There are also three (3) sleighs in the Department for the use of the Captains in the Thirty-third, Thirty-sixth and Fortieth Precincts.

I respectfully recommend that when wagons or equipments of any kind relative to horses are to be ordered that the officer in charge of the horses, wagons and equipments be notified and supplied with a copy of the specifications, and that he furnish a sample of same.

Also when wagons are ordered to be repaired that the said officer be notified.

All such articles to be delivered to the storekeeper at No. 94 Charles street, there to be examined by the officer in charge of the horses, wagons and equipments, and that the said officer then report to the Commissioner of Police, whether such article or articles are in compliance with the specifications and in accordance with the sample furnished.

This, your Honor, will enable the officer in charge of the horses, wagons and equipments to keep an accurate record of all goods appertaining to horses in the Department.

I would also respectfully recommend that when requisitions for supplies appertaining to horses are made that they be approved by the said officer in charge of horses, wagons and equipments; this sir, will regulate the distribution of such equipments.

STEAM CASUALTIES FOR THE YEAR 1901.

March 12—Anton Zier, an engineer employed by the Arion Club, Fifty-ninth street and Park avenue, was severely scalded about the legs while taking out a nipple in the blow-off pipe of boiler between the shell and valve. This accident was caused through his own carelessness he having failed to let the hot water out of the boiler before taking the nipple out.

April r—John Purcell, of No. 72 West Ninety-ninth street, an engineer in charge of a portable boiler owned by Edward Wood, contractor, received injuries from which he died by being scalded from escaping steam, caused by over pressure forcing crown sheet from stay-bolts. No damage to property.

April 2—Henry Otten, 28 years, of No. 566 Lexington avenue, a fireman in the employ of Fleitman & Co., No. 484 Broome street, was scalded to death by the bursting of the crown sheet of locomotive tubular boiler at the above place. Cause, low water. No damage to property.

July 25—Charles Forsetti, of No. 17 Sullivan street, and Joseph Dooley, of No. 324 Tenth avenue, firemen employed by C. Poyet, No. 452 Tenth avenue, received injuries from which they died by being scalded from escaping steam. This accident was caused by a rupture in the hip of one of the boilers at the above place.

The new six-section multiple switchboard recently installed in the operating room has four new lines connecting with the Spring Street Exchange of the New York Telephone Company, making a total of ten lines. More operators were required for the service, which has rapidly increased in the past year.

Underground Cables.

When the underground cables of the Police Department were laid in 1893, they were intended to carry the business of the Department at that time, the old City of New York, with provision for the usual normal increase. But since consolidation these cables have been taxed to their uttermost capacity, all spare wires being used, and frequently these wires deteriorate and have to be abandoned.

It is absolutely essential to obtain an appropriation as soon as possible to enable the Department to renew, repair and extend underground cables in the Borough of Manhattan, and to furnish new cables in the Borough of The Bronx, where subways have been built. During the past year many breaks were discovered in the arm of the cables, caused, sometimes, by the work of enlarging manholes, but particularly to the construction work of the Underground Rapid Transit. In some cases the substitution of new sections of cable will be necessary.

Banks and Exchanges.

The lines and instruments connecting the banks and exchanges with police-stations have worked satisfactorily during the year.

The Department has not, as yet, obtained an appropriation for an adequate system of signals and telephones for patrol services in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. The importance of this has been fully reported for several years. The signal system in operation in the Borough of The Bronx, comprising about thirty (30) boxes, was introduced about thirty years ago, and while good results are obtained, it does not now meet the requirements of the service in the borough. I respectfully urge the prompt consideration of this important subject. The officers on patrol should be supplied with the latest approved means of communicating matters of importance to their stations, and calling for assistance without leaving their posts to use private telephones.

In the Borough of Brooklyn there are 566 miles of overhead lines strung on the poles of the various telegraph and telephone companies, and on the relevated railroad structures. Many requests have been received from the Department having charge to remove our wires from the poles, which could not be done as there was no money appropriated for the purpose. The telegraph and telephone companies are rapidly placing their wires under ground, almost all such lines in the principal streets are already so provided for, and yet the poles cannot be taken down as they carry important police wires. This is also a great inconvenience and expense to the said companies, who are obliged to maintain these poles to accommodate the City Departments, and at the same time are compelled, themselves, by the City to place wires underground.

I beg to urge the importance of obtaining an appropriation for placing the lines underground in this borough, thereby securing reliable service, free from interruption, to which overhead lines are subject. This applies in an especial manner to this borough, where there are so many overhead trolley and electric-light wires, which seriously interfere with good telephone service. It will also enable us to co-operate in the work of removal of poles from the street and be a saving in the end, as the police lines in this borough must be placed underground in the near future.

In the Borough of Manhattan the work of placing police wires underground was accomplished in three years, being done in three sections, and obtaining from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, each year, sufficient money to carry on the work, the total cost of which, in the Borough of Manhattan, was \$59,000.

Several of the precinct station-houses in the borough are connected on a single wire; they should be provided with separate lines, in order to secure good service.

The station-house signal equipment at some of the stations, also many of the patrol boxes, are worn out from long and constant use, and new equipment should be obtained to replace these old ones, which are no longer serviceable.

I would also recommend that as soon as practicable the patrol signal system be extended to the precincts in this borough not already supplied.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

There are 95 1-5 miles of police telephone lines in this borough, connecting Police Headquarters, No. 122 East avenue, Long Island City, with the precinct station-houses, Branch Board of Elections and St. John's Hospital.

These 95 1-5 miles of wire were constructed in the latter part of 1900. Since that time a large sum has been saved in tolls and the private line service secured, which is so essential to an efficient police telephone service.

BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

There are 59 miles of police lines in this borough, connecting the Eightieth Precinct (Stapleton) with the sub-stations. These lines have been given considerable attention during the year, and are all in good condition, except the line to Tottenville (17 miles), which has been used for many years. It is old iron wire and should be replaced with copper insulated wire, for which provision is already made in this year's supplies.

PENSION FUND.

A detailed report was submitted to the Mayor, pursuant to the provisions of section 351, chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901 (Charter), and published in the CITY RECORD of February 5, 1902. That report set forth the transactions relative to the Pension Fund for the year in full detail.
