Besides these there were also 319 volumes loaned out to be read in the rooms.

The Library was closed this year one month earlier than usual, which, of course, would make a difference in the number of volumes read, but still it is 9,697 more than in any previous year. The Library was opened to readers this year a month later than usual, in consequence of the time required to complete the alteration of the premises, but, notwithstanding this, its operations have been eminently successful. By the first of January, three months after the opening, the number of readers was greater than in any entire year except the last.
