REPORT.

To the Legislature :

The Commissioners of Emigration of the State of New York respectfully present their annual report for the year ending December 31st, 1883, the thirty-seventh since the establishment of the commission.

At the annual meeting of the present Board held on the 20th day of February, 1883, Commissioner Henry A. Hurlbut was elected President, and the following standing committees were appointed for the ensuing year, to-wit:

Castle Garden Committee - Charles N. Taintor (chairman), George Starr, Edmund Stephenson, George J. Forrest, Charles Hauselt and the President.

Ward's Island Committee — George Starr (chairman) Chas. F. Ulrich, Chas. N. Taintor, James Lynch, Chas. Hauselt and the President.

Finance Committee — George J. Forrest (chairman), Edmund Stephenson, Chas. F. Ulrich, James Lynch, the Mayor of the city of New York and the President.

The work of the commission is carried on under two general departments, known as the Emigrant Landing Department, at Castle Garden, and the Hospital and Refuge Department, at Ward's Island, each of which is specially supervised by the respective committees appointed by the President of the Board.

LANDING DEPARTMENT.

During the year 1883 the number of passengers from foreign ports that arrived at the port of New York was 454,124, of whom 405,909 were aliens, and 48,215 were citizens of the United States, or had previously visited this country. The number of alien passengers arriving annually at the port of New York since the establishment of this commission in 1847 is as follows:

By virtue of the act of the Legislature of the State of New York, passed in 1855, the Commissioners of Emigration designated Castle Garden as the legal landing depot of emigrant passengers for the port of New York, and required all vessels bringing immigrants to New York from foreign ports to land them at said depot. In 1883 there were landed at Castle Garden 388,242 steerage passengers. The total number of alien passengers was 405,909, comprising 176,691 from Germany; 55,184 trom Ireland; 41,525 from England; 19,976 from Sweden; 11,939 trom Norway; 25,485 from Italy; 7,577 from Russia; 10,326 from Switzerland; 8,404 from Denmark; 4,877 from Bohemia; 3,971 trom Netherlands; 8,922 from Scotland; 3,095 from Austria; 3,840 from Wales; 3,932 from France; 13,160 from Hungary; 386 from Luxemburg; 1,331 from Belgium; 1,161 from Spain; 104 from Turkey; 12 from Iceland; 4,011 from various ports.

In the above table the State of New York is credited with 165,-664, or $20\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. of the total number landed during 1883, but as this number includes many who remain but a short time in the city of New York before proceeding to their destination, and all who arrive destitute, and for whom employment is eventually found in other States, it is manifestly no fair criterion of the actual share of New York State in the immigation of the year.

CASTLE GARDEN.

The situation of Castle Garden is well adapted for the uses to which it is devoted. It is about one-third surrounded by the waters of the harbor, which furnish ample space for the wharves required for the reception of immigrants, all of whom come, and a large proportion leave by water. The main structure consists of the solid walls of the old Castle Clinton, which, although many years old, are still in perfect preservation.

The interior contains space ample for the accommodations of 3,000 immigrants and their baggage and for all the officers required for the Board and its offices. Having been used for its present purpose for many years, some repairs have become necessary. The principal of these are the rebuilding of the main wharf and the painting of all the interior of the rotunda and Labor Bureau and other offices. The hospital accommodations are insufficient, and should be increased. It is respectfully recommended that an appropriation of \$25,000 be made for these special repairs.

All incoming passenger vessels from foreign ports are boarded by officers of the commission, whose duty it is to make an examination as to the cleanliness of the vessel, ascertain the number of alien passengers, the number of births and deaths, if any have occurred, the amount and character of sickness during the voyage, receive all complaints that immigrants may have to make, and subsequently to report at Castle Garden.

