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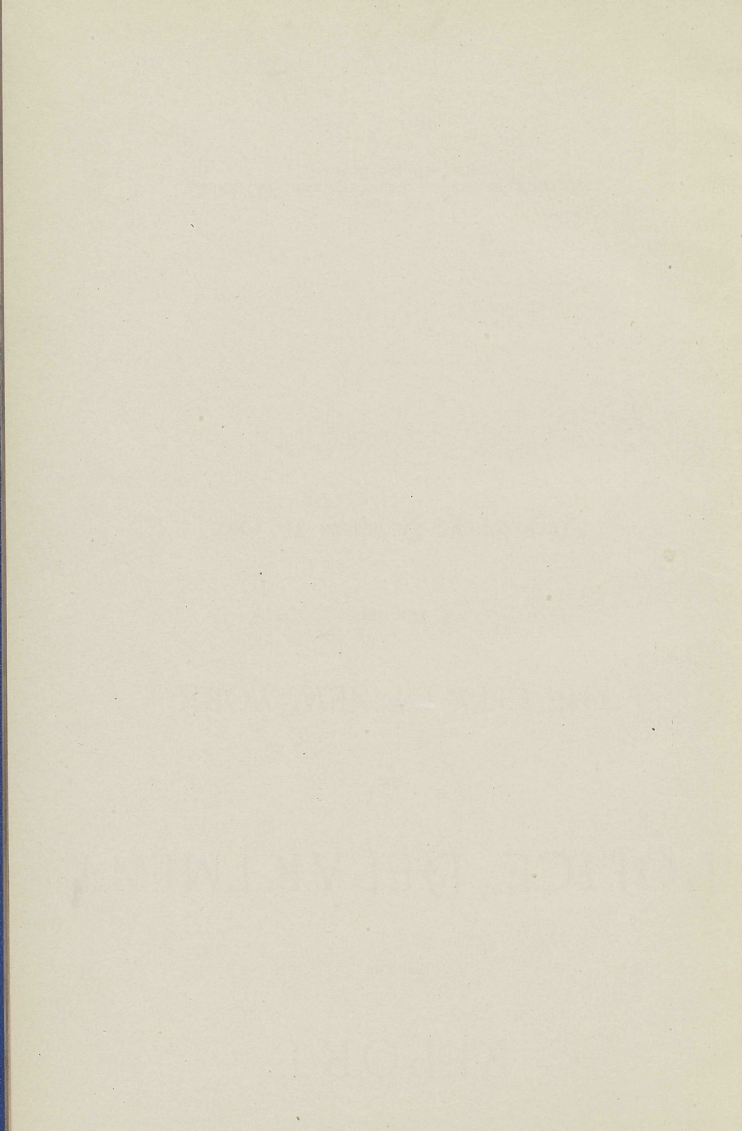

Four patrol wagons (two each in Manhattan and Brooklyn), have no regular precinct assignments, but are being used for emergency purposes or as substitutes for wagons undergoing repairs.

It is respectfully recommended that new patrol wagons be provided for the Fifty-third, Sixtieth, Fifty-fourth and Sixty-sixth Precincts, and new single patrol wagons for the Forty-seventh and Seventy-second Precincts, and that the present patrol wagons at the Forty-seventh, Fifty-third, Sixtieth, Sixty-fourth and Sixty-sixth Precincts be overhauled and repaired, to be used as substitutes for wagons undergoing repairs, or to meet other emergencies.

The Seventy-second Precinct, which covers a large territory, is not provided with a patrol wagon, and as there is no prison attached to said precinct the prisoners are conveyed to the adjoining precinct stations, thus necessitating a long drive for patrol wagon and horses called upon to serve the Seventy-second Precinct, as well as a prolonged absence from their proper precincts.



