

In presenting this report the Committee again congratulate the Society, that notwithstanding the disastrous condition of the country, the usefulness of the Library has been considerably extended, not only by the admission of Females, but also among those to whom it has been always open. They remark that the experience of the past year has shown that but little, if any, in-

more than in any former year.

convenience has arisen from admitting the females at the same time with the males. The privileges of the Library and Reading-Rooms have also been extended to wounded Soldiers and Seamen of the Army and Navy, but it took place so recently that there has not been time to show the effects of the measure. They also remark, that the want of space for additional books, as well as for the accommodation of Readers, has been a matter of serious consideration with them for some time past.