These officers superintend the landing of the passengers and see that runners and other unauthorized and evil-disposed persons are excluded. The steerage passengers, after having their baggage examined on the vessel by the United States customs officers, are brought directly, by barge or steamboat, to the landing depot at Castle Garden, and are carefully examined, as they enter, by the chief clerk of the bureau, and a medical officer attached to the local hospital. The object of this inspection is to ascertain if any sick have escaped the notice of the health authorities at quarantine, (who are thereupon transferred to the hospitals at Ward's Island), and likewise to discover if possible, any one likely to become a future charge to the State, such as blind persons, cripples, lunatics, and paupers. This examination being ended, the immigrants are brought into the rotunda in the interior of the Castle Garden building, where their names, places of nativity, and destination are recorded. It is well warmed, lighted and ventilated. and will contain about 3,000 people. Here the newlyarrived immigrant finds facilities for supplying every immediate want: A restaurant furnishes him plain food at reasonable prices. Exchange brokers are present to change the immigrants' gold and silver coin, as well as bank notes and drafts, into United States currency. To guard against error, the market rates and the daily fluctuations of foreign exchange are marked on boards conspicuously placed, and the broker is required to pay the current rates without deduction, and to give the immigrant a written memorandum of the transaction. Before they leave the rotunda the names of immigrants are called who have letters or friends awaiting them, and who at once receive the former or are delivered to the care of the latter. Every facility is afforded immigrants to communicate by telegraph or otherwise, with their friends, without the necessity of leaving the building. The depot is supplied with all requisite conveniences for cleanliness and domestic purposes, and is carefully guarded both night and day, thus affording to the immigrants, who are expecting to leave for their destination out of the city within a short time, a safe, and comfortable temporary resting place.

RAILROAD DEPARTMENT.

The following Railroad Companies are now represented at Castle Garden, the New York, Lake Erie and Western, the New York Central, the Pennsylvania Central, the Baltimore and Ohio, the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western and the New York, West Shore and Buffalo. From these Railroad Companies, immigrants can procure passage tickets at the established rates to any place in the interior, and their baggage is checked, and with themselves conveyed, without extra charge, to the railroad depot.

CITY BAGGAGE DELIVERY.

To provide for cases in which immigrants wish their baggage carried to any part of New York or adjacent cities, the Board has entered into a contract with the Castle Garden Express Company, by which, as a consideration of the exclusive privilege of carting all baggage not called for by the emigrant with his own conveyance, they agree to transport all single packages to one address below Fourteenth Street, at thirty cents; above Fourteenth Street to Fifty-ninth Street, forty cents; above Fifty-ninth Street, fifty cents; Williamsburgh, Brooklyn, Jersey City, and Hoboken, fifty cents; Paterson, Newark and Elizabeth, N. J., seventy-five cents; no other charge is permitted to be made.

INFORMATION BUREAU.

Of the whole number of immigrants who landed at Castle Garden, 28,291 were received by their friends, through this bureau, 574 children not in charge of their parents, were forwarded to their friends, 633 husbands received their wives and children, 589 parents received their children, and 10,055 persons received their kindred of different degrees of relationship.

EMIGRANT BOARDING-HOUSE KEEPERS.

Boarding-house keepers, duly licensed, are, after the preliminary rules of registration have been complied with, allowed the privilege of entering the Castle Garden rotunda.

These boarding-house keepers are obliged to provide suitable board and lodging for such emigrants as they may lodge, and at reasonable prices approved by the Board. But few complaints have, during the year, been received from emigrants against these boarding-house keepers, owing to the stringent rules adopted by the Board and the constant surveillance kept over them. From the reports made to the Commissioners, there were 50,314 immigrants lodged in these boarding-houses during the year.

WARD'S ISLAND BUREAU.

This bureau receives all applications from immigrants for admission to the State Emigrant Institutions at Ward's Island, or for other relief. The records of arrivals are kept in this office and are examined to verify the right of the applicant to aid from the commission.

Attached to this bureau is a resident physician, whose duty it is to assist the landing officers in inspecting all immigrants when they first land, and to examine all sick and destitute applicants for relief, and to visit all such as are residents of the city.

RECEPTION HOSPITAL,

At Castle Garden, where sick immigrants are temporarily admitted and cared for until they can be removed to Ward's Island. The number of persons treated in the reception hospital during the past year was 1,160. There were forty deaths, and thirteen births. The accommodations at this hospital should be greatly enlarged and better fitted for this important hospital service.

LABOR BUREAU.

The labor bureau which is maintained at the expense of the German and Irish Emigrant Societies, is of great benefit to the thousands of immigrants who arrive each year with no avowed destination beyond the City of New York, and are desirous of obtaining employment, but entirely ignorant as to the best means of looking for it. As many of these are skilled workmen, laborers, mechanics and useful servants, it will be readily understood that an institution like the labor bureau must be valuable alike to the general public and to the immigrants themselves. During the year employment was found for 27,903 immigrants, of whom 19,519 were males, and 8,384 females.

The bureau undertakes to supply employers all over the United States.

