quently formed clays were laid down in this district. Any greater than the ice or outside of it to transport such coarse materials the bottom. From Dresden southward to Chubb's Dock, the scalled Champlain clays rest on the uneven and often kamelil surface of these older gravels and sands.

Such amassments of gravel have already been noted in t Hudson valley occupying a like subjacent position to the Alba clays, as at North Albany and in numerous sections fro north of Cohoes to the point where the stream draining Rou lake falls into the Hudson. The deposits are evidently glaci margin deposits associated with the final melting out of the i If the structures of these gravel deposits at North Albany a Dresden have been correctly interpreted, it would seem as if a time at least the land must have been higher than it was duri the lake stages in which clays were deposited and high enough relation to the southern Hudson valley to permit a rather f run off of the glacio-natant waters. The isolated facts cited fr the talus at the southern base of Skene mountain at Whi hall and the similar phenomena east of Saratoga lake [see p. 13 strengthen this conclusion—that changes of level were tak place during the retreat of the ice sheet. This particular mo ment appears locally to have affected lands lying above sea le Its recognition carries with it, in view also of the marine depos which followed, the assumption that following the disappeara of the ice from this portion of the valley a reversed movement in by which the land was lowered on the north relatively to southern part of the State so as to produce an uplifted barr in that direction capable of retaining the waters which formed lakes whose records are so clearly shown in the succeeding de its of clays and marginal sand deltas. It must be borne in m however, that these earlier movements preceding the clea records of the glacial lakes and the marine invasion depend scattered and fragmentary evidence which further study of district may prove in a better light to be capable of a differ interpretation.
