- The strengths of this course lies within Professor Wawro who was an extremely knowledgeable lecturer. However, his lack of online notes meant that if I didn't manage to focus for the entire class, I would miss out on certain things and have no means of finding a way to understand them.

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- This course is great as a political science major because you will take away real knowledge about Congress that you would need to know if you plan to pursue a career working with the legislative branch. Wawro lectures without any PowerPoint, which I find I take the most from because there is nothing to distract you from the points that he makes.
- I think the course does a great job doing what it is supposed to do -- teaching you everything there is to know about Congress. While some may argue that it is a pretty one-dimensional course, Wawro does a good job teaching the topic in a comprehensive way that includes a great deal of political science theory.
- In the end, the topic is too broad for us to really engage with certain materials. This makes lecture sometimes feel stale or like a history class. Nevertheless, I think Professor Wawro does a great job keeping it relevant to current events.
- Great course, sometimes hard to see how reading dovetails with lecture, would be nice if some of the less interesting readings were cut, some were very useful/interesting but some were very dense and not very rewarding, though these were in the minority. The course definitely contributed to my knowledge of the subject matter. As a senior, I did not find the course particularly helped me develop analytical and reasoning skills, nor did I expect it to, but the extensive feedback given, and outlining of expectations and advice in lecture, could be very beneficial to younger students. Professor Wawro goes above and beyond in this respect.
- I enjoyed how the course focused on one subject at a time which made it less confusing. Also I liked how flexible the schedule was that allowed for more time on difficult subjects. I wish we would have had more time to talk about foreign policy and Congress.

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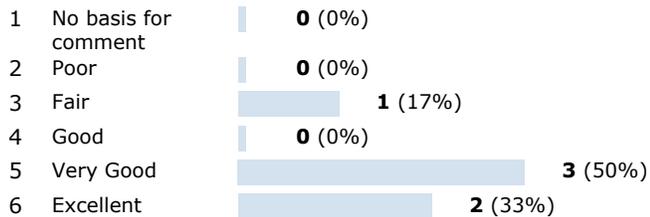
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TA Graph Report for: **Joseph Lyons Sutherland**