The old buggy at Fortieth Precinct Station, for use of Detectives, should be condemned and sold, being of no further use to the Department, and the Captain's buggy now at Seventy-eighth Precinct may be repaired and transferred to the Fortieth Precinct Station to replace the above mentioned carriage when condemned and sold.

It is also recommended that new buggies be provided for use of Captain of Seventy-seventh and Seventy-eighth Precincts, respectively.

Besides the persons technically charged with violation of one or more of the various statutes relative to gambling of all kinds, the above figures also included the persons arrested in poolrooms, gambling houses, etc., when raided, and arranged as "disorderly persons."

Among the gambling material seized were 499 packs of cards, 37,261 chips, also quantity of chips not counted and described as 13 boxes and 4 bags of chips, 153 dice, 15 roulette tables, 25 roulette wheels, 16 faro tables, 23 poker tables, 18 slot machines, 2,061 lottery tickets, also a large quantity of poolroom, racing and policy material.

SIR—In conformity with the rules of the Department, I herewith respectfully submit a report of the service of this Bureau for the year ending December 31, 1902.

The report contains the number of steam boilers examined (tested hydrostatically) and their condition, together with the number of applicants examined as to their qualifications as engi-

neers and firemen to take charge of and operate stationary and portable steam boilers and engines in The City of New York, the number of arrests made for violation of the Steam Boiler Law, and the disposition of the same by the City Magistrates. Also the amount of money paid to the Treasurer of the Police Pension Fund, collected from the owners of steam boilers for certificates of inspection, as provided by chapter 8 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897 (Charter).

#### ENGINEERS AND FIREMEN.

For the year ending December 31, 1902, there were 15,833 applicants examined for engineers' and firemen's certificates to take charge of and operate stationary and portable steam boilers and engines. Each applicant was examined as to his experience, qualifications and knowledge of steam boilers and engines. Of this number 15,206 passed a satisfactory examination and were granted certificates and 627 were rejected.

## STEAM CASUALTIES.

At 9.45 A. M. March 21, 1902—The discharge pipe to the ammonia condenser on the second floor of the building occupied by William Miles & Co., brewers, No. 55 Chrystie street, opened at the seam. James Crowell, Sr., aged sixty-one years, and his son, James, Jr., both of Mosher avenue, Riverdale, were overcome by the fumes of the ammonia which escaped. The former recovered, but the latter died at the Gouverneur Hospital shortly after admission. The seam of this pipe was defective. The pressure on the pipe at the time was much less than usually carried and allowed.

April 15, 1902—A tube in one of the boilers at the New York Theatre, Broadway, Forty-fourth and Forty-fifth streets, became overheated and fused. Owen Lamb, thirty-two years old, of No. 439 West Thirty-eighth street, the fireman who was in the boiler room at the time, was

scalded by the escaping steam and died at the Roosevelt Hospital on the day following his admission. No other damage.

April 15, 1902—A two-inch steam pipe at the United Electric Light and Power Company, Nos. 407, 409 East Twenty-eighth street, burst at the welded seam, caused by a defective weld in the seam. No other damage to life or property.

April 26, 1902—A small boiler used for heating the flat building, No. 51 East Ninetieth street, exploded, completely demolishing same, caused by overpressure. No person was injured. This boiler was exempt from inspection under section 343 of the Greater New York Charter.

At 9 A. M., August 29, 1902—An engine at the Edison Electric Illuminating and Power Company, at the foot of East Twenty-eighth street, burst a cylinder head, caused by water being in the cylinder occupying the clearance space between the piston and cylinder head. No one was injured.

October 21, 1902—One of the tubes in water tube boiler of the Brooklyn Glycerine Manufacturing Company, Nos. 251 and 255 Greenpoint avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, split at the seam or weld. The escaping steam severely scalded the fireman, Christian Andersen. There was no other damage.

On November 9, 1902—Boiler No. 2 located at the Pumping Station No. 2, Queens County Water Works, exploded at 8.30 A. M., while in charge of William Digby, engineer, and James Lawson, fireman. The latter was instantly killed, and the former subsequently died from injuries received.

