The first five Lectures have been delivered, and the attendance and income have fully equaled the expectations of the Committee, and they have every reason to believe that the remainder of the course will be equally successful and instructive.

The Committee have also taken into consideration the subject of giving instruction to young mechanics in architecture and machine drawing, and have engaged Mr. Stitson as teacher of the class in mechanical drawing, and Mr. Paton as teacher of the class in architectural drawing, and proposes to commence their classes on the evening of Thursday, 13th January, 1859, in the premises occupied by the Male Department of the Society's School.

NOTE.—The first meeting for the formation of Classes was held as above on the evening of 13th January, and the result was highly gratifying to the Committee and all present. Eighty-seven names were entered as pupils. The number now is over one hundred.

The Committee, in their Report, state that they are much in want of a small room adjoining the Library, for the use of the Librarian, where newly purchased books can be placed while in the course of preparation for the shelves ; and they respectfully call the attention of the Society to the very limited space at their command ; the shelves being already so full it is extremely difficult to find room for the new books as they are added, which is the cause of much inconvenience and loss of time. And the Commit-

tee also respectfully suggest to the Society the immediate necessity of making such suitable provision, by enlarged accommodation, as will enable them to afford sufficient room for the use of the Library and its numerous visitors and readers.