With few exceptions the females are engaged as domestic servants. The cost of transportation is usually defrayed by the employer. The average monthly wages paid farm laborers and female servants were as follows:

The large amount of correspondence received from all parts of the United States, and the substantial figures in the report for the year, speak for themselves as to the effective work of the labor bureau. No charge is made to the employer or the immigrant for any service rendered.

UNITED STATES CUSTOMS BUREAU.

This bureau, where all duties on the effects of immigrants must be paid, was established at Castle Garden some years ago in connection with the office of the Collector of the Port. Its officers continue to perform their functions with every regard to the convenience of the immigrants.

RETURNED IMMIGRANTS.

During the year 1,350 immigrants were, through the agency of this Board, returned to the ports whence they came. Of this number fifty-three were insane, six were blind, four were deaf and dumb, and sixteen were idiots, twenty-five were cripples, sixty were enciente, 649 were incapacitated through illness, seventy-five by reason of old age, and 462 were, through destitution or inability to obtain employment, unable to maintain themselves without becoming a public charge. The provision of the act of Congress which forbid the landing of immigrants unable to maintain themselves without becoming a public charge cannot be properly enforced without penalties for their violation, which the law does not inflict. Recommendations have, however, been made to Congress to remedy this defect in the law.

Assisted Emigration from Ireland.

During the year 1883, in the months of June and July, many immigrants arrived at this port from Ireland whose passage was paid by the government of Great Britain. Some of these persons had, through the agency of the Poor Law Guardians, been sent to this country directly from the poor-houses. The steamship Furnessia arrived June 25, with three hundred persons whose passages had been paid in this manner, and among them were found a large number of pauper immigrants who had been inmates of poor-houses and who had no relatives or friends in this country able or willing to aid them, nor were they able to maintain themselves. A special meeting of the Board of Commissioners of Emigration was immediately held and the following resolution adopted ;

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Board be directed to detain all immigrants who shall prove to have been sent here by funds furnished by the British government, and that a committee of this Board be appointed to wait on the Collector of the Port, and present the affidavits taken in regard to such cases, and ask that the steamship company who brought them here be compelled to return them. In response to this resolution the hearty co-operation of the Collebtor of the Port was secured, and a large number of these pauper immigrants were returned to the ports whence they came.

In addition a stipulation was obtained from the steamship companies to the effect that they would return free of expense to the Board, all immigrants who on inspection at Castle Garden, were found to be unable to maintain themselves without becoming a public charge.

It has, however, come to the knowledge of the Board that a large number of "assisted" immigrants were landed in Canada, and came into this State by railroad, thus preventing any inspection or supervision of them by this Commission.

From the published statistics it is ascertained that of the 183,105 immigrants landed in Canada during the year 1883, 72,820, or forty per cent. came into the United States presumably by railroad, and consequently were not inspected, nor made subject to the provisions of the act of Congress to regulate immigration.

STATE EMIGRANT REFUGE HOSPITALS, WARD'S ISLAND.

On December 31st, 1882, there were in the hospital 391 patients; during 1883 there were admitted 3,818. The total number treated during the year was, including 164 children born, 4,373. Of these 3,755 were discharged, and 349 died, leaving on the 31st of December, 1883, 269.

On the 1st day of January, 1883, there were 186 patients in the asylum for the insane, ninety of whom were males and ninety-six females. During the year 153 patients were admitted, making the whole number of patients treated 339. Of those discharged forty-six had recovered, thirty-seven were improved, 105 were unimproved, twenty, who were admitted for examination, were found not to be insane, and sixteen died. The number remaining December 31st, 1883, was 115.

On the 31st day of December, 1882, the whole number of immigrants on Ward's Island was 868; during 1883 there were admitted 4,344, and the number remaining Dec. 31st was 636, as follows: 269 in hospital, 115 in asylum, and 252 in the Refuge.

I. NUMBER OF IMMIGRANTS PROVIDED WITH EMPLOYMENT.

During the year employment was procured for 27,903 persons, of whom 19,519 were males, and 8,384 females.

Included among the foregoing were 393 families, comprising 1,180 persons.

II. CHARACTER OF THE EMPLOYMENT OBTAINED.

The foregoing statistical report embodies your customary summarized record for the year just past. As my own incumbency of the position of chief medical officer of your hospital was not assumed until the 15th day of last March, you will doubtless desire a further statistical record of the hospital for this period of nine and one-half months, which I herewith briefly append.

The considerable diminution (two per cent.) of mortality rate for these nine months as compared with that for the year is fully accounted for by the generally improved sanitary condition of the hospital, and the great falling off in immigration, the tide of which has been shown* to effect so directly the mortality rate of the hospital.