The rupture took place below the longitudinal seam, tearing the whole sheet, which was very much corroded and pitted. The boiler was built in 1896 and was considered a high grade class of boiler. The boiler was inspected February 5, 1902, by John S. Higgins, Inspector of Steam Boilers, Borough of Brooklyn. A hydrostatic test of 135 pounds was applied and 90 pounds of steam allowed.

The safety valve of this boiler was found about 150 feet from the boiler; the lever was broken off and the valve could not be raised from its seat. The stop valve was found near the boiler, closed tight. If this stop valve was attached to this boiler and with the safety valve were both in the same condition at the time the boiler was put in commission as when found, there is no other outlet for the steam or relief for the boiler. The cause of the explosion was due to an overpressure of steam.

The above steam plant was situated on the meadows of Flushing bay and large quantities of salt water were used for boiler purposes. The testimony of experts before Coroner Nott, who held inquests on the bodies of the engineer and fireman, testified that the water was very injurious to the boiler, which caused excessive and rapid grooving and pitting which weakened the boiler.

The fact of the use of this water was not called to the attention of this Department, either by the Water Department of the Borough of Queens, who was the owner of the boiler, or the engineer in charge, William Digby, whose duty it was to so report.

The jury found a verdict in accordance with these facts and condemned the further use of this water for boiler purposes.

The number of recorded messages this year exceeds the number of the preceding year by 21,441. There is a remarkable increase in the number of switchboard connections made daily, requiring the constant attendance of six (6) operators, from 8 A. M to 6 P. M., four (4) from 6 P. M. to 12 P. M., and two (2) from 12 M. to 8 A. M.

*Underground Cables.*

\*\*In the Borough of Manhattan the underground cables of the Department are in good condition, except where they have been disturbed by the various underground construction work in progress throughout the City. Our cables are nearly all small and easily broken, so that they have required considerable repairing during the year.

I beg to call attention to the fact that when the cables were laid—1893-1895—they were intended to carry the business of the Department at that time, but since consolidation they have been taxed to their utmost capacity. There are now no spare wires, which are always required, as the wires deteriorate and have to be abandoned. In some places new sections of cable will have to be provided. It is therefore necessary to obtain an appropriation for the repairing and renewing of cables in the Borough of Manhattan and for the furnishing of new cables in the Borough of The Bronx, where many miles of subways have been constructed during the past few years.

*Banks and Exchanges.*

The lines and instruments connecting banks, exchanges, etc., with police-stations have worked satisfactorily during the year.

## BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The removal of the Thirty-fourth, Thirty-seventh and Fortieth Precincts to the new stations necessitated the rebuilding of lines for telephone and signal service, and transferring of apparatus, etc.

The following precinct station-houses are connected on a single wire, viz.: Forty-sixth and Seventy-third; Forty-third, Seventy-first and Eightieth; Sixty-first, Sixty-second and Sixty-third; Fifty-ninth and Sixtieth; Sixty-seventh and Seventy-second, and the Sixty-eighth and Sixty-ninth Precincts. These precincts should be supplied with separate lines in order to secure better service.

In this borough the only lines underground are 1,200 feet; 15 pair cable, Smith street, Headquarters to Atlantic avenue; 375 feet, 75 pair cable, Smith street Headquarters to Fulton, and 1,000 feet, 40 pair cable, on Jay street, Fulton street to Myrtle avenue. All the other lines throughout the borough are strung on the poles of the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company and upon elevated railroad structure. Numerous requests have been received from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity to remove our wires from these poles. This could not be done, as there was no money appropriated for placing the wires in the subway. This is the cause of constant complaint from the telephone company, on account of the expense of maintaining the poles for the accommodation of City Departments, and at the same time are compelled themselves, by the City, to place their wires underground. It also impedes the work of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity in its effort to remove the poles from the streets. I therefore urge the importance of obtaining money to place the Police Department wires in the subways in this borough.

