

After twenty-one years, "the Zone" surrounding Chornobyl is comparable to JRR Tolkein's description of the Land of Morder. Even Reactor Number 4 eerily resembles Mount Doom, rising above the dangerous and desolate (except for rotating teams of workers) countryside, its invisible radioactive fingers stretching across an otherwise stunningly beautiful landscape. LA ZONA (THE UNNAMED ZONE) is a documentary about three children and their families affected by the worst nuclear disaster in human history at the Chornobyl nuclear power plant. Ukrainian films have been internationally recognized at major film festivals winning top awards such as the Palme d'Or at Cannes and the Silver Bear at the Berlin International Film Festivals. Here are five short films that have been honored throughout the international film festival circuit.

WAYFARERS (PODOROZHNI)

Director: Ihor Strembitsky

A filmic series of impressionistic documentary portraits of people in a senior citizen's home and in a psychiatric hospital in Kyiv. The film searches the faces, movements and stories of its characters for the human qualities that we all share (*from 6 Degrees website*). Winner of Best Short Film, Tirana Film Festival (2005); Palme d'Or Best Short Film, Cannes Film Festival (2005). Ukrainian with English subtitles.





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PLAY FOR THREE ACTORS (P'YESA DLIA TRIOKH AKTORIV) Director: Oleksander Shmyhun

Animated short film on how true friendship, love, and commitment can help survive even the cruelest adversities in life. Winner of Audience Award for Best Short Animation at Sao Paolo International Film Festival (2005).

COUNTERCLOCKWISE (PROTY SONTSIA)

Director: Valentyn Vasianovych

This short film is about the proverbial odd man-out who tries to escape from the numbing predictability of everyday life, as well as from his nagging wife escaping into a world of his own imagination translated into art. This film was awarded a Special Jury Prize at the 7th International Short Film Festival at Clermont-Ferrand, France (2005).

THE SHOOTING GALLERY (TYR)

Director: Taras Tomenko

Synopsis from the Berlinale's jury: "THE SHOOTING GALLERY is a portrait of a childhood in black and white. A raw poetic film whose dramatic use of light and shadow gives a painfully intense picture of its young hero. THE SHOOTING GALLERY becomes a symbolic site for hopes and dreams and a street kid's desperate desire to escape his dismal life". An engaging animation about everyday life in a Ukrainian city enacted by passengers from all walks of life stuffed into a packed streetcar. Winner of the Silver Bear at the Berlin International Film Festival (2003).

DEAD ROOSTERS (MERTVI PIVNI), Andrij Parekh

Two re-united brothers descend into an explosive rivalry, where competition and jealousy have an irreversible outcome. This film won the Grand Marnier Film Fellowship at the New York Film Festival (2004). Russian with English subtitles

ANGELUS, S. Poznanskiy and Anton Tromimov This film portrays the hard physical labor elderly inhabitants of one village in Ukraine still endure to earn their livelihoods today. Jury Diploma (Honorable Mention) Molodist Kyiv International Film Festival, Ukraine (1999).
