his Cloke [cloak], and brought them to Mistris Cranes howse in London, as is allso confessed; and they are known by printers to be Walde-granes letters [type]: And it is the same letter that was taken with Hodgkys.

These two last Libells came abroade in Julye [1589] last. Now it is confessed by the Carier, that John Hodgkys that is taken, did send from a gentlemans howse at Woltonam in Warwikeshier vnto Warrington immediatlye after whitsontyde last [18 May 1589] a printinge presse, two boxes of letters, a barrell of nicke, a baskett and a brasse pott, which were delyuered to him at Warrington.

When the Carier overtooke Hodgkys on Dunsmoore, there were two strangers with him It is like[ly] they were workenen printers, whom he then brought with him from London; and it seemeth they were not the same that were taken last with him, if they say true[ly] concerninge the tyme of his hiringe of them.

Hodgkys confessed to the Caryer, that ye gent[leman] at Wolstonam, at whose howse he received the presse, did often harboure him a fourte-night together, and relieved him with meat, drinck, and money

This gentleman seemeth to be master Wisston, because (as wee beare) there dwelleth none other gent[leman] but he at Wolston. Allso he threatned the Bailiffe (beinge his tenante) that apprehended Sharpe there, that he woulde be revenged of him; and he is discovered to be an harbourer of Pennie and such like.

[It is] Confessed, that PENRYE sayde that Hodgkys printed the sayde two Libells called MARTIN Junior, and MARTIN Senior; and that he sett Hodgkys on worke. That Hodgkys aboute Easter last [30 March 1589] tolde Sharpe he had a presse, but would not name where; that at PENRYES motion he woulde take the worke in hande in steed of Walde grave, who was gone: that Sharpe should shortly heare more from him: that PENRYE tolde Sharpe how Hodgkys was in printinge of a MARTIN; that he moved him to goe with him into the North to helpe Hodgkys in printinge, who refused; And that PENRYE therevon was missinge at Northampton for a space.

Towchinge the Cheife vtterers and publishers abrode of all the Libells.

DISCOVERED by manye, that HUMPHRY NEWMAN a Cobbler in London is the principall vtterer of them, and hath had, 6. or. 7. hunderd at once of them. Sharpe confesseth that Penrye and this Newman are the Cheife vtterers of them; and that Newman about about Midsommer last [24 June 1589] would have had Sharpe into the Northe with him vnto Hodgkys, to make up the [two] bookes after they were printed. Newman came often to Northampton vnto Penrye.

Towchinge the Authoure of these Libells.

THE authoure of the written copie, that was taken by the Earl of DARRIE, taketh vpon bim to be the same, that made the first. 3. Libells, and the stile doth not varie.

That this last was contryved by Penrie besides the former presumptions (gathered of his owne speeches and dealinges in providinge a printer &c after Walde-graue his departure) the two handes vsed in the same doe seeme to be the one Penries, and the other his mans hande[writing]; as by a collation of such their writinges (as have bene heretofore taken) may appeare.

The stile of it and spirritt of the man (where he is out of his scoffinge veyne) doth alltogether resemble such his wrytinges, as he hath published with his name to them. In one or two places of it, where he mencioneth Penrye as a third person, there is a slipp vnto the first person, as if the wryter did speake of himself at vnawares.

Doctour Some hath somethings sharplys confuted Pennies fansies. Now this written Libell is very longe and most bitter and virulent againste him and his bookes.

It is confessed that Peners hath sayde before any of these Libells came forthe, that a Noble man deceased did encourage him to wryte bitterly againste ye Bishops and that (if he were discovered) he should not be imprisoned by the Commissioners but by some others for a fashion, and so shortlye after delyvered.