The signal system equipment at some of the stations, especially the Fifty-fourth Precinct, also the patrol boxes, are in use many years, and are in some cases entirely worn out. It will be necessary to renew them this year. I would recommend that the patrol, signal and telephone system be installed in precincts not already equipped, beginning with the Forty-third, Forty-seventh, Fifty-third and Sixty-second Precincts, which comprise the most thickly populated sections.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

There are 116 miles of police lines in this borough, an increase of over 20 miles of line built during the year. This was made necessary on account of the transferring of Headquarters from Long Island City to Jamaica.

The five patrol telephone stations above mentioned were installed last August at important points along the Boulevard, between Far Rockaway and Rockaway Beach. They were established at locations having a considerable number of permanent residents, and they are particularly advantageous during the summer season on account of the large number of daily excursionists to the various places of amusement. Then, again, there is a large summer population at the hotels and boarding-houses in the vicinity, rendering it important that the officers have a means of communicating quickly in cases of emergency. The officers on patrol are required to report from these stations regularly during the tours of patrol duty. It was considered necessary in this Borough to have each station and substation connected with the local telephone exchange, so that people residing in the vicinity, as well as the patrolmen on post, could communicate with the police stations. In the absence of a signal and telephone system the importance of this connection is obvious.

The transfer of borough headquarters from Long Island City to Jamaica necessitated the leasing of a metallic circuit line between Police Headquarters, No. 16 Smith street, Brooklyn, and Police Headquarters, Jamaica, Queens. Provision is made in this year's supplies which will enable us to build our own line.

#### BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

There are 59 miles of police lines in this borough, connecting the Eightieth Precinct (Stapleton) with the substations. These lines are all now in good condition, having been almost entirely reconstructed during the year.

On February 22, 1902, a very severe sleet storm occurred, which did great damage to telegraph and telephone lines. The police lines in the boroughs of Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens

and Richmond, many of which were old iron wires, were completely destroyed. In the reconstruction of these lines, the following number of miles of wire were used :

SIR—I have the honor to herewith forward a report of the work and special work done by the members of this command during the year 1902.

During the month of January, 1902, the United Engineering Company was engaged in making borings for the East River Tunnel off Pier 4, East River, for the Rapid Transit Commission of the State of New York. The work was frequently interrupted and stopped by vessels colliding with the structure erected in the river, causing great loss of property and delaying the work. A roundsman and a detail of men were placed on two tugs furnished by the engineering company and the work was resumed and brought to a successful completion.

During the month of February the German royal yacht "Hohenzollern" arrived at this port and was met and escorted to her dock at Hoboken, N. J., by the "Patrol." A few days after Prince Henry of Prussia arrived and was met and escorted to the pier foot of West Thirty-fourth street. In the meantime the "Hohenzollern" had been berthed at same pier, and during the stay of the Prince and the "Hohenzollern" at this port the "Patrol," with a detail of men, was constantly on guard and also escorted the Prince on all the trips he took on the water; also attended the launching of the yacht "Meteor" at Shooter's Island and kept the river clear of vessels.

During the year many fires occurred on ships and along the water front. The "Patrol" attended and assisted with her fire appliances and towing burning vessels and barges out into the stream and keeping them from setting the shipping and docks on fire.

We also rendered service to the United States naval authorities by sending details of men down the bay, boarding incoming vessels, arresting deserters from the naval service and delivering them to the commander of the Navy Yard, Brooklyn.

We also assisted the United States Custom House authorities and arrested parties engaged in smuggling tobacco on steamers of the American Line, and property of the value of \$1,500 was recovered.

Many persons were rescued from drowning, and many bodies recovered from the river, and assistance given to vessels that had been in collision.

The members of this command have performed special duty on shore in various parts of Greater New York during the year.