There again appears on the hospital records for the past year a large relative number of deaths, sixty-six in all, of patients brought to this hospital in a moribund condition; of this number twentynine died within twenty-four hours of their admission and an autopsy was required to reveal the cause of death; these are so called coroner's cases, and with (3) deaths of prematurely born children and (3) cases the coroner investigated personally, making thirty-five in all, should under no circumstances be charged to the mortality rate of this hospital. In this connection I cannot too seriously call your attention to the pressing need of improved facilities for caring for such cases at the Castle Garden hospital, and further, that more suitable boats for the transportation of the sick from Castle Garden to this hospital should be provided than the draughty, and ill arranged ones now in use.

With the exception of the epidemic of puerperal fever in the lying in department, last spring we have been during the year remarkably free from any epidemic influence in the hospital, and a puerperal fever epidemic is so purely local in its character that I may frankly say there has been absolutely no general epidemic influence extant during the year. In regard to the puerperal fever, notwithstanding the minutest preclutions were

taken to isolate all cases and their attendants and every known means of disinfection employed, it rapidly spread until sixteen cases appeared, nine of which resulted fatally. As promptly as the circumstances would permit an entirely new department, with new supplies and attendants, was opened in the so-called annex pavillion, and we continued to occupy this building until the cool weather of the fall returned us to our old wards. As no new case has developed since this change was made, I trust we shall be able to secure a continuance of our mastery over the recurrence of this most insidious and fatal disease.

The changes I have made throughout the hospital during the past nine months have been numerous, though largely in matters of detail in the re-arrangement, re-modeling and repair of the furnishings, and the cleansing, disinfecting and painting of almost every ward of the hospital now in use. These, though small matters in recapitulation, represent a large amount of labor done by the various employes and inmates of the hospital, and affect materially the general sanitary condition and discipline of the various departments. The work has been accomplished almost exclusively without the importation of either labor or material, so that by utilizing our old material with our own hands much has been done at a very trifling cost, and further there has been set up among the nurses a wholesome feeling of rivalry regarding the good appearance and cleanliness of their several wards.

The appointment of night nurses throughout the hospital has proved an endless benefit to our patients. It is most gratifying to me to be able to report no department of the institution without its proper night attendance.

The experiment of placing the venereal wards, male and female, in a building by themselves and keeping each ward in strict quarantine has, I think, proved most judicious and satisfactory, for through this complete isolation we avoid all danger of their communicating either moral or physical disease, while it further aids most materially in our plans of treatment.

By the recent establishment of a children's ward, supplied with suitable crib-beds, a very pressing need of the hospital has been satisfied. The iron cribs used, unearthed from the old barracks, have been transformed into most comely and useful beds for this purpose. They have all been placed and supplied with mattresses and bedding at almost no cost of new material. The recent purchase of the pretty little chairs and decorated tables you have so kindly furnished the children, together with a provision for suitably uniforming them, will, I am sure, greatly assist me to make this department devoted to these sick little aliens as complete in its arrangements as it will be interesting for the good work accomplished.

The male convalescent ward has recently been neatly furnished, and is now thoroughly complete in so far as its cheeriness, the com.

fort of the patients and a wise economy could be met. It has proved of invaluable aid to us in the handling of patients during the convalescent period and often a great relief to our overcrowded sick wards.

The general sanitary condition of the hospital and asylum since the completion of the excellent work you instituted last year in the way of special repairs has been very satisfactory, and compares favorably, I am sure, with any municipal or State charitable institution in our country.

To the Consulting Board of Physicians and Surgeons, I am indebted for their valuable advice in matters concerning the hospital hygiene, as well as their prompt personal assistance in our struggle with cases of difficult surgery and obscure disease.

My acknowledgments are also due my Associate Medical Staff, for their valuable aid in the works of their respective departments.

In all my work during the period of my service as your Chief Physician, it has been my aim to act in harmony with your expressed policy of rigid economy, while at the same time I have endeavored to keep clearly in mind the fact that nothing was economy which deprived a patient of any necessary comfort or in any way deteriorated the sanitary candition of the hospital; and while taking a very lively interest in the general executive and sanitary work, I have also sought to remember that my first duty was at the bedside with the immediate needs of the sick.

In conclusion let me thank you, Mr. President and Gentlemen of the Commission, for the very hearty co-operation you have at all times tendered me in this noble work, and especially are my warmest thanks due to the gentlemen of the Ward's Island Committee.