LIZABETH by the grace of GOD &c. To all manner of Printers Bookesellers and all other our Offycers mynisters and Subjectes greeting fforasmuche as heretofore by reason of the dyversytie and varyetie in the printing of Almanackes and Pronosticacyons by dyvers Printers wythin thys our Realme of England there have bene dyvers and sundrye faultes and other great abuses escaped and bene commytted in the same whereby greate dyscommodyties have and are daylye like to arryse and growe vales some

reformacyon therein be had knowe us therefore that we mynding the reformacyon and amendment thereof understanding that by the dilligent foresight of our loving subjectes Richard Watkins and James Robertes manye fantasticall and fond prophecienges whiche have bene accustomed to be sett forthe in Almanackes and Pronostyczoyons in former tymes are nowe lefte vnprinted notwithstanding that dyvers suche yet yearclye come to theyr handes in written Coppyes to be printed And being credyblye enformed that by theyr dilligence and meanes the said Almanackes and Pronostycons doe come yearely forthe in printe more orderlye and more apte for the benefitt and vse of our subjectes then before tyme they have done by thies Almanackes and Pronostycacyons by them of late printed being compared with other Almanackes and Pronostycacyons by other persons in former tyme printed plainelye dothe and maye appeare Of our grace specyall have given and graunted And by these presentes doe give and graunt for vs our heyres and successors vnto the said Richard Watkins and James Robertes and to their executors admynistrators Deputyes and assignes full power priviledge and authoretye that the the said Rychard watkins and James Robertes theyr Deputies and assignes by them and everye of them sclues And they being deade theyr executors and admynistrators and theyr Deputyes and assignes by them selves shall and mave during and by all the terms and space of one and twentye veres next ensuying from and after the Twelveth days of maye in the vere of our Lord GOD one Thowsand fyve hundreth fourescore and eight printe and cause to be printed all manner of Almanackes and Pronostycacyons whatsoever and all manner of Bookes and Pamiletes tending to the same purpose And whyche are not to be taken or construed other then Almanackes or Pronostycacyons being allowed by anye oure Commyssyoners for cause ecclesiasticall by what names or titles soever the same shalbe intituled named or called as shalbe printed within thys our Realme of England Wherefore by these presentes for vs our heyres and Successors we doe straightlye charge prohibitt and commaund all and singuler other Prynters Bookesellers and all others our Officers mynisters and Subjectes That they nor anye of them at anye tyme or tymes during the said terms of one and twentye yeres shall not printe or cause to be prynted anye of the said Almanackes and Pronostycacyons or anye other Almanackes or Pronostycacyons bookes or Pamfletes tending to the same or like purpose and that maye be in any wise construed and taken as Almanackes and Pronostycaeyons by what tytle or addycyon so ever yt be intituled or named nor buy vtter or sell or cause to be boughte vttered or sould anve other Almanackes Pronostycacons or other bookes tending to the same purpose then suche onely as shalbe prynted by the said Richard watkins and James Robertes theyr executors or assignes ypon payne of forfeyture of all such Almanacke Bookes Pamfletes and Pronostycacons as shalbe printed bought vttered or sold contrarye to the lymytacyon and meanyng of thies our letters patentes and also vpon payne of forfeiture of Twelue pence for energy Almanack and pronostication so to be printed bought vttered or Solde. All whyche said forfeytures to be to the vse our hevres and Successors.

And moreover by these our letters patentes for vs our heyres and Successors We do wyll and commaund aswell the master and wardens of the Art or mysterge of Stacyoners in our Cyttye of London As also all other our Offycers minysters and Subiectes as they tender our favour and will avoyde our displeasure and indignacyon for the contrarye That they and everye of them yf neede shall requyre do ayde and assiste the said Richard watkins and James Robertes theyr executors admynistrators and assignes and energy of them aswell for searching for all suche person and persons offending herein As in the due exercysing and executyon of this our present lycence and priviledge With

effecte and in all matters incident to the same according to the true meanyng of these presentes for that expresse mencyon of the true yerelye value or of anye other yerelye value or certentye of the premysses or of anye of them or of anye other guyftes or grauntes by vs or anye our Progenytors vnto the said Richard watkins and James Robertes before thys tyme made in these presentes ys not made or anye statute acte ordynaunce provysyon proclamacyon or restrainte thereof to the contrarye made had ordeyned or provyded or hereafter to be made or provyded or anye other thing cause or matter whatsoever in any wise notwithstanding

IGHTE Honorable and our singuler good Lord, yt is no smale greife vnto vs to become troblesome to your Lordship: so oftentimes aboute one matter. But such is the importunitie of our Adversaries in devisinge againste vs newe complaintes, as wee are forced eftscones to renewe our just Defense. Erwhile they chardged vs, as Doinge wrong to Master Barker in printing A Bible of the lesser volume: Now they accuse vs as offringe like injurye to Master Days in publishing therewith the Psalmes in metre. They seeke, by dividing the persons, to make vs seeme guiltie of manie crimes: whereas in very truthe, our Printer havinge for his copie one only volume.

wherein both those bookes are ioyned together, could not convenientlie set furth the one without the other, seinge bothe Do iointlie and vsually serue for the publique celebracon of Divine Service. The suite which they have made vnto your Lordship for the staye of our Printar vntill the next terme, is so prejudiciall to the poore man, as, if they should prevaile therein, it could not but tend to his vtter vndoinge; specially Sturbridge faier now Drawinge neere, beinge the chiefest time, wherein he hopeth to reape greatest fruite of this his travaile. Wee are the rather therefore right humblie to craue of your good Lordship that (yf they cannot be pacyfied otherwise) your Lordship would be pleased, to requeare the opinions of the Master of the Rolls, the Lord cheif Justice of the common pleas, and Justice Pervam; who all, or some of them (as we heare) either already are, or shortlie wilbe there in London. Our selues have conferred with Divers of good skill in the Lawes of England; who not Drawen to favour vs in respect of anie fee, but vtteringe freely there resolute Judgement, can finde no sound reason whereon the aduerse parte, may safely relye, for the cheefe grownde they seeme to lay (viz. That the Prince, by vertue only of Prerogative, may by A later Graunte ether take awaye, or abridge A former beinge no waies hurtfull to the state) is not onlie againste the rule of naturall equitie, but also Daungerous to all Degrees, openinge a way to the overthrow of all Patentes and Privileges aswell of inferiour trades, as of Offices, Landes, and livings whatsoever. Wee have not soughte to call into question the validity of the [i]re monopolies, and engrossementes; whereby such hard effectes Do Daylie ensue, as poore schollers are either Driuen to be Destitute of most needfull bookes, or to buy them (to there singuler hinderance) at excessive prices. Wee shall accompt ourselves well apaied, yf our poore Printar may, with there good patience, now and then Deale with some fewe of the most salable Copies for his necessary maintenance in honest sort. Yf your Honorable perswasion (wherevnto it might well beseeme them in a case of such equitie to gene better eare) cannot induce them to

yeld to this: rather then on Dutifull regard should seeme to be wantinge in the necessarie Defense of this our Charter, which so neerlye concernes vs, our Printer shalbe ready at your Lordships appointment, to ioine with them in the triall of his righte, upon any accion that they shall bringe againste him. Suerlie yf this Charter so equable in it selfe, so commodious to the studentes of the Vniuersitie, so beneficiall to manie other subjects of the realme, graunted by her Maiesties most noble father, ratyfied by the gratious bountie of her selfe, established by Acte of Parlament so manie yeros past, may not be thoughte suffycient againste the [i] re grauntes so latelie obtained: wee know not vpon what privilege wee may hereafter repose our trust.

Wherefore once againe most humblie besechinge your good Lordship to continue your Honorable fauour toward the vniversitie in preserucinge the anneient and lawfull Charters of the same: in all humble Duetie wee recommend your Lordship to the most

blessed protection of the Allmightie. from Cambridge the xvjth of July 1591



[With the exception of the Extracts reprinted on the next four pages, permission has not been granted by the present Court of the Company to reprint this Section of this Register, occupying from folio 427 to folio 436.

These Ordinances are chiefly the decisions or arbitrations of the Executive of the Company upon complaints of or disputes between individual Stationers. They are certainly not the Court Book of the Company from 1576 to 1603 A.D. which has apparently perished; and which is succeeded by another series of Volumes now extant lettered C. D. E., &c. which contain the minutes of the Court of Assistants in regular succession to the present time; and which, as distinguished from these Registers of the Company, might be termed their Records.
